## MINUTES.

## FIRST DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Union County Arkansas, September 9, 1882.

The thirty-seventh annual session of the Liberty Baptist Association met with the Champagnolle Church, Union county, Arkanon on Saturday before the second Sabbath in September, 1882.

Introductory sermon was preached by Eld. G. Norsworthy, (Eld. J. U. H. Wharton, who was appointed at the previous meeting, being absent,) using as a text John iii: 8, "We therefore ought to resolve such that we might be fellow-helpers to the truth." After which an intermission of one hour was had to partake of refreshments furnished on the grounds.

#### ONE O'CLOCK P. M.

House called to order by J. M. Hart. former Moderator. Delegates were called on for letters from the various churches in the Association, which were read and names of delegates enrolled as per tatistical table.

On motion, the Association proceeded to permanent organization by electing by ballot, J. M. Hart, for Moderator, and Geo. E. Murphy, Clerk.

On motion, the order of business of previous meeting was adopted. By regular order, ministers and visiting members of our faith wore invited to seats with us.

Columbia Association responded in person of Eld. G. Wise. On motion, received.

Ouachita Colored Baptist Association responded by letter and delegates Breth. Simon Jones and A. Anderson.

### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The committee on Ministerial Education made the following re-

port, which upon motion, was adopted:

We, your committee on Ministerial Education, submit that it is a subject on which we, as a denomination, perhaps attach too little importance, and while we will present but few of the reasons why we should bend all of our energies to secure the proper development of our ministry, we hope that our churches will see to it that the opportunity for the proper education of our ministry is not neglected. A proper preparation for the ministry is two-fold; one spiritual, the other intellectual. The first is the work of God, the latter is the result of personal effort. We realize the importance of both. Let us see to it that no opportunity for the mental development of our preachers be neglected. We should not rest satisfied to have our young brethren, whom God has called to this sacred office and work, enter the field not fully prepared for his mission in life, for we need and must have workmen that needeth not to be ashamed. When we remember that ministers "are to teach all nations," and that they are to be instant in season and out of season to discharge their varied duties, we see the necessity of development and culture. With our present educational advantages we should be loth to have our brethren go to work without a proper preparation. If we, as churches, do our duty it is not necessary, and any man who will not use due diligence and properly improve every opportunity for his spiritual and mental development, is not worthy Respectfully. the high and holy vocation. Yes, we may say Demon Alcohol! for if not a demon itself it is one of the devil's most deadly weapons with which he destroys the human race. The word of God is the sword of the spirit, and we consider alcohol the sword of the devil, and with it he does his most deadly work-destroys unnumbered thousands, not only temporally but spiritually. A part of our Savior's mission to earth was to destroy the work of the devil, and He bids his children to follow in his footsteps. Hence, every christian is under the most sacred obligations to raise his voice and exert his influence for the suppression of its sale and its use as a beverage. Christians are commanded to shun even the appearance of evil. "Yea, taste not, handle not the unclean thing." The moral and reflecting portion of the unconverted are raising their voices against it, and now is a most favorable time for christians to take the lead and use their utmost endeavors to drive this deadly enemy of the human race from our land. One enemy in camp can do more injury than a host outside. Therefore we would recommend the

churches of this Association to be very strict in their discipline, for the remedy of this great evil must commence in the churches. Unless christians show by their acts, as well as words, that they are opposed to the sale and use of this deadly evil as a beverage, they will succeed but poorly in inducing the world to abandon its use. Let christians remember that drunkenness is classed with the most abominable sins. Let them take a bold stand for their Savior and HIs cause. Frown down the use of of this deadly evil, and by the blessings of God banish the monster, not from our midst, but from our land, and then will the churches prosper, for God will bless them.

Our Foreign Mission Board are calling loudly for money, and are dependent on the churches for support. The churches are under sacred obligations to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Will we hear and heed the command. This depends on the direct efforts of the pastors in developing the spirit of christian liberality in their respective churches. We therefore recommend and urge it to be the duty of our pastors to preach at least one sermon in the year on this subject, and take up a collection for Foreign Missions, sending the amounts raised to Dr. Tupper, Richmond, Va., and that the mounts so raised be reported through the letters to the next session of this body.

Your committee would therefore recommend that a Sunday School Board of five members be appointed to originate and conduct a Sunday School Convention within the bounds and in connection with the meeting of this Association. Would also beg leave to nominate the following members: Rev. J. M. Hart, President; Judge W. C. Langford, Prof. W. L. Hodge, S. B. Lide and I. M. Wise.

We are sad in saying there are so few churches in the whole of Quachita county, and but one besides the little struggling band at Camden trying to hold services not more than once a month. "Truly the field is white unto the harvest." Our people in Camden are striving nobly to hold forth the precepts and ordinances of our Lord, and deserv and should have the sympathy of Liberty Association, whether in receiving the direct aid of this body's Executive Committee, or from the churches and our brethren individually. respectfully state that what our cause in Camden most needs is a parsonage. If, by some means or other, such could be obtained, the Baptist's there would have a sure footing for future work. We are very proud to say and assure our peaple that all the assistance heretofore rendered Camden has not been misapplied. Our church's prospects there are truly promising, which can be seen in the Association's statistical table. We therefore do most earnestly call the attention of our brotherhood composing this body, and that of the entire state, to the pressing need of the Camden church. Also recommend that at a convenient time during the present session of this Association, a collection be taken up to assist in building a parsonage there, which, of course, will be the property of the denomination.
