Therefore we especially recommend that the sisters do what they can in helping their pastors, in visiting and looking after the sick, and securing help for the Orphans Home at Texarkana, Ark.

Intemperance is no less a moral means, a palitial issue, and as drunkeness expels reason, distempers the body, diminishes the heart, dimenishes the strength and inflames the blood. Also causes internal and external and incurable wounds to the soul, body and mind. Besides this what he foods is converted into deadly poisons. Lands flowing with milk and honey are neglected, unpoverished and made barren. Rulers reduced to tyrants, homes converted into hovels, wives to widows, children to orphans, and hap-

piness to disappointment, regret and woe and law and order defied. Therefore to prevent the above evils, to inforce law to secure peace and order. We recommend that our churches do not talerate habitual dram drinking among their members, report to and assist our law officers in the inforcement of all liquor laws and also that they, with other denominations, and all who are friends to temperance do their utmost effort to secure such temperance laws as will suppress the manufacture and sales of all intoxicating liquors.

The home has been well managed and is an honor and a credit to us. There is now 27 children being carred for. We recommend to the churches that a systematic means of giving be
