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MINUTES

—OF THE

Fifty-Ninth Session of The Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association.

The Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association convened in its Fifty-ninth annual session with New Liberty church, Bradley County, Arkansas, at 10 o'clock, Saturday morning October 2, 1909.

A. J. Fawcett, Moderator, being present called the body to order and opened the services by reading the 12th Chapter of Romans. Prayer was led by Elder W. T. Clements, and after singing a spiritual song-another prayer was led by Elder T. G. Morgan. Eld. J. P. Hemby read 2nd Chapter of Ephesians and lead in prayer; after which Elder A. F. Willis was called by the Moderator to preach the introductory sermon, taking for his subject the Final Perseverance of the Saints, from 4th chapter and 16th verse of 2nd Corinthians. After a logical and forceful sermon and the benediction several announcements were made and the hour of 12 having arrived a motion prevailed to adjourn until 1:30 o'clock p. m. 1:30 p. m. the Association was called to order by the Moderator, who after singing and prayer called on the messengers from the various churches comprising the Bartholomew Association to hand in the letters from their respective churches to this Association and appointed J. R. Anders and D. A. Bradham reading Clerks. The Moderator then proceeded to call the roll of churches and the reading Clerks alternated in reading the letters as they were handed in. Shady Grove church having presented two letters by two sets of messengers, each claiming to be the regular appointees of that church the Moderator appointed the following named brethren as a committee to investigate the matter and report its recommendation as to which letter should be received and read and which set of messengers recognized as the legally appointed messengers

from said church by this body, to-wit: J. P. Hemby, W. T. Clements, W. M. Nutt, G. M. Peters and H. Gardner, which committee after being out a reasonable time reported, recommending the seating of J. H. M. Anders and T. H. Rowland as the regularly accredited messengers from said church and the letter presented by them as the duly authorized letter from said church. on motion duly carried said report was adopted, on motion duly carried the association at this juncture proceeded to the election of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer of this association for the ensuing Associational year. C. D. Oslin, J. N. Williams and R. H. Nichols were appointed Tellers, who on casting up the ballots announced that J. R. Woods had received a majority of the votes cast for moderator and that Z. T. Wood had received a majority of the votes cast for clerk and treasurer whereupon the moderator declared J. R. Woods duly elected Moderator and Z. T. Wood duly elected Clerk and Treasurer of the Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association for this Associational year. The retiring moderator yielded the gavel to the newly elected moderator, J. R. Woods, who after making a short talk expressing his appreciation of the high honors conferred upon him, declared the Association duly and permanently organized.

It being the next business in order the moderator then called on all the churches who desire to unite with this Association to present their petitionary letters, whereupon the following churches presented letters, to-wit: Farmville, by its messengers W. B. Nixon, J. E. Kemp and C. C. Frazer; First Baptist Church Parkdale, by its messenger R. H. Nichols; Wilmot Church, by its messenger H.H. Harrington, Corinth Baptist Church of Morehouse Parish, La., by its messengers J. M. Roberson, Al Cammel and S. A. Jarvis; Onego Missionary Baptist Church, by its messenger R. W. Hudson and on giving satisfactory evidence of orthodoxy, were admitted to membership in this Association and the hand of fellowship and Christian greeting extending to their messengers by the Moderator. J. W. Wilson and D. A. Bradham, messengers from Warren

church were at their request granted leave of absence.

J. H. Rowland from Judson Association; A. P. Scofield representing the Baptist Advance; Fran'. M. Wells, (the lecturer); J. S. Rogers, State Missionary secy., F. P. Turner representing Baptist Orphans Home of Monticello and Bro. Waine from Friendship Association were introduced to the Association by the Moderator, given a cordial welcome and invited to sit with us in deliberations of the body.

On motion carried G. E. Holt, the missionary for this Association, was appointed to preach at this church at 7:30 tonight. The deacons of this church and W. T. Cone were appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report at once a program for religious worship and preaching services during the sitting of this association. N. C. Denson, C. D. Oslin and Thos. Ferguson were appointed by the Moderator a committee on order of business for this Association and were ordered to report at once.

Stell: Associational Missions-G. E. Holt, W. M. Wiley and E. C. Sivils; Temperance-H. A. Munn, J. W. Measels and G. M. Peters: Finance-W. T. Cone, S. W. Bethune and W. H. Nichols; Obituaries-T. G. Morgan, H. L. Gardner, and W. C. Johnson. Woman's Work-Sisters L. A. Calhoun, A. V. Johnson and O. C Mefford. The report of the Committee on Divine Services was made and read by W. T. will be led by Elder H. A. Munn. At 11 o'clock a.m. the Missionary sermon will be preached by Elder J. P. Hemby in the church and Elder N.C. Denson will preach in the Grove.

At 2:00 p. m. there will be an Orphans Home rally led by J. N. Williams. At 7:30 p. m. preaching by A. J. Fawcett.

Monday,8:30 a.m.; Devotional exercises at 9 to 9:30 a. m.; Home Missions report 9:30 to 10 a. m.; Foreign Missions, report, 10 to 10:30; State Missions report, 10:30; to 11 a. m, Associational Missions, report, 11 to 11:30; Report on Publication, 11:30 to 12 m.; Report on temperance 12 m.; Dinner 1 to 1:30 p. m.; Ministeral and General Education report, 1:30 to 2 p. m.; Womans Work, report, 2 to 2:30: On Nominations, report, 2:30 to 3 p. m.; State of Religon, 3 to 3:30; Obituaries, report, 3:30 to 4; Finance, report, 4 p. m.; adjournment and taking parting hand.

At 7:30 Elder G. E. Holt preached a forceful sermon from 4th chapter of Exodus, at the conclusion of which a motion to adjourn to 9 o'clock tomorrow morning prevailed. Benediction by J. H. Rowland.

SUNDAY MORNING 9 O'CLOCK.

Devotional exercises conducted by A. V. Johnson. The audience was large and a spirit of brotherly love and true devotion to God and His service was much in evidence. The time having arrived for the report on Sunday School work, the same was read by Elder H. A. Munn, as follows: The Baptists above all other people should press the study of the Bible. It should be their rule and practice in all things. Baptist have always laid great stress on the fundamental teachings of the Bible.

We recommend (1) That we as pastors, mission colporters and Christian workers, advocate to the limit of our influence the ideal condition—a Bible school in every church, and every member of the church and every other person available brought into this Bible School. (2) That we as pastors and preachers see to it that a Sunday School is organized in every church where we hold a meeting. (3) We recommend that a Sunday School Institute be organized in this Association, which shall be held in connection with our Fifth Sunday meetings. We note with pleasure the marked improvement in our Sunday School work and that the importance of a systematic study of the Bible by the youth of our association is becoming more and more realized by pastors and parents. Let this awakened interest continue to grow.

Intellectual and inspiring talks were made by brethren A. P. Scofield, L. M. Webb and W. E. Collins, after which the report was adopted.

The time having arrived for preaching, following a short song and prayer service the Moderator introduced J. P. Hemby who was appointed to preach the missionary sermon. The speaker used as his text Matthew 10:3 and 4; 28:19 and 19. An immense crowd listened attentively to an able sermon from the man of God. After the sermon an adjournment was taken for dinner.

The Association reassembled at 2 o'clock and the body was called to order by the Moderator. After devotional exercises the report on Orphanage work was called for, which was presented and read by J. N. Williams, as follows: Within the Baptist ranks of Arkansas we have two Orphans' Homes, one at Texarkana and one at Monticello. In the name of God and His goodness, we commend these homes to your care and keeping; and heartily recommend that a collection for them be taken to meet the current expenses, and to do such improvements as will meet the present demands. Also recommend that each church or individual designate to which home the pledges

made or money given shall go. In the Texarkana home there are about 26 children. In the Monticello home we have one hundred and thety children. In this home (Monticello) we find it greatly crowded for lack of room. We therefore recommend that a boys' dormitory, a two room cottage for a hospital, and a school house be built at once to meet the great demands that are now on us. school room that we had is now being used (of necessity) for a bed room and we are teaching school in a large tent (which was donated by the good people of Little Rock) but are doing a good school work in this home. We have eighty-five pupils in this school and two of the larger and more advanced girls in Central College (Baptist) at Conway, whose expenses are being paid by individuals. In this home since last Association we have had thirty-two conversions and twenty-one baptisms, so it will be seen that God is blessing this work, and our efforts to carry it on!

A motion was made and seconded that this report be adopted and after earnest talks by J. N. Williams. L. M. Webb, and others the report was unanimously adopted. A collection and pledges were then taken which resulted as follows: Cash collection for Texarkana Home \$21.30, Pledges \$85.50; Cash, Monticello Home \$11.25, Pledges \$487.50. Twelve Dollars and Fifty cents of the pledges made to the Texarkana Home was handed in at once and turned over to the Finance Committee as cash collection, thereby lowering the pledges to \$85.50 and raising the cash collection to \$21.30. (Explanatory note by clerk.)

The messengers from Farmville were by their request granted leave of absence.

Motion to adjourn to 8.30 Monday morning carried.

Prayer and benediction by Elder W. E. Collins.

Monday morning 8:30. Devotional exercises by Elder G. W. Bray who read 27th Psalm. The Moderator de-

clared the Association duly convened for the transaction of business. Messengers from Sardis church granted leave of absence. The minutes of this session up to date read and approved.

Motion carried that all of the reports on Mission work be read now and taken up and discussed in their order. Whereupon Elder A. J. Fawcett read the report on Home

Missions as follows:

HOME MISSIONS

This feature of our work is under the control of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

In all the years of its history this Board has proven to be a mighty factor in developing this Southland for the Master.

We may get a better conception of the magnitude of this department of our work by looking at the various parts of the field separately. —The destitution in all the Southern States, the suburban districts and slums of the great cities, as well as the destitution in the 'smaller towns and rural districts. By the timely aid extended by this Board, many mission stations have been developed into large and prosperous churches, which now contribute liberally in supplying other destitute fields with the word of life, and will continue to be a source of supply in the years to come. 2-The thousands of foreigners in the bounds of the Southern States. These are found in great multitudes in our Southland. Vast hordes of these people are coming from all quarters to our shores, year by year; it is more fearfully true, perhaps than we think, "If we do nor christianize them, they will heathenize us." Their beer gardens and Sabbath desecration are working destruction to our Christian civilization; all over our home field the lost condition of these people cry earnestly to us for the bread of life. Shall we withhold it from them and let them perish at our door? 3—The negroes, "our brethren in black," most naturally look to us for sympathy and help. Many of them are ignorant, superstitious, comparatively helpless and lost. They are among us, not by choice or through their own instrumentality and for ought we know, they are here to stay. presence among us confronts us with many problems of racial, social and religious character, which can be solved only upon the principles of applied christianity.

4-The red men, our neighbors in the West, appeal to us from the plains of their western homes into which their fathers were driven by the onward march of Christian civilization, call to us earnestly to point them to a better land than that from which they were driven and to a home more glorious, than that which they now occupy. We cannot afford to turn a deaf ear to the cry of these our western neighbors.

5—Cuba and the neighboring islands took upon us their deliverers from Spanish oppression and for political protection, these facts give

us an open door through which to lead these from the oppression of sin to the liberty of the children of God.

Thus we have noticed the fields to be occupied by the Missionaries of the home board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The State Association is also operating in these same fields, and their operatious include Mexico also. The reports from this body show that during the last year, that seven missionaries were employed in these fields and two hundred baptisms reported.

From the report of the Home Mission Board, we recall the following facts: \$5300.00 were expended in Arkansas from May 1st, 1908, to May 1st, 1909, and ninety-four Missionaries were employed, whose labors resulted in the baptism of three thousand four hundred and eleven persons.

We urge an increase in our contributions to this work, in the future. All of which we respectfully submit.

Report on Foreign Missions read by Elder A. F. Willis as follows:

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Missions originated in heaven. Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of our Heavenly Father, the greatest missionary this world has ever known, came from neaven to this world to do the will of the Father who sent Him. He came to seek and save that which was lost, and laid it upon His church to carry His gospel into all the world that repentance and remission of sins might be preached among all nations.

We rejoice that the Baptists of Arkansas are recognizing and assuming their duty to preach the gospel to all the world. In studying missions let us keep in mind that all the world is the field and that a soul saved in any portion of this world is equally as glorifiying to our Lord. We have 332 missionaries on the foreign field; 329 of these are supported by contributions through the Southern Baptist Convention and 3 by the contributions through the General Association.

The General Association needs \$2500 in orderthat they may pay their missionaries the amount now due them. The brethren who contribute to Foreign Missions through the Southern Baptist Convention must not and should not slacken their zeal nor lessen their contributions to Foreign Missions, but press forward and enlarge their contributions that they may carry forward the glorious work of Foreign Missions. The Lord has greatly blessed our missionaries and their labors on the field The Southern Baptist Convention has on the foreign field 329 missionaries. These faithful heralds of the Cross have baptized during the last conventional year 2905 persons. The General Association has on the foreign field three missionaries. We, your committee, have not been able to ascertain the number of baptisms reported by these missionaries during the previous associational year. Brethren, we

need liberal contributions from all our churches that this work may be pressed on unto a more glorious victory, and we recommend that the Baptists of Arkansas and especially of Bartholomew Association bear a liberal part in contributing to this work, and that we take collections at our earliest opportunity for this work.

State Mission Report read by Elder N. C. Denson as follows: State Mission work is fundamental. This work done by the churches in a way is beneath and undergirds all of our general work. The backbone of our denomination, in some sense, is State Missions. If our denomination would become weak, and lame, let us slow up on State Missions.

In the great work, churches and Sunday Schools are organized, laggard churches in country, town and city are aroused and stimulated to a consciousness of their mission and might under God. Through our state mission organization hundreds of churches in Arkansas are being saved from the grave and nurtured to the point of self-support. State Missions is the source of supplies for Home Missions, and the home end of Foreign Missions. It is the bond of union between our Associations, a feeder of our schools and a practical outlet of their trained energy, and the medium, largely through which our churches savingly touch the whole, round, sinning, lost world."

So let State Missions have great and constant emphasis by all of our churches. There are two organizations in the state through which our churches do State Mission work. They are the State Association and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The work done by the brethren of the State Association last year is as follows:

For all this let us praise God and Him alone. This year the Lord has blessed Arkansas Baptists in their State Mission work as never before. Thousands have been won to Christ and baptized into our churches during the year. In issue of the Baptist Advance 800 additions to Baptist churches were reported and the next week more than Let us take courage and set our hearts on winning Arkansas for Christ and the Baptists. Ours are the only New Testament churches and we alone have a pure straight gospel, and hence as Baptists our responsibilities are overwhelming, God help us! Our needs for the November meetings are great indeed. The State Association brethren say they need \$4000 to go to Forrest City without debt. The State Convention brethren need all of \$24 000 to go to Arkadelphia Nov. 19, without debt. So we have a heroic task before us and we are called upon to show our loyalty to the Baptist faith by heroic sacrifices. We recommend therefore, that all of our pastors without exception, first, preach more than once a good stirring, informing sermon on State Missions. Secondly, that much time be given to prayer for the success of the present efforts in this great work. Thirdly, that every pastor try to reach every member of his church or churches and every organization in the same for worthy offerings to work. Fourthly, that the pastors and leaders in the churches see that all money intended for the State Association be sent to G. R. Roebuck, Haynes, Ark., and that all money intended for the Convention work be sent to J.

Report of Committee on Associational Missions was read by Eld. G. E. Holt as follows: We thank God for the great blessings He has bestowed on the labors of our missionary the five months he has been on the field. For work done and results, see report of executive committee. It would be impossible to put on paper all the results of work done in building up some weak and dying churches. and some which were dead and enlisting their interest and cooperation in our Lord's work. But while we rejoice over the work done, yet we have hardly touched the field and its needs, or met the demand made on the missionary. Many weak churches and places destitute of the gospel have asked for help which could not be given, though the missionary has preached twice almost every day for fifteen weeks past.

In order that we may meet the needs and demands in this Association, we recommend that one or more missionaries be employed, for as much time as the funds may justify. We also recommend that each church select one of their number to meet with the Associational Board, in order that they may keep posted about the work and its needs. We recommend also that each church take regular collections for this work as often as practical. We further recommend that, if the funds will at all permit, a singer be employed during the revival meeting season to assist the missionary.

Motion was here made that each of the foregoing reports be now adopted. Able speeches were made byl.s, Denson, Fawcett, Rogers, Webb, Holt and others. After which each report was duly adopted. Motion carried that our Associational Mission Board be and is hereby instructed by this Association, to employ G.

E. Holt, the present missionary, as missionary for this Association for and during its next Associational year. The Clerk is instructed to write the churches not represented by messengers to this body, for money to pay for minutes to be furnished said churches. After earnest talks by Elders T. G. Morgan and A. V. Johnson the Association authorized the Associational Missionary Board to employ a singer to assist the missionary during the protracted meeting season. Report of Executive Board read by Chairman J. R. Woods, as follows: After several attempts we got a quorum together in Hamburg on March 26, 1909, and after much prayer and deliberation from all of the brethren, we organized by electing Bro. S. R. Smith chairman and J. R. Woods Clerk and Treasurer: then the question of doing mission work in our Association came up, and after having very favorable recommendations of Elder G. E. Holt, of Bandana, Ky., we elected him to the work of our association for full time, at a salary of Eighty three and one third dollars per month. beginning May the first 1909. On May the first Bro. Holt took charge of the work, and has faithfully discharge his duties: we have found Bro. Holt a man of God and full of the Holy Spirit and it is with grateful hearts that we make the following report of work done by him in our association:

The report of the Committee on Publications was read by Eld. W. C. Harley, as follows: As this is a great reading age and we are influenced by what we read and study; and our characters moulded largely by the literature we read. Therefore we recommend (1) that our people read, study, digest and distribute the Bible first and above all other books, (2) that we scatter the Bible and wholesome Baptist literature broad cast all over the territory comprising the Bartholomew Association, that the evil influences may be counteracted that are made by the reading of dangerous books, magazines and other literature that is flooding our country, the reading of which is poisoning the minds of our young people; and which is a disgrace to a Christian nation and a curse to her civilization, (3) that our Baptist brotherhood strive earnestly to obtain true and

definite information as to the needs of our Mission fields, and such information is given in our Foreign Mission Journal published at Richmond, Va. and our Home Field published at Atlanta, Ga., at the nominal cost of 25 cents each, per year, or if this cannot be done, then from other Baptist sources that are striving to obey what is taught in -Matt. 28. 19-20, (4) that our people take, read and support one or more of our Baptist weekly newspapers that are in sympathy with our Home and Foreign Mission work

The report of the Committee on Temperance was read by Elder H. A. Munn, as follows: The growth of the temperance and prohibition sentiment the past few years in Arkansas has been phenomenal. Every Baptist in the state shouldbe an agency in the suppression of the whiskey traffic. Believing the liquor traffic to be one of the most prolific sources of misery, crime and corruption, and standing directly in the way of the cause of Christ, we believe the time has come for more aggressive work in churches against this traffic and its attendant evils. therefore, recommend that this Association appoint a standing committee of its strongest men, on temperance, whose duty it shall be to induce every church to organize membership against intemperance, especially against the use of and traffic in liquor, that everything possible may be done to break down this great evil which is destroying the young manhood of the country, and sapping the very foundation of our government. Saloonists and whiskey men are organized and in order to successfully combat their ruinous influence, the Christian people must organize.

Let our motto be, therefore, For Temperance, Humanity, Home and Christ. If we will organize, work and trust in God, He will give us the victory.

Com. G. M. Peters H. A. Munn J. W. Measles

After spirited and convincing talks on this subject by brethren Munn, Denson and Turner the report was unanimously adopted. On motion adjourned till 1:30 p. m. Benediction by Elder W. C. Harley. 1:30 p. m. the Moderator called the body to order—prayer by C. D. Oslin.

The report of the committee on Ministerial and General Education was read by Elder G. W. Bray as follows: We believe in an educated Ministry, Solomon said-"The preacher sought acceptable words." Again he said-"Iron sharpeneth iron and light begets light." We find that Jesus was thirty years preparing himself for three years and ten months work. He called the twelve disciples and taught them three years and more. Paul was educated at the feet of Gamaliel and it was thus that God was preparing him for his great work. Apollos had to be taught the way of the Lord more perfectly. Paul wrote to his son (in the gospel), Timothy to study to show himself a workman approved of God rightly dividing the word of truth. and giving to each one his portion in due season. So since every other position requires men that are trained for their work and all classes are now being better educated and since the preacher is to expound God's precious word it is altogether needful that he prepare himself for this. the greatest of all the callings known to men. If he is prepared for his work he can be mightily used of God, but if he is not, he may be ever so earnest, but his zeal will not make up for His lack of preparation, and the cause of Christ will suffer An educated, consecrated minister is a power for God and the salvation of men

We therefore recommend that the churches see to it that our young men who are called to preach the gospel, attend our Baptist schools and make the best possible preparation for His great work. We recommend our denominational Schools, Oauchita and Buckner Colleges: at Arkadelphia and Witcherville, and that our churches take at least one collection per year for ministerial education.

U. organized where our sisters could come together and work and pray and feel that they each have some little part in trying to advance the Lord's cause and for the salvation of the lost. encouragement and prayers.

Finally we request of you, our brethren of Bartholomew Association, your encouragement and prayers and that we be allowed space in the minutes of the Association for the publication of the proceedings of our Woman' Associational Union Auxiliary to Bartholomew Association.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches who, on presenting their credentials, shall be entitled to seats.

Article 2. This Association shall be called Bartholomew Regular

Baptist Association.

Art. 3. Each church composing this Association shall be entitled to

three delegates.

Art. 4. The object of this Association shall be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's kingdom, particularly in the bounds of this Association.

Art. 5. This Association shall never possess any power or authority

over any church, but may act as an advisory council.

Art. 6. New churches may be admitted into this union by signifying their wish by letter and delegates, provided they are deemed orthodox.

Art. 7. The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, and any member of the Association shall be eligible to the offices aforesaid, so long as the Association shall call him—as amended.

Art. 8. Every church shall be furnished with minutes, and every

other benefit of the fund, in proportion to the money advanced.

Art. 9. Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any session of this Association, when two-thirds of the members present shall deem it necessary.

Art. 10. Any church coming heterodox in faith or practice, after her reception, the Association shall withdraw from said church; the the word of God being the standard of orthodoxy—as amended.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, Son and Ho-

ly Spirit.

II. We believe that the Scriptures composing the Old and New Testaments is the Word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and order.

III. We believe in the doctrines of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience

and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

IV. We believe that man was created upright, but by transgression fell from that state; consequently he and his posterity became dead in trespasses and sin.

V. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability

to recover from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

VI. We believe that sinners are justified by the righteousness of Christ through faith in His name.

VII. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace. VIII. We believe in the final resurrection of the dead and the general judgment and that the felicity of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

IX. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel but one who is regularly baptized, called and

comes under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.

X. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the church of Christ, and that believers are the only subjects, and that immersion only is baptism.

XI. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of

rest and devotion.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by a majority of the members present.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is kept ac-

cording to the Rules of Decorum.

4. Any member being dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association, provided it be done on the same day.

5. One member only shall speak at a time, who shall address the Moderator, and upon obtaining the floor, shall proceed, and not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or makes use of personal reflections.

6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on any

one subject without obtaining leave of the Association.

7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt a

member while speaking.

8. Every motion made and seconded; after time given for debate, shall be put to the Association; unless previously withdrawn, and the Moderator shall announce the decision to the Association.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the members

present.

10. No appellation but that of brother shall be used by members in addressing each other while in session.

11. The Moderator shall have same privilege of speech as other members, provided the chair is filled, but shall not be allowed to vote

unless the Association be equally divided.

12. The names of all members shall be called as often as the Association may deem necessary, and no member shall withdraw himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each session and of-

tener if necessary.
