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## **PROCEEDINGS**



HE twenty-fourth annual session of the Southwestern Association was held with De Queen church, Sevier county, Arkansas, beginning October 8, 1904.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the body was called to order by the moderator, Thomas DuLaney. The body sang, "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood," the moderator read 103 Psalm, and then offered prayer. Geo. S. Provence and M. C. Morris were appointed to read the letters from the various churches. After reading letters from fourteen churches, the body adjourned till 1 o'clock to hear the introductory sermon, which was preached by J. W. Hubbard. Text: Collossians 3: 3,4.

### Afternoon Session

At 1 o'clock p. m. the body reassembled, sang "The Lord is my Shepherd," and prayer was offered by J. T. Jones. The call was then renewed for letters, and after reading letters from twenty-two more churches, the body organized permanently by electing Geo. S. Provence, moderator, and R. J. Bettis, clerk. B. J. Mathews was then called on to lead in prayer. The moderator then called for petitionary letters. Gethsemane, Red Colony, New Life and Arkinda, responded with letters and messengers, which were received, and the right hand of fellowship was extended to the messengers,

An invitation was extended for corresponding messengers and visitors. B. W. Teaters, B. F. Cannon responded as messengers from Ouachita Association, and Dan Nations and Russel Brown as visitors from the same. B. J. Mathews, representing the Land Mark Baptist, responded as visitor from Pine Bluff Association, and J. R. Cason as visitor from Dardauelle Association.

The moderator appointed a committee on divine service, composed of pastor and delegates of De Queen church.

A. E. DuLaney, D. W. Hill and J. M. Hankins were appointed a committee on finance.

The committee on divine service reported as follows: B. J. Mathews to preach Saturday night at Baptist church, and E. V. Mabry at Cumberland Presbyterian church. Sunday at 11 o'clock, B. J. Mathews to preach at Baptist church, and J. F. Love at Cumberland Presbyterian church, Sunday afternoon, J. T. Jones at Baptist church: Sunday evening, J. F. Love at Baptist church, and D. W. Hill at Cumberland Presbyterian church.

On motion, D. W. Hill was added to the delegation of Pleasant Hill church, C. H. Arnold to New Hope No. 1, Joe Barnes to New Hope No. 2, Joe Spence and Frank Martin to Oak Hill church.

The body then proceeded to the election of a Mission Board, Bro. M. C. Morris was elected Chairman, with J. H. Barkman, J. N. Lewis, Little River Co., and J. R. Holcomb, R. B. Friday, Sevier Co., to compose the board for the incoming year. Bro. W. C. Martin, of Ashdown, was elected treasurer of the board. On motion the Association adjourned until 8 o'clock Monday morning.

Saturday night Bro. B. J. Mathews preached to a large audience at the Baptist church. Subject: Does it pay to be a Christian?

Sunday 9 a. m. Bro. J. A. Westbrooks conducted a prayer service. Interesting talks were made by Brethern J. T. Cowling, J. F. Love, B. J. Mathews and Thos. DuLaney. At 10 a. m. a Sunday School mass meeting was held, which was led by J. T. Cowling, followed by W. H. Burt, G. S. Provence and M. C. Morris. At 11 a. m. B. J. Mathews preached at the Baptist church to a large concourse of attentive listeners. Bro. J. F. Love at that hour preached an interesting ser-

mon at the Cumberland Presbyterian church. Text Ephesians 2: 10.

Sunday 3:30 p. m. Bro. J. T. Jones, the blind preacher, delivered an able discourse at the Baptist church. After the sermon a collection, amounting to \$7.50, was taken for his benefit.

Sunday night Bro. Love preached at the Baptist church to a large audience. Text: 3 John 1: 8. Bro. D. W. Hill preached Sunday night at the Cumberland Presbyterian church. Text: Phillipians, 2: 1, 2.

The body reassembled at 8 o'clock. After singing "How firm a a foundation," the the moderator read from 10th chapter of Matthew, and prayer was offered by Bro. J. T. Jones. The moderator then announced the body ready for business.

### CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of "Southwestern Baptist Association."

2. This association shall be composed of churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by the several churches before taking their seats.

3. The delegates when convened shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by appointment of moderator and clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual sessison and to continue in office until their successors are chosen.

4. This association shall not interfere with the rights of churches of which it is composed, and shall only act as an advisory council, assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or is evidently implied by the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its own members and delegates from the churches, and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from, and disown, all churches which depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming hetrodox in faith, or disorderly in practice; it should therefore regard all churches under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principle business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with the Gospel; to union and fellowship with all churches of Christ, especially those united under this constitution.

5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union through representation of three delegates at the annual session of this association with a petition for admission, and upon their agreeing to the abstract of the principles herein published.

- 6. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the association, written statistics, giving names of delegates, number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, dismissed, expelled, restored or dead, since the last session, and all information that the churches deem important, which shall be read and minuted.
- 7. This association may have a fund supplied by a voluntary contribution of the churches, and all money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the committee on finance to the treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, and hold his office during the pleasure of the association and present annually for insertion in the minutes, a clear and succint statement of all receipts and expenditures.

8. The association shall furnish the churches with minutes of every session.

9. The association shall take no cognizance of any query sent up from the churches unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed; nor any difficulty between churches unless they have pursued the direction in the 18th Chapter of Matthew, and have failed to settle it; then this association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

10. The clerk of this association shall keep a file of the Minutes of this body

and deliver the same to his successor in office.

- 11. This constitution may be altered or amended, at regular meetings of the association, by the concurring voices of two-thirds of its members present; provided such alterations or amendments be approved by the churches composing this association.
- 12. At each annual meeting there shall be an introductory and a missionary sermon, and the body shall adjourned each day at 11 a. m. for preaching.

### Rules of Decorum

1. When the delegates of the several churches shall assemble at the place appointed for holding the association, the modarator shall open the business by prayer and praise, in person or by proxy. If the former moderator or clerk be absent, the body shall appoint a moderator pro tem.

2. Immediately after the opening of the session the church letters shall be read by persons whom the moderator may appoint, and the names of of the delegates enrolled by the clerk.

3. When the delegates names are enrolled and called by the clerk the association shall elect, by ballot, a moderator and clerk; the majority of votes govern-

ing the election.

4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before they are entertained by the moderator. When motions or amendments to motions are made, the last one shall be first in order; and so on, in reverse order to the crigin-

al motion; but the mover may at any time withdraw his motion.

5. Any person wishing to make a motion or speak of any matter before the association shall rise to his feet and respectfully address the moderator, and if he be in order, the moderator shall signify the same be calling his name; and no one thus in order shall be interrupted while thus speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or for personal infliction; nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same subject without leave from the association, or to explain some of his former remarks.

Whenever sufficient time has been given for the discussion of any sub-6. ject before the association, the moderator shall take the voice of the association, and declare the result, a majority governing in all cases except those provided for.

7. No member shall vacate his seat while the body is in session without

leave of the moderator.

8. When one member shall speak to, or of another, he shall call him "Brother,"

9. The moderator may have the names of the delegates called whenever it

may be necessary.

10. The moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members, by calling some one to fill his seat while speaking; but not until all others who desire to speak have spoken.

The moderator may invite visiting member in good standing to seat in

council who may speak, but not vote.

12. The minutes of the association may be read whenever it is deemed ne-

cessary. 13. The moderator shall be the judge of order. An objector to the moderator's ruling may appeal to the body, a majority of whom shall determine the point of order.

#### Articles of Faith

1. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are a trinity of persons in the God-head—Father, Son and Holy Ghost—and these three in one.

2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments is the word of

God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the fall of Adam, and that the depravity of his fallen nature was entailed upon his posterity, and in the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.

4. We believe in election through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of

the truth.

5. We believe in the final preservation of the Saints, and that they will nev-

er finally fall away and be lost.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the rightcousness of Christ imputed into them, and that it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believed.

7. We believe that good works are fruits of faith, and following after justifi-

cation, and are evidences of our own gracious state.

8. We believe there will be a general ressurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

9. We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of faithful

baptised persons, who are in christian fellowship and are agreed to keep up a Godly discipline agreeable to the rules of the Gospel.

10. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of the church, and the only law giver, and the disciple is with the body, and should be faithfully kept up

for the glory of God and the prosperity of his people.

11. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of the Gospel, and none but true believers have a right thereto, and should be administered by regular ordained ministers, and that immersion is the only apostolic mode of baptism. A Comment of the Comm
