## Proceedings.

Minutes of the Thirty-Ninth Annual Session of the Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association held with Fairview Church, Greene County, Arkansas, October 24, 25, 26, 1908.

The next session will be held with Hopewell Church three miles west of Rector, Greene County, Arkansas, Saturday before the fourth Sunday in October, 1909.

The Fairview Missionary Baptist Church, October 24, 1908.

Saturday, first day, 11 a. m. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. D. J. Faulkner. Text Zec. 4-6. After which the body was called to order by the former Moderator.

We were sad to notice so many churches report no prayer meeting, as we think this is a great stimulant to the church.

We ask each pastor to urge each church to maintain a prayer meeting throughout the year, for we believe the prayer meeting is to the church such as it is to the Christian. We ask each messenger to assist the pastor in organizing and maintaining a good prayer meeting.

Committee on Sabbath Schools made the following report:

The Baptists universally believe in the education of the youth and especially in matters pertaining to Baptist doctrine and in order to accomplish this purpose, heartily support and maintain Sunday Schools. Your committee sincerely regrets to report there are churches in the Association which do not or have not maintained Sunday Schools.

It is essential to begin early to properly instruct children in matters religious and it cannot be done as well outside as in a well regulated Sunday School. It is not essential to refer specifically to the churches having Sunday Schools and those which have not; but it is a fact that those churches which have Sunday Schools are more progressive.

We appreciate fully the success which has attended the efforts of those in Sunday School, both parent and pupil, and look forward to the accomplishment of greater things.

We recommend the organization of our Sunday School work, and the holding of sessions either annually or semi-annually for the better promotion of our Sunday School work.

We specially recommend that attention be given the matter by pastors and all members, and the importance of the work be emphasized on all possible occasions. Discussed by L. F. Maynard and adopted.

We note the great spread of the temperance movement in the last year among all denominations and parties, but don't "rare back on security." We must have state-wide prohibition. We, the committee on temperance, advise that the moderator appoint each messenger present a committee of one on state-wide prohibition for the ensuing year. We further recommend that a committee be appointed to memoralize the next legislature to introduce and pass an amendment to the constitution prohibiting the sale of liquor. Discussed by Elders F. P. We are glad to report that our association has but few aged and infirm ministers who have no means of support for which we should be grateful. God has not only plessed their labors spiritually, but financially as well.

Your committee would respectfully recommend that this association keep a standing committee for the purpose of locating all such worthy brethren who may need our assistance and raise the funds from the churches for their support, and placed in the hands of the executive board to be paid out by order of the board.

Committee on Orphans' Home made the following report.

Our Orphanage has almost doubled its power for good in the last year. We are still far behind our Baptist brethren in adjacent states in orphanage work.

We recommend that the Baptist of Arkansas move our Orphanage to the central part of the State as soon as practical.

We further recommend that Bro. Turner be allowed to take pledges now for our Orphanage to be paid some time during the next associational year, and that each of our churches appoint one of its members to be one of this association's standing committee on Orphanage Work during the following year.

That we all sympathize with and plan and pray for and contribute to this department of our work, even as we do to missions, ministerial education, etc. Discussed by F. P. Turner, T. T. Thompson, J. The committee on State and Associational Missions made the following report:

There is continued need of missionary work being done throughout the state and especially in our association, inasmuch as there are new fields continually opening to some denomination. We feel that it is our duty to preach the pure Gospel to every creature. If those destitute fields ever get the whole truth the Baptists must carry it to them. Our state mission board is trying to reach every place possible that needs help. The work this year has been laid out on a basis of \$3,500; the most of this amount is yet to be raised. We hope all who can, will send an offering to this work. In as much as the state board has been very liberal in the past in helping us, we feel that we should show our appreciation by helping them in this time of need.

We believe that this association should have a missionary for all his time, and he should go into those destitute places, and hold meetings, and visit the people, and where it is necessary, organize churches, and aid them in securing pastors. We also believe that we should aid the weak churches by supplementing an amount sufficient to enable them to keep a pastor. There are several places in the bounds of our association that need a Baptist church organized now. We should do more the next year for state and associational missions than we have ever done in any previous year. Discussed by F. P. Turner, G. R. Tyler, T. Thompson, V. A. Phillips, and adopted.

Committee on Home Missions made the following report:

Our Southland and Sunny Cuba is the field of the Home Board.

The work of the Home Board means perhaps more to our country than any other mission work.

The destitution in large cities is appalling. The Home Board seeks to supply this by an earnest Gospel ministry and in the erection of church edifices. The work has been greatly enlarged and correspondingly our obligations have increased. Signally has God blessed our labors.

Teeming hordes of a foreign population are pouring in on us. They must be christianized or fatal results will come to both church and state.

Self-preservation is our first law. Every effort should be made to enlarge the work by enlarging our support. We urge every Baptist in this association to take and read and study the Home Field. Report adopted

Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows:

A fraction more than six tenths of a cent per member (\$15.55 by 2,341 Baptists) is the 1907 report of Gainesville association for foreign missions. Of this 519 members contributed the whole amount, leaving 1,822 members who have no part in this small amount. In Arkansas we have 1,389 churches; 175 of these gave \$10,345, while the remaining 1,214 gave nothing, and these Baptist churches call themselves the light of the world.

The Foreign Mission Board last year reported \$402,328 by 10,769 churches, while 10,085 of these lights of the world gave not one cent. The last year, twenty-four new missionaries have been sent out, making a total of 222 missionaries, together with 334 native helpers, of 556 workers in foreign fields, representing ten total southern Baptists among eight millions who know millions not our Lord. We also report eight theological schools are training 151 to go out to preach the Gospel. Also we have twelve medical missionaries, who last year treated 3,800 patients. We are thankful to our God for 2,174 converts who were added by baptism last year. In view of these facts as related to this great work of foreign missions, we recommend that each individual member of this association contribute an amount specificially indicated for foreign missions. We also recommend that each deacon and pastor keep continually before their various congregations this foreign mission work. We most heartily recommend the foreign mission work. We most heartily recommend the Foreign Missionary Journal, which can be had at 25 cents the year.

Discussed by L. F. Maynard, J. H. Peay, T. T. Thompson and adopted. A cash collection for foreign missions was taken amounting to \$21.00.

The committee on Ministerial Education made the following report.

More and more is the world becoming eradicated from the ignorance and superstition in which for centuries it has been groping. We know that Christ selected men who were thoroughly capable of standing on the high wall of Zion and proclaiming life and salvation to the eager multitudes who thronged to hear them.

And still there are vast multitudes awaiting the message of life and salvation, and our Master needs workers in His vineyard who can go out in a world of intelligent crit cs and contend for the supremacy of the Gospel of Christiaity.

It therefore behooves us to make greater efforts to educate and train our ministers that they may be better enabled to preach the truth in all its purity.

Our worthy brother, G. D. Faulkner is now in school striving to obtain an education, and others contemplate going soon.

Brethren, let us wake up and do our duty towards the young ministers who are so valiantly striving to obtain an education that they may go out and battle against the contending forces of the world. Let us contribute liberally of the means that a bountiful providence has bestowed upon us.
