APPENDIX.

OBSTRUCTIONS TO DISCIPLINE.

1000. Moderator and Messengers of Spring River Association:

As I was appointed at your last meeting to write the circular letter, and looking over the field and the many questions that interest us, I have at last decided to write, as indicated above, upon our difficulties or obstructions to discipline, as it is an obvious fact that there are few deletes to which our churches are more recreant than that of excluding unworthy members.

There is no doubt as to the duty; the teaching of the Good Word le clear. [See Rom. xvi:17-18: "Now, I beseech you, brethren, mark them which are causing the divisions and occasions of stumbling contrary to the doctrine which ye learned, and turu away from them, for they that are such serve not our Lord Christ, but their own belly, and by their smooth and fair speech they beguile the innocent."] Thus we are required to turn away or withdraw fellowship from such as walk disorderly, and the reason given is that if they remain among they will corrupt others who are innocent.

"If any man that is named a brother be a fornicator, or covetous, or a drunkard, or an idolater, or a reviler, or an extortioner; with such an one no not to eat." (I. Cor. v:11.) Note these offences; but they are not all the causes for which we should exclude a member. But note again: "Now we command you, brethren, in the name of our lord Jesus Christ, that ye withdraw yourselves from every brother that walketh disorderly, and not after the tradition which he received of us." (II. Thes. iii:6.) The term "tradition" evidently means the lanchings of Paul and his co-laborers by word of mouth and was, of rourse, the doctrine gospel of Christ. These are solemn injunctions, not only to the churches in Paul's day, but to every other church since that day until now, and no church can be ignorant, unless it is willful, and this would make it a double crime.

We shall now notice a few of the difficulties to overcome in this important matter:

1. Want of moral courage is among the greatest difficulties or hindrances to the exclusion of unworthy members. Perhaps the whole hindrances to the exclusion of unworthy members. Perhaps the whole hindrances to be excluded; the members talk about it to each other and to those without; yet they walt one for another to move in the matter, each one is afraid of inurring the displeasure of the friends or blood-relations of the guilty. Each brother fears to present the case to the church for fear that he would be stigmatized as a kicker or meddler. So the disorderly member remains in good standing until possibly he hears some talk of the matter and becomes offended and calls for a letter and it is granted, and thus the church loses its self-respect and is bronght into contempt and derision.

2. Kinship according to the flesh is another barrier. The mother is afraid her son will go to the bad if he is turned out. Now, sister, the young man has already gone to the bad, else he would not deserve exclusion. He has too often proved that church membership does not restrain him from his evil ways or induce him to confess and abandon his sins. Yet, alas! the church too often heeds the weak, unreasoning plea of doting parents and retains in fellowship the unworthy, and in direct violation of the known command of Christ.

3. 'Again, worldly influence becomes a potent rival of the Lord Jesus. He says: "How hardly shall they that have riches enter into the Kingdom of Heaven," but our conduct would often justify the saying, "How hardly shall they that have riches be excluded from the church of Christ." Riches are not in themselves an evil. On the contrary, they are useful to the cause of Christ when consecrated to His service. Rich men are a great blessing to the church when they are true, orderly children of God, but no amount of wealth can counterbalance the evil of conduct unbecoming a Christian, no matter how liberally the rich may contribute to the support of the pastor and the cause of missions or how extensive his influence. Jesus commands us to withdraw from every brother, not a part, that walketh disorderly. The church may lose in money, numbers and worldly influence, but she will gain in spiritual power, which is far better. Simon the sorcerer was probably the richest and certainly the most influential r in the city of Samaria. Such was his control of the masses that as people should: "He is the great power of God!" He not only joined himself to the believers and manifested great zeal, but offered them money-perhaps enough to support a missionary on the home or foreign field for a whole year-but Peter said: "Thy money perish with thee." How much we need such courage and faithfulness to the Master!

Sectarian zeal we will mention as another great obstruction to 4. the proper exercise of church discipline. Notwithstanding our Savior's earnest prayer that His people should all be one, there is a popular theory that the many rival sects into which Christians are divided act as checks on each other and thereby promote the purity of all, but. the practical results of these divisions are exactly the reverse, as is always the case when our theories contradict or conflict with the Word of God. In many ways rival sects tend to corrapt the purity of Christianity. Party zeal tempts each denomination to lower the standards of church membership in order to get the greater number. The same temptation prevents the exclusion of unworthy members lest they should join some rival sect. Were all modeled after the divine pattern there would be no rivalry save as to which could most fully conform to the teachings of our Savior. The line between the church and the world would be distinctly drawn or defined and every man stand on his own side of it. In some instances the misapplication of Scripture is obstructive to discipline. By some it is believed the 18th of Matthew should be our guide in all matters of discipline, while this has to do only with our personal offenses and has no application whatever to public offenses against the church. The first object to reclaim has become a trite saying and is repeated as confidently as if it had become an established fact. It has, at best, but a semblance of truth in it and

holly without Scriptural warrant. However, it may be applied to the stumbling Christians who have enough of the spirit of Christ to the reproof and instruction with meekness and godly fear and amptly repent of and turn away from the sin into which they have but concerning those whose disorderly walk brings reproach and contail on the church of God, the positive command of Christ is withdraw from them, to put away from among you the wicked man; and the such a one to Satan for the destruction of the flesh.

My brethren, shall we be abedient to the command of our Savior double the many difficulties to be overcome, and thus shall we regain our lost power and prosperity attend all our ways. W. T. JACKSON.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren-We your committee on associational missions beg leave to say that the history of this Association for thirty years shows that we have tried to do mission work in our bounds. In 1879 to 1880 we worked as we have this year. With this exception we have always followed the board plan. Twice for a year and a half each our work was merged into the state board work, which was followed in each instance by several years of lethargy in the churches relative to our mission work.

We have tried the suptiment plan of taking up certain points and having some one at each point. While this has been good work, we have noticed the churches have not been liberal in contributing to it. This year we understand that while several of our churches have failed or refused to contribute to the work, yet the fifteen churches contributing have been more liberal and zealous than heretofore.

1. We suggest that some one be elected, or suggested to the churches, to enter the work with whom they can affiliate directly.

2. That we ask him to keep and make an itemized report of his work with the contribution to the work by each church, to be printed in our next associational minutes.

CONSTITUTION

We, the messengers of the Baptist Church of Christ, in convention multipled, in order to perpetuate Union, foster Education, and aid in the Gospel, do ordain this Constitution for this Union to be called Spring Hyper Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be composed of Messengers chosen by the churches of the Union and accredited by letter, and each church shall be entitled to three Messengers.

II. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator and Clerk, whose duties shall be defined in the rules of decorum.

III. The letters of the churches shall express the number in fellowship received in baptism, by letters, restored; dismissed by letter, excluded and dead, during the associational year, the name of the pastor, postoffice, and the amount contributed and the object of the donation, and in no case shall the Association appropriate money for any purpose but that designed by the donor.

IV. The Association shall have no ecclesiastical authority over the churches, but may give counsel and answer queries, when requested.

V. Churches may be admitted to the Union on petitionary letters, if Scriptural in constitutional, faith and practice.

VI. This Association may withdraw from any church in this union for unchristian conduct.

VII. Every question shall be decided by a majority vote, except on the reception of members into this union, which must be unanimous.

VIII. A minute of the proceedings of the Association shall be recorded; and, if the churches furnish the means, printed.

IX. The Association shall hold a session annually with one of the churches of the union, on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September of each year.

X. This Constitution may be amended by proposal made in writing and entered of record at one session; and if a majority vote for such amendment, it shall become part of this Constitution.

RULES OF DECORUM

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1. A Moderator and Clerk shall be elected by the Association, who shall continue in office one year, or until their successors are elected.

2. The Moderator shall take the chair at the hour to which the As sociation is adjourned, and after prayer, proceed to business. He shall keep order, and may speak provided he calls a chairman. He shall have no voice except in case of a tie, in which case he may give the casting vote.

3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator. He shall not depart from the subject under consideration, nor indulge in personal reflections.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without leave from the Association.

5. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave.

6. No member shall address another by any appellation other "than "Brother."

7. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member while speaking unless he violates these Rules of Decorum.

8. Any member may appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association.

9. The Clerk shall keep a minute of the proceedings of the Asso-

mation, and perform such other duties as may be required of him.

10. Any member violating the rules may be reported.

The session of the Association shall be' opened and closed by 11, BEAVOF.




