PROCEEDINGS

The Buckville Baptist Association met with Oak Hill Baptist Church in its twenty-ninth annual session, September 20, 1918.

Called to order at 10:00 o'clock.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Elder D. B. Moore.

Elder W. A. Neighbors, at his request, was relieved of preaching the introductory sermon, and the body selected Elder T. J. Jordan, of Hot Springs, who preached the introductory sermon; Text, Rom. 8-1.

Recess till 2:30 o'clock.

Called to order by Moderator.

Prayer led by Brother D. B. Moore.

Brother J. G. McLane was elected Moderator, and J. T. Blakely, Clerk and Treasurer.

The committee announced that Elder D. B. Moore would preach Saturday night, and Elder E. J. A. McKinney Sunday at 11:00 o'clock.

The following were appointed Corresponding Messengers to Saline Association: Elder W. A. Neighbors, Elder S. B. Redwine, and A. R. Chitwood.

The following amendments to the constitution were adopted:

That Article two be amended to read as follows: That each church with less than 50 members, be entitled to three messengers, and each church with over 50 members, be allowed one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof. The following amendment was adopted, also: That when any church has not its quota of messengers, any member in good standing may be seated as a messenger.

On motion, a recess of business hours was taken till 8:00 o'clock Monday.

Saturday night, Elder D. B. Moore preached an able sermon, on the "World's Great War."

SUNDAY.

The body met at 10:00 o'clock.

After a song service by the Marble Class, Elder E. J. A. McKinney, editor of the Baptist Advance, preached a forceful sermon to a large congregation, after which a collection of \$13.85 was raised, and pledges amounting to \$87.00 were made for Associational Missions. Becess till 2:30 o'clock

Called to order at 2:30 o'clock. Sunday School addresses were made by Brother McKinney, Brother J. W. McDonald, and Brother Shepard.

At 3:00 o'clock, Elder J. P. Emery preached a splendid sermon, Text: Judges 5:3.

Sunday night Elder W. L. Cockrell preached to a large congregation, Text: Acts. 16:30.

MONDAY

Called to order by the Moderator at 8:00 o'clock. The Moderator read Second Chapter of Psalms. Brother Sinden led in prayer.

The Committee on Education made their report, which was adopted.

The Committee on Stewardship made their report, and after being discussed by Brother Chitwood, Brother Shepard, Brother Huddleston and Brother McLane, was adopted.

The Committee on Temperance made their report, and after being discussed by Brother J. A. Young, Brother Shepard, Brother J. C. Ratcliff and Brother R. M. Johnson, was adopted.

The Committee on Home Missions made their report, and after being discussed by Brother Emery, Brother Pullen and Sister Newkirk, was adopted.

Committee on Associational Missions made their report, and after being discussed by Brother Emery and Brother J. A. Young, was adopted.

Report of Committee on Obituaries and Condolence, read and adopted.

On motion the clerk was instructed to insert in the minutes, the names of Sunday School Superintendents and Secretaries.

The Committee on Orphans' Home made their report, and after an amendment, was adopted. At 11:00 o'clock, Rev. J. P. Emery preached the An-

Recess till 2:00 o'clock.

Called to order at 2:00 o'clock by the Moderator, who read fourteenth chapter of John. Prayer was led by Brother Emery.

The Committee on Foreign Missions made their report, and after being discussed by Brother Chandler, Brother Emery and Brother McLane, was adopted.

Committee on State Missions made their report, which was adopted.

Treasurer's report read and adopted.

Missionary W. L. Cockrell made his report, which was adopted.

Missionary J. W. Shepard made his report, which was adopted.

Resolution No. 1, read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Nominations read and adopted.

Report of the Finance Committee read and adopted.

On motion, Brother Frank Merrideth, J. G. McLane, and J. T. Blakely were elected Missionary Board for ensuing year.

On motion, the clerk was instructed to have 300 copies of the minutes printed, and distribute them in proportion to the minute fund of each church, the clerk to retain the balance of minute fund for his services.

The Committee on Sunday Schools made their report, and after being discussed by Brother Shepard, Brother J. C. Ratcliff, and Brother O'Donnell, was adopted.

Marble Church was selected as the meeting place of the next Association.

On motion, the body adjourned to meet with Marble Church, 22 miles north of Hot Springs, Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September, 1919, at 10:00 o'clock a. m.

A song was sung, the parting hand extended, and Brother Neighbors led the closing prayer.

REPORTS

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, report as follows:

Southern Baptists are asking for one and a half million dollars this year, in order to meet the enlarged needs in the foreign field.

That amount is large, but not too large when we consider the South's wealth. The Lord has greatly blessed Foreign Mission work the past year.

There were 6,290 baptisms last year.

We have 464 churches in foreign lands, with a membership of 53,000. Each church in this Association should do its best for this cause this year. Arkansas should raise \$40,000 for this cause this year, and may each church contribute a worthy amount to this cause.

Your Committee on State Missions report as follows:

We are glad to report that we are doing a great work along the lines of State Missions, and it will not do to retrench in this crisis of the world's great war. Last year's report of the State Convention Board, showed 91 workers, 4,384 conversions, 2,243 baptisms, 3,470 additions, 29 churches, and 111 Sunday Schools and B. Y. P. U. organized, and \$44,800 given to State Missions.

This year the work has been greatly enlarged. The number of workers is 189; we have four men working full time at Camp Pike. We are spending thousands of dollars to win our soldier boys to Christ; 6,000 were converted at Camp Pike. We must raise \$50,000, in order to "go over the top" when the Convention meets in December. We believe it is the duty of every Baptist of the Buckville Association, to help to the very limit of our ability in this great work.

Many of our boys have gone to the camps, and many more will have to go, and, besides, there are many outside the camps and within the state, that are lost, and need the gospel.

Therefore, we would recommend that our pastors preach on the work of State Missions, and that we pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and that we work together in a very earnest effort to make the cause of State Missions a glorious success.

A Fifth Sunday meeting will be held with Mt. Tabor Church, commencing Friday night, before the fifth Sunday in December, 1918. Plans for a Sunday School Convention will be made at this convention.

Article I. This union of churches of God shall be known as the Buckville Missionary Baptist Association.

Art. II. The Association shall be composed of messengers from the churches in this union. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, who shall have been chosen by the respective church to which they belong.

Art. III. Messengers, when convened, may organize themselves into a deliberative body, by the appointment of Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Art. IV. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed.

It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall act only as an advisory council, assuming no authority except what is implied by the very nature of the compact.

It nevertheless claims authority over its own members, the messengers from the churches, and in justice and propriety must retain the right to withdraw from all churches which may depart from the faith of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

It should, therefore, regard all churches united under this Constitution with vigilant eye, as its principal object shall be to promote the truth of the Gospel and advance the kingdom of God in our bounds and to all the ends of the earth.

Art. V. Newly constituted churches, or churches having letters of dismission from other Associations of like faith and order, may be admitted to membership in this Association at any regular annual session of the body, provided they send messengers with a petitionary letter.

Art. VI. The churches of this Association shall transmit to each annual session a written or printed communication, signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the church, specifying the names of their messengers and the statistics of the church, showing the progress of the church since the last session of this body, which shall be read and filed with the Clerk of this body accordingly.

Art. VII. This Association may have a fund supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches, which shall be paid over through a finance committee to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall present annually to the Association for inspection in the Minutes, a clear statement of all receipts.

Art. VIII. This Association shall furnish the churches with printed copies of the Minutes of each session.

Art. IX. This Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless it appears that the churches sending them have used due diligence to solve them first; and shall not undertake to settle individual differences between the members of the churches, unless it appears that the individuals, or the churches to which they belong, have taken, or caused to have taken, Gospel steps for the adjustment of the trouble.

Art. X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of this Association, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided, further, that Artice IV of this Constitution shall not be altered or amended.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Art. II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament is our only rule of faith and practice.

Art. III. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through the sanctification of the soul unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

Art. IV. We believe in original sin by the fall of Adam.

Art. V. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to rescue himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

Art. VI. We believe the saints are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

Art. VII. We believe the saints will be preserved in grace and never fall finally away.

Art. VIII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that believers are the only proper subjects of baptism, and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

Art. IX. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment, and that the reward of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Art. X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel but one who has been regularly immersed, and that is called and comes under the hands of a acriptural presbytery.
