PROCEEDINGS.

New Bethel Church, Gilkey, Ark., Sept. 20, 1902.
The Dardanelle Baptist Association convened at 10 o'hlock a.
III. and engaged in devotional exercises, led by Elder J. W. Richardson.

The Moderator and Clerk both being absent, the body elected Elder J. W. Richardson Moderator, and Elder M. E. Blair temporary Clerk.

The body then elected permanent officers. Elder E. M. Blair was chosen Moderator, and J. I. Cowger, Clerk and Treasurer.

Petitionary letters were called for, and Havanna, Little Cedar Creek and Pine Grove Churches were received and the hand of fellowship extended to their messengers.

A. H. Autry read the report of Committee on Foreign Misslone

The spirit of missions began in Heaven. For statistical information, we refer the brethren to minutes of the State Convention and of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is with pain we must record the react, that not more than one in twelve of churches this year gave anything to for eign missions, so far as the letters show. This is a sad state of things indeed.

We may be a kind of Baptists, but surely not many of our children would suspect that we are Missionary Baptists. "By their fruits ye shall know them."

Therefore, we recommend that our churches give of their substance to preach rospel in the regions beyond," or else cease their loud claims to be Missionary

To this end, we recommend that the churches read and re-read Matt. 2878-20 until they can imbibe the Savior's spirit and obey his injunction, "Why call ye me Lord, and do not the things which I say."

mance of a Baptist orphanage at Monticello.

We have now 55 children in the home. In May, 1900, we began the erection of building of twelve rooms and a chapel. This building is now completed, and

The home is a combination of the family, school, Bible class, domestic nurlarry and industrial school. We lay this great work on the heart of our people, and

When you wish a higher education for your boys and girls, patronize Ouachita or Central College, or our own Magazine Ouachita Academy. Their management at present could not be better. Give all the help and encouragement you can to other academies and high schools. Provide every advantage possible for your dis-

trict school.

The pubic school interests of our state and nation, are beset by many dangers and secret foes. As the moth to the strong beehive, so is the Roman Catholic influence to our public schools. Bishop Ireland has said: "We will control the United States the next ten years, if we can control the Indians, the negroes, and the public schools." Eternal vigilance is the price of safety. H. H. Street read thereport on Sunday Schools.

The day has passed for us to plead for Sunday Schools as a theory, but the lack of schools in the Association is sad. There are only 17 reported to this session. can find only a few more than 300 Baptist Sunday Schools in Arkansas, while there are about 1300 churches. Surely our people need to be awakened to a sense of their duty in this great and promising field. We are pleased to report that the Sunday School and Colportage Board of the Baptist State Convention for more than five years has been carrying this work steadily forward in Arkansas. Last year they organized and supplied with literature 92 schools, and distributed many bibles testaments, tracts and religious books. Only three churches of the Association have contributed to this work this year. We recommend to the churches that they foster this important enterprise, and to the missionaries of the Association that they do what they can to organize and set to work a Sunday School in every community where they may be able to do so.

The Committee finds that the Mission Board of the Association outlined the work for the past year upon the basis of \$175.00. It employed four missionaries to preach regularly and hold protracted meetings at four destitute places, and also supplemented the salary of one pastor. As to the results of the work, we refer to the report of the Executive Board. Also we find that there are other destitute points, and recommend that our churches contribute more liberally that these may be supplied.

W. E. Kimbrough:

Notwithstanding the fact that for over half a century the Baptists of Arkansas have conducted mission work through associations and conventions destitution largely exists in every part of the state. Thousands among us are perishing without the gospel. Arkansas is a great mission field, and our people have the moans and opportunity to occupy it. Much has been accomplished, and thousands of souls have been led to Christ through the instrumentality of our missionaries, but the demands are greater now than ever before. In view of the ueeds of the field, Baptists of the State have upon them a great responsibility. If the people of the State receive the gospel in its entirety, it must be given them through the Baptists. Therefore we recommend, without reference to plans or mothods, that our pastors take regular collections, and that our people contribute more liberally toward State wide mission work.
