CONSTITUTION

As Amended at 1933 and 1943 Sessions

Article I.—NAME

The name of this body shall be Pulaski County Baptist Association.

Article II.—OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to aid the churches in their divinely appointed work of spreading the Kingdom of God throughout the whole world by every Scriptural means.

Article III.—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches, which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Constitution and desire to co-operate with this Association, who shall be entitled to seats upon the presentation of letters from their churches or other satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional member for every fifty members or major fraction thereof above one hundred.

Section 3. Messengers from churches desiring to affiliate with this Association shall present to the Association petitionary letters or other evidence setting forth the Articles of Faith on which the churches were organized together with satisfactory evidence of the regularity of their organization. They shall be received into the Association only by unanimous vote as cast by the body.

Article IV.—AUTHORITY

This Association shall never exercise any legislative or ecclesiastical authority over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the rights and absolute independence of the churches of Christ.

Article V.—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the opening of each annual session by a majority of all the votes cast at such meeting. Provided, however, that the Moderator shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all sessions of the Association or call some one to occupy the chair temporarily in his absence, and may exercise the same privilege of discussion as any other member of the Association.

Section 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Association and shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of each session as he may be directed by the Association.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of every kind entrusted to his care, and shall disburse the same upon order of the Association and shall make an itemized report of all such funds to the Association before the close of each annual session.

Article VI.—ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD

Section 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of one lay member, elected by each co-operating church, together with the pastors of such churches, and the officers of the Association and the Superintendents of W. M. U. work. Seven members of said Board shall constitute a quorum to transact business, after notice has been given all members of the Board of such meeting.

Section 2. This Board shall co-operate with the churches in this Association in informing and arousing the churches in gathering and disbursing of funds for all of the causes fostered by this Association and shall transact all of the business of the Association in the interim of the annual meeting of the Association.

Article VII—MEETING

This Association shall meet annually on Monday night after the second Sunday in October at 7:30 o'clock.

Article VIII

This Constitution may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any annual meeting, provided that the substance of Article IV shall never be abrogated.

RULES OF ORDER

(BY-LAWS)

As Amended at 1933 and 1947 Sessions

I. The following committees shall be appointed six weeks in advance of the Associational meeting:

(1) Associational Missions; (2) State Missions; (3) Home Missions; (4) Foreign Missions; (5) Colleges and Schools; (6) Religious Literature; (7) Bible (Sunday) Schools; (8) Ministerial Education; (9) Orphan's Homes; (10) Christian Stewardship; (11) Hospitals; (12) Woman's Work; (13) Young People's Work; (14) Digest of Letters; (15) Obituaries; (16) Resolutions; (17) Finance; (18) Temperance; (19) Nominations.

II. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

III. The following shall be the order of business:

1. The Body called to order by the Moderator, or, in his absence, by brethren in the following order of precedence: Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Pastor of entertaining church.
2. Devotional Service.
3. Presentation of letters and enrollment of Messengers.
4. Permanent organization.
5. Introductory Sermon.
6. Petitionary Letters.
7. Reception of visitors, corresponding messengers from other bodies and introduction of new pastors.
8. Appointment of program committee which shall recommend a schedule for all reports and other matters to come before the body, subject to the Association's approval.

IV. Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator. In discussion all personalities shall be avoided. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without special permission from the Association.

V. Mell's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard in deciding questions of parliamentary practice.

VI. The minutes of the preceding session shall be read and approved at the meeting of each session and at close of the Association meeting.

VII. Such offerings may be taken at the annual meeting of the Association as the body may direct.

VIII. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present, or suspended by unanimous vote.

IX. The Associational Board shall meet monthly at such time and place as the Board itself may determine.

X. A doctrinal sermon shall be preached during each annual session at such an hour as each program committee shall provide.

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST EVENING

Monday, October 13, 1947

1. The thirty-second Annual Session of the Pulaski County Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, W. H. Hicks, at 7 P. M., Monday, October 13, 1947, in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church, North Little Rock, with a large attendance of messengers and visitors present.

2. Messengers and visitors were led in a song service by Hatcher Hoyt, choir director of Immanuel Church.

3. W. H. Ryan read the third chapter of Colossians, and led in prayer.

4. W. O. Vaught, Jr., was elected Moderator by unanimous vote cast by W. H. Hicks, presiding Moderator. Owen W. Moran elected Vice-Moderator; Joseph L. Ingram elected Clerk; W. A. Jefferies elected Treasurer.

5. Due to the absence of W. O. Vaught, Jr., the Vice-Moderator, Owen M. Moran, presided.

6. The Immanuel Baptist Choir, under the direction of Mr. Hoyt, sang "Create in Me a Clean Heart, O God."

ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

10. Associational Sunday School report read by Guy S. Wilson. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

Associational Sunday School Rallies held this year, eight, with an average attendance of approximately 150 Sunday School Workers in each rally. In addition to these rallies, there was one Association Wide Training School held at the Immanuel Baptist Church in Little Rock with thirty-eight courses taught. The average enrollment of this school was 750 plus, with an average attendance of 650 plus. Five hundred twenty awards were presented from this school. The total awards presented in the county for training were 1,400 plus, which is a definite gain in number of teachers being trained.

We now have enrolled in our more than 65 Sunday Schools approximately 16,000 people, with an average attendance of around 9,000 each Lord's Day. Through the evangelistic efforts of our Sunday Schools, there has been some 800 or 900 additions to the various churches. So far, only three Sunday Schools report being Standard for the year 1947.

Our Vacation Bible School work under the leadership of Mrs. George Cornell has made definite strides of progress, with a total off 44 vacation Bible schools being held, 34 of these being church schools, 7 mission schools, and 3 negro schools. There were some five or six other schools held that made no reports. The total enrollment of these schools was 5,136, with an average attendance of 3,935, with 234 conversions, and 102 additions to the churches. Forty college students were used in this work, with 20 paid workers, these being paid a total of \$310.18. The total cost of operating these schools was \$2,353.72. The mission offering collected and sent to various mission causes was \$791.45.

The different denominations represented in these schools were: Baptist, 2,504; Methodist, 141; Presbyterian, 21; Nazarene, 25; Pentecost, 6; Lutheran, 1; Church of God, 1; Church of Christ, 24; Mormon, 2; Disciples of God, 8; Catholic, 16; Episcopalian, 2; Undesignated faiths, 235.

The Lord has wrought great things by our Vacation Bible School efforts.

ASSOCIATIONAL TRAINING UNION REPORT

11. Report on Associational Training Union work read by Ray Branscum. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

According to the 1946 minutes of the Association, there were 274 individual Unions in the Training Union with an enrollment of 4,439. During the year only eight churches reported no Training Union work.

I. Activities

The following are some of the activities of the Associational Training Union Organization.

1. Six meetings of the Training Union Executive Committee.

2. Seven mass meetings at Baring Cross Baptist Church, First Baptist Church, Second Baptist Church, Immanuel Baptist Church, South Highland Baptist Church, and the Calvary Baptist Church.

3. Promotion of Junior memory work, Intermediate Sword Drill, and Young People's Better Speakers Contest. Miss Frances Gray from Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, represented the Juniors of our Association; Miss Annette Carter, from Second Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, represented the Intermediates of our Association; Miss Jeanetta Moyer, from First Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, represented the Young People of our Association at the Training Union Convention which was held at Pine Bluff, Arkansas. Miss Jeanetta Moyer, was first place winner in the Convention at Pine Bluff, and represented our Young People at Ridgecrest, North Carolina.

4. September 22-26, 1947, "Church Development Week," was held at the First Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, with an enrollment of 44 in the Story Hour, 75 Juniors, 90 Intermediates, 137 Young People, and 483 Adults. The total enrollment was 829. According to a head count there was approximately 200 that attended who did not enroll.

Christian Literature—1947

The Bible is basic in all Christian literature. No literature may claim to be Christian except as it incorporates the

teachings of the Bible and makes these teachings applicable to daily living. It is with this purpose in mind that Baptists are now producing a great volume of literature.

The Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the greatest producer and distributor of Christian literature among Southern Baptists. This agency alone distributes twenty-eight million pieces of literature annually.

Our W. M. U. organization, our mission boards, our Brotherhood of the South, produce and distribute vast quantities of Christian literature throughout the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention.

We are justly proud of this volume of literature which covers every phase of Christian interest among us, and which promotes every Christian cause sponsored and maintained by us.

Our own Southern Baptist literature ranges in subject matter from statistical reports to devotional and inspirational writings, teaching material, instructional guides, sermons, biography, history, psychology, philosophy, and so on.

The Arkansas Baptist is the official publication of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. It is the policy of the Arkansas Baptist to serve as a medium for the promotion of the entire Baptist program, both state and southwide. Its purpose is to bring information to the Baptists of Arkansas concerning the progress of our work, the needs of our various institutions and agencies.

We also find in the columns of the Arkansas Baptist devotional and inspirational articles, discussion of doctrinal themes, and the interpretation of the Baptist position on many current issues.

We would encourage every church to put the Arkansas Baptist in its budget and send the paper to every family in the church membership. The cost is only 11 cents per name per month, as against \$1.50 in the clubs of ten or more, or \$2.00 per year for an individual subscription.

The wide coverage which our state paper gives to denominational news should make it indispensable in every Baptist home.

TEMPERANCE

28. Report on Temperance read by Raymond Strickland. Motion that report be adopted. Report spoken to by C. C. Coulter of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League. Motion carried.

When Paul wrote his letter to the Ephesians, he urged them to "walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil." (Ephesians 5:15-16.)

Baptists are called upon to give their witness today in a time when "the days of evil," and iniquity abounds on every hand. Sin is popularized and every form of intemperance and indulgence is advertised in its most attractive and appealing form. But Baptists cannot faithfully discharge their responsibility to God and to the generation in which we live without coming to grips with sin in its every expression, and particularly with the iniquitous liquor traffic.

Crime is at an all-time high, with young people from 17 to 22 leading the parade. Divorce and unhappy marriages was never at so high a figure. And at the bottom of all of these evils there is almost invariably liquor and drunkenness.

The people of Arkansas spent for liquor during 1946 a total of \$52,478,708. Automobile accidents and deaths in Arkansas, during 1946 caused by liquor, cost an estimated \$3,555,000. Crime caused by liquor in Arkansas during 1946 cost another estimated \$30,700,000. This is a total loss of \$86,733,708, for which nobody received any conceivable benefit, but which brought an untold harvest of heartache, tears, poverty, and sorrow. The state collected a total of \$5,633,871 in taxes for the sale of these liquors. It thus cost the State of Arkansas more than \$15.00 for every dollar collected in taxes. When will the decent and self-respecting citizens of our state rise up and drive from our borders this wicked and costly and destructive business? The liquor traffic is the enemy of everything for which the Christian churches stand, and would, for the sake of money, wreck and ruin every home in the land.

It is with satisfaction and deep gratitude to God that we can report that some progress has been made in our state toward driving from us the legalized liquor traffic. Since January 1, 1943, under our Local Option law, 35 counties have voted dry, as against 7 which have voted wet. In addition, 23 townships and 9 towns in wet counties have voted dry. Preparation is being made in other counties for a vote.

Recognition should be given to the effective work done by the Anti-Saloon League, under the able leadership of Mr. Clyde C. Coulter, for the success of these county campaigns. Due credit should be given the work of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union for their assistance.

We recommend that our churches work in co-operation with the Anti-Saloon League, and other Christian bodies, in presenting a united front against a common enemy.

We also recommend that our churches place the Anti-Saloon League in their annual budgets wherever possible, or that an offering be taken at convenient times for the support of the work of the Anti-Saloon League.

THE CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM AND TITHING—1947

Southern Baptists in recent years have had three major financial objectives: (1) to get rid of the old debts upon our boards and institutions, (2) to promote the Co-operative Program for the equitable support of all our work, and (3) to enlist tithers to provide a permanent, dependable, systematic support for all our causes, local, state, and worldwide.

Our Co-operative Program continues to grow in favor. All our state organizations and agencies approve of it, and 75 percent of our churches contributed through it in 1946.

But our Co-operative Program receipts are not sufficient to meet the imperative immediate needs of our causes. All our institutions are full and running over. Our Colleges, and Hospitals, and seminaries turned away hundreds last year for lack of room. Then the property of our Foreign Mission Board calls for \$5,000,000 to put it back as it was before the war. Other millions are needed to care for pathetic calls and unprecedented opportunities.

To help meet these enlarged needs a special tithing campaign has been launched. All our convention and agencies are co-operating in its promotion. Each state has adopted a tithing goal for 1947. Our Arkansas tithing goal is 40,000 tithers.

It is very important that our churches increase their gifts for the Co-operative Program. We should make our church budgets so that a greater percentage of the total budget be given for Co-operative Missions. On an average our churches in Arkansas are falling far below the amount given on a percentage basis by the churches in other states. So far as we know, only one church in Arkansas is giving as much as 50% of its receipts for the Co-operative Program. The splendid church at Marianna is giving 60%, and is prospering in every sense. Many of our churches are not even giving one thin dime out of each dollar for the all-inclusive work of Co-operative Missions. No church should give less than 25% of its budget through the Co-operative Program for these World Mission Causes. 50% would be the ideal and 60% is going the second mile.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We urgently and prayerfully recommend:

1. That every church enter full-length and full-strength into the special tithing effort seeking: (1) to enlist at least one-fifth of its members as tithers, and (2) to get all its members to bring their whole tithe into the Lord's house for at least three months, October, November, and December.
2. That October 5, or nearest convenient Sunday, be observed as Tithers' Enlistment Day in all departments and at all services of our churches.
3. That where possible 25% or 50% of the new tithing receipts in October, November, and December be given to the Co-operative Program causes to help meet the dire needs of our denominational agencies.
4. That the Every-Member Canvass be put on faithfully in every church and that every effort be made to maintain and enlarge the number of tithers.
5. That the Special Days as provided in the Calendar of Denominational Activities be observed in all our churches for informing our people and enlisting them in our work.
6. That we urge our churches to give a much larger percentage of their budgets to the Co-operative Program.
7. That the plans and suggestions of our state organization and the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention be used in seeking to enroll.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT—1947

There are now (as of August 1, 1947) one hundred twenty-three Brotherhoods in churches of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. This represents a growth of one-

hundred one Brotherhoods since January 1, 1946. Thirty of the forty-two associations now have one or more Brotherhoods in operation.

The growth of the Brotherhood movement in Arkansas has been steady, and is gradually reaching out into all areas of the state. The objectives of the Brotherhood Department are: (1) A Brotherhood in every church; and (2) An associational Brotherhood in every association.

The progress of Brotherhood work is developing along the lines of (1) Personal Consecration, (2) Personal Stewardship, (3) Personal Soul-Winning. We find that Christian men will respond to worthy challenges; and that in meeting these challenges they grow in grace, in knowledge, in vision, in ability, in leadership. The brotherhood program is a going program; a program which endeavors to set men to going at the tasks of their church.

During the past year the Brotherhood Revival has had a fair test throughout the state. Various church Brotherhoods have sponsored these revivals, and all have been used of God to set men to going in the greatest task of all.

A church Brotherhood is simply the willing men of a church banded together and organized to set forward every phase of the life and work of the church. An associational Brotherhood is an organization of men from the various Brotherhoods in the association: (1) to promote the organization of church Brotherhoods; and (2) to set forward the whole of the denominational program throughout the association.

Because of the place that God has for men in His work, and because of what men can do to work the work of God, we believe that every church needs a Brotherhood. Also that every association will profit immeasurably through the work of the associational Brotherhood.

Our association at present has 12 Brotherhoods. They are: Douglassville, Hebron, Life Line, Reynolds Memorial; Little Rock; Second, Little Rock; South Highland, Little Rock; Baring Cross, N. Little Rock; First, N. Little Rock; Worrells' Memorial, N. Little Rock; and Pine Grove; Central, N. Little Rock; Sylvan Hills, First, N. Little Rock.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION TO PULASKI BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

October 1946 to October 1947

Someone has said, "Every Woman in the Woman's Missionary Society will not ever be realized until we begin with every child in missionary training." How grateful we are, however, for missionary societies that really foster. We greatly appreciate the co-operation of each local organization through its various officers and committee chairmen. We are inspired also to carry on to greater heights because of this co-operation and the loyalty of all the associational W.M.U. workers. We feel especially grateful for the splendid work of our Associational Young People's Director and for the success of our work with the Young People's Auxiliaries. We are enlarging and training our force of workers with the Young People. We are happy to report we have in Pulaski County Association 38 active W. M. S. Organizations with 123 Young People's auxiliaries. There are 27 Sunbeam Bands, 33 Royal Ambassador Chapters, 46 Girl's Auxiliaries, and 17 Young Women's Auxiliaries. 1,400 women and 1,248 Young People are engaged in missionary education, community missions, and evangelism. We report 56 family altars established with 837 tithers and 36 conversions through the efforts of our many faithful workers in all our organizations throughout Pulaski County Association. We have conducted 85 mission study courses. Our gifts to missions total \$96,259.40, to the local church \$95,647.22, and to the Co-operative Program \$21,430.99. Our motto is to help where help is needed. So with the help of the Holy Spirit and with the co-operation of our women we expect to be "Laborers together with God," beginning in Jerusalem and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

40. Report on Christian Education read by Owen W. Moran. Fritz Goodbar, Vice-President of Central College, and Chaplain Blakney, associated with Ouachita College, spoke to the report. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In this "changing world," Christian education also is experiencing change, not in character or foundation, but in material conditions and compelling spiritual need. Our colleges, today, are flooded by the full-tide of men and women out of the services who are taking advantage of the government's educational offers. Thus our schools are crowded beyond all capacity to care for students; and the scarcity and high cost of building materials and labor further complicate

the situation. Meanwhile, the impending menace of paganism and atheism makes it imperative that we strengthen our colleges and seminaries to the utmost, without delay; for we realize that state schools cannot give the Christian training so essential to our young people as they face life in this atomic age.

At the present time, the Arkansas Baptist Convention has only two colleges under its control—Ouachita at Arkadelphia, and Central at Conway—but it gives recognition to Southern Baptist College at Walnut Ridge.

Ouachita College opened the 1947-48 session with the largest enrollment in its history—850 students, among whom 350 are veterans, and 500 are new students (freshmen and transfers from other schools). There has been an increase of three hundred percent in the student body, and twenty percent in the faculty, during the past few years. The Million Dollar Campaign has enabled the college to erect three new buildings; a girl's dormitory, a class-room building, and an apartment house; also forty-three apartments. There is immediate need of two additional buildings, a men's dormitory, and a science and library building. If all of the churches will hasten to pay their pledges in full, these buildings can be erected in the near future.

Central, our Junior College for girls, did not open its doors this fall, but if the present plans of the Board of Trustees materialize, the school will open in January as a four-year co-educational college, at Little Rock. The 1946 State Convention, in session at Texarkana, voted this change in status and location, and the Board of Trustees is doing all in its power to carry out the wishes of the Convention. Dr. Fritz Goodbar has been secured to serve as Vice-President and Business Manager; application has been made to the government for the hospital area at Camp Robinson, covering 400 acres and comprising 125 buildings which can be converted into class rooms, dining room, library, etc.; some of the buildings at Conway are being converted, temporarily, into income bearing property, pending worth-while offers for permanent disposal.

Arkansas Baptists are also vitally interested in our theological seminaries—Southern Baptist at Louisville, Kentucky; Southwestern at Fort Worth, Texas; and New Orleans Seminary at New Orleans, Louisiana.

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, which first opened in Greenville, South Carolina in 1859, and moved to Louisville in 1888, is now located on a beautiful fifty-one

acre campus, The Beeches. Two handsome buildings housing the new School of Church Music have been acquired during the past two years, and a \$160,000 class room annex to Norton Hall was completed, this summer. In 1947 there were 448 graduates (including those from the W. M. U. Training School and the School of Church Music), the largest number in the history of the Seminary. The matriculation for 1947-48, as of September 19, was 889.

The Southwestern Seminary, an outgrowth of the Theological Department of Baylor University, was chartered in 1908 and moved to Fort Worth in 1910. The enrollment for 1946-47 was 1,376, and of this number 253 were graduated. To date, the enrollment for 1947-47 is 1,114. Plans are under way for the erection of two new buildings, The Scarborough-Truett Memorial, and the School of Religious Education.

The New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary opened in 1918, its location in that great city being determined by the weakness of the Baptist cause there rather than by its strength. In the twenty-nine years of the life of this school, the number of Baptists in New Orleans has increased from 1,256 to 14,000, and the number of churches from six to thirty-seven. The enrollment for 1946-47 was 383, of whom about ninety were graduates. On February 5, 1947, the Trustees purchased a seventy-five acre tract on Gentilly Boulevard for the purpose of erecting a new plant adequate to the needs of the rapidly expanding school. They hope to secure one thousand donors who will contribute one thousand dollars each for the construction of the first unit of buildings.

Thus, the gifts of Arkansas Baptists will help all of these colleges and seminaries to meet the challenge of "this changing world," and will give to our youth the Christian training that will enable them to "endure hardness" as "good soldiers of Jesus Christ."
