We especially urge the importance of Christian education, and we recommend Buckner and Mt. Home Colleges as worthy of our patronage and support, both for ilterary and ministerial education.

In these colleges our young people are not only taught the rudiments and principles of literary education, but are taught sound Baptist, Bible doctrines also. We further recommend the Arkansas Baptist, our state paper, and the Baptist Flag of Fulton, Ky., as strong and helpful educational factors. They are sound in policy, principles and doctrine, and should be in the homes of all our people.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We find of the nineteen churches that only thirteen have Sunday Schools, leaving six without schools. Therefore, we earnestly recommend that each church organize a school. That all schools use Baptist literature and Baptist teachers and officers. We recommend this because of the heresy taught by other so-called churches

The great aim of the school should be to lead people to a

saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

PUBLICATION.

We, your committee on publication, beg to make the follow-

ing report:

Whereas, God in His infinite wisdom has given the commission to the Missionary Baptist Church to go preach the word and to teach all nations the truths of the Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, as a channel through which to obtain this information, we recommend that we carefully and prayerfully search the Bible and such books as our Baptist people have written for our edification.

We also recommend the Arkansas Baptist and the Baptists keep pace with their obligations and opportunities they

must be more consecrated to the work of missions.

There are coming to our state each year hundreds of immigrants who are settling in our midst to live. They, their influence and means will either be used for God and right or for the devil and wrong. New railroads are being built, and new towns are springing up as if by magic. Many of these towns, with mining districts, are destitute of the gospel. There is succient destitution in the state to employ the time of hundreds of missionaries constantly. Baptist churches are the true churches of Christ, hence are duty bound to send the true gospel to all who have it not. We have not done our duty in carrying out the Great Commission until we have done our best to get the gospel to every creature. Now, since we are the custodians of the pure gospel, we should do our work in the way God reveals in His word.

Believing as we do, that the methods employed by the State Association are both Scriptural and practicable, we recommend that our churches co-operate with and represent in that body. These methods guard the sacred rights and liberties of the churches leaving all authority in their hand where it belongs. We have been greatly blessed in our efforts to maintain these old Bible principles. Since we have adopted God's word as our only guide in mission work. But notwithstanding all this opposition we are constantly growing in number and in influence.
