## MINUTES,

### First Day.

Saturday, Sept. 23.—The association met with Oak Bower at 10 o'clock a. m. Moderator Tatum called the body together. After devotional exercises Elder J. W. Comer preached the introductory sermon from John vii, 16.

Eld. P. C. Mays, J. D. Moore and Jno. Nesbitt were appointed as reading clerks. Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

At 1:30 p. m. met pursuant to adjournment. The roll was called. The following committee on divine service was appointed: Elders P. C. Mays, Bros. Robert A. Rowe, D. W. Bryan, J. S. Renfrow, and the deacons of Oak Bower church.

Report of committee on divine service that Elder F. F. Gibson lecture on his tour to London at 7:30 to-night.

The following resolutions after some discussion, were adopted; To amend article 2 of constitution so as to read as follows: It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers, and all ordained ministers belonging to said churches are messengers without election. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional member.

Bro. John E. Tatum was elected moderator and Elder J. K. Whelchel, Clerk. On motion the clerk cast the entire ballot of the association for W. A. Mayfield for treasurer.

The following committee was appointed to make out the committees provided for in the constitution. Elders H. L. Been, P. C. Mays, Neely, Bro. R. A. Rowe, and D. W. Bryan.

Sub Rosa Church was admitted on petition by letter.

The following corresponding messengers were seated:

Binum. Visiting brethren were invited to seats and council. Adjourned till 7:30.

Elder F. F. Gibson lectured at 7:30 on his trip to Europe.

### Second Day.

Sunday 9:30 A. M. Sunday School mass meeting opened by singing. Report of committee on Sunday School was read. On motion report was recommitteed to committee and deferred till Monday. After song dismissed for preaching.

Called together at 11 a. m. by song, prayer by Eld. Nathen Keller. Eld. F. F. Gibson preached Text Matt. 26--8. A collection was taken for Associational Missions amounting to \$45 Adjourned meet at 3 p. m.

At 3 p. m. Sunday Eld. P. C. Mays lectured on Temperance. After lecture, pledges were taken to pay for tabernacle amounting in money and pledges to \$142.15. Adjourned till 7:30 p. m.

At 7:30, song. Prayer by H. L. Been. Sermon by Eld. Ben M. Bogard. Subject: The origin, the Perpetuity, and Doctrine of the Church of Jesus Christ; prayer by Eld. Woodard. On motion adjourned to 8:30 Monday.

### Third Day

Monday, 8:30 a. m. A motion was offered by Bro. O. Echols to send Eld. T. J. Woodard as a messenger from second church Ft. Smith, motion prevailed.

Further we recommend that as citizens we vote for men to fill the offices who will try to enact and enforce such laws as will stop the sale of intoxicating drinks of any kind. ### Report Committee Religious Literature.

First and above all, we should read and study the bible, and take it for the "man of our council." For Sunday School helps we recommend the Southern Baptist Convention publications and the American Baptist Publication helps. Your committee regards both of these helps as being sound in Baptist principles, and we will make no mistake in selecting either. For family reading we recommend the Baptist Flag and the Baptist Advance.

### Sunday Schools.

We believe the Sabbath School should be the church teaching faithfully the word of God. The bible says more about teaching the word of God than it does about preaching. Jesus taught in the synagogue as well as preached. No church can comply fully with its commission and be without a Sunday school. God commands his people to search the scriptures, and the Sunday school is the only organization of the church adapted to this purpose. The usefulness of the Sunday school is attested by the fact that a large proportion of those who join the churches come through the Sunday school. Therefore the obligation of every church to maintain a Sunday school is apparent. It is the duty of every

man to give his support to the Sunday school—his personal presence if possible—at least his moral and financial support. From the letters to the association we find that only about one-half of the churches maintain Sunday schools. Therefore we recommend that each church in this association organize and maintain a Baptist Sunday school, and that each member of every Baptist church lend his support to it. Frank Spiller, R. We then met in March and selected Bro. Evins as associational missionary, his work to begin on the 15th of April 1905. We find that Bro Evins has put his entire time in the work since that date till now.

He has traveled 687 miles. Preached 127 sermons. Made 165 religious visits, 10 visits to the sick. Professions of conversions 83. Organized one church. Ordained or assisted 8 deacons. Received on field \$44.16. Church pledges collected



\$65.99. For which work we have paid the missionary Bro. Evins in full.
