NEAR DONALDSON, HOT SPRING COUNTY, ARKANSAS, OCTOBER 5TH, 6TH, AND 7TH, 1907

SATURDAY, FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Elder Ben M. Bogard now spoke a few words as representative of Buckner College,

Elder J. H. Milburn made a few statements in regard to his work as one of the Evangelists of the State General Association.

The Moderator appointed Bros. P. Stanley, R. H Sebrin and the Deacons of Pleasant Hill church as a committee on Divine Services,

Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

SATURDAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reassembled at the appointed time. Prayer led by Elder J. H. Howard.

On motion, Elder R. G. Bowers was requested to preach the in-

troductory sermon at 3:00 p. m.

Little Rock First Church requested through her messenger and letter that she be given a letter of dismission in order that she might join Caroline Association, and on motion the letter was granted.

The Committee on Divine Services reported that Elder J. H. Milburn would preach Sunday at 9:30 a. m., and that Elder Ben M.

Bogard would preach at 11:00 a. m.

A motion now carried that Elder W. W. Gardner be given twenty minutes to present the claims of the Monticello Orphans' Home.

The following resolution offered by Elder B. M. Bogard was

adopted:

Resolved, That we are in sympathy with the support of the orphan children and we recommend that liberal contributions be made by our people toward their support in whatever channel they deem best.

Elder W. W. Gardner now spoke and a collection was taken for the orphan children, resulting as follows: For the Orphans' Home at Monticello, \$6 or; for the Orphans' Home at Texarkana, \$9.46

Elder R. G. Bowers now preached the introductory sermon, using as a text first sentence of the seventh verse of the fourth chapter of James Theme: Be Obedient to God's Will.

Adjourned to meet Sunday at 9:30 a. m.

SUNDAY-FORENOON SERVICES.

Assembled at 9:00 a. m., and after a few minutes spent in devotional exercises the moderator announced the usual committees.

A motion prevailed that the afternoon services be held in the in-

terest of Associational Missions.

It now being the hour appointed for preaching, Elder J. H. Milburn read the eighth chapter of first Samuel and preached an interesting sermon, using as a text: "Thus sayeth the Lord, stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good ways, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. But they said, we will not walk therein. Jeremiah 6:16 Theme: God's Plan of Mission Work.

A collection for State Associational Missions was then taken

amounting to \$20.00

It now being 11:00 a. m., Elder Ben M. Bogard who had been appointed to preach at this hour delivered a very entertaining and instructive sermon. Subject: The Origin, Doctrine and Perpetuity of the Church.

Adjourned to reassemble at 2:00 p. m.

SUNDAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at the hour appointed. Prayer led by Bro. W. K. Johnson. The Executive Committee submitted their report, which was, on motion, adopted, as follows:

Your Executive Committee, Beg to report that after meeting and conferring, both in January and July, and finding that the Association had but thirty odd dollars for Associational Missions, felt that it would be unjust to employ a missionary for one year without having either funds or pledges to pay him. We did in July elect Elder R. F. Russell to labor up to the meeting of this body at a salary of fifty dollars per month, but finding that his churches would not release him he was forced to decline the work.

The Committee on Associational Missions made their report, which was, on motion, adopted, as follows:

We feel that the time has come for immediate action by this association of the churches to employ a missionary or missionaries to preach at least six months in the

destitution of this Association.

We further recommed, That this Association elect a missionary by vote of the messengers. We also recommend that a cash collection and pledges be taken for the support of said missionary. We further recommend that a committee be appointed to collect and pay said missionary.

Pledges by the Messengers for their churches were taken resulting in \$208.50. The amounts pledged were marked opposite the name of each church on one of last year's minutes. Some brother borrowed the minute and failed to return it, so the clerk has no list, but each church can learn from their messengers the amount pledged, so it will be all right anyway.

Adjourned till 9:00 a. m. Monday.

MONDAY-Forenoon Session.

Assembled at the hour named, the moderator in the chair.

Prayer led by Bro. A. W. Files.

A motion carried that the body elect an Associational Missionary. Elder Ben M. Bogard and Bro. J. C. Ross were appointed as tellers and the vote was taken resulting in the election of Elder R. F. Russell, and in a few appropriate remarks Bro. Russell accepted the work.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Moderator appoint a committee to assist the missionary in his work on the field and fill the vacancy should our present missionary from any cause retire from the work.

The moderator immediately appointed Bros. Ben M. Bogard, J. M. Clem, J. W. McDonald and J. C. Ross as the aforesaid committee.

A cash collection of \$7.20 was taken for Associational Missions.

The following Report on State Missions was read and adopted, after being discussed by Elders J. H. Milburn, Ben M. Bogard and Geo. F. Rowe.

STATE MISSIONS.

We your Committee on State Missions, submit the following report:
Missions in the aggregate is pre eminently the work of the churches of Christ. Assembled with the disciples at the close of his earthly mission Christ said to them: "Ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Acts, 1:8.

In regard to State Mission work we would say that this feature of mission werk is highly important, not only in the way of looking after the numerous points of destitution not occupied by district associations, but state work is exceedingly necessary in the way of teaching, endoctrinating and strengthening the things that remain, since the primitive missionaries and evangelists not only visited fields of dest tution and preached the gospel and constituted churches, but also visited the churches as opportunity afforded and necessity demanded and taught and endoctrinated them.

Therefore we would recommend, That this association heartily co-operate with the State General Association of Baptist Churches of

Arkansas and assist in carrying forward this work.

We further recommend, That the pastors of church in this Association preach on missions to their churches and explain to the brethren, as far as possible, the nature and character of this work and take up collections for the same and that the deacons together with their pastors consult together and urge upon the brethren and churches to try and make systematic offering for State Missions and forward those contributions to G. R. Robuck, at Haynes, Arkansas, treasurer of the General Association of Baptist Churches of Arkansas.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We your Committee on Religious Literature, beg leave to submit the

following report:

We call attention to the fact that a good, pure religious newspaper is one of the greatest sources of religious information. It is a source of profound pleasure and comfort to us to learn what our people are doing in every part of our great state as well as other states, and would recommend the Arkansas Baptist and the Flag to our people. But we want to say that no publication, however clear and strong will ever supply the place of the Word of God, the one necessary Book for christian people to read. We sometimes read in our religious papers harsh things that one brother may say about another, we all but come to the conclusion sometimes, that in our newspaper articles we forget that we are brothers. But the eternal Word of God comes to us as a continual refreshing, and as a story that never grows old. Let us all read it constantly and take it as the "man of our council," feeling sure that it will be unto us a perfect guide and will lead us in the path that grows brighter all the way.

We recommend that each church in this association strive to keep up a weekly prayer meeting and to get each member to take part in same.

Report on Ministerial Education, read and adopted, as follows:

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, your committee believe in education for all the people, and especially emphasize the importance of educating our young preachers. While we recognize the great good which has been accomplished by our aged brethren who have toiled on without an education, we are sure these same brethren could have done better if they had been educated. Education means the develop nent of the mind; it does not mean knowledge or information. But a developed mind can accumulate knowledge faster and can put that knowledge to a better use than an undeveloped mind. Hence the need of mental development—education.

We recommend Buckner College, Witcherville, Arkansas, as a good place to get an education. Buckner College belongs to the Baptist State Association and the charter guarantees that it shall forever remain the property of Landmark Baptists. Those desiring to attend this college should address the president, H. W. C. Ainley, Witcherville, Arkansas, and he will send all the information desired.

We recommend that liberal contributions be made toward building the new college building at Buckner College and that we assist the young preachers at Buckner who need assistance.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Worl and the Holy Ghost

Art. 2. We believe that the Scriptures, comprising the Old and New Testaments,

are the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Art. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

Art. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.

Art 5. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

Art. 6. We believe that sinners are justified, in the sight of God, by the imputed

righteousness of Christ only.

Art. 7. We believe that saints shall be preserved in grace, and never fall finally away.

Art. 8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

Art. 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be

eternal.

Art. 10 We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinauces of the Gospel but one who is regularly baptized, called, and comes under the imposition of the hands of a presbytery.

Art. II. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to

commune at the Lord's table.

Art. 12. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

RULES OF DECORUM.

The association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

A moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members 2. present.

The moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have a right

to call to order at any time

4. A member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the association ou the same day, but at no other time.

5 But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise on his feet and obtain ing permission, proceed.

6. The moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak,

shall signify the same by naming the person, or otherwise.

No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses words of personal reflection. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of this association unless with frawa by him that made

8. Every case taken up by the association shall be decided, or withdrawn before another be offered.

When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the moderator shall take the voice of the association on the subject, and the members on the affirmative of the question, shall signify the same by raising from their seats and those in the negative retain theirs

Io The moderator shall pronounce the decision before the standers resume

their seats.

II. Any member wishing to retire, shall obtain permission from the moderator.

12. No member shall speak more than twice on the same proposition without permission of the association, nor more than once till every member wishing to speak shall have done so, nor shall any proposition be made to close the subject till the debates have been carried through.

3. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the association by members

in their address to one another.

14. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.

15. The names of members shall be called as often as the association may direct.
16. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speakink as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the association be equally divided.

17 Any member violating the rules may be reproved by the moderator at dis-

cretion, but only on the day the breach shall be made.

CONSTITUTION.

Article r. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the

name and title of the "Saline Baptist Association"

Art. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers from churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

Art. 3. The messengers, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliherate body, by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual Association and shall continue in office until their successors

are chosen.

Art. 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall act only as an advisory council, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its members—the messengers from the churches—and in propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in fa th or disorderly in practice. It should the effore regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the gospel, and the means in accordance with the gospel and to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially with those united in this constitution.

Art. 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order; may be admitted into this union, on their sending three messenger to the annual meeting of the Association, with a petition for admission, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith pub-

lished.

Art. 6. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communication, specifying the names of their messengers, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, ex-communicated, restored or deceased, since the last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

Art. 7. This Association may have a fund supplied by the voluntary contribution of the churches, and all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the Association.

sociation and shall present annually, for insertion in the Minuetes, a clear and sufficient statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

Art. 8. This Association shall furnish the churches with the Minuetes of every

session.

Art 9. This Association shall take cogniznance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same, and have failed, nor of any difficulty between churches, unless they have pursued the directions in the eight eenth chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them. Then the A-sociation shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

Art. 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of every session of this body; and to deliver over the

same to his successor in office

Art. 11. This constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of the Association by the concurring voice of two thirds of the members then present; provided, such alternation or amendment be approved of by the churches comprising this Association.
