of the Fifty-Sixth Annual Session, held at DeGray Church, Clark County, Arkansas, Friday, October 7

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PROCEEDINGS

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OF THE

Red River Baptist Association

Friday, October 7, 1904.

At 10 a. m. the Red River Baptist Association assembled with DeGray Church, Clark County, Arkansas.

A prayer and praise service was held but the clerk did not

arrive in time to participate in, or report it.

At 11 a. m. Bro. H. L. Winburn preached the introductory sermon from Isaiah 60:1, "Arise, shine; for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee." Theme, "God's Call to the Churches." Our duty to help spread the Gospel was presented with great clearness and force. After enjoying a sumptuous dinner served upon the grounds, the Association at 1:30 p. m. assembled for business. The Moderator, Bro. O. S. Jones, read the 67th Psalm and led in an earnest prayer for Divine guidance of this body in its deliberations.

Bros. T. C. Mahan, J. H. Smart, and J. J. Haynes were

appointed to read the church letters,

The names of the Messengers present were enrolled and the Association organized by the re-election of Bro. O. S. Jones Moderator and J. A. Ross Clerk.

Petitionary letters were called for. None were presented. Upon motion of Bro. J. J. Haynes, it was resolved that the Moderator appoint a committee of three upon the relief of old ministers.

The chair announced the appointment of the following committee on preaching, towit: J. H. Vann, J. W. Wingfield and

the Deacons of DeGray Church.

Shortly thereafter said committee announced that Bro. A. J. Price would preach at this church and Bro. W. U. Davis at M. Zion at 7:30 tonight.

Correspondence was called for from sister Associations.

The following brethren presented themselves and were welcomed by the Moderator and invited to seats with us in council, towit:

Messengers to sister Associations were appointed, as follows:

Bro. H. J. P. Horne was called to the chair.

The letter of South Fork Church was presented and read, and the names of Bros. J. T. Gathright, T. J. Dillard and J. R. Carter enrolled as Messengers.

The Moderator read the 16th chapter of I Corinthians.

Prayer by Bro.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was presented and read by Bro. J. T. Howell and discussed by Bros. Forbes, Price, Browning, Langley, Powell, Thomas, White, Horne and Roundtree, and adopted.

Bro. A. W. King was enrolled as Messenger from Gurdon Church, the letter from this church having failed to reach its destination.

and read by Bro. J. B. Roundtree, and adopted.

H. Y. Bridges was recognized as Messenger from Wall Creek Church. No church letter.

The report upon State Missions was presented, read and

dopted.

Bros. J. F. Love and N. R. Townsend were invited to seats

with us in council.

Bro. J. C. Wright presented and read the report of the Committee on Woman's Work, which was spoken to by Howell and Winburn, and adopted.

The report on Sunday Schools was presented and read by J. J. Little, ably discussed by Winburn, Love, Powell, Mahan, Sutton and Hines, and adopted.

On motion of Bro. J. V. Browning, it was resolved that speeches hereafter be limited to ten minutes.

Bro. H. L. Winburn presented and read the report of the Committee on Education, which was spoken to by him and Forbes and Horn, and adopted.

Bro. J. J. Haynes presented and read the report of the Committee on Ministerial Relief, which was adopted and a cash collection amounting to \$17.08 taken for that fund.

After enjoying the refreshments so bountifully prepared by the good sisters of DeGray, the Messengers reassembled at 1:30 p. m. and were led in prayer by Bro. J. W. Roundtree.

Bro. G. W. Burns presented and read the report of the Com-

mittee on Associational Missions, and moved its adoption.

The report contained a recommendation favoring co-operation with the State Convention.

Bro. W. U. Davis moved to amend by striking out that recommendation.

After considerable discussion in which it appeared to be the consensus of opinion that the Association was abundantly able to take care of missions within its bounds, the motion to amend by striking out prevailed by an almost unanimous volumer the report was recommitted.

In connection with the foregoing, the report of the

Executive Board was read.

Bro. W. A. Forbes presented and read his report was Treasurer.

was adopted.

Bro. G. W. Burns presented and read the report on Associational Missions, as amended by the Committee in words and figures following, towit:

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

The motto of this Association should be, "The Coppel of the Son of God within easy reach of every man, woman and child in her bounds," and as there is still destitution in more pied territory and pastorless churches and churches destitute Sunday Schools, and some places of importance where work has been commenced, that are struggling to succeed and calling on unfor help—

First. We recommend that our Board undertake a Missionary pastoral work.

Second. That the Messengers now present pledge themselves to the support of said work.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

G. W. BURNS, I. M. POWELL. W. J. BLEDSOE, Committee

It was moved to amend the first recommendation so as to read: First. Resolved, That this Association elect a missionary for the ensuing year and fix his salary.

The motion carried.

Thereupon an election by ballot was held for such missionary, resulting: For J. T. Gathright, 33; for R. E. Sutton, 16.
On motion, duly seconded, Bro. Gathwright's salary was

fixed at \$50 per month for time actually engaged.

At 7:30 p. m. Bro. L. Hine preached from the text: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life."-John 3:16.

The writer heard only the close of the sermon, but from what

he did hear, he was very favorably impressed.

At the close of the sermon the Moderator resumed the chall Bro. W. A. Forbes presented and read the report of the Committee on Pastoral Support. It was spoken to by Forbill Howell, Horne, Roundtree and White, and adopted.

Bro. Howell presented the report of the Committee on Nombo

nations and moved its adoption.

A motion to amend by striking out New Home Church and inserting Delight was made. After hearing the friends of both places present their claims, the motion to strike out and insent prevailed, thereupon the report as amended was adopted.

Bro. J. H. Smart presented and read the report of Committee on Home and Foreign Missions, and moved its adoption. The motion carried.

On motion of Bro. Winburn, the selection of the new Executive Board was referred to the Committee on Nominations Afterwards the Committee nominated Bros. W. A. Forbes, A. W. King, G. W. Burns, J. H. Vann and J. M. White as the Executive Board, and the same were duly elected by the Association.

On motion of Bro. Winburn, the Board was directed to carry on the work of Associational Missions subject to the limitations given by this body.

Bro. A. J. Price presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That we extend to DeGray Church and the more rounding community our heartfelt thanks for the kind hoppful ity shown us during the sitting of this, body.

The resolution was adopted by a rising vote.

The Committee on Finance presented its report, which was read and adopted. (See Appendix "O").

The following resolution was presented by Bro. J. T. Howell

and read and adopted, towit:

Resolved, That this Association recommend to the churches within its bounds the Baptist Newsboy as a paper worthy of

their patronage.

On motion, it was ordered that the Clerk cause to be printed the usual number of copies of the minutes; that the constitution by-laws and rules of decorum be printed therein, and that he be allowed \$15 for his services.

A motion to adjourn was carried, thereupon a hymn was sung, the parting hand was given, and the Moderator declared this body duly adjourned, to meet with the church at Delight at 10 o'clock a. m. on Saturday before the second Sunday in October, 1905.

APPENDIX "A."

We, your Committee on Temperance, submit the following

report:

Having carefully studied the temperance question for the past year, we believe the temperance work is gaining ground. There is no better way to put this curse of intemperance down

than for the earnest workers to keep steadily working. There has been great good done both in the county and state, also in the United States. Statistics show that a number more counties in this state, at the last elecion, voted against license, among them Pike County, of which we are proud. We notice also that the United States are improving along this line. While this is the fact, we find on the other hand that there is great opposition to the temperance work. Statistics show that there are one billion two hundred million dollars spent annually in the United States for liquor. This sum is three times the amount required to run the United States government.

We find also that about 90 per cent of the crimes committed in the United States are the result of liquor. About 90 per cent of insanity is caused by liquor, and nearly 90 per cent of widows and orphans are caused by liquor.

We would recommend-

First. That each member of the Baptist church abstalu from the use of intoxicating drinks.

Second. That they work against the use of intoxicating drinks in every way possible.

Third. That they vote against the granting of license to sell intoxicants as often as opportunity affords.

Fourth. That the directors of our free schools be urged to employ only sober men for teachers and that they instruct the pupils under their care about the evils of the use of intoxicating drinks. By carefully instructing the children we hope in time to reach every class of people, knowing that early impressions are the strongest and most lasting.

- Fifth. We would recommend that each pastor study the important question carefully, and lecture to each of his congrugations at least once each year.

Sixth. We would recommend the expulsion of any preacher or layman who persistently indulges in social dram-drinking

We also find that we are not taking the interest in the children that we should, and we are thus missing a great work for God, and we believe He will hold us responsible to a great extent for this neglect of His work.

APPENDIX "F."

Your Committee on Education begs leave to report to follows:

Education is leading out, or developing the powers and capabilities of a man or woman. It consists, not in putting in factabut in developing forces. A well-rounded education has to do with developing the physical, mental and spiritual natures of the subject. This development may be had either in or out of the schools. Our fathers got the same thing—trained faculties and powers—outside of the schools.

They achieved this result by a lifetime of hard experience and were best fitted to live when their call came to go-up higher

The better way is for a man to receive this training outly in life, so he can be able to put his well-developed powers into life's duties. For this purpose our Baptist fathers in Arkaneae have planted and fostered denominational schools, where the body is given healthful exercise, the mind is trained to work and the spiritual nature fed on the best there is in our denominational life. There our young men and women get the training in a few years that it took their forefathers a lifetime to get This your committee understands to be the real philosophy of education.

In our Ouachita Central system of colleges and academies we have the best educational facilities in the state. We have two colleges and four academies. Last year there were about 1,000 students under eighty teachers in our schools. The largest and best equipped of these schools is Quachita College, in our own

We recommend that (I) our people send their boys and mile to Ouachita College; (2) that they offer prayer for the schools and teachers; (3) that we support them with our means; (4) that a special effort be made to induce our young preachers to go to Ouachita College for a training; (5) that we pledge our moral and financial support to the work of ministerial education.

We, your Committee on Orphans' Home, are glad to report that our Home at Monticello is in excellent condition and is proving a great blessing to the unfortunate. The internal care and management of the devout mother, Sister Gardner, is all that could be desired, and the work of Bro. W. W. Gardner, the

financial agent, is most efficient, and satisfactory.

There are sixty-two children in the Home—thirty-six beds in three rooms. The present need of the Home is more room. The present plan of the Board of Directors is to enlarge the building. For this, \$2,000 is needed at once. The Board has \$600 in the treasury for this purpose, and as soon as \$1,000 is procured they will have the work done. Your Committee would, therefore recommend that this Association take a collection for this cause now, and ask the churches in the Association to respond liberally to this noble call at once.

Therefore, we recommend to the churches of Red River Association, that they step out from behind the smoke of confusion and take up the Lord's plan of doing mission work to the extent of their ability, beginning at home and going to the

uttermost parts of the earth.

Brethren, we have said, "Speak, Lord, and thy servants will obey." The Lord says, "Go!" And yet it is a deplorable fact that our people in this Association, gave only \$812.12, or 28 1-4 cents per member for this work last year. Brethren, let us wake up to our duty and come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty. Brethren, let us urge the churches of this Association to give more liberally to this work in the incoming year than we

have in the past, each church being her own judge as to God's plan of work.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

- 1. We believe in a true and living God.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures, comprising the Old and New Testaments, are the words of God and the only rules of our faith and practice.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christian
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.
- 5. We believe in man's inability of his own free will and ability to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.
- 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imparted righteousness of Christ only.
- 7. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away.
- 8. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are the ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and the immersion is the apostolic mode.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and in the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal
- 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the gospel but one who has been regularly baptized, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.
- 11. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's supper.
- 12. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Union shall be known and distinguished by

the name and title of the Red River Baptist Association.

Art. 2. This Association shall be composed of delegates from the churches in the Union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches, before they take their seats.

Art. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot an each annual Association, and continue in office until their successors are chosen.

- Art. 4. This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent in matters of internal government, and shall act as advisory counsel, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied from the nature of the compact. It, nevertheless, claims authority over its own members, the delegates from churches, and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from, and disown, all churches which depart from the spirit of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should, therefore, regard all churches united under this Constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the Kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the gospel, and the means in accordance with the gospel, to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially those united in this Constitution.
- Art. 5. Newly constituted churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union by sending three delegates, their number in fellow-hip, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunitated, restored and deceased since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted.
- Art. 6. This Association shall have a fund, to be supplied by voluntary contributions from the churches. All the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the Association and present annually for inspection in the minutes a clear and succinct statement of all receipts and expenditures.

DIGEST OF LETTERS.

Letters were received from 39 churches, two more than lavear, and two churches were represented by Messengers only Twelve churches without pastors; only one last year. Only 12 churches report amount of pastor's salary. Total baptisms this year 190, last year 205. Total membership last year 2,884, this year 2,949. Three churches have contributed to every branch of church work, Arkadelphia giving \$6.22 per member. Shilms \$4.12 per member and Unity \$3.23 per member. Three more churches very nearly contributed to all the enterprises of the church. Five churches report contributions for minutes only Total contributions for all purposes last year \$5,236.15, this year \$5,806.14, a gain of \$569.99.

Last year we gave per member \$1.93, this year \$1.97. Law year we gave to all missions \$1,206.79, or 44 I-2 cents per member. This year we gave \$1,337.67, or 60 3-4 cents [41]

member.

The Clerk was directed to so construct his tables as to shorthrough which channel the contributions of the churches passed whether State Convention or General Association, but until the church clerks so report to the Association in the church letter it cannot be accurately done. The Clerk thinks that Arkadelphin Boughton, Delight, Gum Springs, Prescott, Shiloh and Units churches sent their contributions to the State Convention, and the rest of the churches sent theirs to the General Association. If so, the State Convention received from seven churches for State, Home and Foreign Missions \$1,063.08, and the General Association received from the remaining thirty-five churches for State, Home and Foreign Missions \$88.45. The State Convention got \$1.01 per member, the General Association got 5 cents and mills per member.

Twenty-one churches report Sunday Schools with 1, 1 pupils enrolled. Last year twenty-one churches reported Sunday

Schools with 1,411 enrolled.

The outlook for the next year, as seen by the Clerk, is verencouraging. All obstacles and hindrances seem to have been removed, and it will be hard indeed for any brother to find an excuse for not putting his shoulder to the wheel and helping make things come to pass.
