

Dear Ouachitonians,

The future is bright indeed if those of you who are shortly to become alumni will dedicate the years ahead to doing all within your power to make Ouachita "queen of the college world." If you will, then when your sons and daughters are ready for college, there will never be a moment's hesitation as to where they ought to go.




