Proceedings.

Paris, Ark., Sept. 15, 1900.

The Dardanelle Baptist Association met at 10 o'clock a. m., and was led in devotional exercises by Eld. J. R. G. W. N. Adams.

After a short intermission Eld. E. H. Stafford preached the introductory sermon from I. Cor. 3-16.

Adjourned to 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 p. m. the body re-convened and the Moderator read Ps. 116. Brother J. G. Fulmer led in prayer.

Read the annual reports of statistics from the churches.

An election was held for officers of the Association for the next year. R. C. Medaris and J. A. Jarrard were appointed tellers. While the ballot was being counted the Moderator appointed the pastor and deacons of Paris Church, together with Bros. J. G. Kirkpatrick and G. T. Hunter, a committee on Divine Service.

The tellers reported Eld. J. W. Richardson reelected Moderator and I. A. Huckaby re-elected Clerk and Treasurer. Enrolled Eld. R. C. Medaris as a visitor from Texas, and Bro. A. S. Jackson from Concord Association.

On motion the election of a Mission Board was deferred until the report of the Mission Board is made.

Moved, That the regular order of business be dispensed with and Corresponding Messengers be appointed to the different bodies with which we correspond; carried.

Appointed to Concord Association, Bro. W. O. Reynolds; to Russellville Association, Eld. J. R. G. W. N. Adams; to Clear Creek Association, Eld. M. P. Blair and F. M. Bradshaw; to Fourch Valley Association, Elds. E. H. Stafford and J. W. Richardson; to Buckner Association, Eld. J. P. Burk; to Arkansas State Convention, Bro. E. A. Kern and Elds. J. W. Richardson and J. P. Burk; to Southern Baptist Convention, W. E. Kimbrough.

The committee on Divine Service reported that Brother Medaris would preach at 7.30 p. m., and at the Methodist church on Sunday at 11 a. m.

Eld. W. B. Peeples, representing Central Baptist College at Conway, was enrolled as a visitor.

On motion and by his request Elder Richardson was excused from preaching the annual Missionary Sermon, and Elder Medaris was requested to preach the same, and Elder Kimbrough was appointed to preach at the Methodist church at 11 a. m. Sunday.

Adjourned to 7.30

The church at this place being in the midst of a revival Brother Medaris preached at 7.30 a splendid revival sermon from the text: "What will you do with Jesus?"

After the sermon Eld. W. A. Clark, of Little Rock, representing the Arkansas Baptist, was enrolled as a visitor and made a snort announcement of his business.

SUNDAY-MORNING SESSION.

At 10 a. m. a Sunday School meeting was addressed by Eld. W. A. Clark and Bro. I. W. Sander. At 11 a. m. Elder Medaris preached the annual Missionary Sermon. At the same hour Elder Kimbrough preached at the Methodist church. Mission collections at both places, \$18.80

Adjourned to 2.45

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Elder Medaris at 3 p. m. delivered an eloquent lecture on "Why I am opposed to the liquor traffic."

At 7.30 Eld. W. A Clark preached to a fine audience from Matt. 1-21.

At the same hour Elder Richardson preached at the Methodist church from Luke 14-17

Adjourned to 8 a. m. Monday.

MONDAY-MORNING SESSION.

At 8 o'clock the Moderator read I. John, 3d chapter, and Eld. L. A. Robertson led in prayer.

Read and approved minutes of Saturday and Sunday.

Called the roll and marked the absentees.

Enrolled Eld. R. R. Elmore as a visitor.

The Treasurer read his report and on his motion it was referred to the Finance Committee.

Elder Robertson read the report of the committee on Temperance, as follows:

WE, YOUR COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE, BEG LEAVE TO SUBMIT THE FOLLOWING REPORT:

The cause of Temperance is one that all good people should be interested in, because we all recognize the fact that intemperance is a great evil and a curse on our civilization, and there is but one way to meet this great foe, and that is by being well informed and well organized, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we as messengers of this body urge our brethren everywhere to subscribe for the Searchlight, and we also recommend the organization of Anti-Saloon Leagues in every township in the bounds of this Association.

W. R. Bass read the report of the committee on Education:

WE YOUR COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION ASK LEAVE TO SUBMIT THE FOLLOWING:

To become educated should be the object of every youth and lass, every young man and young lady in our country. To get an education, time and money must be spent; energy, pluck and interest must be excrted. These things expended and put forth in the wrong direction may end in failure and even disgrace. The hopes of the Nation depend upon the education of the rising generation. 'We must educate or we must perish by our neglect to do so. It gives us great pleasure to notice the rapid progress that Baptists are making in higher education. And we can not recommend too highly the work, influence, power and dignity of our Baptist colleges in the State, to-wit: Ouachita Baptist, Central and Mountain Home. They have the most approved faculty, are desirous and in every way worthy of your support. But beloved brethren, we wish you to understand that there is a work underlying the college work. The common or free schools where the rank and file of us are educated, is where the college student gets his preparation and impetus to higher education. Brethren, many of you are school directors, and nearly all of you are patrons of the free schools. We earnestly beg you, in Christ's name, to give them your heartiest help and co-operation. Watch over them as you would your young and growing crops. From these schools in the beginning come the maply forms and giant intellects who are the leaders in the good work. Observe with a critical eye the academies and high schools of your country and give them your support as well as you can. Encourage to the greatest degree your Sanday Schools. The greatest mind-training often comes to naught without a knowledge of our Savior, therefore patronize your denominational schools.

Eld. W. E. Kimbrough offered the following preamble and resolutions, which were adopted:

WHEREAS, An academy is being erected by the people of Magazine; and WHEREAS, When completed this academy is to be the property of and controlled by the Board of Trustees of Ounchita College, therefore,

RESOLVED, That it is the duty of our churches to give their moral and financial

support to its success.

RESOLVED, That our pastors he specially requested to put forth their best efforts to secure for this school a liberal patronage. W. E. KIMBROUGH.

The report of the committee on Sunday Schools was read:

Your committee on Sunday Schools find that sixteen churches report schools, with 893 pupils, 110 officers and teachers and 71 classes, and that sixteen report no schools. We urge that a great effort be made to organize schools in all of the churches. We recommend Sunday School Conventions. We recommend the studying of the Bible with S. B. C. literature as helps.

Bro. J. C. Sugg read the report on Documents as follows:

Your committee on Documents find that Briar Creek and Cedar Creek Churches respectfully invite the next session of this body. We further find by consulting the messengers from Briar Creek Church that they will yield in favor of Cedar threek Church, and we your committee recommend that the next session of this budy be held with Cedar Creek Church.

Adopted.

Eld. J. S. Gray read the report on Publications:

We your committee on Publications report as follows: Our Savior asks the "How readest thou?" Reading is important. We recommend:

1st. That all our people "Scarch the Scriptures"
2nd. Among the many excellent Baptist papers and periodicals we recommend the Arkansas Baptist, the Foreign Mission Journal, Our Home Field and louthern Baptist Sunday School Literature.

J. S. GRAY, Ch'n LIGHT. HALL.

Discussed by Dr. W. A. Clark and adopted.

The committee on Divine Service reported that Ilder Richardson had been appointed to occupy the pulpit at 11 o'clock. Brother Richardson asked the committee to excuse him on account of his arduous duties as Moderator and on motion the name of H. II. Street was substituted for that of J. W. Richardmon and the report adopted.

Elder Kimbrough read the report of the Committee on State Missions:

In the report of the committee on State Missions at the Jonesboro Convention, we find it recommended, among other things, "that our State Board occupy the field as fully as possible, in the way they may think best." According to appointment, the Board met after the convention, and planned the year's work on a basis of \$5,000. Eld. A. J. Barton was elected Corresponding Secretary at a salary of \$1500, tog ther with moving office and traveling expenses. Three hundred is paid him by the Foreign Board and the same amount by the Home Board for his services in behalf of Home and Foreign Mission work. The work of the Secretary consists mainly in visiting and preaching to churches and associations and taking collections; in editing a page of the Arkansas Baptist, and in conducting general office correspondence.

The Board aids in the support of nineteen pastors; also in the support of seven associational missionaries in cu-operation with their local boards.

We understand that volunteer work has been done by some of our pastors.

From different parts of the field cheering reports are coming of work having been and now being done. We trust that at the convention the report of the Board will compare favorably with that of last year. Lack of means has prevented the Board from supplying many needy fields. About \$2,000 must be raised in the next two months if we go to the Convention without debt. This Association is pledged for \$100.00, and your committee recommends that pledges be taken aggregating that amount at this time, payable between now and November 15.

Our loyalty to the State work must be strengthened and continued. We would emphasize the oneness of State Missions, and would remind you that the lines of our Association are only for convenience, and not for separation from the forces beyond them. We earnestly urge co-operation, full and complete, according to the plans adopted by the State Board; and would exhort our brethren to refrain from reflections and insinuations on the Christian integrity of the brethren who formed them. Let us remember that they are our "servants for Christ's sake," and that they formed these plans in loyalty and love for our Master's cause.

The Board has recently employed a most excellent brother to labor in our destitute towns on the Choctaw railroad, and he is now on the field. We would impress the importance of keeping the needs of the field and the merits of the work before the churches, and of taking regular collections for State Missions.

Adjourned to 1.30

Eld. H. H. Street preached at 11 from Acts 2.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1.30 p. m. reconvened and after prayer resumed consideration of report on State Missions. It was discussed by Bros. Medaris, Kimbrough, Clark, Street and Stafford and adopted. During the discussion pledges were taken for State Missions amounting to \$50.00

J. P. Burk read the report on Foreign Missions: WE, YOUR COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS, BEG LEAVE TO SUBMIT THE FOLLOWING:

WHEREAS, Our blessed Redeemer has commanded us to go into all the world and preach His gospel to every creature and realizing His commission was given unto His Church, if we as Baptists are what we profess to be, upon us rests the great responsibility of sending His gospel to dark and benighted souls who are lost unless reached by His gospel; therefore it becomes the duty of every child of God to help send His gospel to those who have it not, not only because He has commanded it of us, but as a demonstration of our love to Him who has said "If ye love me keep my commandments." Discussed by Brother Medaris and adopted. Eld. J. R. G. W. N. Adams read the report on Associational Missions:

Your Committee on Associational Missions submit the following Report:
We find that many portions in our bounds are without Baptist preaching. With
this fact before us we would recommend that we endeavor to supply these destitute portions with Baptist preaching. We would recommend that an associational
missionary be appointed to travel and preach at destitute points in our Association. We should awaken to a sense of the situation that now confronts us. Errors
of every hue are being taught all over our bounds. We must meet these with the
word of God, and a man or men able to combat these errors. The crisis is on us.
The enemy is on the field. Shall we falter? We would further recommend that
pledges be taken from the messengers of the churches to support said missionary.

The Executive Board, through I. A. Huckaby, Secretary, reported as follows:

The Executive Board held a meeting at Briar Creek Church in October and organized by electing Eld. T. P. Manning Chairman and I. A. Huckaby Secretary. All the members were present except Brother Richardson. At this meeting it was decided to continue the work at Elizabeth Hall, and to establish stations at Rocky Spring, near Sugar Grove, and at Bluftton. The work at Rocky Spring was offered to Bro. M. P. Henry, who was present and who accepted the offer of the Board to pay \$25 for two sermons a month from January 1 to the meeting of the Association, and a protracted meeting in the summer. The Secretary was instructed to offer the work at Elizabeth Hall to Eld. J. S. Gray, and that of Blufton to Eld. J. P Burk on the same terms. It was further agreed to employ a man for his full time to work at Ola and Danville and to ask the help of the State Mission Board in paying his salary. Eld. J. W. Richardson was offered this work at a salary of \$500 a year, and the Secretary was instructed to correspond with him in regard to the matter.

Eld. W. N. Dodd was requested to make at least three monthly trips to Zion Church and endeavor to stir it up and get it to work. He accepted the Board's offer, but has never made any report of work performed.

Brother Eichardson declined the work offered him, and as there was no other meeting of the Board the attempt to occupy Ola and Danville as mission stations failed

Bros. Gray and Burk accepted the work at Elizabeth Hall and Bluffton, reports of which follow.

Report of M. P Henry:

Sermons, 10; exhortations 2; families visited 7; miles traveled 80. There were no conversions that I know of, but the prospect for good there is favorable. I recommend that the work there be continued. In addition to this work done for the Board I preached one sermon a month at County Line, voluntary mission work, and held a meeting during the summer, at which place there were 30 conversions, 15 of whom were added to the Cedar Creek Church.

M. P. HENRY, Missionary.

Eld. J. S. Gray reports work at Elizabeth Hall:

Began work in February and kept up regular monthly services. There were no visible results. I recommend that in future this work be done in connection with Eminence Church, which is only four miles from Elizabeth Hall.

Sermous preached 10; Sanday School talks 2; miles traveled 160.

J. S. GRAY, Missionary.

Report of Eld. J. P. Burk, at Bluffton:

Sermons preached 26; homes visited 20; conversions 1; prayer meetings present 5; prayers in homes 4; miles traveled 216; collected on the field 75c.

I regard Bluffton as a hard field, Methodism having had full sway, but feel that a good work has been done, and with proper cultivation much good will be accomplished. As a proof of my faith in the future of Bluffton I expect to keep a regular appointment there if the Board does not send a man there.

J. P. BURK, Missionary.

Bro, E. H. Gray reported to the Board that he had done some mission work at Liberty Spring on the recommendation of Bros. Logan and Manning, members of the Board, and of Antioch Church; that he had made seven trips to that point and had some encouragement in the work; also recommended that the work be continued. The people at Liberty Spring agreed to pay \$7.50 for the work done if the Board would pay an equal sum.

On motion Brother Gray's report was received and he was allowed \$7.50 out of the mission fund of the Association. All of which is respectfully submitted.

WHEREAS, One Joe A. McCrary, an ignorant but egotistic man, has been traviling over this Association and imposing himself on some of our churches and pustors, claiming to be a regularly ordained Baptist minister; whereas, by his strange conduct he is injurious to our cause; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That this Association has no confidence in him or his work as a preacher, and we warn our people and all others against him.

RESOLVED. That we request the Arkansas Baptist to publish this resolution.

On motion the Moderator was instructed to appoint the Mission Board and also a member of the State Mission Board. Bro. R. E. Cole was appointed member of the State Mission Board, and Bros. M. L. Stewart, R. H. Dacus, G. T. Hunter, W. L.

Rice and T. J. Ballenger were appointed Associational Mission Board.

Bro. W. N. Womack read the report of the committee on Orphan's Home:

The duty devolved by exalted civilization and the pure spirit of our Master moved the minds and hearts of the Baptist family of Arkansas to build a home for the indigent orphans of our State. The State Convention established the Orphan's Home in 1894, now in operation at Monticello, Drew County- This Orphan's Home is a good thing and we ought to support it with our prayers and with our means.
