# PROCEEDINGS.

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ELLIOTT, ARK., OCT., 5, 1901.

The 56th Annual Session of the Liberty Baptist Association convened with the Elliott church at the time above stated. By request of the Alternate, Rev. O. J. Wade preached the Introductory sermon from 1 Cor. 9:12:—"But suffer all things lest we hinder the Gospel of Christ." The sermon was timely in its application, pointed in thought, impressive in its delivery, and was well received by the large congregation present.

By motion the body adjourned for dinner. Dr. R. A. Venable pronounced the benediction.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the body reassembled. The moderator read Matt. 5:14—16. Prayer by Dr. Venable.

Bro. Crawford preached a good, forceful sermon at 8 p. m. on the commission as given by Luke, which was an inspiration to those present.

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## SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6, 1901.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment at 10 a. m.

A. C. Jones read the report on Sunday Schools as follows:

In making our report the question comes "what shall we say?" For years we have had able reports and urgent appeals to the churches with but meager results. We have had "line upon line and precept upon precept" on this great question, but alas! how few churches have heeded our appeals. Despite these urgent appeals there seems to have been a falling off instead of an advance in this work. Out of 32 churches represented 12 reported Sunday Schools. Surely our churches do not realize the importance of this great work. Brethren, will you stop and consider that in failing to have Sunday Schools you fail that far in sowing the seeds of eternal life in the minds and hearts of those whom God has given into your charge? If you do not care for the salvation of your own children, who else will assume the responsibility? We beg you, we entreat you, to go to your churches and begin the work, and continue in your efforts until you succeed in bringing the parents and children together for a systematic and continuous study of God's word in the Sunday Schools. Respectfully submitted by the committee.

The report was discussed enthusiastically by several brethren, and many of whom had no schools, promised to go home and organize schools in their churches. Adopted.

At 11 a. m. Dr. R. A. Venable preached a magnificent sermon on The Commission—Matt. 28: 18-20, in which he took the authority of Jesus as the basis of his command, "Go!" etc. At the close of the service the congregation contributed \$40.15 for State Missions.

At 3 p. m. Dr. J. M. Hart preached a grand sermon from John 5: 39—"Search the Scriptures," etc.

### MONDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1901.

The Association met at 8:30 a. m.; Minutes of the preceding sessions read, corrected and approved.

By motion the funds on hand in the treasury (\$75.86) were appropriated to assist Bro. M. F. Gathright, as Ministerial Student, in Ouachita College. (Bro. H. A. Mayfield authorized the clerk to pledge Spring Hill Church for \$5.00 for Ministerial Education.)

Prof. J. W. Conger was enrolled as a visitor from Ouachita College.

J. D. Crawford read the report on Orphan's Home: At our last meeting there were THIRTY-FIVE Orphans in the Home. We now have FORTY-SEVEN. They are bright, happy children and proud of their Home.

The building is still unfinished, which is one of our needs just now, as more bed-room is wanted to accommodate the children.

Our chapel and school-room needs furniture. Thirty-five of the children are gathered each morning in the chapel and begin their work by divine worship. Their spiritual needs are by no means neglected while the mind is being trained. This noble institution is OURS. Let all the churches be liberal in their contributions to carry on the work. Respectfully submitted. Discussed by J. D. Crawford and J. R. Bishop. Unanimously adopted.

The report on Home and Foreign Missions was read by O.

J. Wade: The past century has been one of great missionary activity, and yet we have done but little more than mere pioneer work. We trust that this shall be a century of reaping, as last has been one of plowing and sowing. Enlargement should be our motto. "Let us attempt great things for God and expect great things from God." There is no limit to His power; there should be none to our consecrated effort.

"The field is the world," and our churches are seeking to evangelize both the Home and the Foreign fields. The work of the Home Board is confined to the Southern States and the Island of Cuba. Its work is of great importance and should be liberally supported. To strengthen our cause at home is to strengthen it abroad. We suggest that:

1. You remember your missionaries in your prayers.
2. That our pastors do more missionary preaching.
3. That our churches seek to inform themselves on all lines of mission work.
4. That the Association hold at least one distinctively missionary meeting before the next sitting of this body, and that the Moderator appoint a committee of five to make all necessary arrangements.

5. That our people double their gifts to our mission work.

After an earnest discussion by several brethren, the report was adopted.

The committee referred to above are: O. J. Wade, R. A. Faulkner, A. C. Jones, B. F. Rogers, W. F. Dorris.

The report on Education was read by B. F. Rogers, in the absence of Prof. Riley: Education is the harmonious development of all the powers of the body, the mind and the soul. The most important part of education for success in this life, and happiness in the life to come is the development of the moral and religious nature. But the law confines the efforts of the State, both in public schools and in the University, to the training of the body and the mind. Hence the education of the soul must be undertaken by the christian denominations. Realizing this responsibility, the Baptists of Arkansas have established and are maintaining Ouachita College, Arkadelphia, for males and females, and Central College, Conway, for females only. Ouachita College, under the presidency of Prof. J. W. Corger, has become the pride of, not only the Baptists of Arkansas, but of the Baptists of our Southland.



Central College, under the management of Prof. W. W. Rivers, is one of the strongest and best equipped colleges for girls in the South. During the past summer the rooms have been refurnished and a system of steam heat put in the building. We urge each Baptist to use his influence for these noble institutions of learning. Speak, work and pray for their success and send your boys and girls to be trained under the christian influences of our colleges.

After a good discussion by O. J. Wade and J. W. Conger, the report was adopted.

The committee on Nominations made the following report, which was adopted: The next session of this Association to be held with the New London Church, Saturday before the First Sunday in October, at 11 a. m., 1902.

Introductory sermon—J. D. Crawford; B. F. Milam, alternate; O. J. Wade, Messenger to the Southern Baptist Convention in May, 1902, and W. Theo. Smith, alternate.

Faulkner, W. F. Dorris, H. T. Hawkins, R. M. Dunn, B. F. Milam, J. P. Neely, A. B. Sessoms. Member of the State Board—W. Theo. Smith.

Report on Temperance was ready by C. P. McGraw: To be temperate in all things is certainly enjoined by the word of God—"Be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess but be filled with the spirit." It is the honest conviction of your committee that the churches should discipline members who are given to the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage. We are commanded to "withdraw from every brother who walketh disorderly." Drunkenness is disorderly, therefore we should withdraw from them. We lament the fact that a few of our members vote to license the open saloon to deal out the ruinous drinks to our young men. Such men should be dealt with by the churches as offenders.

We earnestly recommend that every lover of our blessed Savior put forth every effort to drive this ruinous curse from our midst. ☐ Unanimously adopted.

Report on State and Associational Missions was read by W. F. Dorris: There has been no Associational Mission work done within our bounds during the last year, that work being done in part by our pastors. We recommend that our pastors, so



far as possible, supply the destitution within our bounds by holding meetings at those places when it is convenient.

Our State Mission work has made good progress despite the fact that some have hindered us by unjust and unkind criticisms, both of the plan and our secretary.

Good reports come from all parts of the field. The present indications are that the baptisms by our missionaries and missionary pastors will exceed 1000.

The Board has kept two evangelists in the field during the year, and their work has been greatly blessed of the Lord. It has assisted the churches to sustain pastors, and also associations in their work in many parts of the State.

Churches have been established at Newport and Pocahontas, hitherto unoccupied by Baptists. Mena and Booneville have become self-sustaining and will become great factors in our State work. Surely God has set His seal of approval upon the work of our State Board. We therefore recommend:

1. That all our churches send liberal contributions regularly to our State work.

2. That we pledge our hearty co-operation with the State Board so long as it continues to operate the present plan of enlargement of State Mission work.

After a spirited discussion the report was unanimously adopted.

Report on Publications was read by O. J. Wade: Reading is a means of culture and information. It is power as well as knowledge. It is specially important that we be thoroughly versed in all things that tend to increase our efficiency in the Master's work. Every Baptist should be posted in all things pertaining to our denomination. We urge first the careful read-

ing and study of the Word of God, which is "able to make us wise unto salvation," and thoroughly "to furnish us for every good work." We also recommend the Sunday School literature published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We also urge our brethren to subscribe for the Foreign Mission Journal and the Home Field. Adopted.

The report on Obituaries was read by W. Theo. Smith: It is with sorrowful hearts that we report the death of Brethren E. D. Rogers, of Camden Church, and W. A. Betts, of Union Church. Bro. Rogers was 84 years of age and had been a deacon fifty years, and an active member of the church 53 years. In his last illness his faith in his Savior was strong and his hope of a blissful immortality was bright.

Bro. Betts was 80 years of age, and had been a deacon of Union Church thirty-five years. Truly, he has served his God and brethren faithfully, and has gone now to reap his reward.

Both of these aged servants of Christ have left a noble record behind them, and we hope all our brethren will endeavor to follow in their footsteps as they followed Christ. Adopted.

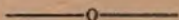
By motion a cut of Ouachita College is to be printed on the back of the Minutes.
