OSCEOLA, ARK., OCT. 8, 1903.

THE Mount Zion Association met this day at 10:00 a.m. with Osceola Baptist Church, in its Fifty-first Annual Session, and was called to order by B. H. Parrish. After singing "I Love Thy Kingdom Lord," prayer was led by E. P. Minton. Rev. S. A. Smith, of Jonesboro, was called upon to lead devotional exercise, and, responding, led a profitable half-hour service.

Upon motion of T. B. Kitchens, E. P. Minton was called to act as temporary chairman. Before regular business was begun Moderator J. H. Kitchens, who was delayed on account of pressing business engagements, arrived and was asked to take his place. Moderator appointed S. A. Smith, E. P. Minton and H. F. Wright, committee on credentials, and J. W. Hiett and B. H. Parrish, reading clerks.

Motion was made at this point to adjourn to defer permanent organization until afternoon and have Introductory Sermon. Elder J. F. McClain occupied the pulpit. After reading John 17th chapter, he took his text from James 5:16 and preached a strong, practical sermon on prayer.

THURSDAY NIGHT.

Called to order by Moderator. Song, "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds." Prayer by G. M. Settlemoir. Report of committee on Ministerial Education was read by E. P. Minton. Spoken to by S. A. Smith, Ed L. Jacobs. A. B. Bohannon preached a most extraordinary sermon bearing upon the subject of minsterial education which was well recieved.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, your committe, on Ministerial Education beg to submit the following report: The education of the ministery is an obligation resting upon all. Those who can educate themselves should do so, and those not financially able to educate themselves should receive financial aid from the brotherhood, at large. So far as your committee is informed this association is not assisting any minister in obtaining an education and only \$34.85 has been reported from the churches for this purpose. Such should not be the condition of affairs in this association. Weighted with the responsibility of leading the people of God into higher plains of usefulness and development to necessity of an educated ministry is apparent to all. Baptists are leading the world in higher education and so we should lead the world in the education of our ministry. The tide of ministerial education is not coming upon us but is now upon us. Our present and future denominational life depends upon the intelligence of our ministry. A man can preach the gospel without an education, but he can preach it better with it. Your committee would recommend that the attention of the churches be called to this matter and that they be also urged to contribute something to this cause. - E. P. Minton, J. W. Light, W. J. Met at 9.00 and called to order by Moderator. Sang "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," and led by prayer by J. W. Hiett. Motion was made that a Ministerial Relief committee be appointed. Motion prevailed and committee was appointed. W. J. Bearden was called upon to lead devotional exercise. The exercise was greatly enjoyed. Report on Literature was read by J. M. Huddleston. Spoken to by J. M. Huddleston, A. B. Bohannon, B. H. Parrish, and adopted.

LITERATURE.

Good literature in our families should be carefully guarded by the parents. It is of too great importance to treat slightly. The development of our girls and boys is dependent upon the literature they read, therefore first of all we recommend the Bible, that it be persistently urged upon our people for it is the way-bill from earth to Heaven. It is the only book that reveals the character and will of God. We, further, recommend that our people use the Southern Baptist Convention Series of Sunday School Literature.—J. M. Huddleston, F. M. Report on Sunday Schools was read by W. H. Borum. The report was discussed by W. H. Borum, W. J. Bearden and J. W. Hiett, Adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, beg leave to report as follows: Sunday Schools are the greatest auxiliaries of the church. They are the means by which and through which we bring the young people and children to the church and teach them the way of

eternal truth, and hasten them to read and study the Bible and thereby teach them the way of eternal life. But the greatest drawback to our Sunday Schools is the fact that fathers and mothers will not attend the Sunday Schools with their children. Instead of taking their children by the hand and leading them to the Sunday School they will remain at home and send the children. Brethren, this will not do. If the older ones do not take more interest in the Sabbath Schools we need not expect our children to be deeply interested. We earnestly ask that all of our churches take more interest in this great work, and in placing literature in the hands of young people and in organizing Sunday Schools in destitute places.—W. H. Upon motion of A. B. Bohannon, Foreign Mission was set for 3:00 p.m. The hour for preaching having arrived, Rev. J. I. Martin of the General Association occupied the pulpit. He selected for a text I Tim. 3:15. His theme was, "Our Mission in the World." He preached a strong practical sermon which was well received. Adjourned.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Called to order by Moderator. Sang "Blessed Assurance."
Prayer led by J. N. Markhart. Report on nominations was read by
J. M. Huddleston. Spoken to by J. W. Hiett. Adopted.

WOMAN'S WORK.

We, your committee, on Woman's Work beg leave to submit the following report: We find that only four churches in this association have Ladies' Auxiliaries, the four having raised \$894.77, which is a demonstration of the great work that might be done by them but for the want of proper organization. It is said that the "Arm that rocks the cradle rules the world," and we therefore recommend:

- 1. That the ladies in all our churches organize Ladies Societies.
- That these organizations have definite aims pertaining to the promotion of the work they expect to accomplish.
- 3. That they co-operate with the Central Committee of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, to be one in their work and co-operation with the great work being done by the ladies of the S. B. C.—P. S. Osborn, Mesdames Wille Johnson, J. C. Spann, S. E. Stotts, F. L. Redding.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by A. B. Bohannon, and after being discussed by him was adopted by unanimous vote.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Foreign Missions is "World Wide Missions." No other interest strikes the high note of our denominational life as does our great mission enterprises. "World Wide Missions" furnishes the most striking and unanswerable reason for our distinct denominational existence to be found anywhere. Our Master committed this great work to us as a special heritage. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel" were the last words He left ringing in the ears

of His people. Our supreme effort must be to raise this blessed work from the sphere of mere duty into the higher realm of opportunity. Here, more than anywhere else, we come into touch with the great purposes of our Savior.

God has laid His hands upon every useful invention of modern times and has devoted them all to this mighty work. Modern machines are ministers of mercy, and with a thousand-voiced echo their silver trumpets go sounding around the globe, the glory and blessedness of the people "whose God is the Lord." The whole wide world is open to the gospel message. From every quarter of the earth the cry is coming to our ears, "Come over and help us." The nations that sit in darkness have heard the echoes of the gospel and are watching for the mission ship. Remotest coral reefs and isolatd islands are waiting for the man of God. Ethiopia today stretches her hands to God. Christian Missions goes before the people as never before. It goes with a mighty Christian civilization and a higher conception of art than ever was known. It goes into earth's darkest corners with a great blazing light in its hand-the light of Christian Liberty, Christian Love and Chritian Life. We make no recommendation except this: That our pastors and messengers go home and bring their people face to face with the great mission spirit. The report of the Committee on Ministerial Relief was read by R. C. Medaris. The report was spoken to by R. C. Medaris, W. J. Bearden. Adopted. A special collection was taken which amounted to \$9.20 to be devoted to this purpose.

OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF.

At the State Convention at Conway a committee was appointed to look after this work this conventional year. That committee consisted of Rev. J. W. McDonald, Rev. W. T. Amis, Hot Springs; and R. C. Medaris, Jonesboro.

The committee has been hard at work since the Convention getting the work organized. The plans have been formulated and the churches informed of the work, and have been asked to stand by the work in prayer and contributions.

We are helping six preachers, and one widow, who was the wife of an old deceased preacher. These men are men that are worthy of our help. Here is an approximate summary of their work:

Revivals held, 2,112: Sermons preached, 12,838; Conversions witnessed, 7,500; Persons baptised, 4,661; Churches organized, 100; Sunday schools organized, 110; Church houses built 16; Associations organized, 2; Number of couples married, 355; Number of funerals conducted, 516; Number of preachers ordained, 104; Number of deacons ordained, 150.

We, as Baptists in Arkansas, owe no little of our present standing and success as a denomination to these old preachers. They are now too old to k bor much and none of them have a sufficiency of this world's goods to keep them comfortable. The ages of these men range from 55 to 91 years. One of them is totally blind. Shall we neglect these men of God in their old and needy days? God forbid. So far our people have done well in contributing to this cause, but we need more money—especially as the winter is coming on. We must give more to these soldiers of the cross in autumn and winter than we did in the spring and summer. Your committee urges all our churches to make regular and liberal contributions to this worthy cause, and we recommend that a collection be taken now for this work. Respectfully submitted, R. C. Report of the Board was read by B. H. Parrish, secretary; Treasurer T. B. Kitchens read his report, and Missionary R. C. Medaris also read report in this connection. The reports were spoken to by J. W. Hiett, J. B. Wise, H. F. Wright, J. H. Kitchens, A. B. Botannon and R. C. Medaris. W. J. Bearden preached a sermon of great power on I John 3:2. "It doth not yet appear what we shall be; but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him as He is." At the close of this sermon the parting hand was given to Bro. Medaris who has rendered such calthful service not only in our own association, but throughout the entire state, and who now leaves us for service in other fields.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

We are convinced by the past history of this association that our Executive Board has acted wisely in the management of our work, and believe it would be the wisest for the association to continue entrusting its work into their hands.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

According to instructions of last association your committee employed Eld. R. C. Medaris as general missionary of Mt. Zion Association at a salary of \$1,000 and expenses. Work began on Nov. 8. 1902. Your Board also entered into contract with the State Board that they were to pay \$75.00 per quarter of the salary of our missionary with the understanding that he was to represent the State work in all its departments at all points visited by him within bounds of Mt. Zion Association. It was also agreed that he should visit some points outside of the association as it would better enable us to meet our obligations and be no serious detriment to our work.

In May the Board in session authorized the Missionary to take collections for the purpose of purchasing a tent, and that he purchase a tent at once for the use of the association. The tent was purchased at a cost of \$120.95, which has been paid as will be shown by Missionary's report.

We attach Missionary's report, and the Treasurer's report to this report as a part of our report. We are glad to be able to report that the obligations of the Executive Board have been paid and we begin a new year without any debt whatever.

We invite the brotherhood and sisterhood of the entire association to join us in thanksgiving to God for the number of souls that have been born into the Kingdom and added to the churches, and the Board feels especially thankful to the brethren of the various churches for their ready responses to our appeals for help in this great work.

Let us thank God, take courage and go forward. There is a bright future before us and let us prove ourselves worthy of the trust committed to us.—J. H. Kitchens, chairman; B. H. Parrish, Secretary.

To the Messengers of the Mt. Zion Baptist Association, assembled in their annual meeting with the Baptist Church at Osceola, Ark., October 8th to 11th, 1993:

REPORT OF MISSIONARY.

Dear Brethren:—As your missionary, and district missionary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for the past year, the work which I have sought to do was that of educating our people along missionary lines, of helping to strengthen the weak churches in centres of influence, helping to raise money for church building purposes, organizing churches and Sunday schools where they gave promise of future existence and usefulness, purchasing a tent for the work in our association, disseminating religious literature, and last, but not least, endeavoring to bring souls to Christ.

The visible results of my labors, so far as we can know, are shown in the summary statement connected herewith. It is, but proper that I should state that, owing to the exceeding rains in the first part of the winter and spring months, the lateness of the summer season, and sickness in the family of the missionary, the work has been hindered this year greatly. Notwithstanding this your missionary is profoundly greatful unto God for His blessings upon his labors for the year. I take great pleasure in acknowleding valuable assistance in the Colportage work by the State S. S. and Colportage Board and the S. S. Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in the gifts of a large number of Bibles, Testiments and tracts. Following is summery statement:

Days labored, 330; Miles traveled, 3,566; Churches visited, 25; other points visited, 8; Sermons preached, 241; Religious addresses, 74; Total sermons and addresses, 315; Prayer meetings conducted, 10; Prayer meetings organized 4: Religious visits, 128; Professions of conversions, 48; Additions by baptism, 42; Additions by letter, 45; Total additions to the churches, 87: Churches organized, 1; Sunday schools organized, 33; Money raised for associational missions, \$357.03; State missions, \$28.40; Home missions, \$8.78; Foreign missions, \$17.35; Sunday school and Colportage work, \$2.50; Ministerial education, \$18.82; Orphan's home, \$8.75; Old ministers' relief funds \$249.08; Tent fund, \$123.12; Colportage wagon' fund, \$9.75; Church' building, (cash and pledges) \$350.00; Pages tracts distributed, 9,000; value of same, \$17.00; Bibles sold, 23; Testaments sold, 36; value of these, \$9.35; Bibles given away, 52, Testaments given away, 61; value of these, \$18.25; Other books sold, 75; value, \$11.25; Missionary Institutes held, 3; Revival meetings held, 8.

Your committee greatly rejoices in the prosperity that has attended the Orphan's Home since its beginning. We recommend that our churches continue to support this part of our work and we insist upon our State Convention having the Board of Trustees.

Report of committee on Home Missions was read by J. W. Hiett. Spoken to by J. W. Hiett, J. B. Wise. Adopted.

HOME MISSIONS.

The territory embraced in this name comprises the States of the S. B. C. and Cuba. Their special work being along the frontiers of the western states and territories, and the islaud of Cuba. There has been much severe criticism of late on the Cuban work, and no doubt but that some very grave mistakes have been made. Men are subject to error. The work of the Home Board has been in the hands of men who are as capable of doing the right thing as you or I. Therefore we urge that all our brethren give to the work, and interests of the Home Board, due consideration and stand ready with their contributions to aid and assist them in its very worthy and laudable enterprises.—J. W. Hiett, J. N. Markhart, A. A. Ryan, Committee.

J. W. Hiett moved that Memorial Services be set for 3:00, p. m. Motion prevailed.

Time for preaching service having arrived, Rev. Isham O. Siler occupied the pulpit, preaching a very instructive and entertaining sermon from I. Tim., 3:15. His theme was the "Ground and Pillar of Truth." Adjourned.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

Called to order by Moderator. Sang, "How Firm a Foundation," led in prayer by S. M. Ferguson.

Report of Committee on Temperance was read by W. H. Méredith. The report was discussed by W. H. Meredith, J. W. Hiett, J. B. Wise, B. H. Parrish, A. B. Bohannon and P. C. Barton. Adopted.

TEMPERANCE.

No subject that can come before this body demands more definite and heroic attention than the one before us—the cause of Christian Temperance. No evil is so widespread and so destructive as the evil of intemperance. The saloon curse is the right arm of Satanic power. No class of society is exempt from the blight of its withering breath. There is no sense in which such unmitigated evil can be justified. It answers no natural or righteous demand. Its very life depends upon the creation of an unnatural, degrading and demoralizing appetite. In its insatiable greed for gain it overrides every principle of honesty, integrity and purity. It attacks the home, the State and the Church. Its one and only demand is gain, and in its merciless greed it is as remorseless as an earthquake. But more than all, this deadly thing, this diabolical plunderer of the virtue of society, this hydra-headed monster that is debauching and imbruting our boys and degrading our girls, and dragging its slimy trail into almost every home, is here by the consent of a so-called Christian people.

It is the sense of your committee that the time is at hand when we must do something more than adopt resolutions concerning it. We must act. We must draw sharp, distinct lines between right and wrong in our churches. The firm, steady hand of church discipline must be interposed to drive this hateful thing from our midst. The church member who in any manner indorses, aids or condones the saloon curse is an unqualified traitor to the church, the home—to God and Humanity.

We recommend that all our churches take such action in the matter as will bring their members who assist this thing to repentance, if possible; but, failing in this, will rid the church of responsibility for such membership.

We recommend, also, that members again be earnestly requested to abstain from the use of tobacco and all other narcotics.—W. H. Meredith, W. H. Allbright, J. T. Terry, J. T. Dement, Committee.

Owing to absence of chairman of the committee the report on State Missions was read by B. H. Parrish. The report as given below was passed without discussion.

- STATE MISSIONS.

We live in a state of vast religious destitution. It is a region of destitution of Baptist preachers and preaching. There is much land in Arkansas to be possessed by Baptists. There are whole counties in the state where there is no settled Baptist preacher and no self-supporting Baptist church. We are surrounded by demands for all our possibilities of evangelization; we are besieged from every side by Macedonian calls. We cannot be true to our Baptist faith and remain insensible to these demands or deaf to these calls.

The State Mission Board has been and is endeavoring to lessen this destitution that exists in our state. Through this agency much has been done, but much remains to be done. The State Board is now, and always has been, handicapped on account of the small amount of money contributed by the churches and put into its hands for this work. The cause demands double the amount of money which the Baptists of this state have been giving to it. We must stand by our efficient missionary secretary and the splendid work he is doing. We need to stand together in praying and giving for this cause. "Arkansas for Christ" should be the motto of every Baptist church and every Baptist in the state. Let no church in Mt. REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF HIGH SCHOOL

We held our first meeting in January and completed the organization by electing G. W. Puryear treasurer.

At this meeting it was unanimously agreed to borrow \$3,579.00 from the Bank of Jonesboro with interest at ten 1 er cent to pay off note then due against property.

At our second meeting it was reported that Z. T. Matthews refused to serve on our board and co-operate with us whereupon Jacob Sharp was elected in his place.

At a meeting in the latter part of June C. T. Carpenter, president of Andersonville Institute, Tenn., was elected to take charge of the School. Visiting us in July he accepted and the organization of the faculty was soon completed by securing Professor W. L. Gentry and Miss Margaret L. Perry,

September 7th a quorum of the Board met and agreed to expend about \$500 in the equipment of our school, most of which has been expended.

On 16th of September the School opened. The opening was full of inspiration and promise. A number of addresses were made of which we desire to make especial mention of the address of Dr. A. B. Bohannon and Hon. Eugene Parrish.

We feel especially gratified to report, that the enrollment was fifty-three the first day and and has since grown to seventy-five and the work is highly gratifying and full of promise.

We appeal to the churches that they contribute to this, one of the most important factors in our work and in every way co-operate with our school.—P. C. Barton, J. W. Hiett; T. B. Kitchens, J. B. Kitchens.

SATURDAY EVENING
