FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The past year has witnessed the conversion of hundreds on the foreign fields. Never before perhaps in the history of christianity have the followers of Christ manifested such interest in the salvation of the heathen. We have missions in China, Africa, Japan, Italy, Mexico and Brazil. All of these are in a flourishing condition

God is the author of this work. He started it because he loved the world.

The work can but continue fruitful because we have the promised power of Christ behind the command "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Satan has done all in his power to oppose and retard the progress of this work, using ignorance, superstition and wickedness in the heathen lands and selfishness, negligence and other sins in Christian lands; so that today there are two thirds of the race groping in the darkness of sin. Yet in the past century we have made great advancement in missions and it has brought glorious results in foreign lands and blessed results in the church and Christian lands.

Statistics show that out of every \$50.00 given by our churches only \$1.00 is given to foreign missions and that at home we have one preacher to every 750. We have whole cities and territories in heathen countries without a gospel preacher. No voice warning them of the perils of sin and of an ineffable hell and no invitation to God through a loving Savior.

With these conditions before us does it not pain you to see how little Concord Association has given during the past year to this work. And does not the command of Christ, his promised strength, and the blessings of God in the past inspire and urge you to greater efforts in this cause?

We would recommend that no church however weak pass through another year without making an offering to

this work.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

While we recognize the fact that most of the churches of this association need more preaching than they are now getting; yet we think that in the wisdom of God we should now at this time concentrate our efforts in occupying those destitute fields.

Therefore we recommend that this Association either in session or by its executive committee employ a Missionary and put him in the field for his full time; and that his work be confined to the destitution and not to churches which have pastors. That collections and pledges be taken at this time.

LADIES AUXILIARY CONSTITUTION

NAME.

Art. 1. This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of Concord Association.

OBJECT.

Art. 2. The purpose of this Auxiliary is to aid our brethren in all the causes fostered by our Baptist Charles.

MEMBERSHIP.

Art. 3. This Auxiliary shall be composed of one delegate from each local Auxiliary or Aid Society having fifty members or less. Each additional twenty five members shall entitle the society to one additional delegate. The President of each local society and the officers of this body shall be ex-officio delegates.

OFFICERS.

Art. 4. The officers shall be: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Corresponding and Traveling Secretary.

MEETINGS.

Art. 5. This Auxiliary shall meet at the time and place of the Association.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

- Art. 6. Sec. 1. The duties of President shall be those usual to such office.
- Sec. 2. The duties of Vice President shall be to act instead of the president in her absence.
- Sec. 3. The duties of Secretary shall be to keep a faithful record of all proceedings of the meetings.
- Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all money's belonging to the Auxiliary and shall pay same only as directed by the Auxiliary.
- Sec. 5. The duty of the Corresponding and Traveling Secretary shall be to correspond with all societies organized in the Association and to travel in destitute places

stirring up interest among our women and organizing them into societies.

CONSTITUTION.

ART. I. This Association shall be known as the Concord Association.

ART. II. It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three Messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional Messenger.

ART. III. The officers shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. IV. SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body according to parlimentary usage.

SECTION 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the Minutes, keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

SECTION 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, or its Executive Committee, and render an account of the same to the annual session of this body.

ART. V. The object of this association shall be to promote Fellowship among the Churches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation, and especially to cultivate the piety of the Churches, and to aid in this last object several minutes of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

ART. VI., SECTION 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the Churches, but will act as advisory counsel whenever it shall be necessary.

SEC. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the Churches, and will withdraw from and disown all Churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ART VII. Newly organized Churches; or Churches dismissed from other associations, may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and Messengers at our annual meeting, and subscribing by their Messenger to the abstract of principles herewith published.

ART. VIII. Churches may be dismissed from the

Association upon application at the annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association, but any Church departing from us without being regularly dismissed,

shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. IX, SEC. 1. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers of the body with five members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting. The duty of this Committee shall be to superintend the Missionary operations of the Association, and represent it in all matters requiring their attention when the Association is not in session. The Committee shall report annually at each meeting of the Association. Three members of said Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Upon appointment said Committee shall come together and arrange their meetings and take such other steps as may be to the interest of the cause of Christ.

SEC. 2. The regular Committees of this Association shall be as follows: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Associational Missions, Sunday School Missions, Education, Ministerial Support, Prohibition, Religious Literature, Digest of Letters, Nominations, Queries, Finance. Order of Business, Woman's Work.

Orphan's Home.

ART. X. It shall be the privilege of the Association, through its Executive Committee, in addition to the power already granted, to conduct Missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to choose a Missionary or Missionaries, as means may allow, and designate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through its treasurer out of any funds in its hands except the money sent for publishing Minutes of every annual meeting.

ART. XI. The annual meeting of the Association shall embrace the Lord's Day and shall begin at 10 o'clock a. m., on Saturday before the fourth Lord's Day in September, at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association shall

adjourn at 11 o'clock for preaching.

ART. XII. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Article VI. Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-third vote of the members who are it attendance.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION.

ART. XIII. 1st. No person shall serve as Moderator of this body more than two terms in succession.

Adopted in 1882.

2nd. The Constitution shall be published annually in the Minutes of this Association. Adopted in 1893.

3d. Missionary sermon is placed in the hands of

Divine Service Committee. Adopted in 1894.

4th. Each church is expected to send to each annual meeting of the Association, by the hands of its Messengers, a sum of money to be used for printing Minutes. Adopted in 1895.

5th. All moneys collected by the Association during its several sessions shall be under the control of this As-

sociation.

6th. It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three Messengers, and all ordained ministers belonging to said churches are Messengers without election. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional Messenger. Adopted in 1905.

7th. The Association shall begin at 10 o'clock a. m.

on Friday. Adopted 1905.

8th. The Association shall begin at 10 o'clock a.m. on Saturday. Adopted 1906.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one and only one true and living God, Jehovah, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, constituting the only all-sufficient standard of Faith, Doctrine, Discipline

and Practice.

- 3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of the eternal love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen His people in Christ before the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children, through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by His power through Faith unto Salvation.
- 4. We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his Maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness and brought death upon his race, who, being by natural descent in the unholy image of Adam, are children of wrath by nature, and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy

state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace

through faith in Jesus Christ, and no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth and the conditions thereof are repentance and faith; the evidence thereof love to the brethren.

7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life, and they are kept by the

power of God through faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseperable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God.

9. A Christian Church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have covenated together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges of the New Testament appertaining to the Church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of Christian Churches'

are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons.

11. Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit by a reg-

ularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance of Jesus Christ, to be observed in the Church as such in remembrance of Christ, and to show forth His death till He comes.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's Day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties.

14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.

2. An introductory sermon shall be preached by a minister chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon to be preached by an alternate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

3. A committee of arrangements, consisting of five members, besides the Moderator and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report the "Order of Business."

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may

be invited to seats, but not to vote.

2. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make an appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address the Moderator, and upon obtaining leave

shall proceed.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject or use words of personal reflection, and then by the Moderator.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association by yeas and nays

or otherwise.

9. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

10. No member shall speak more than twice on one

subject without permission from the Moderator.

11. The appellation of 'Brother' shall be used in the Association by the members in their addresses one to the other. Titles that are unknown to the Scriptures, such as "Reverend," "Parson," and the like, shall not be employed nor appear upon the Minutes.

12. The names of members shall be called as often

as the Association may direct.

- 13. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.
- 14. Any person violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.
- 15. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this association by a majority vote of the members present.
