The twenty-seventh annual session of Greenbrier Baptist Association met with Mt. Zion Church, Enola, Ark., October 20, 1910, 10 o'clock a. m.

The Moderator being absent, the Clerk called the Association to order.

On motion Brother Glover was excused from preaching the "Introductory Sermon," and same was preached by M. P. Matheny, from John 3:1, after which the body adjourned until 2 o'clock p. m.

Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. the Association met, was called to order by the Clerk, P. H. Glover. W. E. Robert swas elected Moderator pro tem.

Elder M. P. Mathany was seated as a visitor, and Elder J. A. McKennie, Elder B. C. Adams and Elder W. T. Box as corresponding messengers from Carolina, United Associations.

Devotional Committee announced that R. L. Hendrickson preach at 7:30 p. m.

The regular order of business was suspended and elders were elected to preach the introductory and missionary sermons.

The body then adjourned till 7:30 o'clock p. m. Dismissed by G. M. Ford.

Promptly at 7:30 R. L. Hendrickson began preaching, his text being 1 John 5:1. Dismissed by G. M. Ford until 8 o'clock Friday morning.

FRIDAY MORNING.

The body was called to order by singing.

The first psalm was read and prayer offered by M. P. Matheny. Singing followed.

The Moderator read the rules of decorum and announced the various committees, which will be found on reports of each, severally.

"Petitionary letters" called for; none were presented.

Talk by Elder M. P. Matheny on "Our Hope of the Second Coming of Christ."

Report on Temperance read by G. M. Ford, Chairman, as follows:

We your committee beg leave to report as follows: The "Liquor Curse" is a curse, socially, morally, politically, financially, physically and religiously. God's word condemns the use of wine, and other intoxicants.

It also teaches us to put no stumbling block or snare in anoth-

er's way.

It is therefore our duty to seek to drive the saloon, and all its allies from the land. The battle is on. States are going dry, Arkansas must keep pace with every onward march for good. Therefore we urge our senator and representative to vote for state-wide statutory prohibition.

We urge our churches to discipline the dram drinker as well as

those who get drunk.

We further recommend that our clerk send a copy of this resolution to our State Senator and Representative.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Called together by singing.

Elder H. P. Glover, by request of the Moderator, called the house to order and proceeded to business.

Report on Home Missions was read by R. F. Adams.

Move to adopt was followed by motion to recommit, which carried.

Letters were read from other Churches. Corinth Church was received on petitionary letter and her messengers seated.

A report on State Missions was read by G. M. Ford. Motion to adopt was followed by reading a substitute by R. L. Hendrickson, which was adopted, 17 to 16, as follows:

StateMissions as held by this Association means the preaching of the Gospel to the destitute sections in Arkansas, by God called, and church sent men according to the principles of the state, and general association.

We recommend: First, that our churches at once take collections, and send with three messengers to the meeting of the State Association at Sheridan, Arkansas, November 10.

Second, that we request any church in our number that cannot conscientiously work with us on these principles to quietly withdray, and go where they can work, and leave us to work in peace.

Third, that our churches in the interest of harmony and peace refrain from employing preachers, either as pastors or in revivals, who are in sympathy with the convention or its methods.

Report on old ministers' relief read by Jones Hartley and motion to adopt followed by one to amend, which was adopted, as follows:

We your committee on Old Ministers' Relief beg leave to submit the following report: At present there are not any ministers within the bounds of our Association who are in destitute circumstances, but since there are such in the state of Arkansas, and resizing the sacrifices that those old soldiers of the cross have made to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the people of our land

We recommend that the churches contribute to these worthy

servants of God by their means and prayers.

Amendment: That the moderator appoint a committee to continue through the whole year and urge this work for the needy—not destitute—ministers in our own bounds, that a collection be taken for Eld. J. O. Cantrell at the present time.

We your committee on Education beg to submit the following report: The necessity for us to try to equip our children for life's battles by the right kind of training is plain to all. Our school days are the days that decide the course of most of our lives. As Baptists we need to be wide awake on these lines and encourage our people to patronize and heartily support our Baptist schools.

Inasmuch as the colleges and universities prepare men and women for life's service, we are dependent upon our own Baptist school for trained workers, instilled with the Baptist spirit, and loyal to our Baptist doctrine. Then again we believe in a divine call to the ministry, and, also, in the best possible training of the God called man, for work; therefore we urge our churches to encourage our young preachers to equip themselves, and also recommend that our churches assist such young men in a financial way to obtain a college training.

We are glad to say that he has been paid in full, and a balance of \$7.83 left in the treasury.

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, beg to submit the following report:

The distinction between State, Home and Foreign Missions, while convenient for reference, and a division of our fund for gospel extension is unfortuante, because missions are missions, whether at home or beyond the ocean, and while State and Home Missions form our base of operations, we cannot be obedient to the divine command resting upon us as trustees for our God for the promotion of his glory on earth if our mission efforts stop short of the remotest bounds of lost humanity.

We would therefore suggest to our churches that they make an effort to raise their standard to do their full duty in the matter of church support and home work, and then duplicate this total amount in gifts to our foreign work.

This is our chief work as the stewards of God. Let us awake to a sense of our responsibilities and do His will. We urge the doubling of all our gifts to missions. God will enable us to do so and bless us in it. Let us trust Him and enter in.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the Association extend to Mt. Zion church, and to the community in general, for the kind and pleasant way in which they have treated us during our stay with them, and also extend our thanks to the moderator for his just and impartial rulings, and to the clerk for his kind and proficient service.

The parting hand was given and the body was adjourned to meet with New Home Church, three miles northeast of Guy.

According to the arrangement of the Devotional Committee, Elder W. T. Box filled the stand at night and Elder M. P. Matheny Sunday at 11 o'clock.

A collection was taken for Elder P. H. Glover, amount not known, but it was something upwards of \$10.00.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches of our union, together with the ministers, who, on producing their credentials, shall be entitled to seats.

Art. II. This Association shall be known as Greenbrier Baptist Association.

Art. III. Each church composing the Association shall be entitled to three delegates until the church numbers one hundred, and then one for each additional fifty.

Art. IV. The object of this Association will be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's Kingdom on earth, and to meet at such times and places as she may appoint.

Art. V. This Association shall be considered an advisory council, and shall have no power to legislate for the churches or lord it over God's heritage.

Art. VI. Other churches may be admitted into this body when they signify a wish to do so by letter and delegates, provided they be deemed orthodox, which shall be determined by their abstract of faith and church government.

Art. VII. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each session and hold their offices until their successors are properly qualified. The Treasurer shall be a member of the Executive Board.

Art. VIII. The Clerk shall keep a regular file of the minutes of this Association and turn same over to his successor in office.

Art. IX. It shall be the duty of each church composing this body to send up such contributions in money to each annual meeting as shall be necessary to defray the expenses of this Association, and each church shall be furnished with minutes in proportion to the amount thus furnished.

Art. X. It shall be the duty of each church to send up to each annual meeting of this body a letter containing a brief history of her progress since the last session, with the following particulars,

to-wit: Her prosperity or adversity; the names of delegates, pastors, deacons, ordained or licensed ministers; her increase by baptism; by letter; by exclusion; died; total membership; contribution for pastor's salary; other home expenses; Associational missions; State missions; home missions; Fore gn Missions; ministerial education; number of Sunday School pupils; number of officers and teachers; name and postoffice of superintendent; amount contributed by the Sunday schools; value of church property; time of regular conference meeting.

Art. XI. Any church may send any query, asking advice of

this Association.

Art. XII. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a full and fair record of the proceedings of this Association and to superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes; for his services he shall receive such remuneration as the Association may from time to time think proper.

Art. XIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and account for all moneys paid to him for use of the Association,

according to its order.

Art. XIV. Amendments to this constitution may be made at any session of this Association, when two thirds of the members present shall deem it necessary.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article I. We believe there is only one true and living God, revealed to us under the personal and relative distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Art. II. We believe that the Scriptures comprising the Old and New Testament are the word of God, and the only correct rule

of faith and practice.

Art. III. We believe in the doctrine of election, as founded in the foreknowledge of God. through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and belief of the truth.

Art. IV. We believe that man was created upright, but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy state, and consequently be-

came dead in tresspasses and sin.

Art. V. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ, through faith in His name.

Art. VI. We believe in the final preservation of all the saints

in grace.

Art. VII. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Art. VIII. We believe that a church is a congregation of baptised believers who meet statedly and have covenant together to maintain the ordinances, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges set forth in the New Testament as pertaining to the Church of Christ.

Art. IX. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel unless he has been regularly baptised, called, and come under the imposition of the hands of a prop-

er Presbytery.

Art. X. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are both positive institutions and the only ordinance of the Church of Christ, and that believers are the only proper subjects, and that immersion alone is baptism.

Art. XI. We believe that regularly baptised believers only

have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

Art. XII. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. The officers of this Association shall be chosen by a majority of the members present by ballot.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is

kept according to the rules of decorum.

4. Any member being dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association, provided it is done the same day.

5. One member may speak at a time; he shall address the Moderator, and on obtaining the floor shall proceed without interruption, unless he shall depart from the subject or use personal reflections.

6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject without obtaining leave of the Association.

7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt

a member while speaking.

8. Every motion made and seconded, after time given for debate, shall be put to the Association unless previously withdrawn and the Moderator shall announce the decision of the Association unless a division is called for.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the mem-

bers present.

10. No appellation but that of "brother" shall be used by members addressing each other during the session of this Association!

- 11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and also vote in case of tie to give the casting vote.
- 12. The names of members may be called as often as the Association may deem necessary, and no member shall withdraw himself from the Association without leave of Moderator.
- 13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each session and oftener if necessary.
- 14. These rules may be amended at any session of this body by a majority of the members present.
