The Woman's Missionary Union has tendered a helping hand in sending means to the support of our onsecrated missionories, in their untiring efforts to raise fallen humanity. Brethren, let us not forget to be greatful to God for his meries and for these missionary instumentalities through which salvation

is offered to benighted beings, and let us show appreciation by up holding the hands of our missionary brethren while they preach glad tidings to all the world, and give all praise to his Holy name.

Quille L. F. PATTERSON, Chairman REPORT ON PAST AND PUTURE FORE OF THIS ASSOCIATION.

The work accomplished by this organization in the past has been very encouraging. For the year ending April 30th 1893, more than our night of all the baptisms reported by the Home Board of Southern Baptist Convention, were performed by the missionaries of this Asia ciation, and for the six years ending September 1892, the Association raised for Foreign Missions, about \$1400. And its missionaries preached 12,979 sermons; added to the church 4,468; organized 00 churches; 150 sunday-schools and traveled 135,924 miles. In 1880 we sent Wesley Smith as our missionary to the Wild Indians, who were men tioned in the Board's report by Sec. A. Frank Ross, as being in our boundary. In 1881 the session was held at Prairie Grove, Indian. Territory, and in the Board's report, mentioned certain collections being the first money ever collected by the Baptists in our bounds for Foreign Missions. (All the Indian Territory was considered to be in the boundary of General Association then, as there was no talk of any other Baptist General Body for this field at that time. Your missionaries preached the first Baptist sermon in Oklahoma

City and your superintendent of missions presided over the constitution at the organization of the first Baptist Association in Oklahome Territory: Buckner College, which has been so severely tried, was founded and fostered by this body, and is still its property, and we recommend that brethren be appointed to represent this body in looking after its interests in the College. The Association was organized as a necessity to afford means of co-operation for brethren in West Arkan sas and Indian Territory, who could not possibly meet to any other general body. It was a necessity then and is now. The great South ern Baptist Convention felt the need of it in 1878 when that body placed the name of this Association in its constitution as one of the thirteen organizations that were entitled to representation in its an nual sessions. There is a great work before us, and a peculiar one There is need of an organization to develop the plain Baptists of the West and to secure help for them and to bring them into organic relation with the great Baptist brotherhood of the South. That God hand has been on us so manifestly in the past let us take courage and press right on to the great business of christianizing all our vast field and training our people to the duty of carrying the gospel to the fur Sheyond. #### REPORT OF THE BOARD.

Received the past year for Foreign Missions \$217. Foreign Mission Journal, \$7.25; Home Field \$5; Missionary Tent \$15.50; Chapel Build ing Fund from Dallas Baptist S. S. \$5; Collection by Missionacies on their support, \$1004.36; for the same from G. H. Council. Treasured General Association, \$7.15; Mrs. E. J. Smith, 55c; F. Lee Perkins, \$2.50 Minute funds for session of 1892, \$19.50; Church building and repair \$1450—\$2733.45. Home Mission Board S. B. C. has paid a special salar of \$400 to Eld. E. L. Compere, and in addition has given \$1000 to an ourgeneral work. Baptist women of the South have given in cloth ing, not less than \$2000 \$2400. Total receipts, \$5133.45.

Funds have been applied as designated by the givers, and still on hand for Foreign Missions, \$115.90, and for Home funds, \$7.70. We have reason to be grateful to God for the record of the General al Association now and in the past. This body began the Foreign mission work in this field. It sent Wesley Smith as its Missionary to the Wild Indians in 1881, Latter on it sent J. B. York to Idaho. You missionaries preached the first Baptist sermons ever preached in the City of Oklahoma, and your Superintendent presided—ever the Conve tion that organized the first Baptist Association in Oklahoma Territor

In 1882, before any other Baptist General body had been spoken for this field, the chairman of the mission board, who was a delegate from McAlester Church, in his printed report, expressed the hope that we keep Bro. Smith among "his wild brethren," and the year previo the Board's report, in speaking of Bro. Smith's field among the wild I

Mans said, "it is in the bounds of our General Association." And so said

mma report in 1880.

Your body, without any delegation present and without seeeing it, honored by the Southern Baptist Convention as far back as 1878 maving its name placed in the Constitution of that great organization as one of the thirteen bodies allowed to represent in that Convention was more than five years before any other Baptist General yexisted in our boundary.

In 1881 when the great Indian missionary, our brother H. F.

min; he wrote as follows:

"I never in my life was more anxious to go to an appointment, and more grieved at a failure. Late Friday evening I turned with a heart towards home. My deepest sympathies are with the General ociation." Again he said: "The rain itself, though hard and conti, could not have stopped me. I offered 50c a day for the round p for a pilot, so I would not have to swim my horse." Concerning Jeand Lazarus, the Jews said: "Behold how he loved him." And our board would remind you of the great love for your Association that cherished by those noble servants of God, H. F. Buckner, Seaborn liler and A. A. Spiller, to the very close of their lives.

We should recognize the presence of God that has ever been manided in the meetings and in the work of the General Association, ere perhaps never has been an organization in which there has existed after brotherly love, and union of effort. This should not be thought as a mere accident, but as a marked evidence of God's favor with us.

And though we dare not boast, yet we may be encouraged that God helped us to do what we have done. Our people are poor, untrained, ittered and most of them without a home and unsettled. Yet dure the six years ending September 1892, your Association has raised Foreign Missions about \$100, and your missionaries preached 12, sermons; added to the churches, 4,468 members; organized 90 nurches, and 130 S. S.; and traveled 135,924 miles in performance of the work. All this work in six years would not have been done by them who have been so poorly paid, if God's blessing had not been them. And though it has been sorely tried, yet your Association did nod work in founding and fostering Buckner College.

This record of work is made to inspire the Association to attempt later things for God. Even our own field appears almost untouched, the heathen world is shrouded in the night of 'death. Having the in God, let us press right on to take all this field for Christ, and wer forget the Master's last command—"Go teach all nations."

Your board would recommend that: 1st That special means be ised to bring about a systematic plan for raising funds from all our nbers; 2nd That a more determined effort be made to secure to for Foreign Missions: 3rd That special efforts be made to enlist co-operation of the sisters in all the churches: 4th That exsistent of gratitude be made to the Home Board Southern Eaptist nvention, and to the Woman's Missionary Union, Baltimore, and right to Miss Annie W. Armstrong for the valuable assistance that been given us; 5th That persistent efforts be made to circulate Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field among our people; 6th that proper mention be made of Buckner Colle. 7th That all our

missionary pastors labor to instill in the minds of their members. Bible teachings on the support of the ministry, and to teach giving an act of worship; 8th That mention be made of Elder A. A. Sput who fell asleep last Spring, and who was in the organization of the sociation; 9th That constant prayer be made that the spirit of mess that has so long ruled over our brethren, may continue, and the members of this very peculiar association may ever keep the mandment, to "love one another as I have loved you."
