MINUTES.

The Spring River Baptist Association met in its 49th sesslon with Lebanon Church, Sharp County, Ark., on Saturday, September 22, 1917.

Bro. G, W. Helm preached a good sermon on the "Setting Up of the Kingdom", after which the Clerk called the body to prder. Bro. J. L. Hill was elected temporary moderator. The roll of churches was called with the following result.

Motion and second that Bro. J. A. Abee read the circular letter written by him. The letter was read and adopted. Motion and second that a copy of the letter be sent to the Baptist & Commoner.

The Committee on Divine Service reported that Bro. J. D Butler preach at 7:30 P. M. and Bro. Bogard at 11 A. M., Sun day. By motion and second the body went into the selection of a place to hold the next session. Pleasant Grove was select ed for the place, Bro. J. L. Hill to preach the introductory mon and Bro. Bob Penn to write the circular letter. Com. on Sunday School—Ray Pickett, H. A. Moore and W. J. Field.

A collection was taken for the Texarkana Orphans' Home which amounted to \$11.91.

Circular Letter.

Fellow Messengers of Spring River Baptist Association:-

In compliance with the wish you expressed at the last session of the body. I submit the following.

My subject is: God's Reward to His Children for Services.

Many people never learn to make a distinction between the gift of eternal life, and the REWARD for services to God. Thinking that eternal life is all that is promised them. and believing "He that heareth my word, and believeth on Him that sent me hath everlasting life, And SHALL NOT come into condemnation, but is passed from death unto life."—John v:24., they grow careless and fail to serve the Master as they should and are thereby deprived of their reward. This being a fact, (as I see it) is the reason I have chosen this subject.

Our worship to God is two-fold in its nature: The first step is to exercise faith; the second is to serve the Lord. The blessing obtained by exercising faith is eternal life: that obtained by the second is reward. A reward is something paid for service done. The bible promises us a reward. Salvation, being a free our, can not be that reward. Paul says "The wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life."—Rom. vi:23. Therefore, salvation being a free gift, we can do nothing to merit it, else it ceases to be a gift and becomes a reward. It is a manifestation of God's sovereign love toward us.

Again, Paul says: "By grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: Not of works. lest any man should boast."—Eph. 11:8, 9. Again: "If by grace then is it no more of works: otherwise grace is no more grace." —Rom. x1:6.

But the Lord manifests his love toward us still further by offering us a reward for acceptable service. This reward is to be given at Christ's second coming.—"And behold I come quickly: and my reward is with me to give to every man as his works shall be."—Rev. xxu:12. Now, this reward is not eternal life, or salvation. because "He that believeth on the son hath everlasting life."—John un:36. To the woman Jesus said "Thy faith HATH saved thee."—Luke vu:50; He said the same to the blind man-Luke xviii:42. Paul said (Eph. 11:5) by grace ARE ye saved.

And he says every man's work shall be made manifest; for the day shall declare it because it shall be revealed by fire; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work abide which he hath built thereupon he shall receive a REWARD. If any man's works shall be burned he shall suffer loss, but he himself shall be saved yet so as by fire.— 1. Gor. un:13, 14, 15.

Paul realized that there was a CROWN for him to wear after he should leave this world.—II. Tim. IV:8. Was this CROWN laid up for Paul because he had believed? No, this crown was to be given him because he had fought a good fight for the Lord. It was given him for his faithful service.—II. Tim. IV:7.

This REWARD is sometimes called a crown, "be thou faithful until death and I will give thee a CROWN of life.—Rev. 11:10.

Now, this crown is something which might be lost: "Hold thou fast which thou hast that no man take thy CROWN.—Rev. III:11.

The Bible seems to convey the idea that this crown will have jewels in it depending on our service done. Other places it seems to hold out other rewards. This REWARD is referred to in Rev. 11:12—"Him that overcometh I will make a pillar, and I will write on him my NEW NAME, etc." Whatever these rewards may be we may rest assured they will be of the Lord, while the REWARD we receive will depend entirely on the character of our service. Then is it not a joyful thought to know that our salvation is in the hands of one mightier than we.

What a precious inspiration, that if we serve Him faithfully, that by and by we will wear that beautiful CROWN given us as a REWARD for our Service.

Brethren, can we not resolve to begin anew to do MORE in the service of our Master, who has promised us so much.
