Minutes of the thirty-second annual session of the Clear Creek Missionary Baptist Association held with New Prospect Baptist Church, Crawford Co., Ark., Oct. 7, 8 and 9, 1904.

The Association assembled promptly at 10:00 o'clock. Eld. W. T. Box read the 12th chapter of Rom. Eld. R. M. Small led in prayer. The Association was called to order by the Moderator and on motion 30 minutes was spent in prayer and song service.

At 11 o'clock Eld. C. R. Johns, the appointee, preached the Introductory Sermon, Text, Matt. 9-38; subject, The Harvest. The sermon was wholesome and full of thought. After the sermon Eld. M. A. Pillers made some appropriate remarks.

On motion adjourned until 1:30 o'clock. Benediction by Eld. J.

E. Cox.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Bro. M. E. Henderson. The Moderator appointed Eld. J. E. Cox and Bro. J. S. Renfroe to read the letters to the Association.

After the letters were read and messengers names enrolled, the Moderator appointed Elds. W. T. Box and J. H. Burnett to hold the election.

The Association went into permanent election, which resulted in the election of Eld. J. E. Cox Moderator, J. F. Crawford Clerk and Bro. G. W. Barham Treasurer.

The newly elected Moderator took the chair after some appropriate remarks.

Petitionary letters called for. Letters from Hopewell, Mt. Hope and Fairview churches were read. Churches received and messengers names enrolled and the hand of fellowship extended to the messengers by the Moderator.

### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS-

The report last year providing for a general missionary in this association seems to have been too comprehensive for the missionary spirit of the churches at that time. Therefore, we present the place of appointing a number of missionaries for the most needy points in the field, such as the missionaries can regularly and faithfully attend during the year, and only that number of missionaries which the funds are adequate to keeping regularly on the field. We call attention to Denning, Coal Hill, and Cove City, as strategic points which, if now developed, will become strongholds of our faith and great sources for missions in the future.

We would not divert the churches from Foreign, Home, or State Missions, for the great commission is for all alike; but it is the sense of this committee that this branch or missions needs to be emphasized and more constantly and vigorously laid upon the hearts of our people by the pastors. It is behaved that, if some month, say January, were set apart for special sermons and contributions for this work, great advancement would be made.

We your committee ask a hearty discussion of this subject before the association and the churches.

Resolved, That we believe that modern ball games such as base and foot ball is a great evil; Therefore, we advise our members to discourage such things.

We your committee on Temperance beg leave to report as follows:

Whereas, we find that all intoxicating drinks are debaseing in their effects and that homes are made unhappy; young men's lives are wrecked; young ladies modesty is shocked; mothers are made to weep because of its dreadful effects. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That churches exercise their authority in putting a stop to this great evil of this age by disciplining her members. We find this evil condemned in the Holy Scriptures, therefore we believe it to be the duty of churches to deal with members who dram drink. We also recommend that temperance be observed in all kinds of social gatherings. Respectfully submitted,

There we recommend that the churches of this association organize Sunday Schools. Further, we recommend the American Baptist literature.

At 11:00 o'clock Eld. W. T. Box preached a very able sermon from Judges 7:7. At the close of the sermon a collection was taken for the General association, amounting to \$16.32.

Sunday, 3:30 o'clock p. m., Eld. R. M. Small preached a splendid discourse and at night Eld. O. Osborn preached to a large congregation and the sermon seemed to be appreciated by all present.

### CONSTITUTION.

Sec. 1. This Association shall be known as the Clear Creek Association of Missionary Buptists.

Sec. 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Missionary Baptist caurches known to be in good standing. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Sec. 3. The officers of this Association shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session of this body and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. A majority of all votes cast shall be required to secure an election.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over

the body according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the clerk to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, attend to the publication an dis-

tribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session and deliver the same to successor in office.

- Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to take charge of the funds of the association, hold them subject to the order of the body, or her Executive Committee, and render an account of the same to each sitting of the body.
- Sec. 7. The object of this association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches, to secure unanimity of faith and concert of action in missionary work, and also to cultivate purity of the churches.
- Sec. 8. This association shall, in no case, interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will be requested to act as an advisory council when necessary. It, however, claims authority over its members and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterdox in faith, or disorderly in practice.
- Sec. 9. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other associations, may be admitted to this body upon application by letter and messengers, at any annual meeting, by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.
- Sec. 10. Churches may be dismissed from this association by application to an annual meeting, for the purpose of joining any body that we recognize, or for the purpose of forming a new association, but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.
- Sec. 11. There shall be an executive committee appointed at each annual meeting, consisting of one member from each church and the officers of this body by virtue of their relation thereto shall be members of said committee. This committee shall have direction of the missionary operations of the association, and shall be required to make an annual report of its proceedings. The committee shall have authority to represent the association in all matters requiring attention while the association is not in session. Each member of this committee shall constitute a missionary agent for his respective church to collect funds for mission work and shall report the same to each meeting of the committee. Three members shall constitute a quorum.
- Sec. 12. This constitution may be altered or amended except Sec. 8, at any regular meeting of the association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

- 1. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is full of unmixed truth, and is a perfect rule of faith and practice. II Timothy iii, 16.
- 2. We believe in one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Matthew xxviii, 19.
- 3. We believe that man, once holy, fell by voluntary transgression from that happy state, and is now utterly void of holiness. Gen. ii, 16-17. Rom. iii, 20-24.
- 4. We believe that sinners are saved by grace alone through faith. Eph. ii, 8. Gal. iii, 15-16.
- 5. We believe that men are justified by faith, without a deed of law, in the Lord Jesus Christ. Rom. v. 1.
- 6. We believe that salvation is free to all who will accept the gospel. John iii, 15-16.
- 7. We believe that except a man be renewed by the Hely Spirit he is not qualified for the Kingdom of Christ on earth, or to enjoy his glory hereafter. John iii, 3. 1 Cor. xv, 50.
- 8. We believe that repentance towards God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are the duties of everyone who hears the Gospel. Acts xx, 2I.
- 9 We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God by which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners through faith in Christ. I Peter i. 2.
- 10. We believe that sanctification, beginning in regeneration, and ever progressive, is the process by which we are made partakers of God's holiness. I Peter i, 2. II Peter i, 5. I Cor. i. 30.
- 11. We believe in the preservation of the saints; that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation I Peter i, 5. Psalms xxxvii. 28.
- 12. We believe that God's law is the only, the eternal and unchangeable rule of his church and moral government. Matt. vii, 12
- 13. We believe that a church of Christ is a congregation of Baptized believers, united in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the ordinances, and obeying the laws of Christ, and that its officers are pastors and deacons. Matthew xxviii, 19. Acts ii, 46-47. John iii, 5.
- 14. We believe that christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer in Christ by properly qualified administrator, into the

name of the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit. Matthew xxviii, 19.

15. We believe that only such as have been properly baptized in water and received into the fellowship of a regular organized Baptist church should partake of the Lord's Supper. Acts ii, 43. I Cor. xi, 2.

16. We believe the Lord's day or Christian Sabbath should be devoutly observed, and sacredly devoted to religious services. Gen. ii, 3. Heb. x, 25.

- 17. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of states and nations should be obeyed when the laws they seek to enforce are not in conflict with the gospel-Matthew xxvii, 17-21.
- 18. We believe in the future resurrection of the dead; the righteous to everlasting life, and the wicked to shame and everlasting contempt. Daniel vii, 12.
- 19. We believe in the final judgment, and in that day the righteous and wicked will be separated forever. Rev. twentieth chapter.
- 20. We believe that the righteous will be made happy forever in heaven, and the wicked miserable torever in hell.

# RULES OF DECORUM.

Rule I. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Rule II. A member not satisfied with any decision of the moderator may appeal to the Association on the same day, but not at any other time.

Rule III. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, and in a respectful manner, address the moderator and, on obtaining the floor, proceed.

Rule IV. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject under discussion; or use words of personal reflection, or otherwise gets out of order, when he shall be called to order by the moderator, and on yielding to order, may proceed again.

Rule V. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question to postpone to a certain time, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they are stated. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, provided the previous question has not been ordered, or vote is being taken.

Rule VI. When a debatable question is before the Association, any member may move the previous question, but before it is put it shall be seconded by at least three members. After the previous question has been moved and the motion prevailed no further debate shall be allowed only by the mover of the main question, who shall be allowed ten minutes in which to close the debate.

Rule VII. Any member desiring to absent himself, shall obtain leave of the Association; and the name of any member absenting himself without leave shall be dropped from the minutes.

Rule VIII. These rules may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting of the Association.

### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 1. Hear the reading of the letters from the churches and enroll the names of their messengers.
  - 2. Elect officers.
- 3. Give an opportunity for other churches to become members of the body and extend the hand of fellowship to their messengers.
  - 4. Receive corresponding messengers and other visiting brethren
  - 5. Appoint committees.
  - 6. Hear report of Executive Committee.
  - 7. Elect Executive Committee,
  - 8. Appoint corresponding members.
  - 9. Hear reports of committees.
- 10. Determine place and time of holding next session and who will preach the introductory sermon.
  - 11. Provide for publishing minutes of proceedings.
  - 12. Resolutions and other miscellaneous matter.
