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# MINUTES

PRAIRIE GROVE CHURCH, PRAIRIE COUNTY, ARK. ) Nov. 28th, 1875.

According to agreement the following named churches formerly belonging to the Mount Vernon and Caroline Associations, viz:

DeWitt, Rising Sun, Mill Bayou, New Hope, Mt. Zion, St. Charles, Bayou Meto, Swan Lake, Liberty, and Prairie Grove, met with Prairie Grove Church, Prairie county, Ark., for the purpose of organizing a new Association.

The meeting was called to order by Elder T. A. Haman, and on motion Elder J. T. Marshall was made Moderator, and

Elder H. Halliburton, Clerk pro tem.

After reading a portion of Scripture and singing the 262 hymn of Southern Psalmist, and prayer by the brother Moderator, it was announced that the Introductory Sermon was first in order, and on motion the delegates representing Praihe Grove Church, with their pastor, were granted the priviege of selecting the one of their choice, to preach said sermon; thereupon Elder F. M. Freeman was chosen; who preached very forcible and interesting sermon, upon the subject of he chutch, from 12th chapter, 28th verse, of Hebrews.

#### 2 o'clock P. M.

After a short intermission the meeting assembled for busiless.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to have as many copies f the minutes printed as the money on hand would admit of, eserving sufficient to pay postage for distributing the same.

On motion the Executive board was instructed to employ Missionary at the earliest practicable moment.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE GRAND PRAIRIE ASSOCIATION.

#### ARTBCLE I.

This body shall be known by the name of Grand Prairie Baptist Association, and composed of members chosen by the different churches in the union, who, a producing letters shall be entitled to seats.

#### ART. II.

The letters from the churches must state the number of members baptised, eccived by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded, the name and post fice of the pastor and clerk.

## ART. III.

The members thus chosen and convened, shall have no power to infringe on my of the rights of the churches, but may act as an advisary council for the remon good of all the churches and advancement of the Redcemers kingdom, ad have power to exclude any church from her fellowship which may depart om the gospel of Christ, either in faith or practice.

#### ART. IV.

Every church composing this Association shall be entitled to three delegates.

#### ART. V.

Should any church fail to represent herself for two consecutive years she by be droped from the list of churches, should a stisfactory reason not be tren.

# ART. VI:

New churche- may be admitted into this body who petition by letter us delegates, if found to be sound in the faith and in good order, the reception be manife-ted by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellow-hip to mean. gers.

### ART. VII.

. This A-sociation shall annually elect a Moderator from among themselves whose uty it shall be to see that the Rules of D. corum are observed, and the the voice of the Association on all questions properly brought before it, alon Clerk elected, whose duty it shall be to keep a correct record of all the builton of the Association, also a Treasurer to receive and disburse the funds sent n to the Association as directed by the body, or churches sending the same

#### ART. VII.

This Association shall in all case be governed by a majority of the member present, except in the reception and dismission of a church, which that he unanimous.,

#### ART. IX.

This Ass cittion may correspond with other Associations and Conventious may be agreed upon while in session.

#### ART, X.

It shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a minister to preachable troductory Sermon with an alternate, also one with an alternate to practi Missionary Sermon at each succeeding session and to fix the time and places: the next meeting of the body.

## ART. XI.

This c. nstitution may be altered or amended at any time by a two-third we of the members present, except that clause in the third article which prohib the interference with the internal rights of the churches which shall force - remain in tact.

#### ART, XII.

The minutes shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

- Art. 1. The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer
- Art. 2. The Modertor, Clerk and Treasurer, shall be elected by ballet by the members present.

Art. 2. The Moderator shall be considered the Judge of order, but any member not satisfied with his decission may appeal.

- Art. 4. The Moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speaking as other members, but not to vote unless it is a tie.
- Art. 5. All questions shall be introduced by motion and if seconded shall be opened for discussion unless withdrawn by the mover or his second. When a subject has been discussed a resonable time, the Moderator shall, when the question is called for, proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and mays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.
- Art. 6. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject or make personal reflections.
- Art 7. No person thall speak more than once upon any subject, until all who wish to speak have had an opertunity, nor more than twice without permission.
- Art. 8. Every subject introduced for discussion shall be decided before an other is effered, unless it be laid over by motion with the conset of the mover and the Association.
- Art. 9. The names of messen erashall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. As y member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.
- Art. 19. The appellation of brother shall be used in addressing each other.
- Art. 11. Any member violating the rules shall be subject to regrowf by the Moderator.
- Art. 12. Amendments or alterations may be made to these rules when a majority may deem it necessary.
- Art. 13. Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by general parliamentary rules.
