### MINUTES.

THE FRIENDSHIP REGULAR BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met with Sardis church, Grant county, Ark., September 18, 1880,

#### TEN O'CLOCK A. M.

The introductory sermon wes preached by J. B. Searcy. Text: I Cor. 15:58: "Be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the works of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

At the close of the sermon the congregation partook of the bountiful refreshments furnished on the ground.

At 2 o'clock p.m. the delegates assembled in the house for organization, and the Moderator read the 45th Psalm, and after singing by the congregation, Rev. J. F. Griffin lead in prayer.

Letters were read from the different churches composing this Association, and delegates' names enrolled. (See statistics.)

Upon a call for petitionary letters, Pleasant Grove church, Grant county, was received and her delegates enrolled. (See statistics.)

On motion, proceeded to elect officers for the present session which resulted in the choice of Rev. M. Y. Moran, Moderator, and J. B. Searcy Secretary and Treasurer.

A call was extended for corresponding messengers, whereupon Brother T. A. Morris reported from Pine Bluff Association, and Rev. J. D. Jameson from Liberty Association.

A cordial welcome was extended to the brethren by the Moderator.

The Committee on Sunday Schools read their report, which was adopted. (See A.)

The Treasurer read his report, which was adopted. (See B.) The Secretary of Book Depository read his report, which was adopted. (See C.)

The Secretary of Foreign Missions read his report, which was discussed by a collection for that work amounting to \$5.10. The report was adopted. (See D.)

On motion, proceeded to return correspondence:

On motion, proceeded to select the place of holding the next session of this Body, which resulted in the choice of Hickory-Grove church, Lincoln county.

Adjourned till Monday, at half-past 8 o'clock.

#### 7 O'CLOCK P. M.

Rev. W. W. Tinker preached at the church. Text: "Ye are the salt of the earth." The sermon was filled with good thoughts and made a good impression.

#### SABBATH.

At 10 o'clock A. M. Rev. J. H. Overton preached at the church. Text: John 17:21. Many good points were raised and argued by the preacher.

At 11 o'clock A. M., Rev. J. F. Griffin preached the missionary sermon at the arbor. Text: Acts 9: 6. The sermon was clear, scriptural and enthusiastic, and a deep, religious feeling pervaded the congregation. At the close of the sermon Rev. J. D. Jameson took up a collection for missionary work in this Association, amounting in cash to \$14.80; pledges, \$78.85; total, \$93.65.

At 3 o'clock P. M., Rev. M. Y. Moran preached by special request on the origin and perpetuity of the church of Christ and its ordinances. The discourse was the sermon of Brother Moran's life. He went beyond himself.

At 7 o'clock P. M. Rev. J. D. Jameson preached at the church, on the relation of the Sunday School to the church. Rev. W. W. Tinker followed in an address on the agency of the Sunday School in the spread of the gospel. Rev. L. Quinn followed him in an address on the best method of conducting Sunday Schools. The services throughout were delightful. The Lord be praised.

#### MONDAY, 81 O'CLOCK A. M.

Association met for business. Prayer by Rev. L. Quinn.

Minutes of Saturday and Sunday read and adopted. The roll was called and corrected.

Rev. L. Quinn was chosen to preach the introductory sermon at next session of this Body, with Rev. J. H. W. Overton alternate. Rev. W. W. Tinker was chosen to preach the missionary sermon and Rev. M. Y. Moran alternate.

The Committee on Home Missions read their report, which was amended and adopted. (See E.)

A resolution restricting speeches to five minutes each, except by permission of the Association, was adopted.

The Committee on Documents read their report, which was adopted. (See F.)

The query from Zion church was answered. (See query after report on Documents.)

The Committee on Publications read their report, which was discussed and adopted. (See G.)

The Committee on Education read their report, which was adopted. (See H.)

The Committee on Nominations read their report, which was adopted. (See officers of Association.)

The Secretary of the Executive Board read his report, which was adopted. (See I.)

The Committee on Finance read their report, which was adopted. (See J.)

A resolution on constitutional amendments, by Brother Quinn, was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

A resolution of thanks, also one respecting the minutes, were adopted.

On motion, adjourned to meet with Hickory Grove church, Lincoln county, on Saturday (10 o'clock A. M.) before the third Sab. bath in September, 1881. M. Y. MORAN, Moderator,

#### (E.)

Your committee on Home Missions would beg leave to report that the cause of Missions is one that demands our serious conideration. The command of the Master to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature" is still binding on us as the gurdians of the truth. Shall we obey the command of our Master ? or shall we lie upon our oars while our fellows are prishing in their sins ? If we expect the Lord to bless us in our basket and store, as well as spiritually, we must wake up to the discharge of our duty in sending the Gospel to the regions beyond. We would advise all the churches composing this Association to dopt a regular system of giving to this noble cause. We know of no better plan to recommend than to take up collections at tated times, say once a month, or every time the church comes together.

*Resolved*, That this Association recommend that our Missionary Board take into consideration the wants of Pine Bluff church at present, and that they appropriate \$100 to that station.

Zion church sends the following query : "Is it Scriptural for church membérs belonging to different churches of the same faith and order to commemorate the Lord's Supper together?" The following resolution was adopted :

#### (G.)

We, as professed Christians, ought to be on the alert. If we allow our children to read poisonous doctrine, we may expect their minds to be poisoned. Pedo-Baptists are scattering their books, tracts, etc., all over the land. Let us take pattern after them in giving to the world our doctrine. We would recommend as such the Bible, "The Baptist," Kind Words," and the "New Southern Psalmist."
