## CONSTITUTION

As Amended at 1933, 1943, 1948, 1950, and 1951 Sessions

### ARTICLE I.—NAME

The name of this body shall be Pulaski County Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II.—OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to aid the churches in their divinely appointed work of spreading the Kingdom of God throughout the whole world by every Scriptural means.

### ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches, which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Constitution and desire to co-operate with this Association, who shall be entitled to seats upon the presentation of letters from their churches or other satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional member for every fifty members or major fraction thereof above one hundred.

Section 3. Messengers from churches desiring to affiliate with this Association shall present to the Association petitionary letters or other evidence setting forth the Articles of Faith on which the churches were organized together with satisfactory evidence of the regularity of their organization. They shall be received into the Association only by unanimous vote as cast by the body.

### ARTICLE IV.—AUTHORITY

This Association shall never exercise any legislative or ecclesiastical authority over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the rights and absolute independence of the churches of Christ.

### ARTICLE V.—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the last session of each Annual Meeting by a majority of all the votes cast at such meeting. Provided, however, that the Moderator shall not be eligible to serve more than two terms.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all sessions of the



Association or call some one to occupy the chair temporarily in his absence, and may exercise the same privilege of discussion as any other member of the Association.

Section 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Association and shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of each session as he may be directed by the Association.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of every kind entrusted to his care, and shall disburse the same upon order of the Association and shall make an itemized report of all such funds to the Association before the close of each annual session.

#### ARTICLE VI.—ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD

Section 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of one lay member, elected by each co-operating church, together with the pastors of such churches, and the officers of the Association and the Superintendents of W. M. U. work. Seven members of said Board shall constitute a quorum to transact business, after notice has been given all members of the Board of such meeting.

Section 2. This Board shall co-operate with the churches in this Association in informing and arousing the churches in gathering and disbursing of funds for all of the causes fostered by this Association and shall transact all of the business of the Association in the interim of the annual meeting of the Association.

#### ARTICLE VII.—MISSION COMMITTEE

The Mission Committee shall be elected by the Association in three groups, as follows: Group 3, to serve for three years; Group 2, to serve for two years; and Group 1, to serve for one year, thus retaining six members of the committee each year and only electing three new ones to take the place of the Group retiring.

The Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer of the Association and the five elected officers of the associational organizations known as the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, W. M. U., and Music become ex-officio members of that committee, thus making the total membership seventeen and this committee shall provide the program and calendar of activities for the Association.

The Mission Committee shall elect its own chairman, who shall be required to report monthly to the meeting of the Associational Board and an annual report to the annual meeting of the Association.

The Mission Committee shall have the responsibility of the selec-

tion of the Superintendent of Associational Missions, subject to the approval of the Executive Board of the Association, and shall have as its duty in co-operation with that officer the planning and practical promotion of the Program of Associational Missions for Pulaski County Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE VIII—MEETING

This Association shall meet annually on Monday night after the second Sunday in October at 7:00 o'clock, and day session Tuesday, adjourning Tuesday night. That four sermons be placed on the program, consisting of the Annual Sermon; the Annual Doctrinal Sermon; a sermon on Stewardship; and a sermon on Missions.

#### ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any annual meeting, provided that the substance of Article IV shall never be abrogated.

### RULES OF ORDER

(BY-LAWS)

*As Amended at 1933 and 1947 Sessions*

I. The following committees shall be appointed six weeks in advance of the Associational meeting:

• (1) Associational Missions; (2) State Missions; (3) Home Missions; (4) Foreign Missions; (5) Colleges and Schools; (6) Religious Literature; (7) Bible (Sunday) Schools; (8) Ministerial Education; (9) Orphan's Homes; (10) Christian Stewardship; (11) Hospitals; (12) Woman's Work; (13) Young People's Work; (14) Digest of Letters; (15) Obituaries; (16) Resolutions; (17) Finance; (18) Temperance; (19) Nominations.

II. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

III. The following shall be the order of business:

1. The Body called to order by the Moderator, or, in his absence, by brethren in the following order of precedence: Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Pastor of entertaining church.
2. Devotional Service.
3. Presentation of letters and enrollment of Messengers.
4. Permanent organization.



5. Introductory Sermon.
6. Petitionary Letters.
7. Reception of visitors, corresponding messengers from other bodies and introduction of new pastors.
8. Appointment of program committee which shall recommend a schedule for all reports and other matters to come before the body, subject to the Association's approval.

IV. Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator. In discussion all personalities shall be avoided. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without special permission from the Association.

V. Mell's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard in deciding questions of parliamentary practice.

VI. The minutes of the preceding session shall be read and approved at the meeting of each session and at the close of the Association meeting.

VII. Such offerings may be taken at the annual meeting of the Association as the body may direct.

VIII. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present, or suspended by a unanimous vote.

IX. The Associational Board shall meet monthly at such time and place as the Board itself may determine.

X. A doctrinal sermon shall be preached during each annual session at such an hour as each program committee shall provide.

9. New pastors and Educational Directors were introduced by Dr. E. A. Ingram, and were officially welcomed by the Moderator, Guy S. Wilson.



10. Request was made for special prayer for pastor, G. A. Keeling, of Zion Hill, and pastor James Thomson of Graves Memorial Baptist Church. Rev. Purl Stockton led this prayer.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

11. W. O. Vaught, Jr., read the report on Christian Education, and introduced Dean Haswell, of Ouachita College, who spoke on Ouachita's part in Christian Education. Motion made that report be adopted. Carried.

Ouachita College is one of sixty-eight Southern Baptist educational institutions representing an investment of more than one hundred twenty-five million dollars in endowment and property values and employing more than four thousand faculty members. These educational institutions are committed to the task of training and developing Christian leadership, particularly Baptist leadership. From these institutions must come most of our Christian statesmen, our leading ministers, our men and women of Christian culture, vision, and convictions.

#### You Own Ouachita

Ouachita is the only Baptist educational institution in Arkansas which is entirely owned and operated by our State Convention. You name our board of trustees; you elect our administrative officials; you determine our policies and program; you are indispensable in our financial program. Without the continued support of Arkansas Baptists, Ouachita could not continue its program of Christian education.

#### Buildings and Grounds

Ouachita College is located at Arkadelphia, Arkansas. It endeavors to serve Baptist young people in all portions of our state. It has one of the finest physical plants of any Southern Baptist college. Arkansas Baptists have invested more than two million dollars in the erection of twenty permanent brick buildings at Ouachita. More than half of these buildings are less than ten years old. These facilities are adequate to provide for the education of a student body ranging from seven hundred fifty to one thousand. The buildings are in good repair and with normal usage will last for a quarter century without the need of major repairs. Ouachita is virtually debt free. With the liberal allocations

which the Convention is making to the institution at the present time, the college finances are in stable condition. There is on deposit, at present, one hundred thousand dollars which can be spent only for the erection of a new administration building to replace "old Main," which was lost by fire in the spring of 1949. The only other building need is a new dormitory for men.

#### Enrolment Figures Inspiring

Ouachita has just begun its sixty-sixth year of Christian education. Our fall enrolment includes four hundred sixty-seven college students and approximately thirty-five special music students. Our Freshman Class exceeds that of last year by ten students. This enrolment of five hundred students compares favorably with that of last May, when the college closed with an enrolment of five hundred twenty-five. The student body includes one hundred forty-two ministerial students as well as forty-one other young people who have dedicated themselves to full-time Christian service. In addition to these who are training themselves for special religious service, the college offers training in the fields of teacher education, home economics, business administration, speech and dramatics, music, art, pre-medicine, pre-law, pre-dental, physical education, and the basic liberal arts courses.

#### Campus Improvements

During the past summer, a great deal of remodeling and redecorating has been done about the campus. The parlors and hallways in all the dormitories have been reconditioned and redecorated. The Little Theater has been completely redecorated; the ceiling in the dining hall has been painted; new equipment has been added to the game room in the Student Center, including a snack bar where students may obtain lunches on Sunday evenings, as well as light refreshments at other times during the week.

#### Our Primary Objective, North Central Association, Accreditation

The college administration, board of trustees, and the leaders of the Arkansas Baptist Convention have all agreed that the primary objective of Ouachita College shall be to regain approval of the North Central Association. Progress has been made to make this objective a reality. North Central has consented to let Ouachita reapply for admission in



the summer of 1952. In the meantime, the faculty and administration will be cooperating with consultants recommended by North Central Association to strengthen points of weakness. It is possible that the school will be sufficiently strong by the spring of 1953 to be readmitted to the North Central Association. Meanwhile the University of Arkansas has agreed to validate the credits of Ouachita students. The future of Ouachita College looks bright. With an adequate faculty, a loyal student body, a debt-free institution, a satisfactory plant, and the generous support of the Convention, there is every indication that the school is in position to advance.

#### Our Thanks To You

The administration and board, as well as the faculty and student body, are deeply grateful to the Baptists of Arkansas for the support they have given during the past year. We feel much indebted to you. We desire to give a good account of the trust you have placed in our hands. We dedicate ourselves to the task of educating Christian young people and instilling in them Christian principles that will insure adequate leadership for our denomination in the coming generation. We covet your continued support, your good will, and your prayers. We thank you for all that you have made possible in the past. We look forward with anticipation to the future.

#### Missionary Advance Must Continue!

The American Bible Society, working with Southern Baptist mission agencies in their Advance Program for worldwide missions, joins in reporting that advance has begun.

The Society also joins in urging that this missionary

advance must continue and increase. Experience on mission fields around the world shows that

*In every missionary advance,  
the Bible goes forward first.*

### The Bible is a "Must" in Mission Work

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

In most countries of the world, the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed scriptures. Someone must help those who can pay only a part of the cost and the many who cannot pay at all.

The American Bible Society, a missionary non-profit organization, supported by gifts, serves as that "Someone." It aids in Bible translation, publishes the scriptures without note or comment, and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world.

During 1950 the American Bible Society—

—distributed through its own work, at home and abroad, more than 11 million volumes of Scriptures. Another 3 million volumes were produced through gifts of materials and money to Bible Societies of other countries, especially Germany and Japan, bringing the grand total to more than 14 million volumes for the year;

—supplied Testaments in nine different languages for United Nations forces in Korea;

—started printing two million service Testaments for our own expanding armed forces;

—in Japan, distributed three million volumes, which was the goal for 1950, making the total distribution in Japan since World War II, more than six million volumes.



1951 Opportunities Call for Even Greater Advance  
in Scripture Distribution

Japan is the major challenge for greater Advance. It is not just an "open door"; "the whole side of the house has fallen out" and we are free to walk right in. Other fields also present needs which, though not so dramatic, are just as real.

In 1950, Southern Baptist churches gave \$78,643 to the American Bible Society; gifts from churches of all denominations amounted to \$646,756. In view of Southern Baptists, strength and readiness to respond to missionary needs, it is expected that Southern Baptist churches will soon be giving to the American Bible Society at least \$150,000 each year. ## SECOND DAY

Tuesday, October 9, 1951

Morning Session—9:30 A. M.

20. The morning session of the annual meeting began at 9:30 a. m., Tuesday, October 9, 1951, with the Moderator, Guy S. Wilson, presiding.

21. The messengers and visitors were led in prayer by pastor Vernon Bellue.

22. Mr. John Gilbreath led the congregation in singing "Standing On The Promises" and "My Jesus I Love Thee."

23. Pastor Lawson Hatfield gave the devotional on 1st Peter chapter 1 verse 5 and led in prayer.

24. Journal for the previous evening was read by the clerk.

25. A committee on Digest of Letters was appointed by the Moderator. The committee is composed of the following: pastors Raymond Strickland, Felix Williams and W. C. Halsell.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL

26. Mr. John Gilbreath gave the hospital report. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

Some of the facts concerning the Arkansas Baptist Hospital for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1951 are as follows:

EXPENSES: \$3,300 per day is the expense of operation. It costs the hospital \$12.88 per day per patient. The school of nursing costs \$247,000 per year. The student nurses, about 200 per year, render service to pay for approximately \$147,000 of it, leaving a balance of about \$100,000. Last year Arkansas Baptists allocated \$25,000 to help with the expenses of the nurses. The Executive Board is asking the Convention this year to grant an allocation of \$30,000 to help with the nurses. The hospital takes care of the balance of the \$100,000 out of money received from pay patients. At the end of the fiscal year the hospital had \$79,025.54 over and above operating expenses which was enough to run the hospital without any deficit for 21 days. The margin is too



close to be comfortable sometimes but we have been able to stay out of the red.

**PATIENTS:** Total number of bed patients was 13,291 but 1518 of them were new-born babies. There were 3,532 out patients. These were treated but did not go to bed. That makes a total of 16,823 patients for the year. The number of patients in bed on the average for a day was 250 or more.

**FREE SERVICE:** The hospital did more than \$92,000 of free service. One polio case cost the hospital over a period of more than two years \$40,000. This is not a part of the \$92,000. Pastors of our State Convention churches are given free hospital service for themselves and their families of children under 18 years of age, and all other preachers of other denominations get a 25 per cent discount on their room charges. This amounted to \$12,456. Under Act 115 our state through the counties helped some with the charity cases, and through our Mother's Day offering others were helped. A great opportunity is offered Arkansas Baptists to do mission work through the Mother's Day offering.

**SCHOOL OF NURSING:** We have two plans of training—one for the R. N., and the other for the T. N. The Registered Nurse takes nine months of preclinical training in the Junior College here in Little Rock and then two years and three months in the hospital for graduation. The Technical Nurse takes one year in bed-side nursing and six months internship for graduation.

**RELIGION:** Efforts are made to keep a Christian atmosphere throughout the hospital. Many of the student nurses are members of the B. S. U. and the Y. W. A. They take a splendid interest in their organizations and in the chapel services. A suitable speaker is selected each year to conduct a revival, or focus week, in March or April. This has proved to be a mighty factor in the religious life of the student nurses. A course in Bible is taught by the chaplain to every class at their first entrance to the school. This is required by the hospital board. The chaplain, J. F. Queen, made more than 10,000 personal visits to the bed-side of patients. He supplied pulpits and spoke in 30 churches, and spoke on the hospital report in eight district associations.

**ADMINISTRATION:** Mr. John A. Gilbreath is the Administrator and a great Christian gentleman. He is available for addresses in district associations, churches, brotherhoods, and schools when his other duties are not too heavy.

## RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

27. Pastor K. O. White read the report on Religious Literature. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

"The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away: but the word of the Lord endureth forever" (I Peter 1:24, 25).

Any denomination which accepts the Bible as the divinely inspired Word of God must recognize the power of the printed page. As Baptists we wholeheartedly accept the New Testament as sole and sufficient rule of faith and practice.

Ours is a Bible-centered denomination. We do not worship the Book but we believe, reverence and seek to follow it. We believe that we are called to "preach the Word," that our Sunday Schools are commissioned to teach the Word, that our churches should be built upon it and that in every important decision it should be the final court of appeal.

In the providence of God the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has come to take its place in the front ranks of the religious publishing houses of the world.

Just recently the Board has purchased a piece of property just outside Nashville, consisting of 22 acres upon which it has constructed a fine modern building with over 100,000 feet of floor space. Modern, high-speed presses have been installed and soon will be operating at full capacity.

We have developed a distinctive literature which is second to none. It is loyal to the Scriptures, denominationally sound, devotionally rich and evangelistic in spirit.

This literature covers the whole field of our church life. Beginning with the "Home Life" magazine for the parents of babies in the Cradle Roll or Nursery it provides a rich background of Bible lessons and teaching helps for all ages.

The Training Union literature for groups of all ages is planned to lead Christians into a clearer expression of their faith and to develop them in every phase of Christian life and work.

The literature for the Baptist Student Union is geared to the interests and activities of young people in a modern age.



Standing alongside the literature of the Sunday School Board are the publications of our Home and Foreign Mission Boards, "Southern Baptist Home Missions" and "The Commission." These magazines contain unlimited information and inspiration for the hearts of our people.

Each state has its own State Baptist paper. In our case "The Arkansas Baptist" ministers to the people of our churches and undergirds the whole program of the denomination.

Our Baptist Book Store, operated with the cooperation of the Sunday School Board, renders a spiritual ministry which is far-reaching and fruitful. It carries a plentiful supply of Bibles, Testaments, Scripture portions, song books, study course books, religious fiction, biography, doctrine and methods. Besides this it assists the churches in the field of visual education.

In addition there is the literature published by Woman's Missionary Union. A multitude of booklets, and tracts on evangelism, stewardship, the church, the home, the Christian life and other related subjects are always available.

The printed page has power, but the greatest power lies in the Word of God. Loyalty to the Word has made us strong. Loyalty to the Word will keep us strong. May God keep us faithful in "holding fort hthe Word of life" through our literature as well as through the spoken word.

#### TEMPERANCE

28. Pastor C. Gordon Bayless gave the report on Temperance, and brought a very timely and helpful message on the evil of drink. Motion made that report be adopted. Carried.

The liquor traffic continues to be the most devastating force in the U. S. It is not content to destroy the body, but

goes beyond that to blight the home, cripple man's earning capacity and to mark his soul for damnation. The biography of liquor is the story of the arch criminal of America. To write its history accurately, one would have to talk to all the little children who have been its victims; to all the wives and mothers who have sat up late at night listening for the unsteady footsteps of a son or husband; to the awful wails of innocent people whose loved ones have been killed by drinking drivers; to all the human derelicts whose brains have been destroyed by alcoholism; and finally, to tell the story of the liquor traffic, one would have to listen to the helpless cries of those doomed to hell for ever.

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT LIQUOR

##### (1) Can the liquor traffic be regulated?

Definitely not. In our state the Temperance League of Arkansas has made numerous surveys on this question and the results are always the same. June 25, 1951, there were 383 Federal permits held by bootleggers in Arkansas. 48 of them were in DRY counties and 335 of them were in wet counties. National surveys show that the more legal dealers there are in an area the more bootleggers there are in that same area.

##### (2) Does Arkansas profit by its taxes from liquor?

The revenue from all alcoholic liquors for 1950 was \$6,-108,627.00.

Arkansas's liquor bill for 1950, was.....\$42,131,646.00

Money-cost of crime caused by liquors in

Arkansas, was.....25,316,455.00

Money-cost of auto accidents caused by liquors,

was .....3,483,000.00

TOTAL.....\$70,931,001.00

It will be seen from the above that each \$1.00 of liquor "revenue" cost the people of Arkansas above \$11.00.

##### (3) Is alcohol a stimulant in the human body?

No, alcohol is a depressant. It causes a drop in physical energy and resistance.

##### (4) Is alcohol merely a bad habit?

Drinking alcohol is more than a disagreeable habit. Drinking liquor leads to alcoholism and alcoholism is a DISEASE. There are 600,000 cancer victims and 700,000 tuber-



culosis cases in the United States, but alcoholism leads the field in major diseases with 4,000,000 victims. And there are more than 60,000,000 Americans, 15 years old and older, now drinking alcoholic liquor with varying degrees of regularity, millions of whom are heavy drinkers and drunkards. For the last four years at least, 50,000 have been added each year to the ranks of chronic alcoholics.

(5) Is moderate drinking harmless?

There is no such thing as harmless drinking. The hospitals are using it less and less for medical purposes. The better the hospital the less alcohol is used.

The really dangerous driver is the man who has had one or two drinks only, who still thinks he is in possession of his faculties, but whose driving judgment has been impaired. On the highway the moderate drinker is more dangerous than the immoderate drinkers.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

(1) That every pastor preach an informative sermon exposing the evils of liquor once a quarter.

(2) That our public schools be encouraged to teach the effects of alcohol upon the body and brain with the same emphasis and freedom they place upon the disease of cancer, heart trouble and tuberculosis.

(3) That, at a time designated by the Temperance League of Arkansas, we again join the Christian forces of Arkansas in a crusade to abolish liquor from the state.

#### BOTTOMS BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

29. Pastor Harold Presley gave the report of the Bottoms Baptist Orphanage. Motion that report be adopted. Carried. Mr. Herring, a representative of the Orphanage spoke on the work at the orphanage.

The Bottoms Baptist Orphanage at Monticello has spent another year caring for the children coming from homes over the state, where the parents have died, or are unable to care for them because of illness, or broken by divorce, which made it necessary for them to have some place to go.

Approximately one fourth of its support comes through the Cooperative Program, the remainder through the Annual Thanksgiving Offering, and other special designated gifts, food, clothing and equipment. Since our last report, ten boys and girls were placed, eight in homes, one entered the Service and one was placed in a foster home. Eleven new boys and girls have been taken in, making our family average, including the staff, around ninety—our capacity is seventy two children. When a satisfactory program for a child in the Home can be worked out, an additional child can be received.

Ten of our children accepted Christ as their Saviour, several others united with the church by letter, and several rededicated their lives. Through the kindness of Arkansas Baptists a number of the children were enabled to attend state programs, (the Assembly, R. A. and G. A. camps and Training Union Convention). Many of our boys love the farm and we are making every effort to improve our milk and beef stock. The Grand Champion Steer of the Southeast Arkansas Fat Stock Show held in Pine Bluff came from the Home and was purchased and given back to the Home by the R. A. Pickens and Son Co., and resold, realizing some \$900 for the Home, including the \$75.00 prize money. Mrs. Carr M. Terrall of Tillar presented the Home with two cows and a calf. Since last report 31 hogs, totaling some 4,469 pounds, and 11 beef totaling 2,753 pounds have been butchered. Approximately 1,474 dozen eggs have been gathered and used. Cows and calves sold brought in \$2,258.25. (31 gal. lard since Jan. 1st) A 100 gallon pasteurizer at an outlay of approximately \$3,000 has been installed and is working successfully, and some 7,626 gallons milk handled.

One of our girls and two boys graduated from high school this year—the boys planning to enter A. & M. College on scholarships in the fall.

City sewerage, to carry away the effluent from the septic tank, and requested by the city, was installed at a cost of \$5,000 plus an additional monthly charge for maintenance.

The superintendent of the Home and the field representative would like to continue making trips to the churches throughout the state, informing our people of the Home, and its work, and showing the moving picture of the Home activities.

Housewives over the state have cooperated in a magnificent way in sharing "coupons" received with purchases



of food and clothing, etc., with which the Home hopes to realize buildings, trucks, tractors, silver, dishes, etc., as has been done by other homes.

Birthday banks have increased the Birthday Offerings quite materially. Many are getting away from the "penny a year" habit and are making it a real offering. Help us increase these offerings. Banks are available and will be provided upon request.

There is a growing demand to provide more space for more children. The planning and steering committee appointed by the Board of Trustees to work out plans for an enlargement program, have been at work, and will be presenting a report of their work. The board in their June meeting voted as follows: "We feel that the Lord is leading us to take care of more children and we request Arkansas Baptists to support us with their means," and will present this motion to the Convention.

The needs of the Home are great—more room for more children, doubtless its greatest need. A gym, or at least some provision for recreation in all kinds of weather is another great need. With that comes the need of another bus, as the one we have will carry only part of the family at one time. Hay and feed is a big need also, and we suggest the Home be allowed to go on the field, (where we have friends who will share), and gather feed and hay, when possible, and thus save those giving it the work of gathering.

We are grateful for our deep-freeze locker, the pianos that have come in, the picture projector, etc.

We earnestly and sincerely invite our friends over the state to visit the Home they are providing to care for these children who need their help so sorely. We believe that a good warm hearted offering for the Home at Thanksgiving time will not hurt the other causes or the Cooperative Program, but rather that it will stimulate all the work.

Remember please, the Cooperative Program provides only about one fourth of the orphanage support and that the Thanksgiving Offering is a part of our program in carrying on the orphanage program. What does God's word have to say about our responsibility as Christians to widows

and orphans? Let's give these children a big place in our hearts.

### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

30. Pastor C. S. Maynard read the report on the Cooperative Program. Motion made that report be adopted. Carried.

This year marks the 26th anniversary of the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists. In 1925 the one greatest single decision Southern Baptists ever made was reflected in the launching of the Cooperative Program. With this program Southern Baptists have made the greatest strides in all her history. The Great Commission has been obeyed in large measure through this program of winning souls, baptizing the saved, teaching and training disciples and other means of ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of mankind everywhere.

We should give our faithful and sacrificial support to the Cooperative Program in 1952 because:

1. It is Scriptural.

Baptists like this word, scriptural. The Cooperative Program is scriptural in that it makes its appeal to the churches from the standpoint of cooperation and not from coercion. Baptist churches, being independent, need some kind of program wherein they can pool their resources and combine their efforts to "preach the gospel to every creature." The Cooperative Program is that program. This accounts for its success and merits our support.

2. Its Scope is World-wide.

The aim and purpose of the Cooperative Program is to cover the earth with the good news that Christ died for man's sins.

The Cooperative Program sets out to fulfill the mis-



sion, educational and benevolent obligations thrust upon us by the Great Commission. Its one big work is in the support of schools, hospitals, orphanages, publications, mission stations, and missionaries, which are the heart and soul of the Great Commission of our Lord.

3. It has proved to be a wise plan.

When churches adequately support the Cooperative Program much time and effort used in special campaigns for funds is saved. When churches support the Cooperative Program worthily there is no need of such special campaigns.

Its proved success for these past 26 years should convince us that God is pleased with it and that in the future He will continue to gather fruits unto His Kingdom through it if Baptists will give it their support.

Through the Cooperative Program the world has been blessed. The gratitude of Baptist hearts should demand its support.

4. Its challenge is great.

We have seen and are now seeing the horrible results of our selfishness in not sending missionaries to all the world. Bombs and bullets have been sent instead, paid for by money taken in taxes from our pocketbooks, money—a small portion of which, if it had been used unselfishly by Baptists to preach the gospel to all the world probably would have held back the war.

Multitudes are still lost in sin. The devil is on the rampage. The moral and spiritual fibre of our nation and other nations is broken down as never before. God is looking to us. He stands ready to pour out His power and blessings on us. Are we willing to meet the challenge? God grant that we will.

We heartily recommend that messengers go back to their churches and urge a worthy increase in the support of the Cooperative Program.

### ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

57. Frank Shamburger read the report on Associational Sunday School work. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

Three Associational Sunday School rallies were held during the year just closed with an average attendance of more than 300. The first was held January 22 at Gaines Street Church and was a most successful meeting. Emphasis was on the adoption and use of the standards in promoting our Sunday School work. Mr. Harold Ingraham, business manager of our Sunday School Board in Nashville, Tennessee, was our speaker and he brought a very wonderful message.

The second rally was at Immanuel Church, April 16, and Dr. Hugh Bumpass of Oklahoma City was the guest spaker. Our conferences were designed to emphasize the importance of personal soul winning. Dr. Bumpass brought a splendid message, challenging everyone present to become a personal witness for our Lord.

Our third rally was at Pulaski Heights Church on July



16. This meeting came during our hottest summer weather and during vacation time. Though the attendance was not large we had one of our best and most helpful meetings. Conferences were held with emphasis on the use of the six point record system in promoting our Sunday School work. Rev. Charles Lawrence brought the inspirational message and everyone present was greatly blessed.

One of the objectives of your Sunday School organizations for this year was that every church in the association should have a Vacation Bible School. Out of 69 churches 36 have reported their schools with a total enrollment of 4,662 with an average attendance of 3,670. Seven mission schools were conducted, one a Negro school. We know of at least 13 churches that had schools but have not sent in their report.

If every church in Pulaski County Association would co-operate in our Associational Sunday School program we are sure that the quality of work done in all our Sunday Schools could be improved and thousands of new people could be brought into the fellowship of our churches.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL TRAINING UNION WORK

58. Ed Markert read the Associational Training Union Report. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

The last minutes of this Association reported 57 churches having Training Unions, an increase of two over the previous year. There were 490 individual unions, an increase of 58, and the total enrollment was 8,081, an increase of 744.

#### I. ACTIVITIES

In January Church Development Week was held during the worst blizzard experienced in 20 years. In spite of the weather, our Association led the State in this week of study.

The tournaments conducted for the special training of Juniors, Intermediates and Young People resulted in winners in each section participating in the State finals as representatives of Pulaski Association. All seven Juniors entered by us scored perfectly in the Memory Drill. Ben Joe McRoberts of Immanuel, our Speakers Tournament winner

was runner-up and Miss Martha Jane Wilson of First Church, Little Rock, was victorious in the State Sword Drill finals. Miss Wilson represented Arkansas in the Sword Drill at Ridgecrest this Summer.

During the past year the officers of our Training Union Association furnished faculties consisting of teachers for all departments for some 20 study courses. Most of these were in the smaller churches of the city and in rural areas. In addition many demonstration programs were presented and organizational work for new unions was done in unions where assistance was needed.

The "M Night" (Mobilization) attendance at First Church was 550 for our Association. This was second high in all the Associations of our State for the past year.

The quarterly meetings of our Training Union Association have brought together record numbers of workers this year exceeding all previous attendance figures. The average number present at these meetings has been 564. Every effort has been made to have unusually interesting and helpful programs and conferences and the response to these has been so outstanding that 470 were present at the last meeting in mid-August.

## II. AWARDS

Our Association had 1,779 Training Union Study Course awards issued between October 1, 1950 and October 1, 1951. For the six months period ending March 31st, our Association was the highest in the State in number of awards. No report is available as yet for the last six months.

## III. PLANS

The Training Union theme for 1952 is "Christ Speaks to His Churches." It is our plan to use every means possible to let Him speak through every union to the churches of our Association.

"M Night" is to be held this year on December 10th at Immanuel Church, Little Rock. We propose to have the greatest attendance of any association in the State and earnestly request the help of all our pastors and churches.

It is our desire to cooperate fully with the State Associational Officers Planning Meeting October 29, 1951. Also to promote attendance on the State Baptist Assembly at



Siloam Springs and the Southwide Training Union Assembly next Summer.

We will continue and increase our efforts in the promotion of Junior Memory work, Intermediate Sword Drills and the Speakers Tournaments for Young People. We also plan to inaugurate this coming year a program for the improvement of public reading of the Bible by adults. This will be known as the Adult Bible Reading Tournament and it is hoped that this will spread to other associations and eventually be adopted as a State project along with the tournaments for younger people.

We plan to intensively foster the crusade for daily Bible reading and family worship, prayer meeting attendance and the stewardship programs of our churches this year.

A full roster of Associational Training Union officers has been in active service throughout the entire year just passed without a single vacancy. This is being enlarged for the coming year because of a need for more than one conference for adults in the quarterly meetings, also because of the division in the Children's Work put into effect by the Sunday School Board.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MUSIC WORK

59. M. O. Kelley read the report on the Associational music work. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

The past associational year has been a joyful year. The churches have responded in a fine way. We have contacted every church in the association. Hymn-Sings have been well attended. From four to eight churches were represented at each one. Several choirs have rendered some very beautiful special numbers. We have conducted music for three revival meetings: Pine Grove; Cedar Heights; and Ramona, Oklahoma. We have held 35 Music Conferences and traveled some 3,000 miles and have made 18 talks on church music. We have conducted the following Hymn-Sings:

West Zone: 12  
South Zone: 10.  
North Zone: 10.  
North East Zone: 12.

The Simultaneous Church Music Emphasis Week which was observed by the churches of Pulaski County, April 8-13 was successful and promising. Nearly 500 people were enrolled in the school taught in four centrally located churches—Friendship, Ironton, South Highland, and Forty-Seventh Street. Faculty members included, Dr. B. B. McKinney, head of the Church Music Department in Nashville, Mrs. B. W. Nininger, Ray McClung of Hot Springs, Mrs. A. M. Norton of Oran, Missouri, and Mrs. Perry Parsons.

For the past few years the choirs of the Greater Little Rock Baptist Churches have joined together to form a Baptist Choral Club, and have presented interesting and uplifting music programs once each year. The work has progressed from year to year. Last year the program was presented at a joint Thanksgiving Service, at Immanuel Baptist Church under the direction of Mr. Hatcher Hoyt. The service was very beautiful and worshipful. Those who participated in it and heard it, felt that it should be an annual affair. During the Criswell Revival, June 25-July 8, the choir sang very effectively.

As a result of this fine contribution, a meeting was called to consider expanding the work of the Baptist Choral Club to include all singers of all churches in the association. The meeting was attended by directors from various churches and the following plans were developed:

1. Membership to include every choir singer in each church.
2. Meetings to be held each Fifth Sunday.
3. Two public services will be sung during 1951-52. The first of these programs is to be presented for the Arkansas Baptist State Convention on the evening of Wednesday, November 21, at the First Baptist Church, Mrs. Joe F. Simmons will direct and Mrs. W. H. Beck will play the organ. The second appearance of the Baptist Choral Club will be in a program for the State Training Union Convention on Friday evening, March 14, at the Robinson Auditorium. Mrs. B. W. Nininger will direct this service.

4. Results—More Music for More People—a finer fellowship in song—a more acceptable service to the Lord.

## ASSOCIATIONAL W. M. U. WORK

60. Mrs. J. D. Yerby read the report on the Associational W. M. U. work. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

Truly, members of Mission Union in Pulaski County have been "Laborers together with God" during the past year. Through their prayers, their gifts, their missionary training of young people, their mission study and their community missions, Christ has been made more real to the Baptists of Pulaski County.

Out of the 577 Women's Missionary Societies and 1,365 Young Peoples Auxiliaries reported in Arkansas, Pulaski County has 54 Women's Missionary Societies and 154 Young Peoples Auxiliaries.

Emphasis was placed on Home, State and Foreign Missions seasons of prayer with special offerings on each occasion—\$15,956.95 for Foreign Missions and \$3,366.43 for Home Missions. Reports on the September State Missions offering are incomplete.

The work has been organized and reorganized in seven churches with 14 new young peoples auxiliaries.

More than 300 mission study classes have been taught throughout the county under the leadership of Mrs. U. R. Tracy, mission study chairman and Mrs. E. A. Ingram, field worker.

Mrs. C. H. Ray, stewardship chairman, reports 640 new tithers.

Mrs. W. J. Mooney, community missions chairman, reports five institutions in the county where the Sunday School lessons have been taught and other personal service rendered. Reports reflect that more than 700 women and young people have been engaged in definite soul-winning efforts.

\$360.00 has been given this year toward the support of Miss Chico Sato, a student in Ouachita College. Miss Sato will return to Japan to teach among her own people.

Six of the associational officers attended a State Leadership Conference at Petit Jean, September 25-26, 1951. Much inspiration and information was received at this conference.

Under the leadership of the new associate superintendent, Mrs. W. J. Mooney, plans are in the making for securing a key woman in each of the five zones of the Association to enlist other churches in organizing a W. M. S. as well as young peoples auxiliaries.

One of our goals for the new year is a full-graded W. M. U. in every church in the Association.

We want to appeal to the pastors to place your W. M. S. in your new church budget. Support your W. M. S. with your presence and your prayers.

The plan and purpose of Jesus Christ is that each individual Christian shall live a Christ-like life, be possessed by a living passion for the saving of the souls of men, and shall give himself to that service right where he lives.

### ASSOCIATIONAL BROTHERHOOD WORK

61. Mr. E. C. Moryer gave the report on the work of the Brotherhood. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

Brotherhood continues its perennial march towards the day when every Baptist church in our state shall have a Brotherhood. Approximately 302 churches in the Arkansas Baptist State Convention now have Brotherhood organizations.

Forty of our forty-four associations have one or more functioning Brotherhoods. Thirty of these associations have associational Brotherhood organizations.

The purposes and objectives of the Brotherhood movement are spiritual purposes and spiritual objectives. The Brotherhood program of work is designed to discover men, enlist men, and utilize men for Christ. In the Brotherhood the men meet together, sing together, pray together, talk together, plan together, and work together to advance every phase of the work of God's Kingdom through their church and denomination.

The Brotherhood ideals are constant. They are: Devotion, Stewardship, and Evangelism. Generally, these are expressed as personal consecration, personal stewardship, and personal soul-winning. From these three ideals stems the whole program of Brotherhood endeavor.

A church is a different church when it has a working Brotherhood. It is a better church, and a more effective church. For God's work waits on men. And the effectiveness of any church is largely determined by the extent to which the men of that church are enlisted in the whole program of the church.

We heartily recommend that every church in Pulaski Count Association give earnest consideration to Brotherhood organization and work. Now is the time!

Pulaski County Association has 33 church Brotherhoods.

REPORT OF STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN  
MISSIONS

62. Pastor W. H. Hicks read the report on State, Home and Foreign Missions. Motion that report be adopted. Carried.

## STATE MISSIONS

The Department of State Missions in Arkansas is directed by Dr. C. W. Caldwell. Through him and the missionaries of the department Arkansas Baptists seek to support a work of the gospel in every needy place. In conjunction with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention this department has also assumed the responsibility of the City Mission program, a ministry of growing importance because of the rapid movement of population from rural to urban centers.

The workers in this division of our Baptist work support and develop every spiritual purpose in which Baptists believe. Evangelism claims much of the attention of all and each. The Evangelistic Conference in January a meeting of great influence and helpfulness. All causes of Arkansas Baptists gain strength as our State Missions forces give loyalty and encouragement to our institutions, our southwide and foreign missionary interests.

The Mission Department of our State Convention continues to supplement Associational Missionaries' salaries, assists many weak churches maintain pastors on the field, gives aid to building programs in critical cases, encourages and assists financially the Negro Baptist work in Arkansas, maintains a chaplain at the Booneville Sanatorium. The missionaries of the Board have had fruitful revivals during the last twelve months.

## HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission program of Southern Baptists becomes increasingly significant as the complexities of modern life effect the lives of people. With the territory of the Convention being multiplied in recent years, including new states and areas, the Home Missionary obligation is magnified. The San Francisco Convention adopted a plan for missionary leaders. The exodus of people to the commercial and industrial centers of the land has brought weakness to many of our rural churches. Yet our rural churches have been and remain a chief asset of Southern Baptists and cer-



tainly of our Lord. Spiritual, educational, and financial assistance is rendered our country churches by our Home Board.

With the goal, "A Baptist church within reach of every person," the program of Home Missions has greatly increased our efforts in the urban centers. The goal of 10,000 new missions in five years set forth by parent churches is an ambitious plan supported by the Home Mission effort. Also in this same five years we are challenged to have 5,000 new churches. An expanding America demands an expanding faith, wider horizons and deeper loyalties if Southern Baptists are to be faithful people of God.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

With a world now one world in communications and transportation, our Lord's commission for one world spiritually is taking on a new urgency. With the divisive forces of greed, racial prejudice, political distrust, and spiritual inertia and confusion playing upon the world scene where the countless multitudes live their insecure lives, our Lord's commission to evangelize the world has renewed meaning. With Communism seeking to win the support of those who, in their state of desperation, are seeking some kind of a promised deliverance, it is imperative that Baptists give their best to that four-fifths of the earth's population which some leaders of world thought say lack the minimum requirements for food, shelter and clothing. Their spiritual poverty and need is even greater. Our Foreign Mission program is our affirmation of the Lord's teaching that God is no respecter of persons. Our Foreign Mission Board now supports about 800 missionaries, made possible by the gifts of about 7,000,000 Southern Baptists.

"Every Baptist a Tither" would transform and greatly accentuate our foreign mission enterprise. God's call for the Christian to support the gospel with his money is as definite as is His call for the dedication of life for world missions.

We recommend that tithing be constantly and prayerfully preached and taught as God's method of financing His causes and that churches prayerfully consider the proportion of dollar income that is sent to missions from the church treasury, to the end that churches shall be fair and faithful in supporting causes beyond themselves, even as individuals

should be faithful in practicing scriptural giving of the tithe.
