### MINUTES.

#### FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The South Western Baptist Association of Arkansas met with Cana church, in Little River county, Ark., on Saturday, Oct. 7th, 1893.

At 9 o'clock A. M. Elder Joe H. Denson (former Moderator) callthe Association to order and introduced the services by reading Psalm

148, and engaging in prayer with Elder Thomas Dulaney.

The Moderator then announced the body ready for preliminary organization, when letters were presented from the churches, which were read by Bros. W. A. Ingle and J. L. Rivers, as per appointment by the Moderator. After letters were read and names of delegates enrolled, the Moderator appointed Bros. Y. R. Harbin and W. A. Turnage as tellers and the body proceeded to the election of a permanent Moderator and Clerk, which resulted as follows, to wit: For Moderator, Eld. Joe H. Denson; Clerk, C. M. Powell, whereupon the Moderator announced the body permanently organized for work.

Etd. M. M. Cochran then arose and on behalf of Cana church, with a very feeling and impressive talk, welcomed the delegation to

their hearts and homes.

By motion the body adj :urned till 2 P. M. to hear the annual sermon, which was delivered by Bro. C. M. Powell. from Luke xvi:16.

#### EVENING SESSION.

At 2 P. M. the body reassembled, as per adjournment, by song and

prayer by Bro. W. A. Turnage.

On motion the Moderator proceeded to appoint the usual committees, pending which, Bro. W. A. Ingle moved to add a committee on Family Devotion and one on Sabbath Observation to the regular list, which motion carried. Before the Moderator proceeded to the appointment of committees a motion prevailed to add the following brethren as delegatee from their respective churches, viz. Uuity, W. A. Turnage; Centre Point, J. L. Rivers; Bethel, U. Mosely, and O. D. Turner; Palestine, J. W. Ford, after which, the following committes were announced as follows:

The Moderator called for petitionary letters. Eagle Town church responded with letter and delegates, which was received, and right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator

On motion the body adjourned with prayer by Bro. Y. R. Harbin

until Monday morning at 8:30.

#### SECOND DAY-SUNDAY SERVICES.

At 10 A. M. Sunday Bro. J. M. Copeland conducted a prayer meeting service at the church, in which an hour was spent in talking upon the subject of prayer very profitably. At 11 A. M. Eld. Joe H. Denson preached an interesting discourse on the subject of Missions, to a large and attentive audience, at the close of which a collection was taken for Associational Missions, amounting to \$17.10. At 2:30, Eld. W. A. Turnage preached, and at night Eld. B. F. Farmer, of Tenn., preached,

#### THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

At 8:30 Monday morning the body was called to order, and after prayer by Eld B. F. Farmer, the Moderator invited visiting brethren to seats with us, and renewed the call for additional letters. Pleasant Valley responded.

The Committee on Sabbath Observation submitted their report, and after many instructive talks, was adopted. [See appendix E.]

The Committee on Foreign Missions submitted their report, and pending its adoption a collection was taken, amounting to \$10.55, for that work, whereupon the report was unanimously adopted. [See ap-

Bro J. D. Rogers submitted a request for letters of dismission for the following churches which was by motion granted, towit: Amity, Antioch Columbus, Cedar Hill, County Line, Centre Point, Fellowship, Holly Creek, Liberty, Mine Creek, Mineral Springs, New Home, Ozan, Pleasant Valley, Sweet Home, Unity, Sulpher Spring, Yellow Creek, Zion and Mt. Carmel.

The Committee on State Missions submitted their report, which

was by motion adopted. [See appendix G.]

By motion the body adjourned to 1:30 P. M., with prayer by the Brother Clerk.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The body reassembled at 1:30 P. M. as per adjournment, prayer by Brother Y. R. Harbin.

By request Bro. G. B. Parker was excused from further attendance

at this Association.

The Committee on Home Missions submitted their report, and by motion was tabled, subject to call.

Bro. M. M. Cochran in the chair.

The Committee on Finance submitted their report, which was by motion adopted. [See appendix H]

The Committee on Family Devotion submitted their report and

on motion was adopted. [See appendix I.]

The Committee on Destitution submitted their report, which was

by motion amended and adopted. [See appendix J.]

The Committee on Documents submitted their report, which was amended by substituting Lockesburg for Mt. Pleasant, and as amended was adopted. [See appendix K.]

The Committee on Prayer Meeting submitted their report, and by

motion it was adopted. [See appendix L.]

By request Bros. W. A. Turnage and D. A. Clark were excused.

Bro. Thomas Dulaney in the chair.

The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted their report, which was by motion adopted [See appendix M.]

Bro. Cochran in the chair.

By motion the body went into the election of delegates to the Southern Baptist and State Conventions, and corresponding delegates to sister Associations, to wit: To Southern Baptist Convention, Eld. C. M Powell, and Eld. M M. Cochran alternate; to State Baptist Convention, Bro. Joe Holman, and Eld. Joe H. Denson alternate; to Red River Association, Elders M. M. Cochran, J. D. Rogers and Bro. A. J. Robins; Ouachita, Elders W. A. Ingle, J. B. Ingle and T. H. Westbrooks; Texarkana, Bros. J. D. Adcock and J. H. Barkman; Union. J. B. Ingle; to Mine Creek, all the members of this Association who will attend.

The Committee on Literature submitted their report, which was by motion adopted. [See appendix N.]

The following was offered by Bro. J. D. Rogers, and on motion

was adopted:

RESOLVED, that this body tender its heart-felt thanks to this church and community for the unreserved hospitality shown it.

The Home Mission Board submitted their report, which was by motion adopted. [See appendix O.]

Bro. A. J. Robins in the chair.

The Treasurer submitted his annual report, which was adopted.

By motion the report on Home Missions was taken from the table, and after some discussion, was unanimously adopted. [See appendix Q] Bro. Denson in the chair.

The Moderator appointed Eld. M. M. Cochran and Bro. Joe Holman and J. R. Lewis as the Board of Ministerial Education as provided for in report of Committee on Ministerial Education.

The following was offered by Bro. M. F. Dennis, which was on

motion was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Bro. Clerk is hereby authorized to have 1,000 copies of the minutes printed and distributed, and he be allowed \$15 and postage for his services.

By motion the body went into the election of the Home Mission Board, to wit: Joe Holman, Chairman; J. J. Moore, J. H. Barkman,

H. S. Holt and G. W. Cowling.

By motion it was agreed that Union should be the place and Saturday at 8 A. M., before the 5th Sunday in December, 1893, as the time for holding the next Mission meeting.

By motion Bros. M. M. Cochran and J. W. Hubbard was appoin-

ted to prepare a program for the next Mission meeting.

The Committee on Ouachita College submitted their report, and

on motion it was adopted, [See appendix R.]

By motion Bros. J. R. Lewis and J. W. Hubbard were appointed to select preachers for next Association, who submitted their report, which was on motion adopted. [See appendix S.]

Bro M. M. Cochran then moved that the Association adjourn to meet with Lockesburg church, Sevier Co. Ark., on Saturday at 9. A. M.,

before the 2nd Sunday in October, 1894, which motion carried.

The congregation then arose and sang "God be With You," and gave the parting hand, after which Bro. L. D. Tate led the closing

prayer.

Thus the 13th annual session of the Association closed, and had it not been for a little uncalled-for friction toward the close, it would have been a very harmonious session. Nevertheless, all went home rejoicing. Our Mission Board starts out with an encouraging outlook, and the churches and pastors seem to be more determined to stand to the support of the Board than ever, and to the end that God may be

glorified; his cause built up and sinners converted, let us all fervently pray.

(3) That the Board hold the ground already occupied, by aiding weak churches located at important localities, and discourage the organization of weak churches so near others as to weaken them numerically, financially and religiously, and furthermore, discourage the organization of churches that are not likely to become self-sustaining. (4) We earnestly recommend that the Board begin this work at once and call upon the churches to sustain them; and that pastors more faithfully, prayerfully and zealously present this work to thheir respective churches, and thereby advance the cause of Christ in the remotest bounds of this Association. 
