Report of Committee on Orphans' Home was now presented, read, discussed by Bro. E. D. Cooper, and adopted as read: We, the Committee on Orphanage, respectfully submit the

following:

First, we are profoundly grateful to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon this department of our work through another year. The progress of the children along all lines has

been most gratifying.

There are to date one hundred and thirty-eight children in the home, most of whom are attending the school kept in manection with the home. Sixteen of these children have prolessed faith in Christ and have been baptized into the Baptist Aurch during the past year, There have been two deaths in the home since the last report.

The home at present is one thousand dollars in debt, and we urge that the different pastors and churches take immediate

ction in relieving the home of this financial stringency.

The home at present being without a field agent and being entirely dependent on the churches, Sunday Schols, societies and individuals for maintenance, we recommend that all the churches take monthly contributions for the home, and the different Clerks to forward this money direct to Bro. J. N. Williams. We also recommend that each church have an annual committee composed of small boys and girls to take subscriptions for the Orphans' Gem, and solicit contributions for the home.

We also recommend that the ladies who desire to do special aid individually for the home to give the proceeds of their sunday eggs to this work. We also re-affirm our allegiance to this noble work and pledge enlarged sympathy, help and gifts

to it.

Home Missions.

The Committee on Home Missions beg to present the following report for the consideration of this body. It was discussed at some length by Bro. J. S. Rogers, Bro. W. J. Bearden, and Bro. A. J. A. McKinney. Moved and seconded that the report be adopted with the word "quarterly" before collection stricken out: carried:

Committee on Home Missions report as follows:

By reference to the Home Board's report we learn the follow facts:

Epitome of the Year.

Last year the Home Mission Board conducted mission work in all the States in the Southern Baptist Convention, including New Mexico, and in Cuba and the Canal Zone.

The number of missionaries in service was 1,302. About 150 of these were maintained wholly by the Home Mission Board, and the others by the Board in co-operation with other agencies. Besides work among white Americans, mission activities were conducted among the Negroes, Indians, Italians, Spaniards, Germans, Mexicans, Swedes, Cubans and Panamans.

During the year Home Board missionaries baptized 26,866, received a total number of 49,297 persons into the churches, organized 235 churches, built 289 houses of worship, and held 243 evangelistic meetings. (Twenty-six mountain mission schools had under instruction 4,419 students. A mission school for Cubans was conducted in Havana, one for Italians in Tampa and one for Mexicans in El Paso. The Baptist colleges of Oklahoma and New Mexico were assisted in getting on their feet. A large number of churches were aided in erecting houses of worship.)

The receipts during the year from the various States were \$333,534. From all sources the receipts were \$344.895, as compared with \$339,735 from all sources for 1910, a gain of \$5,160

for 1911.

The average gift per member to Home Missions for 1910 was a fraction more than fifteen cents, and for 1911 a fraction less than fifteen cents. A great awakening to the Home Mission cause is shown to be due by these averages. Fifteen cents a member for the great work of saving America through Home Missions is a pitifully small amount!

Needs and Opportunities.

There was never before so much need of Home Missions in the South as now, and there have never been richer opportunities than those which beckon Southern Baptists to redouble their efforts for saving America.

The larger needs have come from the growth of population, the growth of industrialism and the consequent population changes, from the vast growth in the South of material wealth. and from the recent large movement of people into the South-

west.

The increasing rate at which immigrants are coming into the South is enlarging the taks of Home Missions, and the new and intenser conditions of living in the cities urge us to more capable city mission endeavor.

These new conditions of living penetrated the far-extending rural districts of the South where 5-6 of Southern Baptists live. and the hold of the country churches on the rising generation

is threatened.

The old rural isolation has been largely done away with by rural mail delivery, better roads, telephones, better farming ma-

chinery and automobiles.

A new and intenser intellectual atmosphere stimulates the young people. Alas, it so often has not its center as formerly in the churches! It may be that God has allowed this crisis to press upon Baptist efficiency in the country to reprove us for having as a denomination, so long neglected the converts whom we evangelized.

We received the great commission to preach and baptize, but did not read the last part of it, which is to develop, cultivate-"teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

The 11,000 Southern Baptist churches that give nothing whatever to mission and bennevolent activities are a reproach to the denomination; they convince us of not havinw added cultivation to evangelization in our domestic mission enterprises If we do not arouse ourselves to a greatly enlarged conception of the Home Mission enterprise and rally to its support, there is a danger which is almost tragic in these thousands of uneducated churches.

Baptists have always been great in the country. They came not maintain their greatness and fulfill their mission without their 'arge country constituency. They cannot in the new life which has come to the country hold that constituency, if they

continue to neglect to cultivate and train it.

From the reports given in the letters we find that \$50.60 has been paid from this Association during the last year. We would recommend that our churches take collections quarterly for this work.

Committee.

Foreign Missions.

The Committee on Foreign Missions report as follows, after after being discussed by Bro. A. J. A. McKinney, Bro. B. H. Par-

rish, it was adopted as read:

The command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," is one that knows no bounds and not to favor Foreign Missions is simply to be anti-missionary. By reference to the record of this Association, we find we have been doing very little for this department of our work. The minute of last year shows less than \$50,00 contributed by the entire Association, and the letters this year show less than \$75.00 tributed.

This means serious neglect and lack of interest in this exceedingly important matter, and, brethren, it ought not so to be: The Foreign Mission Board is directing a great work and we call attention to the following taken from last year's report from our foreign fields: We maintain work on seven fields: Argentina, Africa, Brazil, China, Italy, Japan and Mexico.

We have about 365 missionaries and 540 native workers, 289 churches with 539 out-stations; and a membership of 19,239. We have 218 Sunday Schools, with 11,156 scholars. We have 142 day schools with 3,771 pupils; 11 boys' boarding schools with 721 students; 12 girls' boarding schools, with 610 students. We have 8 woman's training schools with 179 students, and 8 theological training schools, with 200 students.

A partial report of this year shows 3,223 baptisms.

The outlook is encouraging and we feel that we are on the

threshold of a new era and great opportunities.

We commend that each church take a Foreign Mission collection during the year and that some contribution be made and reported by the church to the Association, be that contribution ever so large or small, and sent to Jno. T. Christian, Little Rock, Ark.

Ministerial Education.

We, your Committee on Ministerial Education, beg leave to report as follows.

Report discussed briefly by Bro. Christian and adopted as

read.

The Subject of Ministerial Education is one in which every real Baptist should be intensely interested. Nothing of more importance before our Associational meetings. It is far from being a secondary or side issue. Baptists will show far-reaching wisdom and denominational statesmanship if we press Ministerial Education after a splendid fashion. We will show our utter folly and lack of leadership if we play with this matter.

Christianity is a preaching religion. No other religion of earth has the preacher. We are afraid of ritualism. It is inevitable that we put the main emphasis on ritualism or preaching. It has been so in the history of the world. Real religion and Baptist interests are very vitally at stake in this matter. Brethren, it is without doubt a call of God that we support Min-

isterial Education after a worthy fashion.

In Ouachita Baptist College at Arkadelphia there are now some fifty young preachers. Ouachita is our State denominational school. Nearly all of these young preachers have to have financial help to stay in college. Bro. J. S. Rogers is giving all of his time to the Bible Department. The Lord is greatly blessing the work. The Board of Ministerial Education at Ouachita will help each preacher as much as \$7.50 a month if it is necsary, but this Board depends on the churches for the funds used.

We mention with special favor our Theological Seminaries at Ft. Worth and Louisville. Our own Bro. Dallas Faulkner is

now in the Ft. Worth Seminary.

Your committee would recommend four things: First, that all of our young preachers who possibly can, go to Ouachita. Second, that a worthy cash collection be taken tonight.

Third, that all your pastors preach on Ministerial Education

at least once each year.

Fourth, that everyone of our churches take a collection for this interest between now and June 1 and send to J. S. Rogers, Arkadelphia.

We would recommend the use of the Sunday School literature of the Southern Baptist Convention published at Nashville.
