PROCEEDINGS

The Twenty-Fifth Annual Session of the Greenbrier Baptist Association met with Spring Hill Church, Thursday, October 22, 1908. The Moderator being absent the meeting was called to order by H. P. Glover, who was elected Moderator pro tem. The Moderator read a selection from Scripture, after which Elder McPherson offered prayer.

The Association selected E. T. Herring Clerk protem. The regular order of business was set aside and Elder S. W. Cotton was selected to preach the Intro-

ductory Sermon.

After preaching by S. W. Cotton from the text: "Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved," the body adjourned till 1:30 o'clock, after prayer had been offered by Elder G. M. Ford.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body came together by singing. After the reading of the 31st Psalm, prayer was offered by E. T. Herring.

Letters from the Churches were called for and read by Elders G. M. Ford and A. McPherson. Twenty three (23) letters were read and the messengers seated.

The Moderator called for the nomination of officers for the following year.

P. H. Glover, H. P. Glover and J. M. Bryant were nominated for Moderator, E. T. Herring and G. F. Ford for Clerk. The ballot was cast. "H. P. Glover, Moderator, and E. T. Herring, Clerk," was the announcement of the Tellers. As the Treasurer was omitted in the balloting he was selected by acclamation. After due consideration of E. T. Herring, W. P. Harrod and W. W. Lovil as nominees the vote was taken; no one

having a majority a second ballot was taken, which resulted in the selection of E. T. Herring.

The Moderator tendered his thanks to the Associa-

tion for the honor and proceeded to business.

Petitionary letters were called for and two were presented as follows: Ingleside and Mayflower, which were seated and extended the hand of fellowship by the Moderator.

Elder C. R. Powell, editor of the Arkansas Baptist, of Little Rock, responded to an invitation to visiting brethren and was seated as an advisory member.

Call was made for corresponding messengers; none responded.

After permission by the Moderator Elder G. M. Ford presented the following resolution:

"Whereas, there is certain differences between Baptist

brethren in the way of doing mission work; and,

"Whereas, this Association has always recognized the right of each church to contribute in any way they might choose, therefore be it

"Resolved. That this Association continue to recognize this right of the churches; and be it further

"Resolved, by this body, that those differences between our brethren will not be allowed to be discussed upon the floor of this Association.

G. M. FORD."

A motion was made to adopt it. After much discussion a move was made to table it. It was passed over to come up the following day.

T. W. Waller was called to the chair and the Moderator called on P. A. Glover and J. M. Bryant to retire and assist him in the appointment of committees.

The deacons of the church were appointed Devotional Committee, who reported that Elder J. J. Hurt would preach at night.

The Association then adjourned until 8 o'clock Friday morning.

While the congregation was gathering for preaching the brethren engaged in an experience service,

after which J. J. Hurt preached an interesting sermon.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION.

The body was called together by singing. After the 8th chapter of Romans was read by the Moderator prayer was offered by Elder Kelley, a song was sung and "Rules of Decorum" read by the Moderator.

Letters were called. None were presented. Elder W. E. Roberts was called to the chair and the Modera-

tor continued to appoint committees.

The resolution presented the previous day was read, and J. J. Hurt accorded the floor, but was disturbed by wasps flying from the heated stove flue. After the quiet, he, with others, continued to speak on the resolution.

The motion to table was withdrawn and the vote on the resolution taken, which resulted in it being lost thirty four (34) to fourteen (14).

After the announcement of committees, which will be given elsewhere, call was made for letters. Five

were presented, and read by Eld. McPherson.

The Devotional Committee announced that C. R. Powell would preach at 11 o'clock. This was followed by short addresses by J. J. Hurt and C. R. Powell. The Moderator announced ten minutes recess until preaching.

The congregation came together by singing, and C. R. Powell preached a delightful sermon, using the 16th and 17th verses of the third chapter of 2nd

Timothy.

Dismissed by Eld. J. A. Yarbrough until 2 o'clock.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body came together by singing, and prayer by Eld. R. L. Hendrickson. Eld. R W. Cazort was seated as a corresponding messenger from Carolina Associa-

tion. The Committee on Home Missions made the following report which was adopted after discussion:

HOME MISSIONS.

TO THE GREENBRIER ASSOCIATION-GREETING:

We, your Committee on Home Missions, submit the following report:

From the limited time allotted us, we are unable to make a full report as to who are on the field, or how many converts have been gained through their instrumentality, or as to the provible indebtedness to them, but we do know that the Bible teaches us that it is the duty of the churches to give the Gospel to the lost, and we believe the Bible gives us the plans for so doing, and we are fully convinced that there are many precious souls in the Home Mission field, yet without hope and without God; therefore we deem it our duty under Christ to do all in our power to preach the gospel to them and to assist by helping those whom God has called to preach; to preach to them the word of God and to sustain them also by our prayers and means. The Lord Jesus admonished us saying: "As my Father hath sent me even so send I you." Let us therefore ever teach the gospel truth concerning missions, and count it not only a duty but an exalted privilege to work, and sacrifice for our blessed Redeemer who has done so much for us.

H. E. H. FOWLKS, J. BELOTE, J. S. WOFFORD,

The Commintee on Education made the following report:

EDUCATION.

The cardinal doctrines of the Baptist faith is personal responsibility to a personal Savior, hence it behooves us above all others to see that our people are educated. We are in favor of schools and urge our people to take advantage of every means for the advancement of learning, from the district school to the high school, from the high school to the college, and from the college to the university. The demands on our people are enlarging and these call for increased school facilities. Our denomination leads all others in numbers and we believe that we have the purest doctrine; hence the call comes to us to assume the leadership in education. It is a call that comes from the Master and must be heeded or we fail in our duty to Him.

The State schools are making rapid progress, and our sister denominations are keeping pace with the spirit of the age—they have paid their schools out of debt, and they are equipping and endowing them. We must do something and that right quickly, or surrender our birth right to another.

We recommed that we pay the debts on our schools; that endowment be supplied as soon as possible, and that we give hasty support to our denominational colleges, one of which is

in the bounds of own Association.

The session was opened by singing, and reading the 10th of Romans by the Moderator; prayer by G. M. Ford. Eld. G. M. Ford read the following report of the Executive Board, which was adopted as read:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

We, your Committee, submit the following report:

At our last Association there was a debt of \$36.41 which we were instructed to raise and pay over to the retiring missionary, Eld. W. E. Roberts. This we did.

After this, we, in accord with the instructions of the Association, employed two men, Elders J. A Crye and W. B. Driskill, to work five weeks each as missionaries at a salary of \$10.00 per week.

Brother Driskill's family being sick he did not do any work at all. Bro. Crye put in twenty-seven days of labor, report of

same being attached hereto.

In addition to this Elds. P. H. and H. P. Glover put in one week each, report will be given by said brethren.

The work of Associational Missions is one that all of us should be deeply interested in. There is great need of this kind of work in this Association.

We would urge this work upon the hearts of the Brethren, for we are not doing our duty as God has commanded us if we fail to give the Gospel to those in our midst who have it not.

1st. We would recommend that this Association elect a Missionary while in session, and that he be employed for as much time as we can pay for.

2nd. We recommend that the churches take regular collections for the support of the work.

The Association still omitted the regular order and elected an Executive Committee. After nominating J. M. Bryant, M. A. Clements, U. A. Tucker, F. C. Flournoy, Joe Cavin, and B. A. Author, the vote was cast and Joe Cavin and U. A. Tucker received the minority, but by motion they were reserved as a reserve force, so if any of the others should fall out Joe Cavin would resume the first and U. A. Tucker the second vacancy.

CONSTITUTION.

Art. I. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches of our union, together with the ministers, who, on producing their credentials, shall be entitled to seats

Art. II. This Association shall be known as Greenbrier

Baptist Association.

Art. III. Each church composing this Association shall be entitled to three delegates until the church numbers one hundred, and then one for each additional fifty.

Art. IV. The object of this Association will be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's Kingdon on earth, and to

meet at such times and places as she may appoint

Art. V. This Association shall be considered an advisory council, and shall have no power to legislate for the churches

or lord it over God's heritage.

Art. VI. Other churches may be admitted into this body when they signify a wish to do so by letter and delegates, provided they be deemed orthodox, which shall be determined by

their abstract of faith and church government.

Art. VII. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each session and hold their offices until their successors are properly qualified. The Treasurer shall be a member of the Executive Board.

Art. VIII. The Clerk shall keep a regular file of minutes of the Association and turn same over to his successor in office.

Art. IX. It shall be the duty of each church composing this body to send up such contributions in money to each annual meeting as shall be necessary to defray the expenses of this Association, and each church shall be furnished with minutes in

proportion to the amount thus furnished.

Art. X. It shall be the duty of each church to send up to each annual meeting of this body a letter containing a brief history of her progress since the last session, with the following particulars, to-wit: Her prosperity or adversity; the names of delegates, pastors, deacons, ordained or licensed ministers; her increase by baptism; by letter; by exclusion; died; total membership; contribution for pastor's salary; other home expenses; Associational missions; State missions; Home missions; Foreign missions; ministerial education; number of Sunday school pupils; number of officers and teachers; name and postoffice of superintendent; amount contributed by the Sunday schools; value of church property; time of regular conference meeting.

Art. XI. Any church may send any query asking advice of

this Association.

Art. XII. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a full and fair record of the proceedings of this Association and to superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes; for his services he shall receive such remuneration as the Association may from time to time think proper.

from time to time think proper.

Art. XIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and account for all moneys paid to him for use of the Associa-

tion, according to its order.

Art. XIV. Amendments to this constitution may be made

at any session of this Association, when two-thirds of the members present shall deem it necessary.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe there is only one true and living God, revealed to us under the personal and relative distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Art. II. We believe that the Scriptures comprising the Old and New Testament are the word of God, and the only correct

rule of faith and practice.

Art. III. We believe in the doctrine of election, as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and belief of the truth.

Art. IV. We believe that man was created upright, but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy state, and consequently became dead in tresspasses and sin.

Art. V. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ, through

faith in His name.

Art. VI. We believe in the final preservation of all the

saints in grace.

Art. VII. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the

punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Art. VIII. We believe that a church is a congregation of baptized believers who meet statedly and have covenant together to maintain the ordinances, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges set forth in the New Testament as pertaining to the Church of Christ.

Art. IX. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel unless he has been regularly baptized, called, and come under the imposition of the

hands of a proper Presbytery.

Art. X. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are both positive institutions and the only ordinance of the Church of Christ, and that believers are the only proper subjects, and that immersion alone is baptism.

Art. XI. We believe that regularly baptized believers only

have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

Art. XII. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest.

RULES OF DECORUM.

This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer. The officers of this Association shall be chosen by a majority of the members present by ballot.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is

kept according to the rules of decorum.

Any member being dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association, provided it is done the same day.

5. One member may speak at a time; he shall address the

Moderator, and on obtaining the floor shall proceed without interraption, unless he depart from the subject or use personal reflections.

6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject without obtaining leave of the Association.

7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to inter-

rupt a member while speaking.

8. Every motion made and seconded, after time given for debate, shall be put to the Association unless previously with-drawn, and the Moderator shall announce the decision of the Association, unless a division is called for.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the mem-

bers present.

10. No appellation but that of "brother" shall be used by members addressing each other during the session of this Association.

The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech 11 as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and also vote

in case of tie to give the casting vote.

The names of members may be called as often as the Association may deem necessary, and no member shall withdraw himself from the Association without leave of Moderator.

These rules shall be read at the opening of each session

and oftener if necessary.

These rules may be amended at any session of this body by a majority of the members present.
