#### **Baptist Literature**

Report was read by Chairman Haycock and at request Editor J. S. Compere very ably presented the subject after which was adopted as follows:

"As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he;" and as a man reads, so does he think, whoever determines the reading of the people will determine their thinking, and their character, and their actions. If we let the devil determine what the people read we shall give him a terrible advantage. If the reading of the people is determined by the will of Christ it will help wonderfully in bringing in the kingdom.

Southern Baptist have a great publishing plant at Nashville, Tenn., under the control of the Sunday School Board. This publishing plant has been a great blessing to our people and to our cause. Besides the Sunday School literature that is used in all our Sunday Schools, this Board publishes Home and Foreign Fields, the greatest missionary magazine in all the land. It also publishes and circulates many of the finest religious books and tracts, written by our own Baptist people.

The Baptist Advance and Book House at Little Rock are the property of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The Baptist Advance is circulated and books are distributed all over Arkansas. This is done not as a money-making enterprise, for there is no personal profit to any individual from the business, but it is for the strengthening and extension of Christs kingdom.

We strongly urge that every church in this Association take steps to put the Baptist Advance and Home and Foreign Fileds in every home represented in its membership.

We also recommend that churches and pastors carefully look after the reading of all their members, and encourage them to buy and read the best religious books.

## B. Y. P. U. and Sunday School Report.

We would recommend:

1. That we do our own Baptist Sunday School work in the Association.

2. Believing that the future of our churches depend largely upon the proper training of our young people and believing that our Sunday Schools would be more effective were our teachers trained in Sunday School work—we recommend that a committee of three consisting of J. R. Allen, E. A. Rogers and B. W. Langford be appointed by the Harmony association to work out in connection with Brother J. B. Mosley, the detail of a Sunday School Teachers Convention to be held this fall—the purpose of said convention to be that of teaching teachers how to be better teachers.

3. That the Harmony Association commend the B. Y. P. U. for their splendid work in organizing the City Union which has resulted in so much renewed interest in the young peoples work and that the various unions be urged to keep in touch with Brother Mosley looking towards building up membership and interest in each church among the young people.

4. That we push State Mission Day in the Sunday School, September 28th, and make our offering as large as possible, which sum will be counted in our 75 million campaign.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

11. Chairman I. N. Moore read the report of the committee on Christian education. Dr. J. B. Searcy and Rev. J. E. Merrell discussed same briefly, By request Dr. Otto Whittington spoke on Christian Education and the 75 Million Campaign. This was a masterpiece by a master workman and the Association was thrilled.

No subject is at this moment demanding or receiving more consideration than is the subject of Christian and Ministerial education. Too long already have our people neglected this most important part of our religious work. Time was when a great many believed that a common school education was all that was needed to prepare and fit our young men and women for their lifes work, but that time has in the providence of God passed, and we are awake to the fact that in order to meet and battle with lifes problems our children should have not only a finished education, but that education should be grounded upon those high and lofty principles found only in the teachings of our Lord.

Many of our young men called of God to the ministry, have been until recent years permitted to go into the work wholly unprepared for the most important of all callings, and as a result of this policy, the denomination is paying the penalty today, as can be seen by the number of pastorless churches, the natural result of denominational neglect and indiference.

The Baptist of Arkansas have two well established colleges, Ouchita at Arkadelphia, and Central at Conway, also three mountain schools located at Mt. Home, Maynard and Blue Rige Mo., all of which deserve our hearty support. No other institutions of the church are capable of doing so much for the denomination as are the schools if we will but make use of those possibilities.

We make no recommendations with reference to the financial support of these institutions, as we understand that part so far as it applies to the organized work is concerned, will be cared for under the provisions of the 75 Million Campaign, but we do urge our people to take advantage of these great denominational institutions, when sending their children to school, if the Baptists are right, then we ought to teach our children so, and no place is so well prepared to instill the great doctrines we hold so dear, as in our denominational schools. We further call upon our churches to assist with their means if necessary, in getting the young ministers of their churches, to attend these schools, thus fitting him for a work that will redound to the honor of the church and to the glory of God.

In considering the work of the Orphan's Home, we consider the \$150,000.00 a very small amount for the great work to be done.

As to the Hospitals, we consider it a crying need of the Baptist of Arkansas and that twice the amount could be used to advantage.

As to the amount for the old ministers we consider it very small.

We recommend and trust all and more can be raised for the above cause.

The committee charged with the duties of securing and financing a missionary for the Association brings to your body the following report.

Rev. D. W. Bolton was employed by the committee for full time work at a salary of \$125.00 per month. This Association paying \$75.00 per month and the State Executive Board the other \$50.00 per month. Brother Bolton began work on December 1, 1918 and reports for nine and one-half months as follows: miles traveled 4625; sermons preached 105; religious addresses 40; sermons by others 37; churches visited 26; mission points 10; conversions 7;

## Report on Foreign Missions.

Joint Missions, State, Home and Foreign.

Any just appreciation of the Foreign Mission Board's work and responsibilities, and any effort to provide adequate resources for this work must be based upon a knowledge and just consideration of the extensive fields which the Board is cultivating, the conditions on these fields, the variety of work that is being conducted, and the necessities of the work which we have allowed to accumulate through the years.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is charged with propagating the gospel in Japan, China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, etc. Such numerous and extensive mission fields put this work out of comparison with anything else we are doing.

On these fields there are vaster numbers of human beings than the human mind can grasp. The population in these lands mounts into the hundreds of millions—some of them white, some black, some yellow, but all of them the object of God's love.

The condition of these millions as compared with the people whom we know adds emphasis to the appeal of the great field and the great numbers. These multitudes, whether in pagan or papal lands, are handicapped by ignorance and supersition, by physical suffering, and above all by aggravated sin for which they have found no remedy. If there is any pity in the Christian heart, it ought to be provoked by the deplorable conditions under which millions of our fellow beings on these mission fields are spending their lives while we enjoy the blessings of the gospel and a Christian civilization which it has produced.

But we shall not properly appraise Foreign Missions if we overlook the fact that it includes the evangelization of the lost, the education of the ignorant, the training of the saved, the healing of the sick, the housing of feeble mission churches. Indeed, all that we are doing at home through state mission boards, home mission boards, education boards, orphanages, sanitaria and the rest we are doing through the Foreign Mission Board. No adequate provision can be made for a work so extensive, sa varied and comprehensive if we put Foreign Missions on a parity with any single Christian enterprise which we are conducting at home.

There is another fact, and a great fact it is, which must be taken into consideration if we are to meet our obligations to this great work at this time. The War immeasurably enlraged our international Christian duty. The hereic efforts and sacrifices which we made to set the world free from the extraordinary restraints of autocracy creates for us a new and larger duty to promote everywhere the internal constraints of the gospel of Christ. The unrestrained freedom of unregenerated human nature inevitably menaces the world. The extraordinary world situation which we have created with our guns lays upon us the most serious responsibility to send the gospel into all nations.

The Convention at Atlanta in May recognized the new obligations which this extraordinary world situation laid upon Southern Baptists nad authorized the Board to undertake reconstruction work in Europe, to hasten with the gospel into disturbed and endangered Russia, and to set up the banner of Christ in Persia, Syria and in Galilee, from whence the blessings of Christ's life and death have flowed down through centuries to us, and to which we are under peculiar obligations. In the new work thus designated for the Foreign Mission Board its task and its needs have been wellnigh doubled. Let churches and individual givers lay to heart these facts in making future contributions to this work.

It is fitting to say that as poorly as we have supported this great world enterprise, the blessings of heaven have been upon it. Some of the results of the work last year were 5,635 converts baptized, 41 churches organized, two churches assuming self-support, 61,588 patients treated, and 129,298 treatments administered.

The world fields are ripe unto the harvest, but much of the bending grain will be lost if we do not quickly thrust in the sickle. The world has never seen the universal human mind so expectant, so ready to make great decisions, and therefore such need for quick and decisive action by those who would turn that mind to the right things and lead the world by the highway of the cross back to God. Foreign Mission duty was never so imperious as just now.

The Foreign Mission Board furnishes for free distribution

the best tracts and can fill orders for the best books on Foreign Missions. We would, therefore, recommend to our people that they cultivate and acquaintance with the Literature Department of the Board and seek to promote among our church membership a better knowledge of the work.

While the 75-Million Campaign has been presented in other reports your committee on Missions would add its endorsement of this movement and its admonition to the churches of the Associaiton that there be no failure to give this Campaign the most unqualified. faithful and enthusiastic support. The success of the Campaign will help everything that we are doing and its failure would hurt everything. We have set for ourselves a task worthy of a great people and shall prove ourselves worthy of our inheritance if we accomplish it. The eyes of our Lord and of the world are upon us and we must succeed in this great thing to which we have have laid our hands.

We cannot stress too much the work of our Home Mission Board. Building and helping to maintain mountain schools, helping support more than 2000 Home Boards and State Missionaries, doing intensive evangelistic work among the Negroes, Indians, and foreign populations in our large cities, they deserve our prayerful and financial support. With their church building fund and in other ways they are helping Arkansas Baptist. We owe the Home Mission Board our best help.

State Missions are really the base of supplies for all our work. We must support it with our prayers, our words, and our money.

The triumph of our 75-Million Campaign means the success of State Missions and every department our our work.

## CONSTITUTION.

## Article I.

This body shall be styled The Harmony Association, and it shall meet annually at such time and place as may be duly determined.

#### Article 11.

Its object shall be, without interfering with the independence or authority of the churches, to concentrate Christian effort in the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom at home and abroad.

## Article III.

It shall be composed of all pastors within the bounds of the association and of messengers from Baptist churches co-operating with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three Messengers and one additional Messenger for every twenty-five members, or major fraction thereof, above fifty.

## Article IV.

Its officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall perform the usual duties of such officers. They shall be elected annually and remain in office until their successors are elected. The offices of clerk and treasurer may be in one.

### Article V.

Corresponding Messengers and visitors from other bodies of our denomination shall be entitled to all privileges except voting.

### Article VI.

The business of this association shall be conducted between its sessions, by an Executive Committee of nine members, five of whom shall constitute a quorum.

## Article VII.

The Treasurer shall receive and distribute all funds belonging to the association and give an itemized report thereof, annually.

## Article VIII.

This constitution may be altered at any annual meeting of the association by a two thirds vote of the Messengers present.

3. By motion this association was named Harmony Association.
