While we appreciate the successful labors of our uneducated ministers, whose praise is in all the churches, we feel the want of an educated ministry, that will be able to speak forth words of truth in soberness, and more successfully defend our doctrine. We therefore recommend that all possible steps be taken to accomplish that end.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools, recognizing the importance of teaching our children the Word of God, and further recognizing the importance of systematic effort in this noble work, and being satisfied that Union Sabbath Schools can never accomplish the mission of the Baptists, but, on the contrary, are productive of evil, and evil only, in so far as relates to the furtherance of Baptist principles, which, in the judgment of your committee, are equivalent to Bible principles, would earnestly recommend that each Church composing this body organize a Sabbath School and furnish it with such Baptist literature as will best promote these desired ends. As such literature, we reccommend, after the Bible, "Kind Words," published at Macon, Ga. Your committee would also recommend the organization of a Sabbath School Convention, within our bounds, for the purpose of cultivating the spirit and necessity of Sabbath Schools, and thus secure to our people enlarged views of their responsibilities in this field of labor, and urge immediate action on this question. We further recommend that reports of the different Sabbath schools be sent annually to this body, and that reports in brief form be published in the minutes of this body, and we reccommend Friday, before the 3rd Sabbath in November, as the time, and Oak Grove as the place, and one messenger be sent up from each church. CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Concord Association of Western kansas.

It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist churches known to be in med standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three Messen-Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional Messenger. ART. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by allot at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen. Art. 4. Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body acading to parliamentary usage. Sec. 2.—The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the Minutes, keep a regular file the printed Minutes of the sessions of the body, and deliver the same to his successor office. Sec. 3.—The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to an order from the Association or its Executive Committee, and render account of the same to the annual session of this body.

ART. 5. The objects of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the curches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation; and especially cultivate the piety of the churches, and, to aid in this last object, several days of each

ssion shall be spent in devotional exercises.

ART. 6. Sec. 1.—This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever it shall be necessary. Sec. 2. however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown churches that depart from the principles of this commet by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ART. 7. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations. may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and Messengers, at our annual meetings, and by their Messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published

ART. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Association upon application at an annual meeting, for the purpose of joining any body we recognize, or for the purpose of forming a new association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dis-

missed shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. 9. There shall be an Executive Committee, consisting of five members from the several churches, and the officers of the association shall be ex-officio officers of this committee. This committee shall have direction of the missionary operations of the Association of the committee of the Association of the committee of the tion, subject to its control, and make an annual report of its proceedings at each session of the Association. Besides the special objects entrusted to the committee, it shall also have authority to represent the association in all matters requiring attention while the association is not in eession. This committee shall hold regular meetings on the Saturday preceding each fifth Lord's day of the year, at such places as may be designated by the committee. The committee shall meet for organization immediately after the adjournment of the association. Three members shall constitute a quorum.

ART 10. It shall be the privilege of this Association, in addition to it? ART. 11. The annual meetings of the Association shall embrace the shall begin at 11 o'clock before the fourth Lord's day of September, at wine, troductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association shall ad-

journ at 11 o'clock a. m., for preaching.

ART. 12. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Article 6, Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Association, by the two-thirds vote of the members in tatendance.

RULES OF DECORUM.

This Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. An Introductory and Missionary Sermon shall be preached by ministers chosen the preceding Association—in case of absence or failure, the sermon of either to be preached by an alternate, to be chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

Visiting brethren in good standing may be invited to seats, but not to vote:

A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Asset ciation on the same day, but at no other time.

But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address the moderator, and

on obtaining leave, shall proceed.

No member shall be inferred. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject

or use words of personal reflection, and then by the Moderator.

7. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association ation, unless withdrawn by him who made it. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided or withdrawn before another is introduced.

8. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association by yeas and nays, or otherwise.

9. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

- 10. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission the Association.
- 11. The appellation of Brother shall be used in the Association by members in the addresses one to another, and all titles unknown to the Scriptures, such as "Rev.," D." "Parson," and the like, shall not be employed or appear upon the Minutes.
- 12. The names of members shall be called as often as the Association may direct. 13. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote any question unless the Association be equally divided.

14. Any member violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator, at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.

15. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this body, by majority vote of the members present.
