

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

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Minutes.

MINUTES OF SOUTH-WESTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

The South Western Baptist Association met, pursuant to adjournment with Pleasant Valley Church, Howard County, Ark., on Saturday, 12th Oct. 1889, Bro. J. H. Black, moderator presiding, and was duly opened, prayer being offered by Bro. Y. R. Harbin, at request of moderator. The letters from the several churches were then read by Brethren G. A. Vaughan, C. M. Powell, and R. Parker, (they being by the moderator appointed for that purpose) and the names of delegates enrolled by the clerk.

The hour of 11 o'clock having arrived, the annual sermon was preached by Rev. J. D. Rodgers, the appointee, from John, 14-6, to a large and attentive audience.

At 2 o'clock P. M. the body reassembled, prayer being offered by Rev. Dulaney.

The roll of members was then called by the clerk. It being in order to elect officers of this body, on motion the rule was suspended and the Bro clerk was ordered to east the vote of this body for J. H. Black for moderator, which was done and Bro. Black, declared duly elected moderator.

On further motion, the rule being suspended, J. II. Denson was, by acclamation, elected clerk of this body.

Petitionary letters being called for, petitionary letter from Sweet Home Church, for membership in this body was presented by Brethren W. K. Dowden and J. E. Harris, said church being a member of Red River Association, and having been dismissed from said association to join this body.

Also Ozan church, presented a petitionary letter for membership in this body, through Brethern J. W. King, H. A. King and G. W. Bell delegates from said church.

Bro. J. B. Drake presented petitionary letter from Social Hill church, praying membership in this body, said churches (Sweet Home, Ozan, and Social Hill) being found sound in faith, and the constitutional requirements being complied with, were on motion unanimously received as members of this body, and the right hand of fellowship extended to the brethren representing the same.

A petitionary letter from Mt. Zion church, asking to be admitted as a member of this body was presented by Brethren Charles Burnett and W. S. Love delegates from said church and said church being found sound in faith, and having complied with constitutional requirements was unanimously received and the right hand of tellowship extended to the brethren representing the same.

Correspondence being called for, Brethren T. J. Bennett and J. R. Hardy presented themselves as corresponding messengers from Red River association, and were received and the right hand of fellowship extended them.

On motion Bro. J.B Bowling was received as a delegate from Centre Point church, the delegation from said church not being complete.

On motion Bro. J. R. Kearney was received as a delegate from Liberty church, said church not being fully represented.

The moderator then appointed the following committees to-wit:

On Preaching-Strickland, J. M. Copeland and deacons of Pleasant Valley church.

On Documents-Powell, J. M. Jopeland, Mathews.

ON LITERATURE -B. F. Cannon, J. L. Cannon and W. F. Davis.

On Destitution-Harbin, Hendrix, Cowling.

On STATE Missions-Kearney, Parker, Thomas.

On OBITUARIES-Vaughan, Caroll, Hooker.

OUACHITA COLLEGE-Denson, Strictland, Bell.

The body then adjourned till Monday 14th inst. at 9 o'clock A. M. prayer being offered by Bro. Strictland.

On Sabbath, at 11 A. M. Rev. Strictland preached the missionary sermon at the new church building. Bro. T. J. Bennett also preached at the old church building to large and appreciative congregations, also Sabbath at 3 P. M. Bro. J. H. Bennett preached at new church house and Bro. W. L. White at old church house, to good congregations.

Monday 14th Oct. 1886, 9 o'clock A. M. The body met pursuant to adjournment, Bro. Black moderator presiding, and was duly opened prayer being offered by Bro. Cochran.

Bro. J. B. Searcy Cor. Secy. F. M. and Bro. W. A. Clark, Editor of Arkansas Baptist, being present were invited to seats with body.

The report of Committees on Destitution was submitted, and on motion adopted without discussion. (See appendix "A")

On motion Breth, N. M. Pipkin, H. H. Ford and W. K. Dowden were appointed as a committee on ministerial support.

The Committee on Literature submitted their report which was read, and a motion made and carried, to amend by striking out the "Baptist and Reflector" and said report as amended was adopted. (See appendix "X")

The report of the Committee on State missions was submitted and the same on motion was laid on the table. The hour of 11 o'clock A. M. having arrived the body took recess till 1.30 o'clock P. M.

Bro. W. A. Clark by appointment by the preaching Committee preached (at 11 A. M.) to a large and appreciative congregation.

At 1.30 o'clock P. M. the body reassembled, prayer being offered by the brother Clark.

The Committee on Finance, submitted their report which on motion was adopted. (See appendix "B")

The Committee on Sabbath Schools submitted their report, and the same was ou motion, adopted. (See appendix "C")

A motion was made to reconsider the action of this body in adopting the report of the Committee on Finance which motion carried, and on further motion said report was recommitted without instructions.

The Committee on Temperance subministed their report which was read and on motion, adopted. (See appendix "D")

On motion of Bro. Strickland it was ordered that the sum of Thirtytwo Dollars and .26 cents (\$32.26) in hands of the Treasurer as ministerial education fund be paid over to Bro J. H. Bennett.

The Committee on Foreign Missions submitted their report, which was adopted being fully discussed. (See appendix "E")

Pending the discussion a cash collection for foreign mission amounting to \$16.35 was raised: and by order of this body turned over to Bro. J. B. Searcy Cor. S. F. M. and his receipt therefor taken by the Treasurer.

The Committee on Finance made and submitted their report which was adopted. (See appendix "B")

The Committee on Documents submitted their report recommending that next session of this body be held with Bethesda Church Little River Co. Ark., after discussion was adopted.

Brethren Carroll and Vaughan of the Committee on obituaries being absent, Bretheren C. M. Powell and M. M. Cochran were appointed to serve on Committee.

On motion the body adjourned till tomorrow morning at 8.30 o'clock A. M. prayer being offered by Bro. W. L. White.

Tuesday, 15th Oct. 1889, 8:30 o'elock A. M. The body met pursuant to adjournment, (Bro Black moderator presiding) and was duty opened, prayer being offered by Bro. H. G. York.

The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted their report, which was adopted. (See Appendix "F.")

The Committee on Ministerial support, submitted their report, which on motion, after discussion was adopted. (See Appendix "G.")

On motion the body after prayer took recess till 1.30 o'clock P. M.

At 1.30 o'clock P. M. the body reassembled, prayer being offered by Bro. C. M. Powell.

The Committee on obituaries submitted their report, and the same was on motion, adopted. (See Appendix "H.")

The Committee on State missions submitted their report, which on motion was adopted. [Appendix "I."]

The body then (on motion) elected as delegates to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, Brethren J. D. Rodgers, C. W. Strickland, M. M. Cochran, J. H. Black and J. M. Copeland; as alternates, Brethren Peter Simpson, Jo. Holman and H. Herndon.

On motion it was ordered that the clerk of this body insert in the minutes of this session, the time, place and programme for next District-meeting of this body.

On motion the body proceeded to elect delegates to the Southern Baptist Convention to convene in May, 1890. Elected Brother C. W. Strictland as such delegate—Jo. H. Denson alternate.

The Home Mission Board made and submitted their report, which, on motion, was adopted. [See appendix "K"]

The Report of the Committe on Home Missions was then submitted, and on motion, adopted. [See appendix "L"]

It was then moved that the plan for prosecuting mission work in our bounds during the last associational year, be continued during the ensuing year.

Whereupon it was moved that said motion be so amended as, that churches which received assistance from the Mission Board last year be not assisted during next year, which motion to amend was adopted. And thereupon a motion was made to reconsider the action of the body in amending said [original] motion, which motion to reconsider was adopted, and thereupon said motion to amend was rejected, and a motion was made and carried to adopt the original motion to-wit: that the plan adopted for prosecuting the Home Mission work in our bounds during last year, be continued during the ensuing year.

On motion the body resolved to go into the election of an Executive Home Mission Board to serve as such during the ensuing year: the result being the re-election of the present Board.

Bro. C. W. Strictland refusing to accept, Bro. M. F. Dennis was elected to serve as a member of Board.

On motion Bro. Jo Holman was elected chairman of said Board.

The thanks of the body were tendered Bro. Strickland for his faithfulness and efficiency as chairman of the Ex. Board.

It was then unanimously resolved that the thanks of this body be tendered the brethren and friends of Pleasant Valley Church and vicinity for the royal manner in which we have been entertained during the present session of this body.

Resolved that the quartly mission meetings be continued and that the next mission meeting be held with New Salem Church, Howard County, on Saturday before the fifth Sabbath in December, 1889, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Bro. Dulaney being called to the chair, the report of the Ministerial Education Board was submitted and on motion adopted. (See appendix "M.")

MINUTES S. W. ARK., BAPTIST ASSOCIATION. [6.]

On motion it was resolved that the present Board of Ministerial Education be continued.

Bro. Black in the chair, resolved that thanks of hody be tendered the Moderator and Clerk for faithful and efficient services.

Resolved that the Clerk have printed 800 copies of the minutes of proceedings of present session, and that he be allowed \$15.00 for his services.

It was further resolved that in having the minutes printed, the Arkansas Baptist office be given the preference—all things being equal.

The Report of Committee on Ouachita College, was submitted and adopted. (See appendix "N")

Resolved that the annual sermon at the next session of this body be preached by Bro. M. M. Cochran—Bro. Thos. Dulany alternate, and that Bro. T. J. Bennett preach the missionary sermon, Bro. B. F. Cannon alternate.

On motion it was ordered that the articles of faith be published in minutes of this session.

By motion the moderator appointed corresponding messengers as follows:

To Red River Association C. W. Strickland, J. M. Copeland and M. M. Cochran.

To Union Association: Brethren J. D. Rodgers, Pete Simpson and H. H. Ford.

To Caddo Association, W. J. Tolerson, J. E. Harris, J. E. Kennedy. The Treasurer, Joe H. Denson submitted his report or settlement, which was on motion adopted. [See appendix "C"]

The "Sweet bye and bye" was then sung, the parting hand given a fervent prayer was offered by Bro. Thomas Dulaney, and the body adjournd to meet with Bethesda Church in Little River county on Saturday betore the second Lordsday in October 1890 at 9 o'clock A. M. Then passed another harmonious, and we trust a profitable session of the body.

Articles of Faith

OF THE SOUTH-WESTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

- Art. 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost.
- Art. 2. We believe that the Holy Bible, including the Old and the New Testament, is the Word of God, and furnishes the only rule of faith and practice.
- Art. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election "according to the fore-knowledge of God, the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and the sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ."
- Art. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.
- Art. 5. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.
- Art. 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, by the imputed righteouness of Christ, only.
- Art. 7. We believe that the Saints shall be preserved in grace and never finally fall away.
- Art. 8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are the ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and that immersion is the Apostolic mode.
- Art. 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgement, and that the felicity of the righteous and punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.
- Art. 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, except one who is regularly baptised, called, and comes, under the imposition of hands by a presbytery.
- Art. I1. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.
- Art. 12. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.
