REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Baptists, stand for the highest and fullest development of all the faculties with which God has endowed us. Recognizing this fact as we do today it behooves us to take advantage of the many opportinities that lie at doors of promoting the cause of higher education. In this age of progress and advancement the call is for men and women, boys and girls with enlarged visions, who are capable of grasping and solving the many complicated problems which confront us today. Indifference toward the cause of that higher development for which our splendid system of schools and colleges stand today is the cause of so much infidelity as manifested by our people.

It has been truly said "We must educate or we perish."

The need of the denominational school today, teaching as it does the great fundamental truths of the Bible, is greater than ever before. We should fully comprehend the great fact that there is lying dormant, power and energy undeveloped in the hearts and minds of our boys and girls, which should and must be cultivated. And for the accomplishment of this, we have established Friendship Normal Academy in our midst the creature of this body. We recommend that F. N. A. receive at your hands that true and loyal support which it so much deserves.

The Board of Trustees of Friendship Normal Academy submit the following report:

With gratitude to God, loyal friends and patrons, we desire to note that the records of our school the past year reveals the fact that it was the most successful in its history, supplying as it does a long felt need of such an institution in our Association. With the hearty co-operation and support of our people, which it deserves, we anticipate a bright future. A strong faculty has been secured for the present term, and although we are very much hampered by the loss of our Dormitory we feel that under God and wise management we will be able to report advancement the present term.

With regret we mention the burning of our Dormitory, which occurred on the night of May 11th, 1908, but realizing the importance of maintaining one in connection with our school, and being encouraged by the sympathy expressed by its friends, we were prompted to plan and undertake the erection of a much larger and more commodious building, which, when completed, will be a credit to our Association. The main building is 68x76, two stories, containing twenty-eight rooms, with twelve foot cross halls. All sufficiently large and ventilated to insure comfort and health.

The school is no longer an experiment, but has demonstrated beyond a doubt, its value in providing a means for boys and girls to educate them-

selves who otherwise could not have educational advantages.

Your Board most earnestly insists that if we maintain our credit as a denomination along educational lines, we must take no backwasd step, but with renewed energies each and every Baptist within the bounds of this Association must rally to the support of this institution. The work is ours and the demand is upon us. The world is looking for results. Shall we, like valient soldiers, bestir ourselves in this enlightened age of progress and advancement, and reap the reward that is so near our door..

REPORT ON PROHIBITION.

We, your committee on Prohibition offer the following Resolutions:

1. Resolved that, Just as long as whiskey is in the land men will drink it, and just as long as men drink it there will be drunk men in our land, and just as long as there are drunk men in the land there will be crime and sorrow. Also there will be men on the market for sale.

Now Brethren of Friendshp Association, as we have been so long discussing the subject of Prohibition, and trying to get men to let drink alone, and we still have men in our churches that will drink, and as long as we hold in our membership and fellowship the drinking men we cannot have the influence over the drinking population that we should. And as thus is so, and as Jesus Christ has said that His Church is the Light of the World. Therefore be it

Resolved, That this body or Association recommend that every church belonging thereto show their loyalty to Jesus Christ by withdrawing fellowship at once from everyone who drinks, and who will not quit drinking. thereby showing our loyalty to Jesus Christ, the head of the church, who said to his church, "Withdraw from everyone who walks disorderly."

Sunday School Report.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, find in examining the letters from the churches—twenty-four that report Sunday Schools, with number of scholars enrolled 2,110 and 130 teachers.

We only found 4 churches without schools. We have gained from 1,756 to 2,082, and from 18 to 24 schools So we would urge the pastors of every church in their care to have a Sunday School. We find reported 411 baptisms, and the greater portion have come from the Sunday Schools. So, let us look after the children and the lost of our community.

Report on Home Missions, read by J.S. Rogers, chairman. Adopted.

Home Missions Report.

Our hearts ought to be stirred to deep gratitude to God for His marvelous blessings on our Home Mission work the past year. Never before in the history of our denomination has God so opened the windows of Heaven and showered his blessings upon this work. During the year there were nearly 20,000 baptisms, some 16,000 additions by letter to our churches about 200 churches—and 600 or 700 Sunday Schools organized under the direction of our Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga. The number of souls led to Jesus and prepared for glory reached up into the tens of thousands. Hundreds of weak churches have been strengthened, aided in building meeting houses and helped otherwise. Arkansas Baptists gave to this work \$7,563.00.

Our brethren of the State Association see the great need of Home Mission work, and during the year have done good work. They have preached the Gospel effectively, many have been converted and good done otherwise. Let us thank God for all this good work and be greatly encouraged.

We would urge of our pastors to preach on and emphasize Home Missions more and more, and recommend that every church in this Association without fail take a collection for this great work. To do effective work, owing to the heathen, we must be strong at home. So let us lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes in all our southland and Cuba, and then God will give us the heathen. Report on Orphan's Home, read by G. H. Gammill, after which a collection was taken as follows: Cash \$6.00 for Texarkana Home, and \$9.95 for Monticello Home. Adopted.

Ophan Home Report.

We are profoundly grateful to God for the progress we have made in Orphanage work in Arkansas the past few years. Twenty years ago no Baptist Association in our State had a report on Orphanage work. Now we have two Orphanages; one at Monticello, the other at Texarkana. Both of them are doing good work. Adjoining States are doing far more in this line of work than Arkansas. Our Orphanages receive children from infants to ten years for boys and thirteen for girls, and keep them until eighteen. The Home at Monticello has changed management and been greatly improved the past year. It is now like a new institution. All who visit it are delighted with Brother and Sister T. J. Neely, who have it in charge. We urge every church, Sunday School and Ladies Aid Society to make at least one offering annually to this work. And we think it would be wise to have Bro. F. P. Turner visit them on these occasions and tell them about the work in detail. We also recommend that the Association make an offering for this work now. Respectfully Submitted,

Report on Foreign Missions, read by E. Ryland. Discussed and adopted. Foreign Missions Report.

We, your committee on Foreign Missions, submit the following report:

The obligation to "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," is made binding by the last command of our Lord. This obligation reaches to the uttermost parts of the earth. We may feel the force of the command more at home because we see the needs here, but our obligations to Christ in relation to China, Japan, Africa, and other parts of the earth, are of no less binding importance than to reach the lost in the community where we reside. Paul felt himself "pure from the blood of all men," because he had done his best to declare unto them the whole counsil of God from the place of his conversion at Damascus into Judea, in other parts of Asia, in to Greece and on to Rome. And his plans called for his going even on to Spain.

We are glad to note the growth of this spirit. Our noblest and best are offering themselves on the altar of service to go to every part of the world. Perhaps fifty of our young people in Arkansas have signified the desire on God's opening, to carry the message of life to the lost. And with this giving of themselves has come upon others a readiness to give more largely of their means. Last year Southern Baptists gave through the Southern Baptist Convention \$402,000.00 for this work, and the Lord gave them 2,200 baptisms on our foreign fields. Of this amount Arkansas Baptists gave \$10,235.00. But what is this among so many? The average for Arkansas Baptists is a little over ten cents each. For the South the average is 20 cents each. How small this in comparison with our members and wealth! Many children gave a dollar each. What ought the men and women do?

We would urge the givers to give more, and that they seek to enlist more givers in all our churches. Let Friendship Association come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty.




