PROCEEDINGS

Friday Evening, October 17, 1913.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That at the Thirty-Ninth Annual Session of the Grand Prairie Baptist Association begun and held in Center Point Baptist Church on Friday night before the third Sunday in October, 1913, the time and place prescribed by last association for holding said annual session; present and presiding R. We recognize the Sunday school as the teaching service of the church. Our Master put great emphasis on teaching. He taught and preached in their synagogs. He often gathered together Himdeciples and taught them, as in the Sermon on the Mount, Mat. 5:7. The Apostle Paul laid great stress on teaching, so did the early Church Fathers. Ninety per cent of the conversions comes through the work of the Sunday school or teaching services. It is our conviction that each church should have a Baptist Sunday school throughout the year. We further recommend that the parents should attend the Sunday school and discourage the idea that Sunday school is for children only. We further recommend that if there is no churches, Sunday schools should be established in all communities.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Mission work, or carrying the gospel to the unevangelized, and developing the weak places, in our denomination, is of primary importance. For this, and this alone, our lord established His churclin the world. When we cease to be useful in this regard we lose all right to standing and recognition as churches of Christ Jesus.

For the sake of convenience this work has been divided into State, Home, Foreign, District and City Missions. The principal and obligation are the same in all of these; the territorial division being for convenience only.

The foreign mission work of the Southern Baptists is done mainly through the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We occupy fields in China, Japan, Italy, Africa, Mexical South America and are slightly interested in some European work at present.

In all these fields the past year has exceeded in visible results any former year in the history of our work, except in Mexico. The revolution down there has crippled our work seriously. We trust that the providence of God will bring good even out of this reign

of carnage and bloodshed.

The call of Foreign Missions is a call to the deepest principles of our churches. It is also the call of our Lord, which we cannot to be to hear without suffering for it. Added to this there is the humanitarian call of the millions who are lost in darkness and inveloped in eternal ruin. We must hear this call.

Your committee would recommend the following:

First. Let every pastor in the Association secure and read at

limit one good book on Foreign Mission enterprise.

Second. Let pastors and churches make large use of the tracts which the Foreign Mission Board issues and which can be had free of cost by writing to R. J. Willingham, secretary of the foreign mission board, Richmond, Va.

Third. That pastors and laymen ought to take the Foreign Miston Journal, which costs 25 cents a year, and is issued by our foreign Mission Board at Richmond, Va.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This body shall be known by the name of the Grand Prairie Baptist Association, and composed of members chosen by the different churches in the union, who, on producing letters, shall be entitled to seats; also the ordinined ministers in good standing retiring moderator and all committees appointed at one session to report the next.

Article 2 The motto of this Association shall be: "The truth in its purity, preached in every section of our bounds."

or Missionaries, in our bounds; to solicit and collect money, of Article 3. The letters from the churches must state the numb() of members baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter.

Article 4. The members thus chosen and convened, shall have excluded, the name and postoffice of pastor and clerk.

no power to infringe on any of the rights of the churches, but may not as an advisory counsel for the common good of all the churches and advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom, and have power to exclude any church from her fellowship which may depart from the mospel of Christ, either in faith or practice.

Article 5. Every church composing this Association shall be untitled to three delegates.

Article 6. Should any church fail to represent herself for two meetutive years, she may be dropped from the list of churches, should a satisfactory reason not be given.

Article 7. New church may be admitted into this body who putition by letter and delegates, if found to be sound in faith and mood order, the reception to be manifested by the moderator living the right hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Article 8. This Association shall annually elect a moderator from among themselves whose duty it shall be to see that the lines of Decorum are observed, and take the voice of the Association all questions properly brought before it; also, a vice Moderator, and a Clerk, whose duty it shall be to keep a correct record of all the business of the Association; also a treasurer, to receive and distance the funds sent up to the Association, as directed by the body, or churches sending the same.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association retain on the Minutes the names of all churches admitted to membership, until such are dropped by action of the Association; and in cases of non representation, it shall be his duty to write: "Not represented" in the proper place opposite their names in the matterial table.

Article 10. This Association shall in all cases be governed by a majority of the members present, except in the reception and dismission of a church, which shall be unanimous.

Article II This Association may correspond with other Associa-

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Association to appoint minister to preach an introductory sermon, with an alternate; to one, with an alternate to preach a Missionary sermon at each meeting session; and to fix the time and place for the next meeting of the body.

Article 13. The Moderator shall appoint, at each annual session, in Executive Board, consisting of at least one member from each thurch whose duty it shall be to elect and employ a Missionary the orders on the Treasurer of the Association to pay the same, which orders the Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay out of any many that he may have for this purpose; also to change during vacation, the time or place, or both, for next meeting of the Association, whenever in the providence of God, it may be necessary. The of-

ficers of the Association shall be considered members of the board.

Article 14. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time, by a two-third vote of the members present, except that clause in fourth article which prohibits interference with the internal rights of the churches; which shall forever remain in tact.

Article 15. The Minutes shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer.

Article 2. The Moderator, vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasure shall be elected by ballot by the members present.

Article 3. The Moderator shall be considered the judge of order, but any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the body.

Article 4. The moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speaking as other members, but not to vote, unless it is a tie.

Article 5. All questions shall be introduced by motion, and il seconded, shall be open for discussion, unless withdrawn by the mover or his second. When a subject has been discussed a reasonable time, the Moderator shall, when the question is called for proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and nays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.

Article 6. Any member wishing to speak, shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject or make personal reflections.

Article 7. No person shall speak more than once upon any subject, until all who wish to speak have had an opportunity, nor more than twice without permission.

Article 8. Every subject introduced for discussion shall be decided before another is offered, unless it be liad over by motion, with the consent of the mover and the Association.

Article 9. The names of Messengers shall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. Any members wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

Article 10. The appellation of "borther" shall be used in addresing each other.

Article II. Any member violating the rules, shall be subject to reproof by the Moderator.

Article 12. Amendments or alterations may be made to them rules when a majority may deem it necessary.

Article 13 Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by general parlimentary rules.
