Prohibition.

We, your committee on prohibition, report that we find that the sentiment against the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage is increasing in the minds of our people, and also with all morally disposed people, and while this is true we believe that this sentiment demands a practical confronting. We therefore recommend that the churches of this associstion demand that the members totally abstain from drinking any intoxicants, and if they will not desist, deal with them for unchristian conduct. We further recommend that if any church in this association retain in its membership anyone who is guilty of drunkenness, that this body withdraw associational fellowship from such church. recommend that as citizens we vote for men to fill the offices who will try to enact and enforce such laws as will stop the sale of intoxicating drinks of any kind. Report Committee Religious Literature.

First and above all, we should read and study the bible, and take it for the "man of our council." For Sunday School helps we recommend the Southern Baptist Convention publications and the American Baptist Publication helps. Your committee regards both of these helps as being sound in Baptist principles, and we will make no mistake in selecting either. For family reading we recommend the Baptist Flag and the Baptist Advance.

Sunday Schools.

We believe the Sabbath School should be the church teaching faithfully the word of God. The bible says more about teaching the word of God than it does about preaching. Jesus taught in the synatogue as well as preached. No church can comply ully with its commission and be without a Sunday chool. God commands his people to search the criptures, and the Sunday school is the only organization of the church adapted to this purpose. The isefulness of the Sunday school is attested by the fact that a large proportion of those who join the churches come through the Sunday school. Therefore the obligation of every church to maintain a Sunday school is apparent. It is the duty of every

man to give his support to the Sunday school—his personal presence if possible—at least his moral and financial support. From the letters to the association we find that only about one-half of the churches maintain Sunday schools. Therefore we recommend that each church in this association organize and maintain a Baptist Sunday school, and that each member of every Baptist church lend his support to it. Frank Spiller, R. Foreign Missions

Report on Womans Work

We, your committee on woman's work beg leave to submit the following: Women have been a potent factor in church work since the days of our Savior. They sympathized with him in his persecutions and like Aron and Herr held up his hands and the hands of his disciples, while they preached the gospel to a dying world.

There are many more women in our churches than men; and they are the most devoted and effictive workers. They have raised thousands of dollars through their missionary and other societies, and while they do not personally preach the word they have sent and are maintaining hundreds of preachers in the field. Many hearts of missionaries their wives and little ones have been made glad by the bountiful boxes of nice clothing and other family articles down to the Santa Claus doll for the baby, that have been sent to the faithful missionaries by these devoted bands of christian women.

The Ladies Aid of the First Baptist Church of Fort Smith have raised for church purposes this associational year the magnificient sum as follows: The Greenwood society has in its treasury \$140. We are not fortunate enough to have before us the statistics of the other societies in this association; but it is fair to presume that they have each raised proportionate amounts. Wherever these ladies' societies have been organized, we feel justly proud of the great work they have accomplished and we earnestly urge the ladies of all the churches to organize such societies and bring the tithes into the storehouse and prove the Lord that he may open the windows of Heaven and pour us out a blessing that the earth itself cannot contain. That the chords of Zion may be lengthened that she may run and be glorified.

I Geo W. Evans, Missionary of the Concord Association beg leave to submit this as my report, commencing April. 14, 1905. Time actually engaged 5½ mo's. Miles traveled 687. Sermons preached 127. Religious visits 165. Visits to sick 10. Professions of conversions 83. Baptised 4. By Letter 6. Churches organized 1. Deacons Ordained 8.

Missionary.

Report of Executive Committee

Immediately after the adjournment of the last association we elected J. A. Hall as missionary at a salary of \$500 or 600 provided he could collect the one hundred on the field. He entered into work and continued until Christmas when he left the work for which service we paid him.

We then met in March and selected Bro. Evins as associational missionary, his work to begin on the 15th of April 1905. We find that Bro Evins has put his entire time in the work since that date till

now.

He has traveled 687 miles. Preached 127 sermons. Made 165 religious visits, 10 visits to the sick. Professions of conversions 83. Organized one church. Ordained or assisted 8 deacons. Received on field \$44.16. Church pledges collected

\$65.99. For which work we have paid the missionary Bro. Evins in full.
