PROCEEDINGS

SATURDAY, FIRST DAY-FORENOON SESSION

The Saline Baptist Association convened this day, October 5th, 1912, with Owensville church and was called to order at 9:00 a. m. by the Moderator, J. A. Verser, and appointed Eld. S. F. Funk to lead in devotional exercises, who after reading 1st Psalms led in prayer. A number of good talks made on the objects of this Association.

On motion of Eld. F. C. Sims, who was to preach the introductory sermon, Eld. M. P. Matheney was requested to preach this sermon, and after reading 4th Chapter Exodus, he preached a very interesting sermon using as a text Ex. 4:4, and "he took it by the tail." To many this seemed a very odd text, but before the preacher had finished his discourse everyone seemed deeply interested in the strong points made. We find in the 4th chapter Exodus that the Lord told Moses to cast his rod upon the ground, he did so and it became a serpent and he fled from it, but the Lord told him to "take it by the tail" and he did so, and it became a rod again. Whatsoever the Lord says do, do it without fear, for there is no danger.

It now being the noon hour Eld. F. C. Sims led in prayer and adjournment was taken for dinner which was hountionsly served on the grounds.

Forty-five churches represented and seventy-nine messengers present. It now being in order to elect officers for the next ensuing year. Bros. J. W. Melton, J. C. Ross and O. C. Williams were appointed tellers and a ballot taken resulting in the election of Eld. S. F. Funk, Moderator, and A. B. Shockley, Clerk and Treasurer.

Petitionary letter from Mount Pleasant church was received and read, and H. D. Prater seated as her messenger. Also petition ary letter from Red Oak church received and read, and Garland Walker and L. Branum seated as messengers.

Eld. M. P. Matheny of Little Rock, Ark., was welcomed as a visitor, representing The Baptist and Landmark Sunday School Literature.

On motion Eld. C. C. Warnock was permitted to make his report as missionary of this Association. In making his report Bro. Warnock donated to the Association \$25.00 of the amount due him for work done as missionary.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY

As Missionary of the Saline Association I beg leave to submit the following report: I labored on the field six and a half months; miles traveled, 1500; organized 1 church; ordained 2 deacons; baptized 22 converts; preached 125 sermons; organized 5 Sunday schools and 3 prayer meetings; visited 210 homes; delivered 6 public addresses; conducted 13 funerals; led prayer in 31 homes and administered the Lord's Supper in .3 churches. C. C. WARNOCK, Missionary.

Eld. M. P. Matheny submitted the following plan of work in our Association as recommended by Malvern Second church. "For the sake of harmony, and in the interest of greater efficiency in our local Association, we ask that the Association adopt as her plan of work in place of the one now used, the following: Appoint committees to carefully consider and report on, 1st, The distribution in our bounds, and how best to supply it. 2nd. The Mission work done during the past year, and by whom done. 3rd. Pastoral work and support, and how to increase it. 4th. The spiritual condition of our churches. 5th. Bible teaching and study in our churches. 6th. Religious reading. 7th. Prayer in the home and the church. 8th, Church discipline, 9th, On how to develop our people in the grace of giving, 10th. The liquor traffic. 11th. Time, place and preacher of next meeting. 12th. Our dead."

After a short discussion the foregoing was adopted by a standing vote, 58 to 6. The Committee on Divine Services, composed of the officers of Owensville church, reported that Eld. C. C. Warnock would preach tonight at the church house, and Eld. T. W. Thornton at the Arbor. 'A motion carried that the time and place of next meeting be appointed at tonight's services. Adjourned till 7 p. m.

SATURDAY NIGHT SERVICES

Met at 7 p. m. Prayer led by J. W. Melton. Eld. C. C. Warnock read part of the 55th chapter of Matthew and preached an interesting sermon, using as a Text, Mat. 5:8; "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God."

Eld. T. W. Thornton delivered an interesting discourse at the Brush Arbor. Text, Rev. 12:3; "And then appeared another wonder in heaven, and behold a great red dragon, having seven heads and ten horns and seven crowns upon his heads."

At the close of the services the clerk announced the committees appointed by the Moderator.

This being the time set to appoint the time and place of the next session of this Association a *resolution was read and unanimously adopted recommending Malvern Second church as the next meeting place and that the Association convene on Thursday night before the first Sunday in October instead of Saturday as heretofore, and that Eld. N. D. Jones preach the introductory sermon; Eld. S. F. Funk, alternate.

On motion adjourned till 9 a. m. Monday.

SUNDAY FORENOON SERVICES

Assembled at 10 a.m. in Memorial services conducted by J. A. Verser. The letters from the churches reported 29 deaths during the past year and as the roll was called a number of good talks were made regarding their christian life and the evidences they left that they died with the sweet assurance of going to that home of eternal life, love and peace where Jesus is.

We would like very much to give a complete list of names and ages of our sainted dead of the past year, but we could only get a partial list and in most cases only their sir names. We hope the churches will here-*Resolution not turned over to the Clerk by the Committee. after report names, ages and a short sketch of the life work of their dead in order that it may be properly recorded in the minutes.

It now being the hour appointed for preaching Eld. F. C. Sims read the 2nd Chapter of The Acts and led in prayer and preached a splendid sermon using as a text the latter part of the 47th verse of the chapter read. Text, "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Theme, church development. The preacher made some very strong points that emphazised the principles on which Baptist doctrine is founded, and in order that some of the jewels of thought scattered by our ministers at our Association will be on record to be seen in future years we here give a few of the many good points made that were heartily indorsed by all Baptists present. "We should not encourage people to come into the church unless they give unmistakable evidence of being saved." It is better to have 100 sinners on the outside of the church than to have one unconverted person in the church." "We are often too slack in the reception of members." "Our churches should be developed on spiritual lines." "One reason why our churches are so lax, so cold and backward is because many of us preachers are too cowardly to preach the whole council of God." "We should stand out four square before the world."

At the close of the sermon Bro. J. A. Verser led in prayer, and a collection of \$15.07 was taken for State Associational Missions. Also at this hour Eld. Joseph Taylor preached a good sermon at the Arbor using as a text Math. 3:13. "Then Cometh Jesus from Galilee to Jordan, unto John to he Baptized of Him." At close of the services a collection of \$8.05 was taken to aid Sulphur Springs church in building their new house. Also a collection of \$5.05 was taken for Eld. R. B. Hunt. Adjourned for dinner and to reassemble at 3 p. m. for preaching.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON SERVICES

Met at 3 p. m. Eld. J. W. McDonald preached a good sermon. Subject, "But can ye descern the sign of the times." And among other good points made said, "There are great and wonderful changes attempted and being made by people today as an improvement on the teachings of God's word. Many are attempting to take short cuts in earrying out the commission of our Lord and Master. Formality and not spirituality has the upper hand in many churches. I have seen things practiced in some of those fashionable city churches that made my heart ache. I have seen the pastor enter the stand clothed in black robes. Roman Catholicism is attempting to take this country by the throat and we should awake to our duty, not only as christians but as citizens of this republic. The future looks dark but we must put on the whole armor of God and fight the battles of our Lord.

Closing prayer by Eld. C. C. Warnock. Eld. R. B. Hunt preached at this hour at the Arbor and a collection of \$5.00 was taken for the Orphans' Home.

SUNDAY NIGHT SERVICES

Met at 7 p. m. Eld. S. F. Funk read the 8th Chapter Inke, and led in prayer and preached a good sermon, using as a text Luke 8:10, "To you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of God." Eld. F. C. Sims led the closing prayer, and a collection amounting to \$5.15 was taken for the Orphans' Home.

MONDAY FORENOON SESSION

The Association assembled in business session at 9 a.m. Called to order by the Moderator, who read the 133 Psalm. Bro. J. A. Verser led in prayer.

Eld. Andy Neighbors was welcomed as a corresponding messenger from Buckville Association.

The Moderator called for reports of committees and the report on Orphans' Home was read and in discussing the report Bro. J. A. Verser said: Our Association, the oldest in Arkansas, has been looking after and taking care of orphan children for many years. Old Brother W. H. Wyatt, one of the old pioneer preachers of this country who was Moderator of this Association away back in 1852, died soon after this time, as did also his wife, and they left several children with but little means of support and this Association took charge of these children and employed old Brother Randolph of

Jefferson county to feed, clothe and school them until they could care for themselves. Brother Randolph reported to this Association annually and was paid for taking care of them, and now brethren we have orphan children over here at Texarkana to look after and care for, 39 of them, and they are dependant on us for food and clothing. Let's do our duty in providing for them.

On motion the report was adopted as follows:

ORPHANS' HOME REPORT

Your Committee recommends that the churches take more interest in the support of the home and take collections from time to time and forward the money to Eld. J. W. Sims, treasurer, at Marvel, Arkansas. Several of the children have had typhoid fever, and one of them died. Bro. Carter, the manager, is just recovering from a severe spell of the fever. We are behind in the running expenses of the home and we urge our brethren to make this a matter of prayer. We have 39 children in the home, from 5 to 16 years of age and all of the larger ones are members of the church. We have a ten acre tract of land and a three story brick building with about 15 rooms. Mrs. Newman, known to Baptist readers as "Miss Willie" has caused some improvements to be made by dividing some of the larger rooms for the larger girls, and had a new fence and other improvements made with money she raised for the purpose. We have some milch cows, also a garden and orchard. We hope that in the near future we will be able to make the children more comfortable and to take care of more orphan children. this home belongs to us, these are our children by adoption: shall we let them suffer for food and clothing? We hope to arrange to move the home to Malvern in the near future.

Let us ask ourselves whether we are performing our duty in the part we play as citizens in permitting this traffic. This is not a matter to be temporized with, it is a matter with which no compromise should be made. "At last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Let us pray and vote so that our garments may be clear of the blood of the 70,000 souls annual toll which this deadly traffic claims. Let us fight it as we would a viper, an adder or a serpent, praying God to give us strength to do our duty in suppressing this great evil. Fraternally submitted.
