Whereas, The Roman Hierarchy in America is seeking to overthrow our Government and its free institutions and establish a union of Church and State; and that

Whereas, They have already captured our President and are manipulating the affairs of legislation, trying to muzzle the press and free speech; in proof of which we refer to the arrest of Hon. Thos. E. Watson of Thomson, Ga., and to the obligations in Jesuitical oaths, and to statements made by their priests, cardinals, etc., also their secret military organizations, as the Knights of Columbus; therefore

Be it Resolved, That this body speak out in no uncertain terms in condemning their encroachments upon our liberties, guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States. Also be it

Resolved, That Liberty Leagues be organized in all parts of our Association, and that copies of these resolutions be spread on our minutes, and copies furnished the Baptist, the Liberator, the Jeffersonian and the Menace for publication.
