Arkansas may truly be said to be almost a mission field. That it is our duty as far as possible to occupy this yast territory for Christ

Our state Board has had on this field during the past year fifteen men; some in the towns and some in the country. These men have all done a good work for the Master. The Board could have put at least one hundred men to work if it could have had

the means with which to send them out.

agree to pay weekly or monthly as the Lord may prosper them to the cause of missions.

- 3. That all monies thus raised to be paid into the treasury of the church, thereby making the church the custodian of all funds thus raised.
- 4. That the church from time to time appropriate the funds to the Associational, the State, the Home, and the Foreign Boards, as the necessities may demand.
- 5. Your committee would further recommend that as a means to greatly aid the churches in putting the above plan into successful operation, the mission book, adopted by the state Board which can be had at the small cost of thirty-five cents per copy, and can be procured upon application to M. D. Early, Little Rock, Ark. This association contributed \$85.78 to state missions the past year.

The committee on education reported:

We, your committee on education, would respectfully submit the following: Since ignorance and vice are closely allied, so education and civilization, with all their concomitant blessings, are inseparable companions.

All nations are apprised of this fact, and knowing that in order to develop their varied resources, and to elevate their subjects and thereby keep pace with the progressive march of science,

are making strenuous efforts to educate their subjects.

But, intellectual training does not necessarily make a man or nation great; and we find that those nations who have regard for the moral as well as the mental training occupy a position that others may envy, but never reach:

If education is so essential to develop, energize and support all other industrial pursuits, how much more important when applied to the great work assigned us of rescuing the sons and daughters of Adam:

Here we have error in every guise to combat skepticism and sophistry to meet infidelity and ritualism to antagonize us at every step, and all these, spirits of satanic origin advocated by educated talents. To successfully overcome this unrelenting opposition to that which is dearer to us than our lives, our sons and daughters ought to receive that moral and intellectual training that the interest demands.

In educating our children great wisdom is to be exercised in selecting teachers, schools and books. Our denomination in the state has long felt the deficiency in this important matter, and by prayer and zeal, wisdom and means combined, have succeeded in establishing a college at Arkadelphia for the education of both sexes, and now ask for that support which is necessary to make it a parmanency, and which it is justly entitled to. No school can prosper without children and money. The denomination has both. Shall we withhold them, or shall we not rather rally to the support of these noble brethren who have labored so faithfully to establish this school? This school bas all the necessary advantages for ministerial education also, and while we are praying for more laborers in the Lord's vineyard, let us make an effort to encourage, by our means and prayers, those young ministers who are struggling to obtain an education and have not the necessary funds. This is a part of our work that has been sadly neglected hitherto and now demands our serious at-W. H. PASLAY, Ch'm. tention.

Amendment offered by T. D. Ware:

In view of the great importance of an educated ministry, we would most heartily recommend that this association support some one young man studying for the ministry at Ouachita College: further, that the churches of this association pledge

one hundred and twenty-five dollars for the purpose, and that a committee be appointed to superintend the work, and that the young man supported must have the indorsement of the associational Board.

Your committee, to whom was referred the letters from Pilgrim Rest and Level Valley churches, petitioning for membership into this body, would respectfully submit the following: While we regard the manner of their organization irregular, and contrary to the general usage of the Baptist denomination, and highly inexpedient, and would most earnestly discourage a repetition of similar proceedings, yet, in view of all the facts in the case, would recommend the reception of the above churches into the association.

On motion, W. A. Forbes, editor Ackansus Baptist, was invited to the courtesies of this body.

Committee on Temperance submitted the following: Every Christian ought to be thankful to God for the unprecedented success of the temperance reformation. Four states, by large majorities, have adopted a constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicants as a beverage. Some seventeen states have passed a law providing that the nature of alchoholic drinks and narcotics, and their effects upon the human system, shall be taught in all the public schools. The congress of the United States by a majority almost amounting to

unanimity, passed a similar law for the District of Columbia and territories. The plan of prohibiting by local option is doing a vast amount of good in a large number of states, among which

our beloved Arkansas stands prominent.

The drink trafic assails the most sacred rites and interests of humanity. It is more destructive to the human race than war, famine and pestilence combined. Every philanthropist ought to throw the full force of his influence against it. Therefore we would advise all Christians to use all proper means to establish the rule of total abstinence for the individual, and total prohibition for the state. It is, therefore, our solemn duty to do all in our power to bring the church of Christ up to the standard of New Testament discipline in reference to intemperance as well as all other sins.

One of the grandest revolutions now going on in the world.

One of the grandest revolutions now going on in the world, is the one to abolish the traffic in intoxicant as a beverage. any one will carefully investigate the contest for constitutional prohibition in the states of Michigan, Texas and Tennessee, they will see arrayed on the side of prohibition the largest portion and best part of the different religious denominations, with tears, and prayers and arguments, appealing to the word of God, to science, to history, to facts, presenting the temporal interests for time and the spiritual interests for eternity, thus appealing tothe people to stop the ravages of this monster evil. On the other side are arrayed the advocates of blood and money, including some of the most degraded of the human race, with the millions procured at the expense of broken hearts, and blasted hopes, and blood, and death, and ruins in every horrid form; degrading church members, corrupting the ballot box, bribing politicians, assassinating their opponents, bribing juries, using the poor, ignorant Africans, and the tenfold more degraded inimigrants from all parts of the world, to back them up in robbing the wife of her husband, the mother of her sons, the community of its peace and safety; assailing everything sacred and holy, and encouraging everything vile and degraded. We now appeal to every one who reads this report, after praying to God for direction, to choose on which side of this tremendous contest they will throw their influence.

Committee on Associational Missions reported as follows:

BRETHREN: It is certainly true that while other interests coming before this body demand our most careful consideration. nothing is of such importance as our associational work. The harvest truly is great and the labors are few. The report of our board shows that from two months work done by M. K. Thornton and A.C. Ball that the Lord has greatly blessed them, and that there is still much to be accomplished. There are places within our bounds where there has been no preaching in the last three years, and many other places where there is great destitu-The committee would recommend that our churches be advised to adopt the best possible system of securing funds for this much needed work. And that the pastors of churches as far as possible look after the destitution in the bounds of their churches. Whenever the associational and state work is strengthened then the interest of the Home and Foreign is advanced. We would recommend a hearty co-operation with our state board, and that all appointments of our board be reported to the state board, and ask them to ratify the same simply that our work may be one. We would also recommend that the plan pursued by the executive board for the last three years, of employing missionaries during the summer months and fall T. D. WARE, Chr'm. months, be continued.

On motion, after discussion by T. D. Ware and M. D. Early,

Pending discussion, on motion; by W. H. Paslay, adjourned to meet to-night after preaching.

SATURDAY NIGHT.

After preaching by W. H. Paslay from Rom. vii: 24, the association convened for business.

The committee on religious exercises reported that M. P. Early would preach at the Baptist Church to-morrow at 11 o'clock a. m. T. D. Ware at the Methodist Church, and W. A. Forbes at the Presbyterian Church the same hour.

Forbes at the Presbyterian Church the same hour, Resumed the discussion of associational missions by intro-

ducing the report of the executive board, which is as follows:

At a meeting of the board during the session of the associa-

tion at Brinkley, it was ascertained that after defraving all expenses of the association there was on hand #- The board decided to use a part of the amount in assisting weak churches in sustaining their pastors. At a meeting of the board on Saturday before the fifth Sunday in May in pursuance of the above decision the amount of \$50.00 was appropriated to Brinkley church and \$15,00 to Mars Hill. At the same meeting the secretary of the board was instructed to correspond with the presidents of Jackson University, Tenn., Clinton College, Miss., and Onachita College, Ark., with a view to securing the services of two young men to act as missionaries in the Mt. Vernon Asseciation, which resulted in employing M. K. Thornton and A. C. Ball from Clinton College for two months, beginning the 15th of July and ending the 15th of September at a salary of \$50.00 per month each. Their report is as follows: Baptized 52, restorations and conversions, 106; amount collected, \$17.90; held six protracted meetings and organized two churches.

The meetings were held in the southwestern portion of Phillips and southern part of Monroe, and in other sections of country where there had been but little or no preaching. The board instructed the missionaries when they commenced a meeting to continue as long as there was hope of doing good. They usually held their meetings from ten days to two weeks. They found the destitution so great that in order to do the work as instructed, the time for which they were employed was exhausted before they could occupy the whole field.

tance of the work. Brethren there is no field of christian labor where so many can be employed to such great advantage nor where the average christian can accomplish so much for the Master. It is the candid opinion of this committee that if you would advance the interest of the Baptist cause you must teach ; the children the Bible in its purity and simplicity. We therefore recommend that the church be urged through these messen-

Committee on Home Missions reported: Your committee on Home Missions would submit the following:

This Mission is under the auspices of the home board of the

Southern Baptist Convention. The field of this board embraces Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas-together with the Indian Ter-

ritory and the Island of Cuba. The work in Cuba is a marvell in modern missions. ° Arkansas has been asked for five hundred dollars the present year. About three hundred and fifty of this amount was

pledged at the last Baptist State Convention. This board has done a grand work work in Arkansas, and

we most respectfully ask that our churches contribute of their means to help in this great work.
