## MINUTES.

#### SATURDAY, OCT. 7, 1899.

The Fayetteville Baptist Association met according to appointment with Springdale church, Washington county, Arkansas, on the date above. When the Moderator, Elder H. C. Winstead, called the same to order for business, and after the reading of one of the Psalms and prayer by Elder S. A. Riggs, Elder W. W. Gardner, superintendent of the Orphans' Home at Monticello, preached an excellent sermon, followed with prayer by Elder E Moss.

On motion the Association adjourned until 2 o'clock p. m.

2 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was called together with prayer by Elder J. A. Stone.

The letters from the different churches were then called for and read by Julge A L. Thompson and F. G Kimbrough, and messengers' names enrolled as per table of statistics.

Organization then resulted in the election of Elder H. C. Winsterd, Moderator, and H. P. Greene, Clerk and Freasurer.

Visiting ministers were invited to seats and the same accepted by Elder S A. Riggs.

Corresponding messengers were then called for and Bros. J. H. Boatright and J. C. Calico were received from Madison County Association, Mrs. A. Hobbs, of Bentonville, from Benton County Association, and a letter of correspondence from Clear Creek Association by the hand of Elder J. A. Peters who was given a seat with the body.

On motion the Association decided to meet at 9 a. m. and adjourn at 12, to convene again at 2 p. m. and adjourn at 5, to meet at 7:30 and adjourn at will.

Committee on Temperance-W. S. Luper and F. M. Brooks. Committee on Associational Missions-Elder A. H. Autry and F. E. Wilson.

Committee on Sunday Schools-G. A. Graves and A. L. Thompson.

Committee on Obituaries-C. O. Farmer and John Luper.

Committee on Orphans' Home-F G. Kimbrough and A L. Thompson.

Committee on Finance-G. W. Corbit and J. R. Peters.

Committee on Nominations-E. Webb, A. T. Hopkins, P. Armstrong and Will Roberts.

On motion Monday 10 o'clock a. m. was set for the report on Associational Missions, and report on Orphans' Home for tonight after the sermon.

On motion the Association then adjourned. Prayer by Elder D. L. Hood.

#### 7:30 AT NIGHT.

Elder Francis Bozeman preached a grand sermon to a large audience and the report of the committee on Orphans' Home read, and after some very appropriate remarks by A L. Thompson and an urgent appeal by Elder W. W Gardner in the interest of that noble institution, the report was adopted and a collection of \$25.00 was made.

On motion the Association then adjourned. Prayer by H. P. Greene.

#### SUNDAY MORNING.

Preaching at all the churches in the city by the different members of the Association and at 3 p. m Elder A. H. Autry buried 17 candidates, young ladies and young gentleman, in baptism.

#### MONDAY MORNING, 9 O'CLOCK.

The Association convened pursuant to adjournment. After singing prayer was offered by J. Crawford and the minutes of the former session read and approved.

On motion Bro. F. M. Brooks was excused on account of sickness.

On motion the letter of invitation by Prof. Shinn to visit

his school, was read and a committee of two appointed, to-wit: F. G Kimbrough and C. W. Walker, to attend and deliver to the Professor the thanks of the Association.

The report of the Committee on Denominational Education read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Education read and after some appropriate remarks in its support the same was adopted.

On motion the thanks of the Association be and is hereby extended to Bro. W W. Gardner and Sister Hoit Gardner, the Matron of the Orphans' Home at Monticello, for their care and management of that institution.

Report of the Committee on Associational Missions (together with the report of the Associational Missionary) read, and after remarks by Elder A. H. Antry, H. P. Greene, J. Crawford, D. L. Hood, A. L. Thompson and C. W. Walker, was adopted.

Report of the committee on Home Missions read and after some talks by Kimbrough, Walker and others the report was adopted.

On motion the hour of 3 o'clock was set for the report on State Missions.

#### 11 O'CLOCK A. M.

Elder E. Moss delivered an excellent and practical sermon, followed by a grand and forcible prayer by D. L. Hood, and the Association adjourned

#### MONDAY 2 O'CLOCK.

The Association convened and after singing and a prayer by Elder A. H. Autry proceeded to the business of the body.

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools read, and after remarks by C. W. Walker, H. P. Greene, A. L. Thompson, Elder R. Peters and Dr. Christian, etc., the report was adopted.

The Treasurer's report was then read and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions read and endorsed by Elder A. H. Autry, C. W. Walker, and adopted.

Report of the Committee on State Missions read and endorsed by C. W. Walker, Elder Riggs and Elder A. H. Autry, and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Nominations read and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Publication read and the report was adopted.

Report of the Associational Miss'onary and Executive Board read and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Finance read and adopted. Report of the Committee on Temperance read and adopted. Resolution No. 1 adopted. On motion W. B. Brogdon, F. Bozeman and C. W. Walker were chosen as delegates to the State Baptist Convention, and C. W Walker elected also a member of the State Board.

On motion any member of this Association having a minute of the same is authorized to act as correspondant to other associations.

On motion Elder A. H. Autry was chosen a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention and Bro. F. G. Kimbrough alternate.

On motion the Association adjourned until to-night after preaching.

7:30 AT NIGHT.

Elder H. C. Winsted preached a fine sermon on missions, after which the Association was ordered to business and on motion report of the Committee on Obituaries was read an l adopted.

On motion 500 copies of the minutes were ordered printed and the clerk to superintend the same, and that he be allowed \$10 00 for his services.

On motion the following Resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That any member of this Association being present at the State Convention at Jonesboro, Ark., may be enrolled as a delegate from this Association upon the presentation of a copy of these minutes or otherwise identified by any accreditable delegate

On motion the Association then adjourned to the time and place agreed upon. Prayer by Elder Francis Bozeman.

We regret to say that there has been a sad dereliction of duty on the part of Baptists of the Fayetteville Association in regard to State Missions We are not in touch with our brethren of South Arkansas in the great work of witnessing for Christ. Why is this? Is it because we are not in sympathy with the work? Is it because the plans for conducting the work are not wisely laid? Are we indifferent to the great work of bringing men and women to a knowledge of the truth as revealed in God's word because forsooth the work is not done within the bounds of our Association? No, surely this can not be. As Missionary Baptists we feel that we ought to witness for Christ not only in Jerusalem, but in Judea, and in Samaria and unto the utmost part of the earth Our State Board is composed of our ablest and most consecrated men; they have planned wisely, and the Baptists south of the Ark. River are in hearty sympathy and cooperation in the work as laid out by the Board. As a consequence of the well organized effort, only a few churches are pastorless, and four-fifths of all the money contributed for State work is given by the Baptists south of the river aided only by the Caroline Association north of the river These facts are given not so much as a matter of information as to arouse to a sense of our duty. May we all be impressed with the obligation resting upon us to give liberally to State Missions, and may the day speedily come when the gospel of the kingdom shall be proclaimed in every town and hamlet throughout the broad State of Arkansas.
