New Light Church, Saturday, Oct. 22, 1898.

The Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association convened in its twenty-ninth annual session, with New Light Church, Clay county, Arkansas, October 22, 1898. The introductory was preached by Eld. J. S. Haden at 11 o'clock a. m. His text was John 4:39.

The former moderator being absent, the clerk called the body to per. Eld. J. D. J. Faulkner was chosen moderator pro tem. The body was led in prayer by Eld. Giles C. Taylor.

On motion, adjourned to 1:30 p. m. for refreshments. Benediction by Eld. J. H. Peay, editor of the Baptist Gleanor.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 p. m. the association was called to order and business resumed. Letters from the churches were called for and read. Twenty-two churches were present by letters and messengers.

On motion, the body went into election of its

permanent officers. Eld. J. D. J. Faulkner was elected moderator; H. Halcomb, elerk; Eld. T. L. B. Thorn, treasurer.

Petitionery letters were called for.

Corresponding messengers were called for: Eld. J. H. Peay was enrolled as such from Mt. Zion Association.

Visiting brethren were then invited to seats in the body and to participate in the deliberations. Elds. Giles C. Taylor, financial agent for Central Baptist College, Conway, Ark., and C. D. Owens, of Mt. Zion Association, accepted the invitation.

On motion, adjourned to 7 p. m. Prayer by Eld. J. R. Halcomb.

The body convened at 7 o'clock p. m., and after preaching by Eld. J. R. Halcomb, on the subject of the "Security of the Believer," the association resumed business. The moderator then read out the committees mentioned above.

On motion, adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock a.m. in Sunday school mass meeting, conducted by Bro. V. A. Phillips. At this time the committee on Sunday schools was to make their report. Prayer by Eld. E. D. Cooper.

SUNDAY MORNING.

The association met at 9 o'clock a. m., and after singing and prayer by Eld. E. J. Teague, the committee made their report on

Sunday Schools.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, submit our report as follows: After having heard the church letters read, and observing that not exceeding one-fourth of the churches in the Gainesville Association report Sunday schools, we are impressed with the importance of urging each church to organize a

school at once, and to use sound Baptist literature as well as to select Godly Baptist teachers and officers. Because if we do not teach the rising generation the truth of the Bible, they will be taught wrong and led into error. We further recommend each Sunday school to purchase black-boards, maps and Bible picture lessons, which may be obtained of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn. We further hope that each church will realize that it is impossible to carry out the command of the Savior, in the fullest sense, who said, "Go preach the gospel to every creature," without a Sunday school.

On motion, it was received for discussion. Speeches to this report were made by Elds. J. R. Halcomb, C. D. Owens, E. D. Cooper, E. J. Teague, G. H. Faulkner, J. D. J. Faulkner and Bro. V. A. Phillips. On motion, further discussion was deferred until Monday.

At 11 o'clock Eld. Giles C. Taylor preached to a large and attentive congregation at the Baptist church, and Eld. G. H. Faulkner at the residence of Bro. Wimberly. At night Eld. E. D. Cooper preached from the subject, "Pure Religion."

A journed to Monday morning. Benediction by moderator.

MONDAY MORNING.

October 24, 1898.

The association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Bro. J. J. Burton. The roll was called and the messengers answered to their names. The minutes of Saturday and Sunday were read, amended and adopted.

The committee made their report on

Ministerial Education.

We, your committee on Ministerial Education, submit our report as follows: Whereas, the Bible admonishes us to study to show ourselves workmen that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth, giving to each his portion in due season; and whereas, we have several young men who have entered the ministry and are striving to educate and prepare themselves so that they might better do the work enjoined upon them. We recommend that the entire Gainesville Association give all possible aid to the support of this great undertaking.

Com. ELD. J. R. HALCOMB, V. A. PHILLIPS, J. N. MINETREE.

The above report was amended by adding the following paragraph:

"And in as much as our beloved brethren, J. S.
Rogers and Neely Meredith, have already entered
Ouachita College, be it resolved, that we urge the
churches of this association to help them to complete
their education in this school."

During the discussion of this report, a collection of \$7.50 was taken for this object. The report was then adopted.

Home Missions.

The following is the report: We, your committee on Home Missions, would report that we find

the field covered by the Home Board is a vast one, including the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, Mexico, Indian Territory, Oklahomá, Cuba and Porto Rico. We have many men on those fields in the destitutions, among them Dr. Diaz in Cuba. Those men are looking to the Home Board for support while filling the destitutions. The Home Board pays 50c for every dollar we raise in Arkansas, which funds are spent in our state. Therefore, we recommend our people to co-operate with the Home Board, as every dollar we raise is worth one dollar and fifty cents to Arkansas.

Emphasis was given to this report, urging the churches to enlarge along the line of Home Mission work.

The committee then made its report on

Foreign Missions.

Your committee would report as follows: The great work of the church of Christ is to give the pure gospel to the entire world. The field of our operation is exceeding broad. We must work in Jerusalem, in Judia, in Samaria and unto and in the uttermost parts of the earth. Go into all the world; teach all nations; preach the gospel to every creature. District, State and Home Missions are important, but Foreign Missions must not be neglected. Let the perishing nations have our sympathies, let our brethren on foreign fields have our prayers and material support. Let our contributions be so generous that more laborers may be sent into the harvest. The Board is worthy our utmost confidence. Let all our churches give it their most hearty support. Let the organ of the Board, the Foreign Mis-

sion Journal, be put into the homes of all our beloved people. Respectfully submitted,

The committee on State and Associational Missions made the following report:

State and Associational Missions.

As to State Missions, we would recommend that we, as the Gainesville Association, co-operate with the State Board and that the churches in our bounds earnestly solicit regular contributions to this work and send the same to the secretary of the State Board. We should co-operate both in theory and practice. Viewing the destitution in the bounds of the Gainesville Association, and being taught of God that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation, and in obedience to the command of our Lord and Master to preach the gospel to every creature, we urge that we place a strong man in the fields of destitution for as much of the time as possible. would recommend that the moderator appoint five brethren to constitute an associational board of missions, whose duty it will be to look out the destitution in our bounds and point out the field to be cultivated by the missionary; also fix the salary of the missionary, and keep an itemized account of all contributions received and moneys paid out by them, and make a report of same to the body at its next annual session. We further urge the messengers representing the churches to urge upon their respective churches the necessity of contributing to associational work; to take collections from time to time and forward same to the board.

On motion, the executive board was empowered to employ as well as fix the salary of the missionary.

The Sunday school report was then taken up, discussed and adopted.

A recess was taken until 2 o'clock p. m. Eld. J. H. Peay then preached a sermon on "The Angel and the Gospel." Benediction by Eld. T. L. B. Thorn.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

The association convened at 2 o'clock, and was led in prayer by Eld. G. H. Faulkner, After some discussion, the State and Associational Mission report was adopted.

NEXT ASSOCIATION.

On motion, Piggott was chosen as the place for the next session of the association. Eld. J. R. Halcomb was elected to preach the introductory sermon; Eld. J. D. J. Faulkner, as alternate.

TIME.

On motion, the time for the next meeting was changed to Thursday at 10 o'clock before the fourth Sabbath in October, 1899.

On motion, dispensed with preaching tonight. Adjourned to 7 o'clock. Benediction by Eld. J. H. Peay.

At 7 o'clock p. m. the association convened, led in prayer by Eld. J. K. Pate. The moderator appointed the following

On Publication.

We, your committee on publications, respectfully submit the following: The Bible should ever be the book of our study, the rule and guide to our faith and practice. We believe, however, that every Baptist in our association should read some Baptist paper. We recommend the Baptist Gleaner, published by Eld. J. H. Peay; the Arkansas Baptist, and also the literature for Sunday schools published by the American Baptist Publication Society and the Southern Baptist Convention.

then made their report: The management of brother and sister Gardiner has been very economical and in all respects satisfactory. Several homeless and

helpless children have found good christian homes through this institution. There are at present eighteen orphans in the Home. More room is badly needed and our people are urged to give liberally that the contemplated addition may be erected at once.

The Executive Board

Made the following report which was adopted: Soon after our last association we met and organized by electing Bro. W. H. Weatherly, chairman, and Bro. J. J. Burton, secretary. We employed Eld. J. D. J. Faulkner as missionary, at a salary of \$40 per month. We sent him to the following mission points: Rector, for one-fourth time; Bark Camp Island, Delaplaine, one-fourth time, and Jones' Ridge for one-fourth time. The other fourth time to do general mission work. He commenced work the first of February, 1898, and worked for five and one-fourth months, for which we have paid him one hundred and ninety-nine dollars and twenty-six cents, leaving a balance on hand of twenty-two dollars and fifty eight cents.
