That we recall with grateful hearts the grand work already done in different parts of the state in planting churches which have subsequently become strong and self-sustaining, as well as aiding weak churches to hold up the banner of Christ, that the "Poor may have the gospel preached to them."

That we urge all the churches of this Association to take this work to their hearts as one of the greatest involved in the commission "to preach the gospel to every creature" and that they aid the same by their prayers, means and best influence

We hereby renew our allegiance to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for the 'wise manner in which it has conducted our state mission work through its executive board, and pledge it our hearty support in taking Arkansas for Christ.

APTERNOON SERVICE, 1:30 P. M. Devotional services.

The committee on Resolutions reported as ollows:

"Whereas certain Churches formerly asociated with this body have of their own accord withdrawn from us and formed a new Association on what is known as the Gospel Mission Plan, and assumed the name which belongs of right to the Original Association.

Therefore Resolved,

1. That this action on their part is clearly in violation of Article 6, of the Constitution of haid Association which r.ads:-"We acknowledge the independence of the particular churches, and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this association, mor will the association decide in any controversy that may arise in any church "

Nevertheless, they deem it their duty to disown any church belonging to this b dy which may have essentially departed from the faith. It is evident to everyone that by such action these brethren have exercised *authority* and *jurisdiction* over the Temperance Hill Church by ignoring the rights of the majority and accepting a small min rity of said church, and thus denying the independence of that particular church. This same article says "nor will the Association decide in any controversy that may arise in any church " But this Association by accepting members excluded from Temperance Hill church for just cause, has by formal action undertaken to decide the controversy which had arisen in the Temperance Hill church, and thus stand convicted of the most deliberate violation of the constitution of the Benton County Association.

Again Article 5th reads— 'Churches wish ing to unite with this Association may apply by letters and messengers and giving satisfactory information of their being sound in doctrine and correct in practice, they may be received by unanimous vote etc." Hence the action of this new Association in receiving members excluded because not correct in practice is also clearly in violation of the Constitution of the Benton County Association. furthermore that faction which that body accepted did not receive a *mannimous* vote, J. N Beard of Lowell church, A. J. Phillips and Luther Fag ala of Bethesda church, and W L Cardin of Twelve Corners church voting in the negative

2 Resolved, That the formation of the new Association is in violation of all Christial courtesy Every concession has been made to them which they could rationally demand If they did not want to work through the Boards and Agents of the State Convention they were granted full and hearty liberty to give through any agency they might choose For such reasons the body no v in session claim by right the original name of the Benton County Baptist Association, because she has not violated the Constitution of said Association and proposes to maintain in spirit and practice this purpose for which she was originally organized

3. Whereas this Association has in the page made every possible concession to our brethren who decined to work through boards and agent of the State Convention offering them perfe

freedom in the disposition of funds for missions, and yet, so far f iled to satisfy them as to cause a division in the body: --Whereas about 95 per cent of the active members of our Denomination in the United States, after much thought, prayer and long experience, have found the present method of conducting their various missionary enterprises through boards and agents, to be the most efficient and satisfactory and whereas, this a-sociation believing that "in the multitude of Council there is safety." prefer to work with the great body of our people, yet we see not a shadow of r as in for demanciation or of even unkind feeling towards our brethren who prefer some other method of conducting the same work

This last fact has been stated and emphasized in other meetings of this association. See Minutes of 1900, page 6, number, Foreign Missions

4 Resolved, that our attitude as an Association towards Intemperance, Sunday, desecration and all kindred questions has been modified in no respect, that we are uncomprisingly opposed to everything contrary to the revealed will of God and to the highest welfare of our homes, our churches and our country, yet we do not believe that such interests are best promoted by acts of violence, denunciation, or any disputations.

5 Resolved, that this Association extend its most hearty thanks to Temperance Hill church and pastor for their kind and Christian hospitality so cordially extended to this body.

Report on Home Missions read and adopted as follows:

"Home Missions is the co-operatve work of our churches in the Southern States, Oklahoma, Indian T-rritory and in Cuba The direction of this work is committed to the Home Mibuion Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, consisting of twenty-one brethren at large elected by the Convention in session and one Vice President for each of the Southern States

The hoard is located at Atlanta, Ga. The work is done as far as practicable in co-operation with the various State Conventions.

There are thousands of foreigners coming annually into our Southern States. Our Home Board is making great effort to reach them at the different ports with the gospel as soon as they are landed. The work is continued with them as fan as possible after they are settled and have become citizens of our country.

Our Board also recognizes the importance of assisting the negro population of the South, and co-operates with them through their general bodies in giving the ble-sed gospel of our Lord to all their people.

Last year the Home Board aided in the support of 51 missionaries in Arkansas who biptized 747 persons The amount of money received from the Board for this work was \$5,000.00

Resolved that we pray for, and heartily co operate with this Bourd in this great work of giving the pure gospel of our Lord to all the lost of our own beloved home land.
