A collection was then taken for the Home, and among the contributions was ten dollars contributed to Mrs. Hannah Hyatt Gardner, the matron of the Home, by Bro. Donahoue, of Kentucky church.

On motion, from 11 a. m. to 12 m., was set apart for the

discussion of State and associational missions.

The report of Committee on Religious Literature was received and ado ted without discussion. (See report C).

The Committee on Home Missions reported, and the

report was adopted as read. (See report D).

The Committee on Sunday-schools made their report, and it was ably and enthusiastically discussed by Bros. Benj. Cox and J. G. Doyle. The report was laid over for the evening session. (See report E).

The report of State missions was then heard, which was discussed very ably by Bro. J. N. Glen and Eld. J. W. McDon-

ald and adopted. (See report F).

Next came the report of the Committee on Foreign Mis-

The report on Sunday-schools laid over during the mornng session, was now taken up and adopted. (See report E).

The Committee on Total Abstinence reported that they favored and would recommend that the same report made by the committee on this subject at Oat Grove church during the association in 1897, be inserted in the minutes of the present meeting. Adopted. (See report I).

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Education was

received and adopted without discussion. (See report J).

The Committee on Prayer meeting submitted their report.

Adopted as read. (See report K).

Bro. J. W. McDonald now came forward and requested that prayer be offered in the interest of our beloved Bro. J. M.

Powers, of Magnet Cove, who has for a long time been lingering on the bed of affliction, and whose family is in almost a destitute condition. A very feeling and earnest prayer was held, led by Bro. J. M. Glen, after which a collection was taken for this deserving family. Five dollars and seventy-five cents was collected and sent to the brother.

The Committee on Nominations made their report which

was adopted. (See Report L).

A motion was made to have the Committee on Prayermeetings to report first at the next session of this body. Motion carried.

The association then chose the following named brethren as messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention: Eld. A. J. Fawcett, messenger; Dr. E. C. Ellis, alternate. Elders J. M. Clem, J. W. McDonald, Benj. Cox, R. F. Russell and Dr. E. C. Ellis as messengers to State Baptist Convention.

On motion Eld. J. W. McDonald was elected to represent

th s body on the State Mission Board.

A motion prevailed that a committee be appointed on obituar es and that the clerk be instructed to have a memorial page in the minutes inscribed in a black border. The follow-lowing named brethren are the committee appointed to report in 1900: Elders J. W. McDonald, C. B. Henderson.

The report of the Finance Committee was next received

and adopted. (See Report M).

On motion the clerk was elected treasurer and allowed \$15 for his services in superintending the printing and distribution of minutes.

A resolution of thanks was offered by Bro. J. W. Mc-Donald and amended by Bro. C. D. Ewell so as to embrace the moderator and clerk as follows:

Resolved, That we, the messengers to the meeting of this association, tender our thanks for the cordial hospitality extended to us by the people of this community; also for the faithful services of the clerk and the impartial manner in which the moderator has presided over this body during this session.

The resolution was adopted as amended.

A motion to adjourn carried. A song was sung during which the messengers took the parting hand.

The association then adjourned, prayer by Eld. A. J. Fawcett, to meet with Ouachita church, Hot Spring County, at 10 a. m., Saturday before the first Sunday in October, 1900. Thus closed the sixtieth session of the Saline Baptist Association, one of the most harmonious and fraternal meetings of its history.

#### B-ORPHANS' HOME.

Your committee would submit the following:

In 1894 Miss Hannah Hyatt offered to our church at Monticello eighty acres of land for the purpose of building an orphans' home, which was accepted. At the meeting of our convention at Lonoke of that year, the en-

terprise was adopted and a board of trustees appointed.

We now have a building 20x60, two stories high, with six large rooms, and a farm of forty acres, all of which is under cultivation by the boys in the home. At our last meeting we had eighteen children in the home. Now there are 36, 13 of whom have been baptized and are members of the Baptist church at Monticello. The home is under the management of Mrs. Hannah-Hyatt Gardner. The children are receiving a good education. All this is done without any cost to you. But brethren, we must have more room in the home. We have eight children in a room and five beds in each of these rooms. Others are seeking admission, but there is no room for them. Our board is doing all it can to get the money to build the main building. Half of the amount for that purpose is on hand. Your committee would ask all the churches of this association to aid in this great work. Will you give us a good collection today?

Let us not be willing to pay the expenses of our missionaries to foreign lands and then refuse to do anything for these same foreigners when they come to us bearing their own expenses. We would also call attention to the fact that for several years the Home Board has been paying \$1,000 a year to aid our cause in Arkansas. The board is deeply interested in our work. We also recommend that the hearty support of our churches and schools be given Bro. J. G. Doyle, the faithful representative of the Sunday-school Board.

#### F-STATE MISSIONS.

Another encouraging feature is the harmonious co-operation of all our associations with the State Board. Your committee would recommend that our relations be continued as heretofore; that pledges be now taken and that a committee of five be appointed on nominations who shall recommend to this body an associational missionory whose duties shall be outlined by the association and amount of salary agreed upon. #### I-TOTAL ABSTINENCE.

We, your committee on total abstinence, beg leave to report that we recommend that the members of all our churches wholly abstain from the use of alcoholic liquors unless as a medicine upon a prescription by a reputable physician, and, further, that they promptly withdraw fellowship from every member who will engage in "social dram-drinking." We further recommend that the association appoint a suitable man to write a letter on the subject of intemperance, to be published in the minutes.

Letter on Intemperance prepared by Bro Bennett Malone:

Having been appointed by Saline Association to write a circular letter on intemperance to be printed in the minutes, I begin with diffidence on account of the greatness of the subject and of my own weakness. The subject is one that has occupied the greatest minds and but little can be said that has not been said before; but I hope to stir up the minds of my bretheren by way of remembrance. The saloon swings open more gates to hell than any other power in our cities. The use of alcohol as a beverage cuts down youth in its vigor, manhood in its strength, and age in its weakness. It produces weakness, sickness and death. It makes wives, widows; children, orphaus; fathers, fiends, begars and paupers.

It extinguishes natural affections, erases conjugal love, blots out filial attachment, blasts parental hopes and brings age with sorrow to the grave. It covers the land with idleness and crime, it fills our court dockets with business, fills jails, alms-houses and penitentiaries, demands our asylums and furnishes victims for the scaffold. It is the life-blood of the gambler, the element of the burglar, the prop of the highwayman and the support of the midnight incendiary. It countenances the liar, respects the thief, es-

teems the blasphemer.

Men fail to meet their debts and lightly esteem their obligations and lose self-respect by indulging the appetite for drink, then curse the world and laugh at its ruin—and more, it murders the soul and is the chief source of all the lawsuits and crimes of nearly every sort. Nearly all of our church trials are traceable to whisky, and no Baptist church should hold a member in fellowship who will give countenance in any way, either by manufacturing, buying, selling or drinking. The greatest curse in our church is "social dram-drinking." Members of our churches claiming to be washed by the precious blood of Christ, meet together on the 25th of December to celebrate his birthday with "egg-nog" or some other "fixed-up" drink; some of them get beastly drunk, and all more or less so, never think of his name in reverence. No church ought to hesitate one moment when it meets in conference at once to withdraw fellowship from such. Some have said we would depopulate our churches. I reply that our churches would be stronger without such members. Any church holding such in fellowship, ought, and will before many years, be dropped from the association.

The question has been brought up and discussed twice in our association and is gaining advocates, and I hope to see the time when no Baptist church will hold in its fellowship a member who will drink one drop in a social way any more than a thief or a liur, for he that said all liars shall have their part in the lake of fire, said "no drunkard hath eternal life or shall inherit eternal life;" and to drink spirits because you like the taste or effect of it, is to be a drunkard. There is not one word to be said in its favor. It is by some, recommended as a medicine, but the best authorities have agreed that it is neither a food nor a medicine. Any food product, as beef or bread, taken into the stomach is received with avidity, digested and prepared for the use of the body. Not so with alcohol. It is received as an intruder. The bloodshot eye and flushed face are an index to the condition within. A very small quantity will plainly show the effect upon the stomach and other membranes. The delicate linings of the stomach, heart, brain, liver and

lungs are reduced, and every tiny vein is inflammed like the blushing rose itself, and each indulgence intensifies the result until the system is permanently injured, and the inebriate often transmits to his posterity his dreadful habit. In conclusion let me say a word to young ladies. Be sure never form an alliance with the young man who takes a social glass. It is better to be an old maid than to be a drunkard's wife with all its miseries. Let your motto be: "The lips that touch liquor shall never touch mine."

#### J-MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

No subject is of more importance to our denomination than that of ministerial education. Other denominations are paying a great deal of attention to this matter in the State of Arkansas, and we must be up and doing and meet them. We think it is a duty due to God, by one who is called to the highest position that a man can fill, to prepare himself, to the best of his ability, to fulfill his duties and do the greatest good to mankind. In view of the fact that great men and great preachers existed before books were ever invented, yet we urge and insist that our young ministers prepare themselves. We have in Arkansas the Ouachita Baptist College, and its reputation for scholarship is high, not only in Arkansas but throughout this great United States, and we earnestly call the attention of our young ministers and young men who feel that they are called to the ministry, to this Baptist institution. At no time in the history of America could an education be procured so cheap as at the present time. We would urge that different churches in this association take up collections for the benefit of ministerial students.

## Rules of Decorum.

- 1. The association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the snffrages of the members present.
- The moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time.
- 4. A member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the association on the same day but at no other time.
- 5. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise on his feet and obtaining permission, proceed.
- 6. The moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by naming the person, or otherwise.
- 7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses words of personal reflection. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of this association, unless withdrawn by him that made it.
- 8. Every case taken up by the association shall be decided, or withdrawn before another be offered.
- 9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the moderator shall take the voice of the association on the subject, and the members on the affirmative of the question shall signify the same by rising from their seats and those in the negative shall retain theirs.
- 10. The moderator shall pronounce the decision before the standers resume their seats.
- 11. Any member wishing to retire, shall obtain permission from the moderator.
- 12. No member shall speak more than twice on the same proposition without permission of the association, nor more than once till every member wishing to speak shall have done so, nor shall any proposition be made to close the subject till the debates have been carried through.
- 13. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the association by members in their address to one another.
- 14. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.
- 15. The names of members shall be called as often as the association may direct.
- 16. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time; but shall not vote on any question unless the association be equally divided.
- 17. Any member violating the rules may be reproved by the moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall be made.

## Constitution.

- ARTICLE 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the "Saline Regular United Baptist Association."
- ART. 2. This association shall be composed of delegates from churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.
- ART. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberate body, by the appointment of a moderator and clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual association, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.
- ART. 4. The association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall only act as an advisory council, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its members—the delegates from the churches—and in propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the principles of this compact by becoming hetrodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should therefore regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principle business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with that Gospel, and to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially with those united in this constitution.
- ART. 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union, on their sending three delegates to the annual meeting of this association, with a petition for admission, and by their delegates agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.
- ART. 6. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the association, a written communication, specifying the names of their delegates, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored or deceased, since the last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.
- ART. 7. This association may have a fund supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches; and all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee of Finance to the treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the association, and shall present annually, for insertion in the minutes, a clear and succinct statement of all the receipts and expenditures.
- ART. 8. This association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.
- ART. 9. This association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same, and have failed; nor of any difficulty between churches, unless they have pursued the directions in the 18th chapter of Matthew, and have

not been able to settle them. Then the association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them, at its discretion.

ART. 10. It shall be the duty of the clerk of this association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of every session of this body, and to deliver over the same to his successor in office.

ART. 11. This constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of the association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members then present; provided, such alteration or amendment be approved of by the churches comprising this association.

## Articles of Faith.

ARTICLE I. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost.

ART. II. We believe that the Scriptures, comprising the Old and New Testaments, are the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ART. III. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

ART. IV. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.

ART. V. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

ART. VI. We believe that sinners are justified, in the sight of God, by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

ART. VII. We believe that saints shall be preserved in grace, and never fall finally away.

ART. VIII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of haptism, and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

ART. IX. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

ART. X. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, but one who is regularly baptized, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of a presbytery.

ART. XI. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

ART. XII. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.
