Minutes of Ouachita Baptist Association -= 1897.

The Ouachita Baptist Association met in its Thirtieth Annual session with Toccana church, Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in September, 1897. Introductory sermon at 11 o'clock, by Elder M L. Ridling, followed by E. S. James ats 2:38-39. The body came together at 2 o'clock; Elder E. S. James chosen Moderator, pro tem; J. J. Mershon, Clerk, pro tem.

After devotional exercises letters were read from thirteen churches; one petitionary from Mena church, which was received, the Moderator extending the land of fellowship to the messengers. Brother J. P. Lawrence was seated as a senger from New Hope church, No. 2, in the absence of the regular appointed essenger.

The election of officers resulted as follows: J. J. Holland, moderator; J. J. Mershon, clerk; A. J. Robins, treasurer.

The preaching committee aunounced that Elder S. A. Neighbors would preach night with H. C. Ridling to follow. Brother Modlin to conduct a prayer meeting at 9 o'clock, Sabbath morning. On motion the body adjourned to meet at 8 clock, Monday morning.

The Missionary sermon, at 11 o'clock, was preached from the 9th chapter and 14th verse of 1st Corinthians, by Elder A. J. Crawford, followed by J. J. Holland, The collection after preaching, for missions, amounted to \$6.71.

The preaching committee announced preaching at 3 o'clock, by Bro. J. J. Hawkins, followed by Brother Modlin; at night by Brother A. S. Jackson, followed Brother B. Duke.

Preaching committee announced that Brother E. S. James would preach Monday, at 11 o'clock, followed by S. A. Neighbors. Approved.

The body came together at 8 o'clock. The Moderator read the 46th Psalm

The following reports were received and adopted, to-wit:

ON FAMILY WORSHIP.

We, your committee on Family Worship, beg leave to submit the following: We learn by reading God's word, that family worship is commanded by, and has the approval of God. The ancient Jews were commanded to teach their children the law of God. This was made very binding.

We find by experience and observation that family worship is conducive to piety. Piety is indispensable to efficient work for the Master. There can be no real days piety in a home where there is no family altar, and none truly pious can come from such a home; therefore, we can have no efficient workers where there are no family altars, as the success of our work depends on our family piety.

The fore, we recommend and urge upon the members of our churches to erect fan taltars.

A motion was carried to request three associations to-wit: Buckville, Howard Caunty and Southwestern, to send three able messengers to meet Brothers J. A. Norris, H. C. Ridling and I. C. Lewis, at Salem church, four miles east of Dallas, 10 o'clock a. m., Saturday before the second Sabbath in November, 1897, to ouncil with us in regard to the division in our Association.

Brother J. J. Holland was the appointee to Buckville, M. L. Ridling to How-

ard county, and a letter to be written by the clerk to the Southwestern Association. Brother H. C. Ridling appointed a messenger to Buckner Association. On motion the Moderator appointed five messengers to the General Association, which will meet with Earl church, near Ardmore, in the Indian Territory, the following brethren were appointed: I. C. Lewis, E. S. James, S. A. Neighbors, B. Duke and T. M. Hollingsworth, or any other of our brethren who might be there. The following resolution of thanks was voted:

Resolved, That we extend our thanks to Yoccana church, and the community surrounding for the kind, hospitable manner in which they have entertained the body.

A motion was carried to authorize the Board to make any arrangements for putting out a missionary that they might deem proper.

A motion to take collections in cash and pledges resulted as follows: Cash: B. Duke, 50 cents; T. B. Spears, 25 cents; A. T. Joplin, \$1.00; J. H. Beach, 10 cents. Pledge. T. M. Holingsworth, five bushels corn; J. J. Hawkins, \$5.00; M. L. Ridling, \$1.00; Charley White, \$1.00; L. C. Lewis, \$1.00.

'A motion carried that the Association appoint the places for the fifth Sabbath meeting time to be 10 o'clock, Saturday before each fifth Sabbath. 1st. Pine Grove; 2d, Hopewell; 2d, Hickory Creek; 4th, Buffalo.

A motion carried to authorize the clerk to make the best arrangements possible for printing the minutes, and the remainder to go towards compensating him for his services.

A motion prevailed requesting the Board of the Louisville Seminary to remove W. H. Whitset from the presidency of the Seminary.

A motion carried to furnish the Arkansas Baptist with a copy of the above resolution with a request to publish the same.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet with Salem church, Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in September, 1898. The song, "How Firm a Foundation," was sung at the close, while the parting hand was taken amidst a glorious scene of rejoicing.
