SATURDAY, OCT. 8, 1898.

The Fayetteville Baptist Associasion of Washington county, Arkansas, met with Liberty Church on the above date and was called together by singing, and prayer was offered by Elder I. M. Phillips of Springdale. The introductory sermon was then delivered by Elder A. H. Autry, from the 27th verse of the 13th chapter of the Book of Numbers.

After the sermon the Association adjourned until 2 o'clock.

2 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was called to order for business by the former Moderator, Elder, H. C. Winstead, and prayer by Elder Frances Bozeman.

Letters from the different churches were then called for and read by A. H. Autry and C. W. Walker. The Association then organized by the re-election of Elder H. C. Winstead Moderator, and H. P. Greene Clerk and Treasurer.

On motion New Bethel Church was restored to membership.

Pelifomury letters were then called for and none received.

On call for visiting ministers, Elders J. S. Spyres and J. R. Peters responded.

On motion the following committees were then appointed by the moderator:

On motion a committee on 5th Sunday meeting was appointed by the Moderator and T. H. Lee, F. T. Coffee and J. S. Spyres were put on same

On motion 10 o'clock on Monday was set apart for the report on Associational Missions.

A call was then made for correspondence and none received.

On motion the Association then adjourned until 9 o'clock Monday. Prayer by Elder W. S. Luper.

MONDAY, 9 O'CLOCK A M.

The Association was called to order for business by the Moderator and a scripture lesson read and prayer offered by D. L. Hood.

On motion the time for the report on Associational Missions was extended to 2 o'clock p. m.

Report of the Executive Board was read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Obituaries read and approved.

Report of the Committee on Home Missions read, heartily endorsed and adopted

On motion a committee on Orphans' Home was appointed and Elder Frances Bozeman and Thos. H. Lee were put on same

On motion a committee on nominations, consisting of Λ . C. Dees, H. H. Cook and W. N. Elliott was appointed.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was then read, and after much interesting disscussion in favor of the same, was adopted.

On motion the Association then adjourned until 1 o'clock.

1 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was called to order for business. Prayer by Elder Frances Bozeman. The subject of Ass'al Missiens was then called up, read and discussed and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Orphans' Home read, approved, and a collection of \$5.55 placed in the hands of Elder Bozeman for this work.

The special committee appointed to select some one for the Associational Mission for the ensuing year, reported and recommended Elder I. M. Phillips, who was, by acclamation, ananimously elected, and \$110 in pledges by the churches and individuals made and paid for this work.

Report of the Committee on Ministerial Education read and adopted.

The report on State Missions was then read, ably supported by C. W. Walker and adopted.

The Committe on Sunday Schools was then read and endorsed by Elder J Crawford and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Denominational Education read and adopted.

The Committee on Publications then made their report, which was adopted.

Resolution No. 1 was then, on motion, introduce 1 and approved.

Treasurer's report read and adopted.

The Committee on Foreign Missions then made their report, and after some discussion in support of the same was most cordially endorsed.

On motion, the subject of a 5th Sunday meeting in the bounds of the Association, and in the interest of the churches and of Baptist Sunday Schools, was liberally discussed, and endorsed, and a Committee appointed to arrange a program for the next 5th Sunday.

The Committee on nominations then made their report which was adopted.

On motion the Association then elected C. W Walker, A. M. Reed, I. M. Phillips, H. C. Winstead and J 'rawford as messengers to the State Baptist Convention, and on motion Elders A. H. Autry and Frances Bozeman were chosen as messengers to the next Southern Baptist Convention.

Brother I. M. Phillips was chosen corresponding messenger to Benton County Association, Brother H. C. Winstead to Madison County Association and J. R. Peters to Clear Creek Association, and on motion any member of this Association who will visit these Associations and carry our Minutes may act as corresponding messenger.

Report of the Committee on Finance read and adopted.

Resolution No 2 was then introduced by Brother Bozeman and approved. 500 copies of these proceedings were ordered printed, the clerk to superintend the same, and to receive \$10.00 for his services.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet with Springdale Church on Saturday before the 2nd Sunday in October, 1899.

Reports of Committees.

HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., has control of the Missionary work among the foreign population on our shores, together with the Negroes of the South, the Indians of the West and the population of Cuba.

In the last named country the work has been greatly retarded of late by the terrible scourge of war, but we pray and confidently expect that the wrath of man may be made to praise the Lord, by permanently opening new doors to the Missionary of the Cross We hail the dawn of a new day when the Gem of the Antilles shall not only be free from Spanish oppression but from the rule of error and sin.

On our own shores the work has been crowned with a fair measure of prosperity during the past year. Among the foreigners of our great cities and among the negroes of the South some advances have been made, especially along educational lines, and we look to the future for a more intelligent and godly citizenship among these classes than in the past.

We heartily recommend the work of the Home Board to the favorable consideration of our churches, assured that it is worthy of our most liberal sympathy and contributions.

STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee on State Missions submit the following report:

Representatives from 49 Associations and about 1350 Baptist Churches compose the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. As the Association is the creature of the churches,

so the State Convention is the creature of the churches and Associations. All of the enterprises fostered, all of the agencies employed by this body, center in one grand object, viz; the evangelization of destitute portions of the State, to aid weak churches, to organize new churches and Sunday Schools, and to carry the gospel to such destitute portions of the State as have it not. To this end the Executive Board of the Convention at its November session employed and put into the field two Evangalists, but for want of funds only one is now retained. Encouraging reports come to us from every portion of the State in which our Evangelist, Bro. Tate, has labored, especially from the border Counties on the north. Fifteen Missionaries are employed who are preaching to weak churches, unable to sustain a pastor; they are located in such centers of influence as will yield the best results to our State work; about \$2,000.00 is expended for their support. We have also an Orphans Home, located at Monticello, and three colleges, one at Arkadelphia, one at Mountain Home and one at Conway, the two first named for males and the last for females. All of these are under the control and fostering care of the Convention, are all well attended and have able corps of instructors. Thus it is that our young men and women can obtain in Baptist institutions such instruction as will thoroughly equip them for their life work.

Such, brethren, is the magnitude of the work Arkansas Baptists have undertaken, and we of the Fayetteville Association must share the responsibility for the failure or success of this undertaking.

Our Executive Board, with W. E. Atkinson at its head, has planned wisely for carrying forward this grand work. Urgent appeals come to us for aid, let us wake up to the full measure of our duty and responsibility, let us rally to the support of our brethren by contributing liberally in carrying into effect the plans so wisely laid by the Board. This is our semi-centennial, our jubilee year, may it indeed be to us all a jubilee.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Your Committee finds that nothing has been done the past year for Associational Missions, owing to the failure of the churches to make contributions for that work. Some of the churches sent their contributions to the last Association, a

part of which was used toward the liquidation of the old Associational debts. Since the last Association very little has been sent the board for Associational Mission work. This is a sad state of affairs. Our churches hesitate to contribute to this mission work because of the uncertainty of securing a missionary. Therefore, your Committee would make the following recommendations:

I. That this Association elect, during its present sitting, an Associational missionary, who shall be employed by, and take the field under the direction of the executive board, whenever sufficient means shall have been received from the churches to begin and prosecute the work.

II. That a special Committee of three be raised to make nominations for a missionary and report to this Association, subject to the approval of this body.

III. That the messengers pledge their churches for any amount they may deem practicable. Otherwise, the churches are urged to inform the board as early as possible of the amounts they can raise for the prosecution of this work during the ensuing Associational year.
