MINUTES.

The Mt. Zion Association of Missionary Baptists convened in thirty-eighth annual session with the Jonesboro church on Thursday before the second Lord's Day in October, 1891. The ody was called to order by Eld. E. P. Minton, the former Modrator, who read a Scripture lesson from the 9th chapter of Corinthians, after which the Association was led in prayer Dr. J. B. Searcy.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. C. B. Hunfrom John iv: 34-35. After the sermon the Association recess until 1:30 pm. Benediction by Eld B G. Manard.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reassembled. After singing Eld. J. T. Prior led the body prayer. The former Clerk being absent, Eld. J. H. Amacker on motion, elected Clerk pro tem. The letters from the less were read by Elds. J. T. At 7:80 p.m. the Association reassembled. Eld. B. G. Mand, the appointee, instead of preaching, delivered a most mannet, forcible and eloquent lecture on the destitutions mannet the State and the work accomplished by the State mand in attempting to supply said destitutions with the manual. The lecture closed with a collection taken to aid the Board in its work.

After prayer by Dr. Searcy the body adjourned until to-

FRIDAY - MCRNING SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and bowed in prayer with Eld. D. H. Hall.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved. The roll was called and absentees marked.

An invitation to seats with the body was accepted by Eld, L. H. Fowler from Mt. Vernon Association.

Messengers to corresponding bodies were appointed as follows:

The Association being entitled to one delegate to the Southern Baptist convention, Eld. J. H. Amacker was, by acclamation, elected as such, and Eld E. P. Minton declared alternate.

Eld. W. G. Stamper was recognized as a delegate from Bethabara church.

The report en College Work was read. Pending its adoption a collection was taken for Ouachita College. While the collection was being taken Bro. J. H. Kitcheus, Jr., informed the body that Bro. J. T. McKinney, who died since the last meeting of the Association, had given the college his note for \$24 to help liquidate the debt hanging over it, and that the Association had established the precedent of paying off such notes given by deceased brethren, whereupon the body at once took up a collection to pay off this debt, which was immediately done. In addition to this collection the one just begun amounted to \$20.25 cash and \$6 in subscriptions. Total collection \$50.25.

The report was then adopted as follows:

Your committee on college work would report that this is the most important enterprise that we have in the State. Our children must be educated or they must become the servants of those that are. To allow others to educate our children is in effect to consent that our children, for the most part, shall never be Baptists. But if we educate them ourselves we must have a college, or colleges, in which to educate them. We sommend most heartily the effort of the brethren at Mountain Home to build up an institution of learning of high grade at that place under the direction of Baptists. We hope in the near future they will have a noble college there. But the Baptists of Arkansas already have a college, of which they may justly be proud. It is now in the fifth year of its active work. last year there were 330 students enrolled. This year we exnect a much greater number. The faculty is filled with twenty active teachers. A great number of young ministers are in attendance and many more are coming. Ou schita College is the place where the Baptists of Arkansas should educate their nons and daughters. The progress of this college has been unparalleled; but, with all its prosperity, it has an harrassing debt, though its property is worth some \$60,000, yet there is a debt of some \$12,000 that must be met. Only a little more then half that amount is reliably provided for. To the Baptists of the whole State, this college looks for the support it must have or suffer. Will our people rise up in their strength and may off this debt and thus stop interest and expense? It is the wisest thing we can do. Respectfully submitted,

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Ministerial Education ask to report follows:

That in this age of progress and general diffusion of intel-

gence among the people we recognize the fact that an educated ministry is an absolute essential to the prosperity of our denomination and the successful propagation of its doctrines. Therefore, we do most earnestly recommend that this Association make a persistent effort to aid any worthy young men who reside within its bounds, who may in good faith be making an attempt to qualify themselves to preach the gospel of Christ, and that this be done in a systematic and efficient manner and in a spirit of discriminating generosity.

We further report that the churches composing this body have, during the past year, contributed to this cause \$125.60, which has been expended assisting our brother, E. J. A. McKingney, whom we believe to be worthy of the beneficence.

HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions beg leave to report as follows:

We find that comparatively nothing has been done for Home Missions. Only \$33.05 have been paid, Jonesboro Church paying that amount. Our home Board is doing nobly, but could and would do much more if all our membership would contribute of their means as the Lord has prospered them. The outlook in Cuba and the Indian Territory is very encouraging. 'The fields are white to harvest," and we should send out the reapers and gather it. We can do this only by a consecration of both ourselves and our means to the Lord's cause. Therefore we would respectfully recommend a more thorough consecration of all that we have and are to Him "who became poor that we through his poverty may become rich."

STATE MISSIONS

Your Committee on State Missions would submit the fol-

lowing report:

We are apprised that the destitution in our beloved State wery great. The increasing development of our State demands of us, as Baptists, increased energies and contributions within our bounds. Our State Board has undertaken a grand work in sending the gospel to the destitute places, and unless we place the means in their hands this work cannot be done. We find that very little has been done the past year on this line. We find that only \$68.60 has been paid, as follows:

Your committee would therefore offer the following mommendation: Let there be appointed in each church a maintee of one, and only one, to represent each Christian interprise that appeals to the church for aid. For instance, let there be one to represent Foreign Missions, whose duty it shall to devote himself entirely to that work. Let him make a lat of the members and see to it that each one during the year matributes something to that enterprise, if it be only one milkel. In the same way let there be one each to represent lione, State and Associational Missions, one to Quachita College, one to Ministerial Education, one to collect the pastor's lary, one to Ministerial Support, etc.

We would further recommend that as many as half of
