Elders J. A. Gean, P. Sheppard, Geo. F. Moody, G. L. Richardson, O. E. Sharp, J. W. Sims and R. D. Kerr were seated as visiting ministers. Mrs. Geo. F. Moody was seated as a visitor. Ruth church was admitted into the Pine Bluff Association; also Zion Hill church, at one time a member of this Association, but after going off with the Conventionites, asked to be admitted back, which was done.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION.

Met at 9:30 a. m., pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder E. L. Page. Owing to the fact that W. E. Sherrill, Moderator, was sick and could not attend, a special prayer was offered by the Association, led by Elder J. W. Sims. Elder E. L. Page conducted the devotional exercises for 15 minutes. Reading of the letters was finished. Elder W. H. Hodges was seated as a visiting minister. The Committee on Publication made their report and after being discussed by Ben M. Bogard, was adopted. The Clerk and Treasurer's report was read and adopted. The Committee on Education made their report, and after being discussed by Elders J. W. Kelley, W. D. Dougan, G. F. Moody and Ben M. Bogard, was adopted. Elder J. W. Sims preached at 11:30 a. m., Text, 1st John 3:1-2-3.

Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at 1:30 p. m. Prayer by Bro. C. S. Bruding. A collection was taken for Bro. Cobb, who is attending the Baptist College at Sheridan, and who has been down with fever for more than a month, which amounted to \$24.22. Committee on Foreign Missions made their report, and after being discussed by Elders J. E. Ratliff and R. W. Glover, was adopted. Committee on Home Missions made their report, and after being discussed by Elders G. F. Moody and J. W. Kelley, was adopted. The Committee on Nominations made their report, and recommended that Eld. W. D. Dougan be elected to preach the next Introductory Sermon, and Eld. R. W. Glover as alternate, and Eld. J. W. Kelley was recommended to preach the next Missionary Sermon. report was adopted. New Friendship church was selected as the place to hold the next session of the Association. The Committee on State Missions made their report, and after being discussed by C. S. Bruding and H. L. Phillips, was adopted. The Committee on Romanism made their report, and after being discussed by Eld. W. D. Dougan, was adopted. As Bro. Ben M. Bogard, Assistant Moderator, had to leave, Eld. Geo. F. Moody was elected Assistant Moderator. Adjourned, to meet back at 7 p. m.

SATURDAY NIGHT SESSION.

Met at 7 p. m. After some time being spent in devotional exercises, Eld. A. Vanderhorst preached, Text, Jeremiah 12:51. A motion was carried to take a collection for Home and Foreign Missions at the close of the sermon at 11 a. m. Sunday. A collection was taken by Eld. J. W. Kelley for the Baptist College at Sheridan, Ark., which amounted to \$212.60.

Adjourned to meet at 9:30 a. m. Sunday.

Met at 9:30 a. m., pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Bro. S. R. Cobb. The Committee on Documents made their report, which was adopted. The Committee on Sunday Schools made their report, and after being discussed by Bros. J. A. Gean, Dock Sanford, W. W. Chambers, W. H. Hodges and Jno. Davis, was adopted. The Committee on Membrials Made their report, which was adopted. At 11 a. m., Eld. W. E. Sherrill preached the Missionary Sermon, Text, Dan. 2:4. There being more people than could get into the house, Eld. A Vanderhorst preached in the grove to a large crowd, Text, Matt. 7:26-27-28-29. After each sermon a collection was taken for Home and foreign Missions, which amounted to \$76.93. Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at 1:30 p. m. Prayer by Elder R. W. Glover. The Committee on Finance made their report, which was adopted. A resolution of thanks to the members of Harmony church and the good people of Prattsville for the way they took care of the Messengers to the Association, was offered by V. A. Ashcraft, which was adopted. Adjourned to meet with New Friendship

State Missions.

Your Committee on State Missions reports as fol-By State Missions we mean missionary work in Arkansas by the churches of the Baptist State Assn. There are nine Missionaries who have been putting in either part or full time this year and their labors have been blessed by the Lord. Elder J. A. Smith is the Missionary Treasurer, and his postoffice address is 906 Main St., Little Rock, Ark. Bro. Smith makes no charge for his work as Treasurer, and only receives pay for the time he actually puts in on the field. We do not regard it as being wrong to pay for the work done as Treasurer, but we report the fact for the information of the churches. We recommend that a cash collection be taken for State Missions at this hour and that we engage in prayer that the Lord may send forth more laborers into the harvest. That interest may be in-creased in State Missions, we recommend that the churches elect Messengers to the State Association, and that all of our people be urged to read The Baptist & Commoner so that they may keep informed concerning the work.

Orphans' Home.

We, your Committee on Orphans' Home, make the following report: We have, in Texarkana, Ark., a good substantial brick Orphans' Home, with 32 rooms, mostly all finished, located in a good part of the town, on a ten-acre plat of land, surrounded on every side by nice homes, many of them newly built, and occupied by good citizens, making the property now worth almost, if not quite, twice what it cost us; and, to the joy of all of us, this part of our home is all paid for. We have in this home two good mules and a wagon, several head of cattle and several nice hogs, and all this is paid for. We also have quite a lot of nice chickens, and they, too, are ours. We have in this home, together with several applications already approved, about forty children. counting Bro. Carter and his wife; all that God in His mercy and love to us, and in His confidence in us, has entrusted to us to feed and clothe; and greatest of all, to not only care for their bodies, but also to care for the welfare of their souls; and this we are doing, evidenced by the fact that all of them who are old enough are now Christians, and members of the Baptist church. this our hearts and lives should be filled with gratitude. But now comes the other side: We have run behind during this Summer, and up to now, during this period of high cost of living, about \$1,500.00 running expenses. This we owe to the good merchants of Texarkana who have been more than kind to us. We also have a farm of 140 acres of good land, which has cost us, in principal and interest, ten thousand dollars, on which we now owe a little over \$5,000. I have paid the interest up to August 25. We recommend that a collection be taken here tonight, first in cash to be paid tonight, then in pledges to be paid by January 1st, and that God being our helper, all of us give until we feel it away down in our souls. We have on this farm about 30 acres in good average cotton, from which we already have gathered five bales of cotton, and have sold only one of them. So we have four bales of cotton, together with some more that is not picked, to help us on these debts. We have several acres of just fairly good corn, and a good crop of potatoes, peas etc., to help us in feeding the children. Of course we have to pay the man on the farm that goes with the children and shows them how to workone-fourth of what is made on the farm. We do this to

keep from paying him a salary. May God help that we do our full duty.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of three Messengers chosen from each church in our union, provided that nothing in this Article shall be construed to bar any minister in good standing from serving as Moderator or Clerk, and from serving on committees.

Article 2. This Association shall be known as

The Pine Bluff Baptist Association.

Article 3. Each church composing this Associa-

tion shall be entitled to three Messengers.

Article 4. The object of this Association shall be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's kingdom on earth.

Article 5. This Association shall be considered an

advisory concil and shall have no power to legislate for the churches or lord it over God's heritage.

Article 6. Other churches may be admitted into this body when they signify a wish to do so by letter and Messengers; provided they be deemed orthodox, which shall be determined by their Abstract of Faith and Church Government.

Article 7. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session and hold their offices until their successors are properly qualified.

Article 8. The Clerk shall keep a regular file of the Minutes of the Association and turn same over to his successor in office.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of each church composing this body to send up such contributions in money, to each annual meeting, as shall be necessary to defray the incidental expenses of the Association; and each church shall be furnished with Minutes in proportion to the amount thus furnished.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of each church to send up to each annual meeting of this body a letter containing a brief history of her progress since the last session, with the following particulars, to-wit: Her prosperity or adversity, the names of her Messengers, pastors, deacons, ordained or licensed ministers, the number baptised, received by letter, by voucher, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded, dead, total in membership, time of regular meetings, postoffices, etc.

Article 11. Any church may send up any query asking advice of the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a full and fair record of the proceedings of the Association and to superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, and for his services he shall receive such remuneration as the Association from time to time may think proper.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and account for all moneys paid him for the use of this Association according to order.

Article 14. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any session of this Association when two-thirds of the members present may deem it necessary.

ABSTRACT OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe that there is only one true and living God, revealed to us under the personal and relative distinction of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe that the Scriptures comprising the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of election. as founded in the foreknowledge of God through the sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and belief of the truth.

Article 4. We believe that man was created upright, but by voluntary transgression fell from the holy state, consequently he and all his posterity became dead in trespass and sin.

Article 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ through faith in His name.

Article 6. We believe in the preservation of the saints in grace.

Article 7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteousness and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Article 8. We believe that the Christian church is a congregation of baptised believers who meet statedly and have connection together to maintain the ordinances and discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges set forth in the New Testament as pertaining to the church of God.

Article 9. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances of the gospel unless he has been regularly baptised, called and come under the imposition of the hands of a presbytery.

Article 10. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are both positive institutions, and the only ordinances of the church of Christ, and that believers are the only proper subjects, and that immersion alone is baptism.

Article 11. We believe that regularly baptised believers only have the right to commune at the Lord's Supper.

Article 12. We believe that the Lord's Day should

RULES OF DECORUM.

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. The officers of this Association shall be elected by a majority of the members present by ballot.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is kept according to the Rules of Decorum.
- 4. Any member dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association, provided it be done on the same day.
- 5. One member shall speak at a time. He shall proceed without interruption unless he depart from the subject or use personal reflections.
- 6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on any subject without obtaining leave of the Association.
- 7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt a member while speaking.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded, after time given for debate, shall be put to the Association, unless previously withdrawn, and the Moderator shall announce the decision.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the number present.
- 10. No appellation but that of "Brother" shall be used by the members in addressing each other during the session of the Association.
- 11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, and also in case of a tie to give the deciding vote.
- 12. The names of the members shall be called as often as the Association may deem necessary, and no member shall withdraw himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each session and oftener if necessary.
- 14. All questions shall be decided by "aye" and "no", unless the "ayes" and "noes" are called for by motion and seconded, in which case the decision shall thus be taken.
- 15. These rules may be amended at any session of this body by a majority of the members present.
