Report on Sabbath Schools being called for the committee reported as follows:

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sabbath schools would submit the following: Regarding the Sunday School as the nursery of the church, your committee is of the opinion that there is no department of christian labor (preaching the gospel being excepted), so productive of good to the church as the existence of Sabbath Schools, and it is with emotions of heartfelt sadness, we announce the fact that there has been, and still is so much apathy and indifference towards the subject. While the mind is young and tender, and while the youth of our country are able to claim the promise of scripture, "They that seek me early shall find me," and ere the evil days have come when the mind has received a firm and settled bias from long practice to working of iniquity-is the time for parents and christians to speak for Jesus. In order to do this most effectually, the most practicable way, is the organization of Sabbach Schools, conducted by christian men and women of experience, and whose primary and great object should be the conversion of all who enter the school. The reports of the different Churches generally evince the fact that where the Sabbath School is the most faithful are the greatest revivals of religion, and the Sabbath School papils largely swell the number of converts. Brethren, the time for united, vigorous action has come-Romanism hurled from power, and shorn of its andority in the Old World, fastens its eyes upon the new, and openly hoasts of its ability to xield the scepter of government and sway the destiny of our nation in the next thirty years. And how can this be accomplished? They themselves furnish the answer! "Through the children of the country," Afrendy their numbers are largely on the increase-already-the dark cloud-is rising above the horisons and the matterings of its thunder are distinctly heard; and shall be be less foresighted than them? Shall we not seize upon this department, which in their hands forms such in tremendous power for evil, and with the blessing of Goldura it into an instrument of good. Brethren, Baptists, to the resene, and by us no longer neglige the means God has placed in our bands, but let us resolve that we will act in this matter, and that immediately, and conlinue in act unil every church in ou. Association has established a Surday School which shall be thoroughly B otis; in its teaching, and confacted by those who are neither afraid nor ashvared to s, eak for less. We believe that the church was more constituted, whose duty it

as not to meet every Subbath, for religious instruction and devotion. We believe it would be a step in the right direction, "if we
would in tuture, never recognize or constitute a church unless those
propesing thus to be recognized would agree to adopt this rule of
action. Did not the Apostolic churches meet vogether on the first
day of each week for some religious purpose. In view of these facts
and the great importance of the matter, we would recommend the
adoption of the following:

TEMPERANCE.

Your committee on temperance beg leave to call the attention of the hody to the importance of all philanthropists doing all in their power to oppose the use of ardent spirits as a beverage. The country is paying more for intemperance than all the taxes of the government. A large majority of the crimes of the country have their origin in intemperance. Our churches have more trouble from intemperance, than any other cause. We never can put down druntenness while we advocate and practice the moderate use of ardent spirits as a beverage. Any use of ardent spirits not for medicinal mechanical or sacramental purposes leads to intemperance. Therefore, resolved that every scriptural means should be used to stop the spread of intemperance. Respectfully submitted,

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Your committee of Home Missions, beg to submit the following: That while great destitution still prevails within our bounds, yet the outlook is more encouraging than hitherto, that through the labors of our Missionary, regular preaching has been established at

Bible Union and Hengewell-and those churches are now, in working order. Also the hugh the lawers of Brother Clack our State Mission. ary, the cause las here revived at Brinkley and Helena. Brother Wilcon has also moved within our Association, and Brother Clark

has been called to the care of the Helena Church.

We learn that several of our ministers are doing little or no breaching, otherwise the field would be tolerably well supplied, their exense laring that the churches fail to support them, and they are consistled to resort to secular pursuits, in order to support their families. How shall this state of affairs be remedied? We would recommend that three or four of our church s that are contiguous, unite and secure the serfices of some Minister, and settle han within their midst, and support him, that he night devote his whole time to the ministry. The gaspel must be Self-sustaining, for the great head of the church has occasined that they who preach the gospel should live of the gospel. But the question arises how can this he done owing to the impoverished can dition of the churches." We reply by having your Minister within your reach, each and exery one can do something towards his support in the way of clothing or provisions; thereby loosing his bands, and rendering him efficient in the work of the Ministry. Our Ministers do not expect to be made rich, but do expect, and the Bible requires that they should receive a decent support. Brethien, the great fault is our tack of faith in our Blessed Redeemer-let us arouse ourselves, shale off our lethargy, put on the whole armor of Carist, and by the help of the Lord we can take possession of the field. All of which is 'respecifully submitted.
