MINUTES.



SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1894.

The Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association convened with Friendship church, near Gainesville, pursuant to adjournment at 11 o'clock, a. m. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder H. B. Wester, of Black River Association, Missouri. His text, Philippians 2, 12, "Work Out Your Own Salvation With Fear and Trembling."

The body was then called to order by the former moderator.

A motion then carried to adjourn until 2 o'clock, p. m., for refreshments, which were furnished in abundance on the ground.

EVENING SESSION.

At 2 o'clock the Association was called together and business resumed.

The roll of churches was called and twenty-three responded by letter and delegation (See Tabular Statement), and letters read by brother T. B. Kitchens and Elder J. D. J. Faulkner.

The report of committee on ministerial education was presented, read and adopted, as follows:—We believe it is the duty of every man called of God to preach, and we believe that it is necessary for such a one to acquire at least a good common english education, the necessity of ministerial education is apparent to all. Our ministers have to meet educated men, and to meet them properly, they must be educated more, they must be able to rightly divide the word of truth, and as we have several worthy young men belonging to this association, whom we believe are called of God to preach, to-wit:—Brethren Lawless and Merideths, we would recommend an agent to solicit funds for that purpose. We would further recommend that there be one brother in each church, in the association appointed to lay the matter before their church, and take up

We cannot all go to foreign fields, but we can send Godly men with our means, and we can only do this by liberal contributions. We have already in foreign fields, in Brazil, Taylor, in China, Simons, and Graves. in Africa, Smith, in Rome, Bro. Eager and others in other fields. These Godly men cannot work there unless we help them, and we recommend that our pastors present the matter to their churches and take up collections quarterly for this purpose.

The committee on state and associational missions reported as follows:—Which was read and adopted: Because of the pressure of the times, this year, the association has done nothing in the way of state missions, but we note with pleasure the work done by Bro. Lively in Blue Cane, assisted by Friendship church to the amount of twenty-six dollars and fifteen cents (\$26 15). There has been one addition to the church for every dollar we have spent, this should encourage us, and we recommend that the association appoint an executive board, and that we localize our work so as to build up our weak places, and Blue Cane and Main Shore as important places to be occupied.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

On motion that we correspond with Mt. Zion, Black River and Current River association, and Elder W. J. Bearden and J. J. Burton to Mt Zion, Elder J. N. Settlemoir and J. C. Holcomb to Black River and W. J. Bearden to Current River, were appointed as corresponding messengers.

On motion the Treasurer was instructed to pay the amount for printing minutes to the clerk, that he superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes and that he be allowed \$10 for his services.

On motion that the association convene in its next session with Hopewell church in Greene county, Arkansas, on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September 1895.

Elder J. D. J. Faulkner was elected to preach the introductory sermon with Elder W. J. Bearden his alternate.

Whereas we have been so royally entertained by Friendship church, and the good people of the vicinity, during the sitting of this body, that the thanks of this body be extended to them, and our prayers be given for their material and spiritual prosperity.

Thus closed the Twenty-fifth Annual Session of the Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association, with prayer by Elder J. H. Peay.

And on motion the body adjourned, to meet with Hopewell church four miles Southwest of Rector, Arkansas, on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September, A. D. 1895, at 11 a. m., and during long service the parting hand was extended by the brethren.


