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Proceedings

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The Twenty-ninth Annual Session of the Fourche Valley Baptist Association convened with the Casa Baptist church, October 7, 1916, at 10:00 a.m. Devotional exercises were conducted by Eld. W. T. King.

Report of Committee on Home Missions.

The Committee on Home Missions submitted the following report:

The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., is the

agency through which Southern Baptists as a body have the task of preaching the Gospel to the lost and building up the kingdom in the South.

The population served by the Home Board embraces about 36,000.000 people, about 18,000,000 of whom make no profession of religion whatever.

Our Board, last year, maintained about 1,409 missionaries. These report 43,792 baptisms and brought into the churches 71,386 persons. They organized 167 churches and 321 Sunday schools.

This year the Convention has apportioned \$438,750.00 to be raised by the churches in 17 States, which will average about \$18.00 to the church.

We recommend that our churches be encouraged to order and use, free, tracts furnished by the Board. Also, that earnest prayer be made in all churches for this work, and that at least one sermon on Home Missions be preached during the year in each church.

Foreign Missions is our effort to carry the Gospel into all the world. The harvest for Foreign Missions is ripe, the doors are wide open and our missionaries are meeting with great and glorious success.

That on the foreign field 6,471 converts were baptized and 77 churches were organized. We have today 315 Missionaries on the Foreign Field, and they are crying and praying for our help. A great number of our young men and women have

surrendered to the call to the Foreign Field and the Foreign Mission Board has had to say to these brethren, "Funds all

gone, can't send you,"

Brethren: Your committee would recommend that, when our regular time comes to pay to Foreign Missions, that every church make an effort to get every member to pay to this great and needy cause.

Report on Christian Education.

After splendid discussions, the following report on Christian Education was adopted:

Your committee on Christian Education submits the fol-

lewing:

The Bible is definitely in favor of Christian Education Matt. 28:20; Eph. 4:18; Hosea 4;6. Indeed, every word in God's Book that speaks against ignorance is for Christian

Education. Jesus was a great teacher as well as a great preacher. Christ and his apostles everywhere emphasized the importance of knowledge touching religious work. We as Baptists and followers of Christ and his apostles must believe in and practice Christian Education as thoroughly as we do Missions.

The education of preachers is especially important for Baptists. We will be woefully undone in time if we neglect this fundamental matter. We urge with all possible emphasis that every young preacher in this Association do his best to get a good education. Preachers are given free tuition in all our Baptist schools in the State. At Ouachita College other financial help is given when needed. Arkansas Baptists have two great Baptist Colleges—Ouachita College for boys and girls at Arkadelphia, C. E. Dicken, D. D., President; and Central College, at Conway, for girls, J. W. Conger, LL. D., President. The attendance at Ouachita last year was about 300, and at Central about 200. We also have Mountain Home College, (Mt. School Academy) at Mountain Home, Rev. H. F. Vermillion, President; Maynard Academy, at Maynard, Rev. W. A. Cummings, President. Both of these schools are mountain schools of the Home Mission Board of Atlanta, Ga., for boys and girls, and are doing well.

It is hoped that our Baptist people will patronize our Baptist schools. They are as good as the best. The atmosphere in all these schools is religious and Baptist. The study of the Bible is given a large place in each of them.

Your committee earnestly recommends that all our preachers preach often each year on the needs and benefits of our Baptist schools, and that they urge our folks to send their children to them. We further emphasize the great importance of every church in this Association making a worthy offering to our schools each year. The churches co-operating through the Baptist State Convention are giving about \$20,-C00.00 this year to Christian Education.

Report on State Missions.

The following report on State Missions, after very able ciscussions, was adopted:

Your committee on State Missions submit the following

report:

All New Testament churches find their origin and end in Missions: the ultimate origin of missions to be found in the heart of God: the historical origin of missions is found in the life and death of Christ, and the practical origin and application of missions is entrusted to Baptists or New Testament churches. Missions believed in and practiced is just as much a mark of true Baptists as the restricted Supper of our Lord, or the preservation of the saints.

State Missions, is in many respects, the very heart of all our denominational work. State Missions is the constant friend of Associational Missions the conservator of Home Missons, and the Base of Supplies for Foreign Missions. No church in this Association can afford not to make an offering to State Missions this year. State Missions includes revival meetings, baptizing, reviving and enlisting laggard churches, colportage, helping to build church houses, aiding weak churches in supporting pastors, raising church debts, Sunday School and Baptist Young People's work, and Woman's work.

In 1915 the churches co-operating through the Baptist State Convention did the following State Mission Work:

Missionaries and other workers, 60; Conversions, 2,301; Baptisms, 2,053; Additions, 3,085; amount raised in Arkansas for State Mssions, \$18,762; Bible Schools held, 11; Bible Institutes held, 132.

This year our number of employees in State Mission work is 56; the number of conversions up to September 1st

was 2,511; the number of baptisms, 1,802 and number of additions, 2,518.

To put our State Mission work out of debt, the Baptists of the State need to raise, between this and December 6th. \$27,997.12.

Your committee would recommend three things:

- 1. That our people all up and down the Association pray devoutly for our State Mission cause.
- 2. That every pastor by sermons, gift and visits, do his utmost in every church for the State Mission debt.
- 3. That our pastors and active laymen and women organize themselves into committees of two or more and go out to try to get every church in the Association to make an offering to State Missions, and that an organization be completed at this Association

James expresses our duty to the fatherless. He says: "Pure religion before God is to visit the fatherless in their effiction."

Deut 14:28, 29, "Provide so that these should come and cat."

At our last Convention we passed a resolution requiring the Board to place the children in good homes, and in compliance with this resolution between 75 and 80 children have been placed in good homes.

We have received 14 into the Home since January 1, 1916, there now being between 125 and 130 in the Home.

Our \$17,000 debt is a heavy burden and our brethren of Monticello, who have been under this load so long, are begging for relief. This debt is ours as much as theirs, and we can pay this debt any day, could we only realize this as our debt. We have now in cash and good pledges about \$4,000 of this amount. Our task from now to the Convention is to provide for the other \$13,000 and at the same time provide for the current expenses of these orphans who must eat three times a day as our children.

Your committee therefore recommends

1. That every pastor in this Association presents this matter as God commands. 2. That every Sunday school be requested to continue their regular monthly offerings, for current expenses, and that we now take a collection in cash and pledges to relieve the heavy demands, and that all pledges be paid at an early date and not later than November 20, 1916.

Report on "Woman's Work" was read and after splendid talks was adopted as follows:

We, your committee on Woman's Work submit the following:

Your committee on Woman's Work find that there are about 250 Women's Missionary Unions, 50 Young Men's Auxiliaries, and 125 Sunbeam Bands. They enlist all ages and classes of bovs, girls, and women, in our churches. All of these organizations have monthly missionary meetings with carefully prepared programs. They are taught systematic Bible study and proportionate Giving. Our women are doing a great work and are really the missionary training forces of our churches. The work has grown to such proportions that it has become necessary to have their annual meetings separate from the State Convention, and they now meet in May instead of November.

We believe the motto, "Saved to Serve," rightly applies to women of Arkansas.

We, the committee, recommend that this Association elect a Superintendent for the purpose of enlisting the women in the Association and that churches in this Association co-operate with the Superintendent giving her spare time to this work, and that this Association pay for her stationery and postage.
