MINUTES

OF THE

State Line Baptist Association

The State Line Missionary Baptist Association met with Antioch church on Thursday night, September 11, 1919. Rev. E. T. Lincoln of Maynard preached the annual ser mon after which the association adjourned to meet Friday at 9:00 a. m.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Met as per scheduled at adjournment. Opened with singing and prayer by Rev. J. A. Allison and 30 minutes was spent in devational exercises.

After this the Association was called to order by W. S. Looney and Bro. W. S. Looney was elected Moderator by acclamation. C. H. Carter was nominated clerk and nominated by acclamation. Bro. T. R. Dollahan and J. A. Allison were appointed reading clerks and the letters from sister churches were called for, read and messengers were seated as follows:

After this a 10 minute recess was given. Visitors from afar off, Dr. U S. Thomas of Little Rock and Sister Mildred Matthews of Jonesboro were seated.

Bro. Allison preached from Mark 14 and the latter part of the 6th verse and the first part of the 8th verse, an able sermon. The Association then adjourned to meet at 3:30 p. m.

Motion was carried to give Sister Matthews time to introduce herself and her work and time for a talk Saturday and Sunday.

FRIDAY EVENING SERVICE

The Association was called to order by the Moderator after which Sister Matthews made an earnest appeal in behalf of Women's work in their part of the \$75,000,000 campaign.

Following this Dr. U.S. Thomas preached an able sermon from Mark 12-5 on the importance of prayer. He also preached Saturday morning at 11 o'clock, Saturday afternoon at 7:00, and Sunday morning at 11.00 and many were made to feel the inspirations of his sermons.

SATURDAY MORNING SERVICE

Association met and was called to order by Moderator. Prayer was offered by Bro J. A. Allison after which the order of business was taken up.

District Missions

We, your committee on district missions, would report as follows: We find quite a lot of destitution in our bounds and several of our churches without a pastor. There are some place where we might have a church if we had a man to go and hold a meeting and organize a church. We would recommend that we put out a man to go in the field and we ask the State Board of Arkansas Baptists in convention to co-operate with us in this great work of the Lord.

State Missions

Your committee would call attention to the importance of State Missions. It proposes to preach the theme Gospel to every man and woman in Arkansas, help weak churches and assist local associations to support a first class mission ary.

Dr. E. P. Alldredge is our new secretary of missions. He and all the force are deeply interested in the Baptist 75 Million Campaign. Our state is asked for \$3,200,000 in five years. This will care for all our work except local expenses of our churches. This big sum of money will go to Christian education, orphans home, ministerial relief, home and foreign missions, hospital work and district missions.

Resolved that this association accept our quota and elect an organizer and publicity manager and take hold of this work and do our best to put this association over the

top. That every member pray and work to bring about a great revival in this association, in the state and in the Southland. . Respectfully submitted

Home Missions

We your committee, would recommend first, that earnest prayer be made for the work of the Home Mission Board and that our preachers be asked to preach at least once a year on Home Missions. Looney, E. T. Lincoln and C. H. Carter.

Christian Education

The Baptists of Arkansas have two well established colleges, Quachita at Arkadelphia and Central at Conway. Both of these institutions have for years been contributing largely to our denominational growth and development. We also have four mountain colleges, Maynard Academy at Maynard, Mountain Home in Carroll county, Blue Eye and one other that I do not know the name of.

Our total property value in educational institutions is estimated at \$400,000. Our total debt as reported at last meeting of the convention was only about \$60,000. This debt is on our State Board and consists of the debt of Central College assumed by the convention and of obligations made to secure money to annul the deficit at Ouachita College.

We now owe \$70,000 in the endowment fund for Ouachita and it is hoped and believed that this fund can be made to grow last enough to have many more deficits there. The Baptists of Arkansas must pay our little educational debts, endow Ouachita college liberally and provide new buildings and equipment for our colleges and mountain schools. We heartily endorse the five year campaign. We are glad that an educational secretary has been employed whose entire time is given to raising funds and stimulating the interest of the educational work. Quachita and our mountain schools are very important in training the ministry.

We are sadly in need of more preachers. We ought to help and encourage our young preachers to attend our

schools. Let no church fail to make opportunity.

Woman's Work

Realizing that this is the greatest hour in the World's history for Southern Baptists and realizing also the great part that women have to fill in this reconstruction period, we, your committee on Woman's Work, feel as never before the importance of organized Woman's Work and the need of such work in this association.

We find that out of the churches in this association there is only one Woman's Missionary Society and there is no society for the training of our young people and children Therefore we recommend, first that a Woman's Missionary Society and Sunbeam Band be organized in every church in this association and where it is possible that our young ladies and girls organize into a Missionary Society and where that is not possible that the young women be urged to join the Woman's Missionary Society

We further recommend that Mrs. H. E. Peters of Maynard be elected as superintendent for this association and that she have the hearty co operation of the women and the pastors of the churches.

We still further recommend that the women in every church have a Prayer Ctrole, a tithing band and some organized Bible study.

Again we recommend that a certain hour be set aside at every meeting of the association for the presentation of Woman's Work.

Orphans Home

The Orphans Home at Monticello has been in operation for 24 years and has been a blessing to many orphan children. This work of mercy has a large place in the hearts of the people. Its mission is based on God's word to "Relieve the distressed orphans and save them to state and bring them into the Kingdom of God". We now have several children in our home at Monticello and the possibility of placing the children in good permanent homes. While it has its problems, nevertheless it is proving a great blessing to the children and at the same time enables, the home to care, for a larger number of children.

We also have a home at Texarkana which must be supported. They maintain many orphanchildren. The Monticello home will need much money to meet all obligations and go to the convention clean of debt.

We recommend that every church and Sunday school

make regular monthly offerings to this work of mercy.
