

The team entered various tournaments including the College of the Ozarks Warm-Up Tournament, East Central Forensic meet at Ada, Oklahoma; Mid-South Tournament at Henderson State Teachers College; Savage Debate Tournament at Durant, Oklahoma, and the district Pi Kappa Delta meet at Harding College. Both members of the team won a "superior" rating at the East Central Forensic meet. This was the highest award given in the tournament.

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


